#### 9 MATTERS/QUESTIONS OF WHICH NOTICE HAS NOT BEEN GIVEN

The following questions were asked by Cr T Harbour to the Chief Executive Officer:

1. Is it correct that blocks of land in the Winton Town Plan are being classified as Corfield?

Most of the blocks within the Winton Zone and Precinct Map (as included in the Winton Planning Scheme) are identified / classified as Winton. However, there are some blocks which Council has described as being Winton, but the Department of Natural Resources, Mines and Energy is referring to these blocks as being in Corfield or Opalton. Please refer to the map below which shows the rural residential land adjacent to the Kennedy Developmental Road being described as Corfield. Also, the golf course land is designated as Corfield and land south of Riley Street is described as Opalton.



#### 2. If this is the case, who authorised these changes?

These property descriptions / localities have been established under *Queensland's Place Names Act 1994* and are developed in consultation with the community, local government and organisations like Australia Post. The purpose of localities is to enable unambiguous property addressing which in turn facilitates efficient delivery of essential and emergency services.

The DNRME has provided the following commentary: -

Should the needs of a community not be met by the existing arrangements, the Department accepts suggestions to make changes to localities under the Act. Locality names and boundaries are intended to be enduring and should only be changed where there are sound reasons. Long term benefits to the community shall outweigh any private or corporate interests, short term effects and the impact on the community in making a change. The Winton Shire local government area consists of the localities of: -

- Winton
- Corfield
- Opalton
- Middleton
- Kynuna

Winton and Corfield both contain town centres. Opalton includes features such as the Opalton Outpost and fossicking fields. Kynuna locality is split between both Winton and McKinlay Shires, with the town centre in McKinlay Shire.

#### 3. When was Council informed of these property description changes?

Based on information from the DNRME, the localities and boundaries were named and bounded by the Minister for Natural Resources on 7 April 2000. The boundary between Corfield and Winton was amended on 29 August 2014 (this appears to be just the railway section on the northern side of Winton). Without conducting further investigations, I assume the Council was informed of these changes when the localities and boundaries were introduced and amended.

#### SUMMARY

In October 2019, Council engaged George Bourne and Associates to create a Quarry Management Plan for Council to follow and bring all the Council owned pits up to the correct compliance and operating standards.

#### RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the report be received.
- 2. THAT Council adopt the Quarry Management Plan.

#### **REPORT**

In October 2019, Council engaged George Bourne and Associates (GBA) to create a Quarry Management Plan for Council operated quarries.

The Quarry Management Plans covers all the required standards and regulations that Council are to follow to keep their gravel pits compliant and operating efficiently under the *Environmental Protection Act 1994*. Currently Council have sixty-nine usable gravel pits in various locations throughout the shire set on road and stock reserves, freehold land and lease hold land.

The process for setting up a Quarry site are as follows;

- Area is visual surveyed by Council Officers.
- Contact is made with GBA to set up the Gravel Pit through Department of Agriculture and Fisheries (DAF) and the landowner, depends on the status of the land could be just the land owner.
- Once DAF approves the pit a Cultural Heritage Assessment (CHA) with the Traditional Owners of the land is conducted and the area is pegged awaiting approval.
- Once approval is sort through the CHA the pit is added to Councils Environment Authority (EA) and works begin on setting up the operation of the Gravel Pit.

 Once operations have ceased at the Gravel Pit there is a Rehabilitation Plan attached to the Quarry Management Plan that has to be followed to rehabilitate the site.

Council currently has an agreement in place with DAF for the extraction of materials on lease hold land within the shire. This agreement does come with its own set of conditions regarding Health and Safety under the *Mining and Quarrying Safety and ACT 1999*, purchasing of the material and access to the sites. Under this agreement Council must provide signage at each gravel pit site stating Councils name, contact details, do not enter signs and a Quarry Management Plan.

Council does have agreements in place for gravel pits that are on freehold land. These agreements must be made with the property owner and Council for an agreed price and conditions by both the parties, these gravel pits also fall under the Quarry Management Plan. Council Officers are regularly scouting around for new sources of gravel around the shire if a site is deemed suitable the above process will be repeated and the Quarry Management Plan reviewed to add new pits to it.

#### Schedule 2 – Terms and conditions

#### 1. Extension

Effective on and from the Commencement Date, the term of the Agreement is extended to the Extension Date.

#### General

#### 2.1 Further acts

Each party must promptly de all acts and execute and deliver all documents (in form and content reasonably satisfactory to that party) required by law or reasonably requested by the other party to give effect to this deed.

#### 2.2 Notices

Each communication (including each notice, consent, approval, request and demand) in connection with this deed to be given by either party to the other must be in writing and delivered by hand, posted by pre-paid post, or sent by facsimile transmission to the address or number specified in Item 1 of Schedule 1 (or any other address or number notified from time to time).

#### 2.3 Counterparts

This deed may be executed in any number of counterparts and by the parties on separate counterparts. Each counterpart constitutes the deed of each party who has executed and delivered that counterpart.

#### 2.4 Expenses

Except as otherwise provided in this deed, each party must pay its own costs and expenses in connection with preparing, negotiating, executing and performing this deed.

#### 2.5 Governing law

This deed is governed by and will be construed according to the law applying in Queensland.

#### 2.6 Jurisdiction

Each party irrevocably:

- submits to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of Queensland, and the courts competent to determine appeals from those courts, with respect to any proceedings that may be brought at any time relating to this deed; and
- (b) waives any objection it may now or in the future have to the venue of any proceedings, and any claim it may now or in the future have that any proceedings have been brought in an inconvenient forum, if that venue falls within clause 2.6(a).

#### 3. Definitions and interpretation

In this deed

- (a) Unless the context indicates a contrary intention, the definitions and rules of interpretation specified in Schedule 1 of the Agreement also apply to this deed.
- (b) Agreement means the agreement between the parties as described in the Background to this deed and attached in Annexure 1.
- (c) Commencement Date means the date specified Item 2 of Schedule 1.
- (d) Extension Date means the date specified in Item 3 of Schedule 1
- (e) Machinery of Government Change means a change to the title, structure, functions or operations of the Department or a part of the Department (including corporatisation) as a result of an order made under the Constitution of Queensland 2001 (Qld) or other Queensland legislation.

#### PERMIT

1.1 This Sales Permit authorises You to Get the Sale Quantity of Quarry Material from each Endorsed Area, in accordance with the Act and the terms and conditions of this Sales Permit.

#### No Warranty

- 1.2 To the extent permitted by law, the Chief Executive does not give any warranty in respect of:
  - the type, quality, or quantity of Quarry Material the subject of this Sales Permit, and
  - (b) access to the Supply Zone and the Quarry Material,

and You agree that You have entered into this Permit having conducted Your own investigations and at Your own risk.

#### 2. COMMENCEMENT AND TERM

- 2.1 This Sales Permit commences on the Commencement Date and, unless terminated earlier by agreement between the parties, or otherwise in accordance with the terms of this Sales Permit, will expire on 30 September 2019 ("Expiry Date").
- 2.2 The Chief Executive may, in his or her absolute discretion, extend this Sales Permit by notice in writing, for any term and on any conditions the Chief Executive thinks fit, provided You make a written request for an extension not less than 12 months prior to the Expiry Date.

#### 3. APPROVALS AND COMMENCEMENT OF QUARRYING OPERATIONS

- You may only Get Quarry Material from Endorsed Areas.
- 3.2 The Chief Executive may, by notice in writing (in the form of an updated Schedule 3), add or remove Endersed Areas to this Sales Permit from time to time.
- 3.3 Within one (1) year of the Effective Date for each Endorsed Area, You must do the following, in respect of that Endorsed Area:
  - obtain the following approvals and permits, as required for Your Quarrying Operations:
    - Development Approval under the Sustainable Planning Act 2009 or the State Development and Public Works Organisation Act 1971, as applicable;
    - any approval or permits required under the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (Cth); and
    - any other approval, permit or other authority required to be obtained under Commonwealth, State or local laws, for the Quarrying Operations; and
  - in respect of the Development Approval required under clause 3.3(a)(i), provide to the Chief Executive a copy of the Development Approval; and
  - in respect of any other permits and approvals required under clause 3.3(a), notify the Chief Executive in writing that You hold such approvals and permits;
  - (d) provide written evidence to the Chief Executive's satisfaction, at his or her sole discretion, that a particular approval, permit, or other authority is not required for an Endorsed/Area.
- 3.4 If You do not comply with clause 3.3, the Chief Executive may do either of the following, in his or her sole discretion, by notice in writing:
  - exclude from this Sales Permit the Endorsed Area/s in respect of which You have not complied with clause 3.3;

- (b) terminate this Sales Permit; or
- (c) agree to grant an extension of time for You to comply with clause 3.3 in relation to one or more Endorsed Areas.
- 3.5 It is a matter for You to seek the Chief Executive's written approval to grant an extension of time under clause 3.4(c). You must provide any and all documents and/or evidence the Chief Executive considers reasonably necessary to facilitate his or her decision under clause 3.4(c).
- 3.6 Quarrying Operations must not commence (or recommence, as the case may be) on an Endorsed Area until You have done the following:
  - (a) complied with clause 3.3 in relation to that Endorsed Area;
  - finalised Your Quarry Management Plan for the Endorsed Area, to the satisfaction of the Chief Executive in writing;
  - provided the Chief Executive with a copy of Your Terrain Survey for the Endorsed Area as required under clause 4.1; and
  - provided the Chief Executive with evidence of the insurances required under clause 26.

#### MEASURING AND DECLARATION OF QUARRY MATERIAL YOU GET FROM THE SUPPLY ZONE

#### Requirement to Survey

- 4.1 If requested in writing by the Chief Executive You must engage a Registered Surveyor to complete a Terrain Survey of each Endorsed Area, prior to the commencement of Quarrying Operations on that Endorsed Area. The results of this survey must be supplied to the Chief Executive, and must include details of:
  - if known, the estimated quantity of available Quarry Material on the Endorsed Area in Cubic Metres and Tonnes; and
  - (b) the contours, at not more than one (1) metre intervals, of the Endorsed Area, on the Survey Map; and
  - (c) the boundaries of the Endorsed Area on the Survey Map, how these are permanently marked on the ground on the Endorsed Area and the location of the Access Road/s on the Survey Map.
- 4.2 If requested in writing by the Chief Executive You must:
  - (a) engage a Registered Surveyor to undertake a Quantity Survey of each Endorsed Area, by 31 July of each year, to quantify the quantity of Quarry Material actually removed by You in the previous 12 month period ending 30 June, or other period as requested by the Chief Executive;
  - (b) provide the Chief Executive with a copy of the Quantity Survey and associated report by 31 December of each year or as otherwise directed in writing by the Chief Executive;
  - (c) retain the survey data used by Your Registered Surveyor and, when requested by the Chief Executive, provide this survey and associated data to the Chief Executive within 7 days of the request.

#### Measuring Procedure

- 4.3 To determine the quantity of Quarry Material removed from an Endorsed Area You must use either:
  - (a) Volumetric Truck Count;
  - (b) a Scale Equipped Loader Bucket;
  - (c) Other Scale Equipment;

- (d) A Weighbridge;
- (e) Volumetric Loader Bucket, or
- (f) Other Approved Measuring Method,

as specified as the Method of Quantity Measurement in Item 5 of the table in Schedule 3 for the Endorsed Area.

#### 4.4 If You use

- (a) Volumetric Truck Count You must ensure that You accurately know and maintain records of the volumetric or weight carrying capacity, as applicable, of each truck or other vehicle removing Quarry Material from the Endorsed Area and You must accurately record and maintain a daily tally of the number of loads removed from the Endorsed Area by each truck or other vehicle; or
- (b) a Volumetric Loader Bucket You must ensure that You accurately know and maintain records of the cubic capacity of each loader or other equipment You use to load and/or remove Quarry Material from an Endorsed Area and You must accurately record and maintain a daily tally of the quantity of Quarry Material removed from the Endorsed Area; or
- (c) a Scale Equipped Loader Bucket, Other Scale Equipment or a Weighbridge it must be properly installed, must always measure accurately and must be certified and maintained in accordance with the National Measurement Act 1960 (Cth); or
- (d) Other Approved Measuring Method You must ensure that You accurately know and maintain records of the daily quantity of Quarry Material removed from the Endorsed Area consistent with the measuring procedures approved by the Chief Executive.

#### Periodic Declarations

- 4.5 For each Declaration Period:
  - (a) You must complete a Periodic Declaration form, including details of the type and quantity of Quarry Material removed from each Endorsed Area during the Declaration Period; and
  - (b) the Periodic Declaration form must be submitted to the Chief Executive within fourteen (14) days following the end of the Declaration Period, by email to fo northfmp@daff.gld.gov.au and also mailed to Forest Products DAFF, at PO Box 6014, Red Hill, Rockhampton, Queensland 4701, or to such other address as notified by the Chief Executive from time to time.
- 4.6 If there are no removals of Quarry Material for a particular Declaration Period, You must still complete and submit a Periodic Declaration form, showing 'NIL' removals, in accordance with clause 4.5(b).
- 4.7 If You fail to supply a completed Periodic Declaration by the due date, or if the Chief Executive is of the view that the information on a Periodic Declaration, or any other Record is inaccurate, incomplete or illegible, You will be in breach of this Sales Permit and the Chief Executive may, in addition to the rights conferred under the Act and this Sales Permit, determine the amount payable for any such period and may issue a notice to You to pay such amount within fourteen (14) days of the date of the notice.

#### Removal Dockets and Other Records

- 4.8 Unless advised otherwise in writing by the Chief Executive, the quantity of Quarry Material removed from an Endorsed Area must be recorded on a Removal Docket prior to its removal from the Endorsed Area. Each Removal Docket must be fully completed, accurately and legibly.
- 4.9 You must comply with:

- (a) clause 4.10 if You are using Volumetric Truck Counts, Volumetric Loader Bucket or Other Approved Measuring Method;
- (b) clause 4.10 if You are using a Scale Equipped Loader Bucket or Other Scale Equipment that is not capable of producing a printed docket of the quantity of Quarry Material; or
- (c) clauses 4.11 and 4.12 if You are using a Scale Equipped Loader Bucket, Other Scale Equipment or a Weighbridge that is capable of producing a printed docket of the quantity of Quarry Material.

as applicable from time to time, to calculate the quantity of Quarry Material removed from the Endorsed Area.

- 4.10 Following the end of each Declaration Period, together with the Periodic Declaration required under clause 4.5, You must, unless otherwise advised in writing by the Chief Executive, also provide the Chief Executive with the originals of the Removal Dockets completed for that Declaration Period, in accordance with the procedure set out in clause 4.5(b).
- 4.11 The quantity of Quarry Material removed from an Endorsed Area must be recorded on records produced by Your Scale Equipped Loader Bucket, Other Scale Equipment or Weighbridge, and You must, unless otherwise advised in writing by the Chief Executive, provide a signed and certified copy of these records to the Chief Executive in accordance with clause 4.12.
- 4.12 Following the end of each Declaration Period, together with the Periodic Declaration required under clause 4.5, You must, unless otherwise advised in writing by the Chief Executive, provide the Chief Executive with a signed and certified copy of all records produced by Your Scale Equipped Loader Bucket, Other Scale Equipment or Weighbridge for every load of Quarry Material removed from an Endorsed Area during that Declaration Period, in accordance with the procedure set out in clause 4.5(b).

#### Production of Removal Dockets

4.13 The driver of any vehicle loaded with Quarry Material Got under authority of this Sales Permit, must, upon being intercepted and requested by the Chief Executive, immediately produce a completed Removal Docket for the load of Quarry Material in the vehicle. Failure by a driver to comply with this requirement may result in suspension of this Sales Permit.

#### Blast Report

4.14 Each time explosives are used to Get Quarry Material on an Endorsed Area, You must, unless advised otherwise in writing by the Chief Executive, obtain a Blast Report(s) showing the quantity of Quarry Material Got. The Blast Report must be delivered or posted to the Chief Executive care of Forest Products DAFF, PO Box 6014, Red Hill Rockhampton Queensland 4701, or other such address as notified by the Chief Executive from time to time, within 7 days of the blasting.

#### **Documented Procedures**

- 4.15 You must accurately document the procedures used by You and Your Operators for measuring, recording, accounting and declaration of Quarry Material for each Endorsed Area, to ensure that You comply with the requirements of Clause 4.
- 4.16 You must, when requested in writing by the Chief Executive provide the Chief Executive within 7 days of the request with a full copy of Your documented procedures.

#### Records

- 4.17 You must:
  - (a) keep all Records;

- allow, during Business Hours, the Chief Executive to inspect and make copies or extracts from the Records; and
- (c) supply such further information regarding entries or information in the Records as may be reasonably required by the Chief Executive.
- 4.18 You must retain the Records for five (5) years after their creation.

#### VALUES PAYABLE FOR QUARRY MATERIAL

- 5.1 Subject to the Value Review or General Value Review, You must pay the Chief Executive the following Values for the Quarry Material removed from the Supply Zone:
  - (a) \$0.64 per Cubic Metre of Quarry Material (as applicable to the Unit of Measurement specified in Item 3 of the table in Schedule 3 for the applicable Endorsed Area), where the material is:
    - removed from an Endorsed Area which is not a Reserve for which You are the trustee; and
    - (ii) used, or to be used by You in the Winton Shire Council area in carrying out Your responsibilities under the Local Government Act 2009.
  - (b) Nil Value for Quarry Material;
    - removed from an Endorsed Area which is a Reserve for which You are the trustee, and the material is used or to be used by You in the Winton Shire Council area in carrying out Your responsibilities under the Local Government Act 2009; or
    - (ii) where the material is to be supplied by You, at no charge for the material, to a State Government agency for its use except where the material is to be supplied under a supply contract or other arrangement acquired by You as part of a public tender process.
  - (c) Where neither clause 5.1(a) nor 5.1(b) applies to Quarry Material removed from an Endorsed Area, the Value for the Endorsed Area is as specified as the "Value for Clause 5.1(c)" in Item 8 of the table in Schedule 3, for the Endorsed Area.
- 5.2 You must pay the Chief Executive for the quantity of Quarry Material You Get from the Endorsed Area's each Declaration Period, as calculated by You or the Chief Executive in accordance with clause 4.
- 5.3 You will forfeit Your rights to any Quarry Material remaining on an Endorsed Area (whether stockpiled, processed or otherwise) on the expiration or termination of this Sales Permit, regardless of whether or not You have paid for the Quarry Material.

#### Value Reviews

- 5.4 The Value's payable for Quarry Material will be adjusted on 1 July of each year (the "Value Review"). The first Value Review will be carried out on 1 July 2014.
- 5.5 At each Value Review the Chief Executive will adjust the Value by the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index (All Groups) Brisbane during the preceding twelve (12) months to 31 Narch, as published by the Australian Bureau of Statistics.
- The Chief Executive may also carry out a General Value Review. The initial General Value Review will be on 30th September 2019 and (if applicable) then every 5 (five) year anniversary thereafter. In carrying out the General Value Review, the Chief Executive will take into account a number of factors including, but not limited to, the general value of competitive grades of quarry material or equivalent products and any change in relativity between these prices and the movement in the Consumer Price Index or other relevant indices, including the causes thereof.
- 5.7 The reviewed Value following a Value Review or General Value Review will be notified to You and put into effect by notice in writing signed by the Chief Executive.

- 5.8 Irrespective of when the Value Review or General Value Review is carried out, the reviewed Value is payable by You from the due date of the most recent Value Review or General Value Review or such other later date as determined by the Chief Executive and advised to You in writing.
- 5.9 If the Consumer Price Index (All Groups) Brisbane as published by the Australian Bureau of Statistics is discontinued or modified, the Chief Executive will determine, by notice in writing, an appropriate replacement indexation mechanism and the commencement of its implementation for the purpose of the Value Review and General Value Review.

#### ACCOUNTS

- 6.1 The Chief Executive will, when applicable, forward You an Account at the end of each Declaration Period, for payment for Quarry Material removed or other monies owing under this Sales Permit.
- 6.2 Except as otherwise agreed by the Chief Executive, when the Chief Executive sends You an Account for an amount due under this Sales Permit You must pay the amount stated in the Account within thirty (30) days from the date of the Account.
- 6.3 If You fail to pay any amount/s payable under this Sales Permit by the nominated due date, You may be required to pay interest on the outstanding amount, at a rate equal to the Commonwealth Bank of Australia's monthly overdraft index rate.

#### Seizure of Quarry Material

- 6.4 If You fail to comply with Your obligations to pay for Quarry Material under this Sales Permit, then, in addition to the rights of the Chief Executive under the Act and this Sales Permit, the Chief Executive may if necessary, seize and detain or remove from You the Quarry Material for which money is owing.
- 6.5 For the purpose of clause 6.4, You grant to the Chief Executive an irrevocable licence to enter the land or premises;
  - (a) owned or controlled by You; or
  - (b) of any associated company or agent where the Quarry Material is located.

without liability for trespass or any resulting damage and retake possession of the Quarry Material.

#### 7. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

7.1 This Sales Permit constitutes the entire agreement between You and the Chief Executive with respect to its subject matter and supersedes all previous negotiations, commitments and writings with respect to that subject matter.

#### DAMAGE

- 8.1 In carrying out activities authorised by this Sales Permit, You must exercise all reasonable care to avoid causing damage to any roads, fences or other improvements, including cultivated land and crops.
- 8.2 If the Chief Executive is satisfied that damage to improvements has been caused by a person purporting to act under the authority of this Sales Permit, the Chief Executive may, by written notice, require You to rectify or repair the damage.
- 8.3 If the damage is not rectified or repaired to the satisfaction of the Chief Executive within the time stated in the notice, the Chief Executive may arrange for repair or rectification of the damage, at Your cost.

#### 9. ACCESS ROADS AND ROAD USE

9.1 Vehicles entering or leaving an Endorsed Area must only use Access Roads and no other road or route should be used unless with the prior approval of the Chief Executive.

- 9.2 You must comply with any law, direction or policy of both State and Local Government Authorities in relation to the use of roads which are not under the control of the Chief Executive.
- 9.3 You must maintain all Access Roads in a good and satisfactory condition and, if applicable, in accordance with any requirements of the Local Authority.

#### 10. AMENDMENT AND VARIATION

- 10.1 Unless otherwise provided in this Sales Permit, the parties may agree to amend or vary this Sales Permit at any time by an agreement in writing executed by both parties.
- 10.2 Notwithstanding clause 10.1, the Chief Executive may, in his or her absolute discretion, vary a Schedule to his Sales Permit, by written notice to You if:
  - the whole or any part of a Schedule is or becomes inconsistent with Local, State or Commonwealth government law or policy; or
  - (b) the variation will have no material financial impact on You.

#### 11. APPLICABLE LAW

- 11.1 This Sales Permit will be governed by and construed according to the law of the State of Queensland, and the parties hereby agree to submit to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of Queensland.
- 11.2 You must comply with all relevant Local Authority, State and Commonwealth laws.

#### 12. ASSIGNMENT

12.1 You must not novate or assign or otherwise part with the rights and obligations in this Sales Permit.

#### 13. ABORIGINAL CULTURAL HERITAGE

- 13.1 You must take all reasonable and practicable measures to ensure that Your Quarrying Operations do not harm Aboriginal Cultural Heritage (the "Cultural Heritage duty of care").
- 13.2 If, in the course of Your Quarrying Operations, You identify or uncover any Aboriginal Cultural Heritage or are made aware of new information relevant to existing identified Aboriginal Cultural Heritage, You must, in addition to complying with all statutory reporting conditions.
  - advise the Chief Executive of the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage in writing within 7 days; and
  - (b) immediately cease all work that threatens the existence and preservation of that Aboriginal Cultural Heritage.
- 13.3 If You do not comply with this clause or Aboriginal Cultural Heritage is identified or uncovered in an Endorsed Area, the Chief Executive may, in his or her absolute discretion, do one or more of the following by notice in writing:
  - reduce the Endorsed Area to the extent that the Chief Executive is satisfied that Your Quarrying Operations will not harm or have a significant adverse impact on the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage;
  - (b) reduce the Sale Quantity;
  - (c) Suspend Quarrying Operations under this Sales Permit until the Chief Executive is satisfied that You can comply with Your Cultural Heritage duty of care; or
  - (d) terminate this Sales Permit.
- 13.4 Any rights and obligations under this Sales Permit that have accrued up to the date this Sales Permit is terminated pursuant to this clause will not be affected.

13.5 In this clause "Cultural Heritage duty of care" and "Aboriginal Cultural Heritage" have the same meanings as defined in the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 2003.

#### 14. DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION

#### 14.1 You must

- keep all Records in a secure location so that no unauthorised person is able to gain access to them; and
- ensure that Records are kept confidential and are not disclosed to any person, except:
  - (i) where required by law; (including disclosure to another government department or agency in order to satisfy the Chief Executive's obligations and responsibilities relating to the management of Quarry Material and Forest Products or environmental concerns pursuant to the Act and other State and Commonwealth laws); or
  - (ii) with the Chief Executive's consent.

#### DISPUTE RESOLUTION

#### Dispute resolution - general

- 15.1 Subject to clause 15.6, disputes between the parties will adhere to the following procedure prior to the commencement of litigation or other external dispute.
- 15.2 The Contact for one party may notify the Contact for the other in writing of the occurrence of a dispute (Dispute Notice) and the Contacts will try to resolve the dispute through negotiation.
- 15.3 If the Contacts are unable to resolve the dispute within 14 days from the receipt of the Dispute Notice, the dispute is to be referred to:
  - for You the person holding the position of Chief Executive Officer (or his or her delegate); and
  - (b) for the Chief Executive the Director, Forestry (or equivalent) or his or her delegate.

for resolution.

- 15.4 If the dispute is not resolved within 14 days after its referral to the representative of each of the parties as listed in clause 15.3, either party may refer the dispute to a mediator agreed by the parties with costs to be shared equally between the parties.
- 15.5 If the parties cannot agree upon a mediator, either party may request the President of the Queensland Law Society to nominate a mediator.
- 15.6 Nothing in this clause prevents either party from commencing court proceedings relating to any dispute arising from the Sales Permit at any time where that party seeks urgent interlocutory relief.
- 15.7 Each party will continue to perform this Sales Permit despite the existence of a dispute or any proceedings under this clause.

#### EXERCISE OF DISCRETION

16.1 If a party is granted discretion or the ability to determine any matter under this Sales Permit without reference to the other party, that discretion or ability must be exercised reasonably.

#### 17. FIRES

17.1 You must act promptly and do everything reasonably within Your power and at Your expense to prevent, extinguish or control any fire on or threatening the immediate vicinity of Your operations in the Supply Zone.

#### FORCE MAJEURE

- 18.1 Neither party will be liable for any delay or failure to perform its obligations (other than an obligation to make any payment), to the extent that the failure or delay is due to Force Majeure.
- 18.2 If either party is unable, because of Force Majeure, to carry out wholly or in part their obligations under this Sales Permit (other than an obligation to make any payment), they must notify the other party of the particulars of the Force Majeure as soon as is reasonably practicable.
- 18.3 The obligations of the party so far as they are affected by the Force Majeure will be Suspended during, but not longer than the continuance of (and for such further period thereafter as is reasonable in the circumstances) the Force Majeure.
- 18.4 The party giving the notice must take all steps and use all reasonable diligence to remove the Force Majeure as quickly as practicable, except that they will not be rendered liable to settle any strike, or other labour difficulty on terms not reasonably acceptable to them.

#### 19. RELEASE AND INDEMNITY

- You release to the full extent permitted by law, the Chief Executive from all actions, claims, proceedings or demands and in respect of any loss, death, injury, illness or damage (whether personal or property, and whether special, direct, indirect or consequential, including consequential financial loss) arising out of the granting of this Sales Permit and the Quarrying Operations, except to the extent that the loss, injury or damage was caused by the negligence of the Chief Executive.
- 19.2 To the full extent permitted by law, the Chief Executive will not be liable to You for any special, indirect or consequential damages, including consequential financial loss arising out of the granting of this Sales Permit or the Quarrying Operations.
- 19.3 You indemnify the Chief Executive against all liability, loss, costs and expenses (including any actions, claims, proceedings or demand brought by any third party, and any legal fees, costs and disbursements on a solicitor and own client basis) arising from or incurred in connection with:
  - any unlawful, wilful or negligent act or omission by You, Your Operator/s, or any person for whose conduct You are liable; and
  - (b) personal injury (including sickness and death) or property damage or loss in connection with the performance (or attempted or purported performance or non-performance) of Quarrying Operations or any other activity in connection with this Sales Permit or a breach of this Sales Permit by You.
- 19.4 Your liability to indemnify the Chief Executive under clause 19.3 will be reduced proportionally to the extent that any negligent act or omission or breach of this Sales Permit by the Chief Executive caused the loss or liability.
- 19.5 The indemnity granted in clause 19.3 is in addition to and not exclusive of any other remedies the Chief Executive may have against You at law.
- 19.6 You indemnify the Landholder against all liability, loss, costs and expenses (including any actions, claims, proceedings or demand brought by any third party, and any legal fees, costs and disbursements on a solicitor and own client basis) arising from or incurred in connection with:
  - any untawful, wilful or negligent act or omission by You, Your Operator/s, or any person for whose conduct You are liable; and
  - (b) personal injury (including sickness and death) or property damage or loss in connection with the performance (or attempted or purported performance or non-performance) of Quarrying Operations or any other activity in connection with this Sales Permit.

- 19.7 Your liability to indemnify the Landholder under clause 19.6 will be reduced proportionally to the extent that any negligent act or omission by the Landholder caused the loss or liability.
- 19.8 The parties to this Sales Permit acknowledge and agree that in respect of clause 19.6;
  - (a) the signing of the Sales Permit by the Chief Executive is an acceptance on behalf of the Landholder of the promises contained in clause 19.6; and
  - (b) You must if requested by the Chief Executive sign any further documents or do anything further required by the Chief Executive to ensure that the promises contained in this clause are enforceable by the Landholder against You.
- 19.9 This clause will survive the termination or expiration of this Sales Permit
- 19.10 In this clause, "Landholder' means a person having an interest in land within the Supply Zone, in whole or in part.

#### 20. INTERFERENCE WITH RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES OF CROWN LESSEES

20.1 Subject to the Act, You must not by any act or omission interfere with the rights and privileges of any lessee, licence or holder of any authority from the State of Queensland for part or all of the Supply Zone, unless You do so with the consent of such lessee, licensor or authority holder.

#### 21. MECHANICAL EQUIPMENT

- 21.1 The Chief Executive may examine any item of mechanical equipment brought onto an Endorsed Area.
- 21.2 You must maintain all mechanical equipment brought onto an Endorsed Area, including that belonging to any Operator or other party, in good working order, fit for its designed purposed and in such a condition that it does not constitute a safety and/or fire threat.
- 21.3 In this clause "mechanical equipment" means and includes, but is not limited to all makes of tractors, trucks and any other item of plant or equipment as may be determined by the Chief Executive from time to time.

#### 22. NOTICES

- 22.1 Subject to clause 22.2, all communications under this Sales Permit must be in writing and, unless otherwise specified in this Sales Permit, must be delivered by hand, by prepaid post, email or facsimile to the Contact and address specified in Schedule 4, or any substitute address as may be notified in writing by the relevant addressee from time to time.
- 22.2 Formal notices, if sent by email, must be in pdf format, or other format that is a scanned image of the original communication, including a handwritten signature, and attached to the email. For the purpose of this clause, formal notices are notices provided under the following clauses:
  - (a) Clause 2.2;
  - (b) Clause 3.2, 3.3;
  - (c) Clause 5.7;
  - (d) Clause 8.2;
  - (e) Clause 10.2
  - (f) Clause 13.3:
  - (g) Clause 15.2;
  - (h) Clause 26.1;(i) Clause 30.1; and
  - Clause 31.1.
- 22.3 Notice will be deemed to be given:
  - (a) where sent by pre-paid post on the fifth day after the date of posting;
  - (b) where hand delivered on delivery;

- (c) where sent by facsimile transmission upon an apparently successful transmission being noted by the sender's facsimile machine prior to close of business at 5.00pm; or
- (d) where sent by email on the day that the email is sent, unless the party sending the email knows or reasonably ought to suspect that the email and the attached communication were not delivered to that addressee's domain specified in the email address;

as the case may be, but if the communication is taken to have been received on a day that is not a Business Day or later than 5.00pm on a Business Day, the communication is taken to have been received at 9.00am on the next Business Day.

#### 23. PASSING OF OWNERSHIP

23.1 All Quarry Material remains the property of the State until it is paid for, or in the case of material to which clause 5.1(b) applies, until the Quarry Material has been declared and accounted for by You in accordance with clause 4.

#### 24. INSURANCE

- 24.1 You must effect and maintain for the term of this Sales Permit the following insurances:
  - insurance under the Workers' Compensation and Rehabilitation Act 2003 (Qld) to cover workers, eligible persons, self employed contractors, directors, trustees and partners who will be entering on the Supply Zone; and
  - a public liability insurance policy for not less than \$20 million arising from any one event in respect of the death of, or injury to persons, or loss or damage to property; and
  - (c) any other insurance as reasonably required by the Chief Executive.
- 24.2 The insurance policies required under clause 24.1 must be with an Appropriate Insurer.
- 24.3 You must ensure that the insurance policies that You have effected pursuant to this clause cover all Your invitees, employees, contractors and agents and names the State of Queensland as an interested party and cover the Quarrying Operations under this Sales Permit.
- 24.4 From time to time (but no more than once annually) the Chief Executive, acting reasonably, can issue a notice to You increasing the minimum insurance cover required by this clause 24.
- 24.5 You must, within 5 Business Days of the request, provide copies of policies or certificates of currency for the insurances required under this clause 24 if requested by the Chief Executive, acting reasonably.
- 24.6 If You are an individual or sole trader, then clause 24.1(a) is satisfied if You maintain:
  - (a) personal accident insurance covering all medical treatment, hospitalisation and medical expenses; and
  - (b) income protection insurance; and
  - (c) death and disability insurance,

equivalent to the coverage and entitlements provided to employees under the statutory provisions of the Workers Compensation and Rehabilitation Act 2003 (Qld).

24.7 You must take such reasonable steps as are necessary to ensure that each Operator takes out and maintains a public liability insurance policy which meets the requirements of this clause.

#### 25. QUARRY PLAN AND OTHER AUTHORITIES

#### Quarry Management Plan

- 25.1 You must not conduct Quarrying Operations on an Endorsed Area until the Chief Executive has approved the Quarry Management Plan (or amended Quarry Management Plan) applicable to that Endorsed Area.
- 25.2 You must prepare a Quarry Management Plan which includes the following:
  - a description of Your working plan for the quarry;
  - (b) the layout of the quarry and the associated infrastructure;
  - (c) the measures to be taken by You to minimise safety risks and adverse environmental impact resulting from Your Quarrying Operations;
  - (d) the requirements and nature of Your rehabilitation works and undertakings to be implemented for worked out areas;
  - (e) a description of the final landform to be prepared post rehabilitation; and
  - (f) any other matters or requirements as required by the Chief Executive.
- 25.3 The Quarry Management Plan must be consistent with all relevant requirements of the Development Approval.
- 25.4 Where a dam is being retained after completion of the Quarrying Operations, You must provide to the Chief Executive the written approval of the landholder.
- 25.5 Your Quarrying Operations must at all times comply with the Quarry Management Plan.
- 25.6 You must immediately, upon cessation of works on the Endorsed Area or part of the Endorsed Area, undertake rehabilitation of the disturbed area in accordance with the Quarry Management Plan, and each worked out area of the Endorsed Area must be progressively rehabilitated as required under the Quarry Management Plan.
- 25.7 The Quarry Management Plan must be updated by You as necessary to maintain its currency and to accommodate any revised arrangements in Your Quarrying Operations.
- 25.8 Any variation, amendment, update or revision of the Quarry Management Plan under clause 25.7 will not take effect without the written approval of the Chief Executive.
- 25.9 The Quarry Management Plan forms part of, and is subject to this Sales Permit.
- 25.10 Where any inconsistency exists between:
  - (a) the Quarry Management Plan; and
  - (b) any other provisions of this Sales Permit,

the provisions will take precedence in that order, to the extent necessary to resolve any inconsistency.

#### Legislation and other Authorities

- 25.11 You must hold and keep current all relevant licences, approvals, permits and other authorities required under all relevant State, Commonwealth and local authority legislation and regulations in respect of the Quarrying Operations conducted under this Sales Permit.
- 25.12 Quarrying Operations must at all times comply with:
  - all relevant State, Commonwealth and local authority legislation and regulations, including but not limited to the Environmental Protection Act 1994; and

(b) all relevant approvals, permits and other authorities, including but not limited to Development Approval under the Sustainable Planning Act 2009 and any required permits under the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (Cth).

#### 26. REMOVAL OF OPERATORS

- 26.1 If, in the opinion of the Chief Executive, an Operator is not a fit and proper person to remain in a Supply Zone, the Chief Executive may require You by notice in writing to remove that person from the Supply Zone.
- 26.2 In determining whether a person is not a fit or proper person under clause 26.1 the Chief Executive may have regard to matters such as whether the person has behaved in a manner likely to cause danger to themselves or to any other person, has behaved environmentally irresponsibly, and/or has behaved unprofessionally in their dealings with the Chief Executive or with the Chief Executive's staff and employees.
- 26.3 Any person determined not to be a fit or proper person pursuant to this clause must not be employed or allowed to work in the Supply Zone without prior written consent of the Chief Executive.
- 26.4 A determination by the Chief Executive under this clause is final.

#### 27. RIGHTS OF ENTRY AND MANAGEMENT OF PUBLIC ACCESS

- 27.1 You have a right to enter on the Endorsed Area/s (via the Access Road/s) under the Act, for the purpose of conducting operations under this Sales Permit.
- 27.2 You must erect and maintain a sign, to the satisfaction of the Chief Executive, at the road entrance/s to the Endorsed Area/s stating Your name, the process for access onto the Supply Zone and a contact telephone number.

#### 28. GST

- 28.1 Words defined in the GST Legislation have the same meaning in this clause 28.
- 28.2 If a party is required under this Sales Permit to reimburse or pay to another party an amount calculated by reference to a cost, expense, or an amount paid or incurred by that party, the amount of the reimbursement or payment will be reduced by the amount of any input tax credits to which that party (or an entity on whose behalf the party is acting) is entitled in respect of any acquisition relating to that cost, expense or other amount.
- 28.3 If GST is payable by an entity ("Supplier") in relation to any supply that it makes under or in connection with this Sales Permit, the parties agree that:
  - any consideration (including the value of any non-monetary consideration) provided for that supply under or in connection with this Sales Permit other than under this clause 28 ("Agreed Amount") is exclusive of GST;
  - (b) an additional amount will be payable by the party providing consideration for that supply ("Receiver") equal to the amount of GST payable by the Supplier on that supply:
  - (c) the additional amount is payable at the same time as any part of the Agreed Amount is to be first provided for that supply and the Supplier will provide a tax invoice to the Receiver in respect of that supply, no later than that time; and
  - (d) to the extent, if any, that any consideration (or part thereof) is specified in this Sales Permit to be inclusive of GST, that consideration (or the relevant part) will be excluded from the Agreed Amount for the purposes of calculating the additional amount under clause 28.3(b)(ii).

#### SEVERANCE

29.1 If any provision of this Sales Permit is prohibited, void, invalid or unenforceable the provision will be ineffective and severed from this Sales Permit to that extent without affecting any other provision of this Sales Permit.

#### 30. SUSPENSION AND TERMINATION OF THIS SALES PERMIT

- 30.1 (a) If You
  - breach any term of this Sales Permit, any provision of the Act, or Part 7 of the Fire and Rescue Service Act 1990;
  - (ii) do not comply with a notice provided under this Sales Permit, or a reasonable direction of the Chief Executive in relation to Quarrying Operations; or
  - (iii) become insolvent, bankrupt, subject to any form of external administration or enter into an arrangement with Your creditors or otherwise take advantage of any laws in force in connection with insolvent debtors or are wound up, voluntarily or involuntarily.

Of:

(b) as otherwise provided in this Sales Permit.

the Chief Executive may, by written notice, do one or more of the following, at the Chief Executive's sole discretion:

- (c) require You to rectify the breach within the period specified in the notice;
- (d) Suspend this Sales Permit for such time as stated in the notice; and/or
- (e) terminate this Sales Permit.
- 30.2 Any Suspension or termination of this Sales Permit by the Chief Executive will have no impact on Your obligations to pay monies and comply with continuing obligations under this Sales Permit, subject to the conditions (if any) stated in the notice by the Chief Executive.
- 30.3 If the Chief Executive Suspends or terminates this Sales Permit, You are not entitled to claim or receive compensation or damages for that Suspension or termination.
- 30.4 You must not enter the Supply Zone or conduct any Quarrying Operations during any period of Suspension, except with the prior written consent, and in accordance with the conditions specified by the Chief Executive.
- 30.5 If the Chief Executive Suspends or terminates this Sales Permit, the Chief Executive may charge You for any increased costs and/or administration costs incurred.
- 30.6 Nothing in this Sales Permit restricts the Chief Executive's powers under the Act in relation to a breach of this Sales Permit.

#### WAIVER

- 31.1 No right under this Sales Permit is to be taken as being waived except by notice in writing signed by the party waiving the right.
- 31.2 The failure by a party to enforce any clause of this Sales Permit or any forbearance, delay or indulgence granted by that party to another party is not to be construed as a waiver of its rights under this Sales Permit.
- 31.3 The waiver by either party of a breach of a clause by the other party will not be a waiver of any other clause or subsequent breach of that clause.

#### 32. NATIVE TITLE ASSESSMENT

#### Module 24KA Endorsed Area

32.1 You acknowledge that where a native title assessment for the inclusion of an Endorsed Area under this Sales Permit was made by the Chief Executive under section 24KA of the Native Title Act 1993 (Cth) the Quarry Material Got by You from that Endorsed Area

- (known as a 'Module 24KA Endorsed Area' under Item 6 of the table in Schedule 3) can and must only be used for Facilities for Services to the Public.
- 32.2 You must permit native title holders reasonable access to the land or waters in a Module 24KA Endorsed Area", except while there is active Quarrying Operations, or for reasons of health and safety.
- 32.3 You acknowledge that if You propose to use Quarry Material removed from a Module 24KA Endorsed Area for a purpose other than for Facilities for Services to the Public the Chief Executive will be required to undertake a new native title assessment which will be undertaken at Your sole expense and, where applicable, You must bear the costs of required actions and outcomes. Any requested variation to this Sales Permit will in the first instance be dependent on the outcome of this new native title assessment.

#### Native Title Deed

32.4 It is a condition of this Sales Permit that You comply (if applicable) with the requirements of a Deed Regarding the Grant of a Sales Permit (known as 'the Native Title Deed' for the applicable Endorsed Area under Item 6 of the table in Schedule 3) under section 31(1)(b) of the Native Title Act 1993 (Cth).

#### Module 24JA Endorsed Area

- 32.5 You acknowledge that where the Chief Executive has conducted a native title assessment under section 24JA of the Native Title Act 1993 (Cth) for an Endorsed Area, the quantity of Quarry Material that may be removed from that Endorsed Area (known as a 'Module 24JA Endorsed Area' under Item 6 of the table in Schedule 3) is strictly limited to the Sale Quantity specified in Item 2 of the table in Schedule 3 for the corresponding Module 24JA Endorsed Area.
- 34.6 If You apply to the Chief Executive to increase the Sale Quantity for a Module 24JA Endorsed Area, You acknowledge that the Chief Executive will be required to undertake a new native title assessment which will be undertaken at Your sole expense and, where applicable, to bear the costs of required actions and outcomes. Any requested variation to this Sales Permit will in the first instance be dependent on the outcome of this new native title assessment.

#### SCHEDULE 1 - DEFINITIONS AND INTERPRETATION

- 1.1 In this Sales Permit, where commencing with a capital letter and unless the contrary intention appears or the context otherwise requires:
  - "Access Road" means a road used to access or leave an Endorsed Area as identified in the map/s in Schedule 3 showing the Supply Zone and/or as specified in the Quarry Management Plan, excluding any State-controlled road (as defined in the Transport Infrastructure Act 1994) and any road administered by the local government/s applicable to the Supply Zone.
  - "Account" means either a Tax Invoice or other account or statement of any amount owing under this Sales Permit.
  - "Act" means the Forestry Act 1959.
  - "All Available" means all the Quarry Material available within an Endorsed Area that may be extracted in compliance with this Sales Permit and the Development Approval and any other relevant approvals or permits.
  - "Appropriate Insurer" means an insurer which:
    - is authorised under the Insurance Act 1973 (Cth); and
    - is registered with the Australian Prudential Regulation Authority as an authorised insurer.
  - "Business Day" means a day that is not a Saturday, Sunday or a public holiday in Brisbane.
  - "Business Hours" means between 9.00am and 5.00pm on a Business Day.
  - "Blast Report" means report or Tax Invoice received from a contractor or agent, detailing the quantity of Quarry Material Got from shot(s) fired, when explosives are used to Get Quarry Material.
  - "Chief Executive" means the Director-General of the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry on behalf of the State of Queensland or any successor department or agency responsible for administering the provisions of the Act related to State-owned commercial quarry material, and includes a person performing duties under the Act.
  - "Claims" includes actions, suits, demands, proceedings, damages, compensation, costs (including solicitor and client costs), losses, charges and expenses.
  - "Contact" means the contact person named for each party in Schedule 4, or as notified by a party from time to time.
  - "Commencement Date" means the date the last Party to sign, signs this Sales Permit.
  - "Cubic Metre" means the quantity of Quarry Material measuring one (1) cubic metre after extracting and processing and at the time of its removal from the Supply Zone.
  - "Declaration Period" means each Calender month, or such other period as notified by the Chief Executive in writing from time to time.
  - "Development Approval", which has the same meaning as defined in the Sustainable Planning Act 2009, means the Development Approval for Your Quarrying Operations.
  - "Effective Date" for an Endorsed Area means the date specified as such in Item 7 of the table in Schedule 3 for the corresponding Endorsed Area.
  - "Endorsed Area" means a discrete part of the Supply Zone from which You are authorised to Get Quarry Material under this Sales Permit, as specified in Item 1 of the table in Schedule 3, and shown on the corresponding map in Schedule 3, or as notified in writing by the Chief Executive from time to time.
  - "Expiry Date" means the date specified as such in clause 2.1.
  - "Facilities for Services to the Public" means:

- (a) the facility or facilities relate to an onshore place, as defined in the Native Title Act 1993 (Cth);
- (b) the facility will be operated for the general public, where the general public means the public at large, as opposed to one particular individual or company; and
- (c) the type of facility is listed in section 24KA of the Native Title Act 1993 (Cth).
- "Force Majeure" means an event outside a party's reasonable control and includes, war, whether declared or undeclared, revolution or act of public enemies, riot or civil commotion, strike, stoppage, ban, limitation on work or restraint of labour whether on the Supply Zone or at any other place, act of God, fire, flood, storm, tempest or washaway, electricity or gas shortages of public utilities providing those resources, act of restraint of any governmental or semi-governmental or other public or statutory authority, and any pathogenesis that is beyond the control of the parties.
- "General Value Review" means a review carried out in accordance with clause 5.6.
- "Get" has the same meaning as defined in the Forestry Act 1959.
- "GST" has the same meaning as defined in the GST Legislation.
- "GST Legislation" means A New Tax System (Goods and Services Tax) Act 1999 (Cth).
- "Method of Quantity Measurement" means the method specified as such in Item 6 of the table in Schedule 3 for the corresponding Endorsed Area.
- "Operator" means You, Your employees, contractors, sub-contractors or any other person engaged or employed from time to time in the performance of Quarrying Operations.
- "Other Approved Measuring Method" means a measuring method approved in writing by the Chief Executive other than Other Scale Equipment, Scale Equipped Loader Bucket, Volumetric Truck Counts or Weighbridge, that is certified and maintained in accordance with the National Measurement Act 1960 (Cth) (if applicable) and is used by You to measure the mass of the Quarry Material removed from an Endorsed Area.
- "Other Scale Equipment" means a measuring device or equipment, other than a Scale Equipped Loader Bucket or a Weighbridge, for determining the weight of Quarry Material, that is certified and maintained in accordance with the National Measurement Act 1960 (Cth) and is approved in writing by the Chief Executive,.
- "Periodic Declaration" means a document in the form provided by the Chief Executive (or in another form approved by the Chief Executive), for the purpose of entering information about the Quarry Material Got during a Declaration Period.
- "Quantity Survey" means a survey undertaken by a Registered Surveyor to determine the quantity of Quarry Material removed from an Endorsed Area between two defined points in time.
- "Quarrying" means the Getting of Quarry Material in accordance with this Sales Permit.
- "Quarry Management Plan" means the Quarry Management Plan required under clause 25. as amended and approved from time to time, which forms part of this Sales Permit.
- "Quarry Material" has the same meaning as defined in the Forestry Act 1959 and in relation to an Environment Area specifically means the type of Quarry Material specified in Item 4 of the table in Schedule 3 for the corresponding Endorsed Area.
- "Quarrying Operations" means any activity undertaken for the purpose of, or in association with, Getting Quarry Material pursuant to this Sales Permit, including, but not limited to:
  - (a) entering the Supply Zone to Get Quarry Material;
  - (b) the removal of Quarry Material from the Supply Zone;

- (c) the construction, maintenance and use of buildings, Weighbridge, water storage facilities, fencing, and other facilities, infrastructure or works in the Supply Zone; and
- (d) the construction, maintenance and use of Access Roads.
- "Quarrying Safety" without limiting any term or condition of this Sales Permit, means the conduct of Your Quarrying Operations and Your obligations under this Sales Permit in a manner which minimises any risk (whether temporary or permanent and of whatever magnitude, duration or frequency) of an event or likelihood of an event that may cause injury or illness to any person.
- "Records" means all information necessary to:
  - (a) record all operations under this Sales Permit and accurate details of all Quarry Material Got from each Endorsed Area, including but not limited to Periodic Declarations, Removal Dockets and, if applicable, records produced by Your Scaled Equipped Bucket Loader, Other Scale Equipment and/or Weighbridge;
  - (b) record where the Quarry Material removed from each Endorsed Area was used and/or to who You sold or supplied the Quarry Material to as applicable; and
  - (c) compile each Terrain Survey and Quantity Survey.
- "Registered Surveyor" has the same meaning as defined in the Surveyors Act 2003.
- "Removal Docket" means a document, in the form provided by the Chief Executive, or in another form approved by the Chief Executive, providing details of Quarry Material Got under this Sales Permit, and any other information as required on the document.
- "Reserve" has the meaning as defined in the Land Act 1994.
- "Sale Quantity" means the amount specified as such in Item 2 of the table in Schedule 3 for the corresponding Endorsed Area, as updated from time to time by the Chief Executive under the terms of this Sales Permit.
- "Sales Permit" means this Sales Permit and includes all schedules and annexures, and the Quarry Management Plans.
- "Scale Equipped Loader Bucket" means a machine used for the loading of Quarry Material that measures the mass of the Quarry Material, using scales as certified and maintained in accordance with the National Measurement Act 1960 (Cth), as it is being loaded for transportation for removal from an Endorsed Area.
- "Supply Zone" means the total of all Endorsed Areas, including the Access Roads, from time to time.
- "Survey Map" means a cartographic plan image of an Endorsed Area, drawn by a suitably qualified person detailing contours at not more than one (1) metre intervals, water drainage, infrastructure, Access Roads and stockpiles.
- "Suspend" means the cessation of Quarrying Operations under this Sales Permit, in whole or in part, and/or on such conditions, as directed by the Chief Executive.
- "Tax Invoice" has the same meaning as defined in the GST Legislation.
- "Terrain Survey" means the initial survey undertaken by a Registered Surveyor to determine the topography of an Endorsed Area, before the commencement of Quarrying Operations.
- "Tonne" means one metric tonne of Quarry Material at the time of its weighing on the Scale Equipment Loader Bucket, Other Scale Equipment or Weighbridge at the time of its removal from the Supply Zone.
- "Value" means the amount, as stated and adjusted under clause 5, payable by You for each Tonne of Quarry Material Got under this Sales Permit, exclusive of GST.
- "Value Review" means a review conducted under clause 5.4 of this Sales Permit.

- "Volumetric Loader Bucket" means a loader bucket or other container, for which You know and regularly verify its measured cubic volume capacity, to determine the quantity of Quarry Material Got from an Endorsed Area.
- "Volumetric Truck Count" means Your tallying system for counting and recording the number of truck; and/or other vehicle loads of Quarry Material removed from an Endorsed Area and of the volumetric and/or weight carrying capacity (as applicable), of each truck or other vehicle used.
- "Weighbridge" means any weighbridge, as certified and maintained in accordance with the National Measurement Act 1960 (Cth) and approved by the Chief Executive for use to measure the mass of the Quarry Material removed from an Endorsed Area.
- "Year" means a Year commencing on 1 July and ending on 30 June of the following year.
- "You" means Winton Shire Council (ABN 46 299 386 399).
- In this Sales Permit:
  - headings are for convenience only and do not affect interpretation, and unless the context indicates a contrary intention;
  - if You are constituted by more than one person, then that expression refers to all persons, and the obligations under this Sales Permit binds those persons jointly and severally;
  - person includes an individual, the estate of an individual, a corporation, an authority, an association or a joint venture (where incorporated), a partnership and a trust;
  - a reference to a party includes that party's executors, administrators, successors and permitted assigns, including persons taking by way of novation and, in the case of a trustee, includes a substituted or an additional trustee;
  - a reference to a document (including this Sales Permit) is to that document as varied, novated, ratified or replaced from time to time;
  - a reference to a statute includes its delegated legislation and a reference to a statute, delegated legislation, code of practice or a provision of either includes consolidations, amendments, re-enactments and replacements;
  - a word importing the singular includes the plural (and vice versa), and a word indicating a gender includes every other gender;
  - (h) a reference to a party, clause, schedule, attachment or annexure is a reference to a party, clause, schedule, attachment or annexure to or of this Sales Permit, and a reference to this Sales Permit includes all schedules, attachments and annexures to it;
  - (i) includes in any form is not a word of limitation;
- a reference to S or dollar is to Australian currency;
- if a word or phrase is given a defined meaning, any other part of speech or grammatical form of that word or phrase has a corresponding meaning; and
- no rule of construction will apply to a provision of this Sales Permit to the disadvantage of a party merely because that party drafted the provision or would otherwise benefit from it.

#### SCHEDULE 2 - SAFETY CONDITIONS

#### GENERAL

- (a) You and all Operalbrs must comply with these conditions, in addition to the obligations as applicable to Your Quarrying Operations under the Work Health and Safety Act 2011 or under the Mining and Quarrying Safety and Health Act 1999 and the Mining and Quarrying Safety and Health Regulation 2001.
- (b) Without limiting the obligations and responsibilities contained in all relevant laws and Codes of Practice You must ensure that:
  - all machinery being used in connection with Your operations is fit for purpose and has the appropriate registration or permit applicable to its use; and
  - all persons operating machinery being used in connection with Your Quarrying Operations are competent to operate such machinery and hold any relevant licence or certificate of Competency required to operate such machinery.
- (c) You must ensure that at all times on the Supply Zone that Quarrying Operations and any act associated with it are undertaken in a manner that eliminates or reduces the occurrence of a Dangerous Event.
- (d) You must adopt and implement appropriate measures and procedures that:
  - (i) identify and assess Risks;
  - (ii) eliminate or minimise exposure to Risk;
  - (iii) are reviewed on a regular basis; and
  - (iv) take reasonable precautions and exercise proper diligence to ensure the obligations pursuant to this Schedule are met.
- (e) You must inform the Chief Executive, before Quarrying Operations commence, of the name and contact details of the Senior Site Representative who will represent You on the Supply Zone, and in addition to this obligation, You must at all times throughout the duration of this Sales Permit keep the Chief Executive notified of the name and contact details any replacement personnel appointed to the Senior Site Representative position.
- (f) Where required under either the Work Health and Safety Act 2011 or the Mining and Quarrying Safety and Health Act 1999 for Your Quarrying Operations, You must have a Site Safety Management System in place and provide a statement confirming this to \$no Chief Executive before Your Quarrying Operations commence under this Sales Permit.

#### 2. ACCIDENT REPORTING

- (a) You must report to the Chief Executive the details of any Event, whether directly or indirectly attributed to the performance of this Sales Permit, which may compromise the normal productive operation of the Quarrying Operations, and/or causing death or hospitalisation of a person within twenty-four (24) hours of the occurrence of the Event.
- (b) You must report to the Chief Executive Minor Accidents and Lost Time Incidents within seven (7) days of the occurrence of the Minor Accident or Lost Time Incident.

#### 3. ROADSIDE ACTIVITIES

(a) Roads must be temporarily closed at all access points to an Immediate Danger Zone by the use of Safety Signs, appropriate authorised temporary barriers and/or traffic control personnel whenever acts done in the performance of this Sales Permit constitute a hazard to road users.

#### 4. ACCREDITATION

- (a) All Operators must comply with Competency requirements contained in the Mining and Quarrying Safety and Health Act 1999 and the Mining and Quarrying Safety and Health Regulation 2001.
- (b) Relevant and appropriate Competency levels must relate but are not limited to:
  - Occupational Fealth and Safety;
  - (ii) Plant Operation.

### 5. ACTION ON NON-COMPLIANCE

- If You or an Operator does not comply with these conditions the Chief Executive may do one or more of the following, in his or her absolute discretion;
  - advise You of the breach and direct, by notice in writing, that it be rectified within a specified time;
  - direct, by notice in writing, the immediate suspension of Quarrying Operations until the breach is rectified;
  - advise the Inspector of Mines and the District Workers Representative of the Department of Natural Resources and Mines (Mine Safety section) of the extent and nature of the breach;
  - direct, by notice in writing, that an Operator be removed from the Quarrying Area;
     or
  - (v) terminate this Sales Permit by notice in writing
- (b) In deciding which action to take pursuant to clause 5(a) the Chief Executive will take into account:
  - (i) the nature of the breach;
  - (ii) the severity of the breach;
  - (iii) previous acts of non-compliance;
  - (iv) Your performance under this Sales Permit; and
  - any other factor the Chief Executive, in his or her sole discretion, determines relevant.

# 6. DEFINITIONS

In these conditions:

"Competency" for a task at a quarry is the demonstrated skill and knowledge required to carry out the task to a standard necessary for the safety and health of persons.

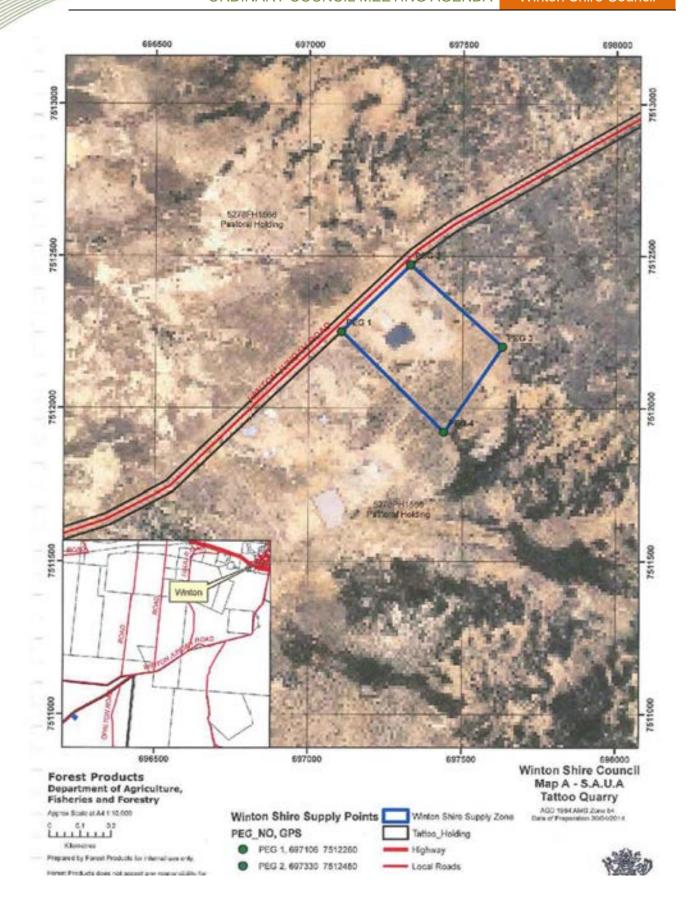
"Dangerous Event" means an Event caused by specified high Risk Plant, or an Event at a workplace caused by a workplace activity, if the Event involves or could have involved exposure of persons to Risk to their health and safety because of:

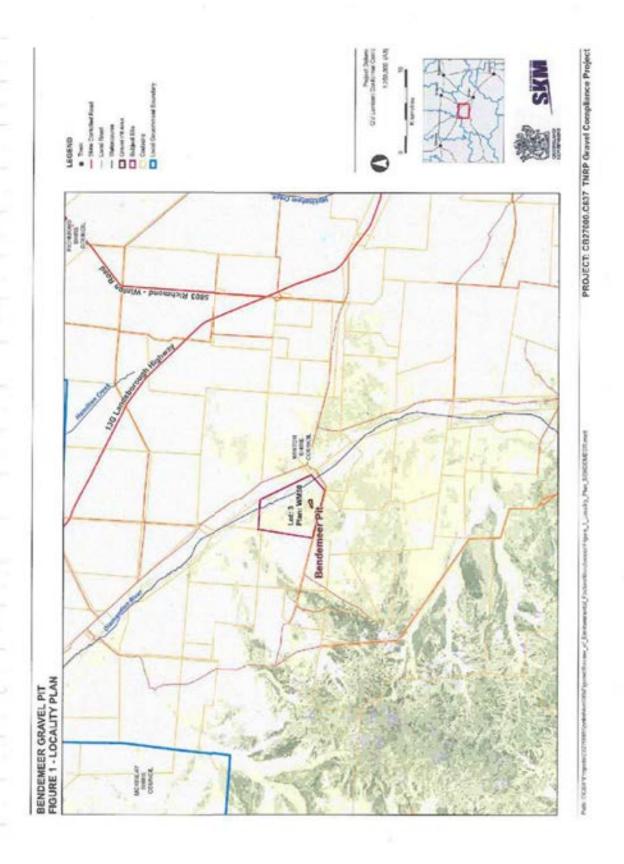
- collapse, overturning, failure or malfunction of, or damage to, an item of specified high Risk Plant;
- (ii) collapse or failure of an excavation or of any shoring supporting an excavation;
- (iii) collapse or partial collapse of any part of a building or other structure;
- damage to any load bearing member of, or the failure of any brake, steering device or other control device of, a crane, hoist, conveyor, lift or escalator;
- (v) implosion, explosion or fire;
- (vi) escape, spillage or leakage of any hazardous material or dangerous goods;
- (vii) fall or release from a height of any Plant, substance or object;

- (viii) damage to a boiler, pressure vessel or refrigeration Plant; or
- (ix) uncontrolled explcsion, fire or escape of gas or steam.
- "Event" means and includes a Dangerous Event, Work Caused Illness and a Serious Bodily Injury.
- "Immediate Danger Zone" means that part of the Quarrying Site within the immediate vicinity of quarrying activities being carried out at the material time.
- "Lost Time Incident" means any work related injury or disease which results in the temporary incapacity of a worker where they cannot perform their regular or alternate duties on the next working day, after the day on which the injury or disease occurred.
- "Minor Accident" means an accident or injury that does not require hospitalisation but does require treatment or assessment by a medical practitioner.
- "Plant" means any plant and equipment, including but not limited to any excavator, loader, dozer, scraper and truck, used by You or on Your behalf in connection with the Quarrying Operations undertaken under this Sales Permit.
- "Quarrying Area" means the area covered by the Quarry Management Plan. It may contain one or more Quarrying Site and includes other work such as roadworks.
- "Quarrying Site" means the site at which quarrying is actively in progress.
- "Risk" means Risk of death, injury or illness.
- "Safety Sign" means a sign which is clearly legible and provides adequate notice to all persons who may be exposed to the hazard, of the presence and nature of the hazard, and is designed in accordance with AS 1319 Safety Signs for the Occupational Environment.
- "Serious Bodily Injury" means an injury to a person that causes:
- (i) the injured persons death; or
- (ii) the loss of a distinct part or an organ of the injured person's body; or
- the injured person to be absent from the person's voluntary or paid employment for more than 4 days; or
- (iv) causes a person to be admitted to a hospital as an in-patient.
- "Site Safety Management System" means a documented and auditable safety and health management system for the Supply Zone and the associated Quarrying Operations that identifies risk management elements, practices and resources for developing, implementing, maintaining, reviewing and continually improving policies and practices to ensure the safety and health of persons who may be affected by Quarrying Operations.

## "Work Caused Illness" means:

- an illness contracted by a person to which work, a workplace, a workplace activity or specified high Risk Plant was a significant contributing factor; or
- (ii) the recurrence, aggravation, acceleration, exacerbation or deterioration in a person of an existing illness if a, workplace, a workplace activity or specified high Risk Plant was a significant contributing factor to the recurrence, aggravation, acceleration, exacerbation or deterioration.

### **SUMMARY**

This report outlines the cost associated with the gravel sheeting of 9.1kms of the Olio – Muttaburra Road and recommends that the funding be sourced from Roads to Recovery and the Rural Roads Budget.

## **RECOMMENDATION**

- 1. THAT the report be received.
- 2. THAT Council approve 50% of the expenditure to gravel sheet Olio Muttaburra be funded from the rural roads budget and 50% funded from Roads to Recovery Funding.

## **REPORT**

In November 2019, Council received extra Roads to Recovery funding to stimulate the economy as the effects of the drought are still being felt across the region. The extra funding that was received through Roads to Recovery is \$1,066,785.00 which is broken in half over 2 financial years, this means that \$533,392.50 must be spent by 30<sup>th</sup> June 2020, and the rest by 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020.

The Works Department have been working on getting a sheeting program together for various Class 1 black soil roads around the shire including Cork Mail Road and the Olio- Muttaburra Road. These two roads were identified as most in need of sheeting due to their class and significance in linking communities and places of interest and the black soil status of the roads.

This financial year the Works Department would like to gravel sheet approximately 9.1kms of the Olio – Muttaburra Road between the Kennedy Development Road and the Winton – Corfield Road (please see below map). This road has not been included in the 2019 Flood Damage Program and would benefit from having sheeting works completed on it. As the road stands it currently gets closed in wet weather and is usually closed for several days which causes inconvenience to residents and tourist using the area. The road also gets wheel ruts due to the integrity of the black soil and can create several safety issues. Because the road has not been added to the 2019 Flood Damage Program, it has not received much maintenance during this financial year.

The cost involved in gravel sheeting 9.1kms of the Olio – Muttaburra Road is \$1,066,000.00 which would give the road a 150mm overlay of gravel seven meters wide. This expenditure will be broken into two funding sources 50% from Roads to Recovery and 50% from Rural Roads Budget which currently has an unexpended amount of \$1,014,465.00.

As the northern area of the shire is predominately black soil, it is very difficult to source gravel in this area. Due to this reasoning, gravel will be sourced from Scrubby Gravel Pit 25kms south on the Jundah Road and will be hauled by contractor and dumped on the road ready for spreading.

### **SUMMARY**

Playscape Creations have been engaged through Vendor Panel to design and construct a package of works at Little Swaggies Childcare. The total value of work is \$300,000 less upgrades to the kitchen.

To ensure maximum outcomes for Little Swaggies the Master Plan and initial design have been funded through the asset program – this is to create a series of discreate packages of work that can be done over several years.

# **REPORT**

Council have successfully received \$300,000 in funding from Works for Queensland which has been allocated to the Little Swaggies Child Care Centre for two core projects.

- 1. The kitchen was upgraded with stainless steel benches (compliance issue)
- 2. Playground renewal

For the playground renewal Playscape Creations have been engaged under a Vendor Panel arrangement. Playscape are situated will in the playground space and have delivered many plans and projects for childcare centres. Additionally, Playscape were an excellent vendor for the Waterpark project.

The Asset Manager has engaged Playscape to design a Master Plan for the facility utilising strategic asset budget (rather than works for Queensland). This ensures that Little Swaggies get the most work on the ground as possible for the funding but also that Council have strategic direction for the future.

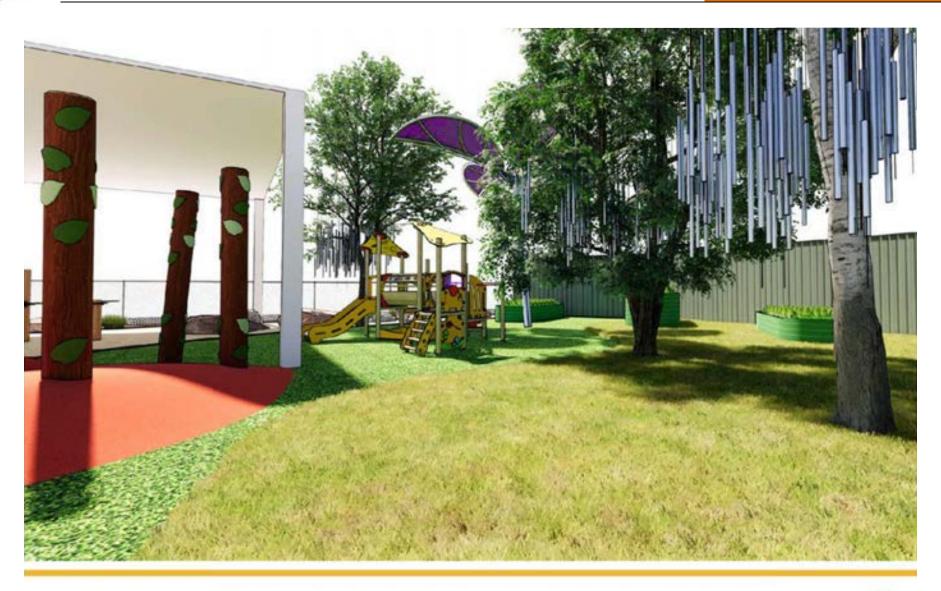
Playscape were made aware of Councils limited funds – that the project needs to be in separate packages such that:

- Some packages can be finished with the Works for Queensland Funding
- Future packages do not exceed Councils likely affordability
- There is cohesion between packages (and hence throughout the site)
- Operation of the centre can proceed during works
- Operation of the centre is not impaired after the works are complete
- The needs of the centre (as determined by the tender brief) are met

Prior to engaging Playscape they were made aware of the limitations, wants and needs of the centre and then again at the start of the master plan project these needs were again addressed to ensure everything was captured.

Little Swaggies staff did not want fireman poles or large rope elements but did want sand and water play.

The attached Masterplan forms a starting point for work packages as well as the current works for Queensland funding. Playscape are currently in the process of determining the best value for money for package one – how to 'spread' the work out over the site.

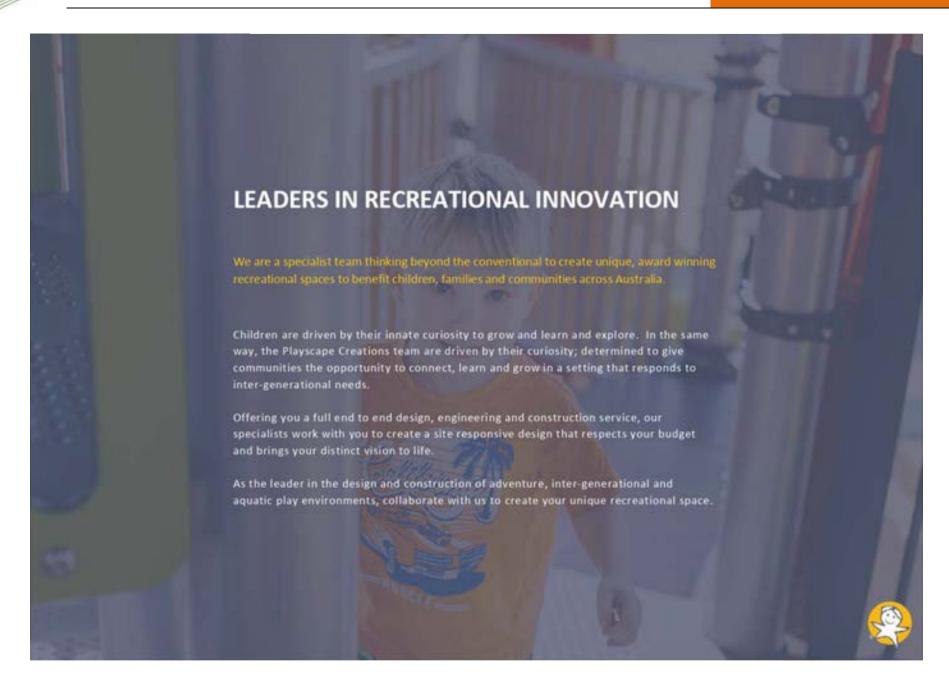


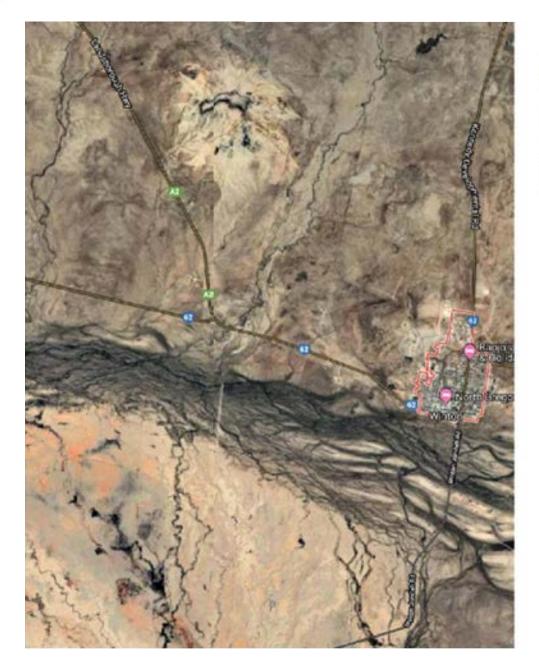

# Design Overview

The layout design for Little Swaggies initial concept design has been inspired by the Google Maps image of Winton's dry river creek bed formations.

This imagery was also seen on the walls of the Waltzing Matilda centre.

The natural water channel flow lines have been recreated in the play space to create pockets of play with mounding and embankments similar to those found in nature. Landscaping features similar to those seen in the township have also been introduced such as "Boulder/Moon Rocks" and soft plantings.

Other theming elements that we have incorporated into the space also draw from Winton's history and landmarks such as "Arno's Wall" and the "Musical Fence". As well as Little Swaggies very own "Discovery Digs to be uncovered in the sandpit area.

And a "Bespoke Performance Stage" that follows the flow of the creek formations for young performers who may want to be a part of Winton's budding movie scene. We have also utilised the repetition of natural hardwood "Bespoke Timber and Misting Totems" throughout to unify the space and tie all play nodes together.

These can be customised and carved to suit theming and provide amazing sensory, discovery and developmental play activities.

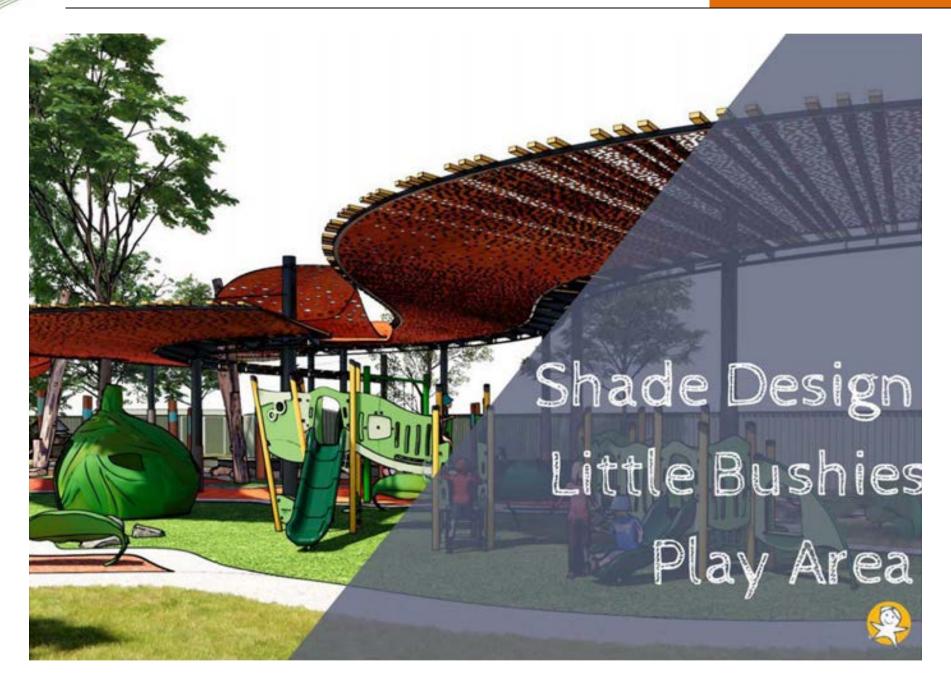
All of the play elements that were discussed have been introduced into the space in these "play islands or nodes", which has allowed us to retain and incorporate these within and with the existing shade structures.

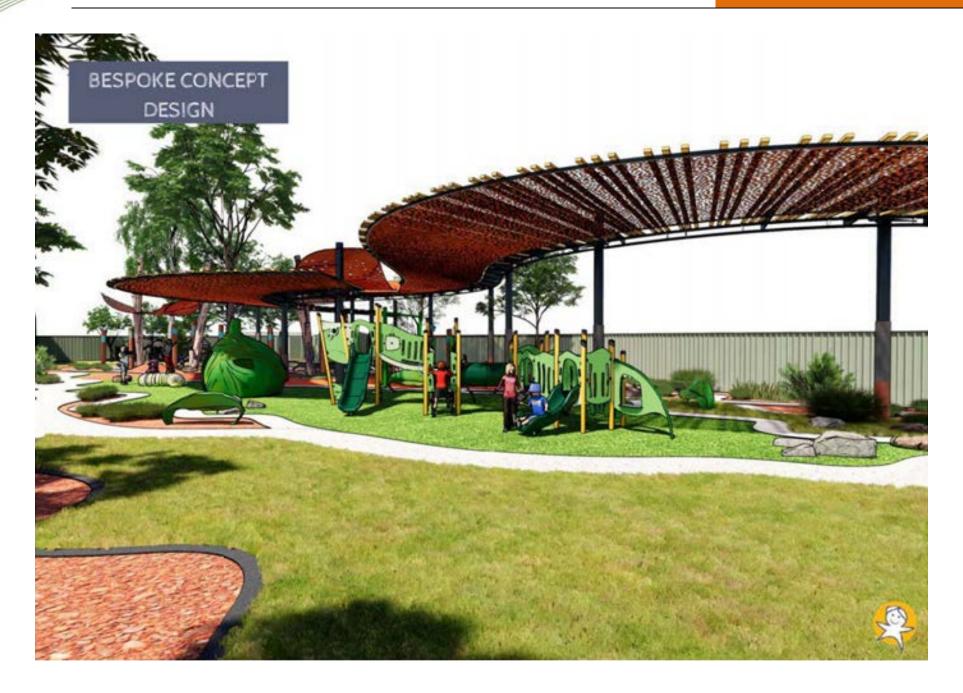
It has also enabled us to design a Winton inspired "Bespoke Shade" structure that weaves its way through the Little Bushies play space following the same flow as the "islands of play" providing both shade, and is also a stunning architectural feature.

The design of the bespoke hard shade structure draws upon the elements of the land surrounding Winton that we saw throughout, and also even adds another layer of quality in its shadow and light play.











# Bespoke Shade Design

Offering a completely different feeling to the entire space this Bespoke Shade Structure has been designed with the Heart of Winton in mind, and to complete the enhancement of the entire play space.

Drawing on the farming and agricultural elements, as well as the landscape, its materials mimic those we saw throughout Winton.

The hard structure follows the flow of the play space whilst still providing shade when needed throughout the day, as well as providing some beautiful shadow play.

Over the sandpit area the shade branches out literally to a sail type with hardwood timber posts to support it.





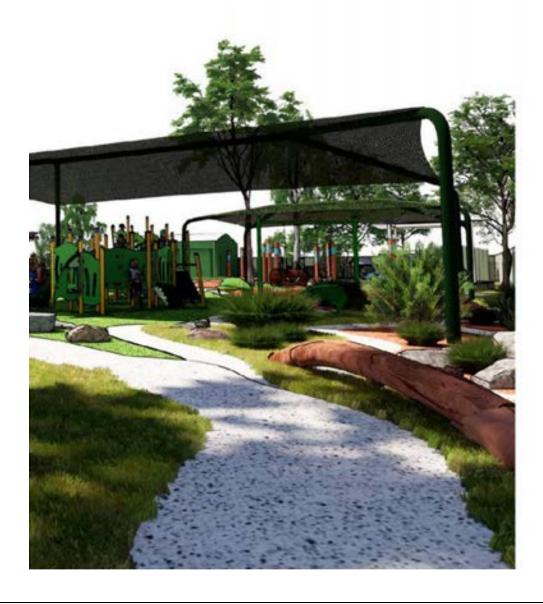


#### Bespoke Shade - Overall Plan

We have provided concept imagery of both shade structures with the play elements.





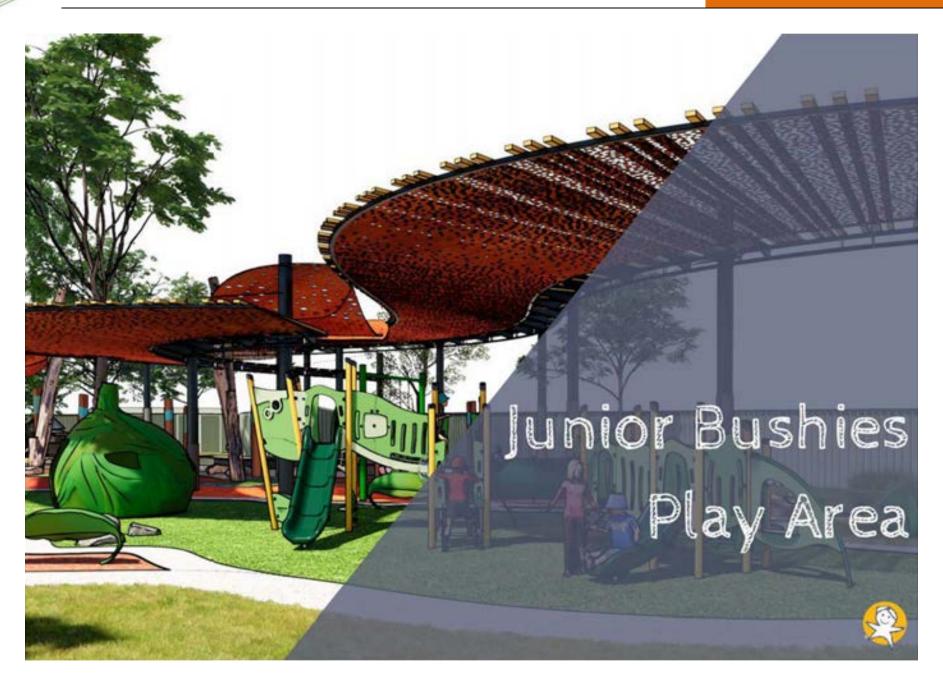

# Little Bushies Play Design

Designed to encourage play for children aged 2-5 years old we have created "Islands of Play" situated along the flow lines of the "Dry River Creek Bed" which incorporates a "Water Pump".

A "Barefoot Sensory Discovery Path" weaves its way through the landscaping with "Nature Play" elements such as boulder/moon rocks and "Log Climbers", as well as Bespoke carved "Timber and Misting Totems" dotted along the way.

The "Little Hamlet Kingswood" Play System is situated at the front of the space to replace the existing unit. This offers a plethora of challenging and stimulating climbing activities, sliding fun, roleplay, and interactive play panels.

A Quiet Zone is created with the "Gumleaf Pod Cubby House" and "Gurr Leaf Seats" inspired by the iconic Australian story by May Gibbs, Snugglepot and Cuddlepie. Perfect for quiet reading or imaginative play As is the "Giant Caterpillar" climber/seat which has a 3m curved body and is painted to look like the Wanderer or Monarch butterfly larvae.

We have created your very own "Performance Stage" for budding movie performers, as well as a "Sandpit Area" with "Discovery Digs".

A Dragonfly Embankment Slide" sits under the shade of the trees in front of the newly renovated "Chicken Coop - Chooksville" area.

And we have redesigned the space in front of the sheds for the "Bike, Trike and Scooter Traffic Area".

Designed to encourage play for children aged 6 weeks - 2 years old we have introduced play elements as discussed as being desired by the centre.

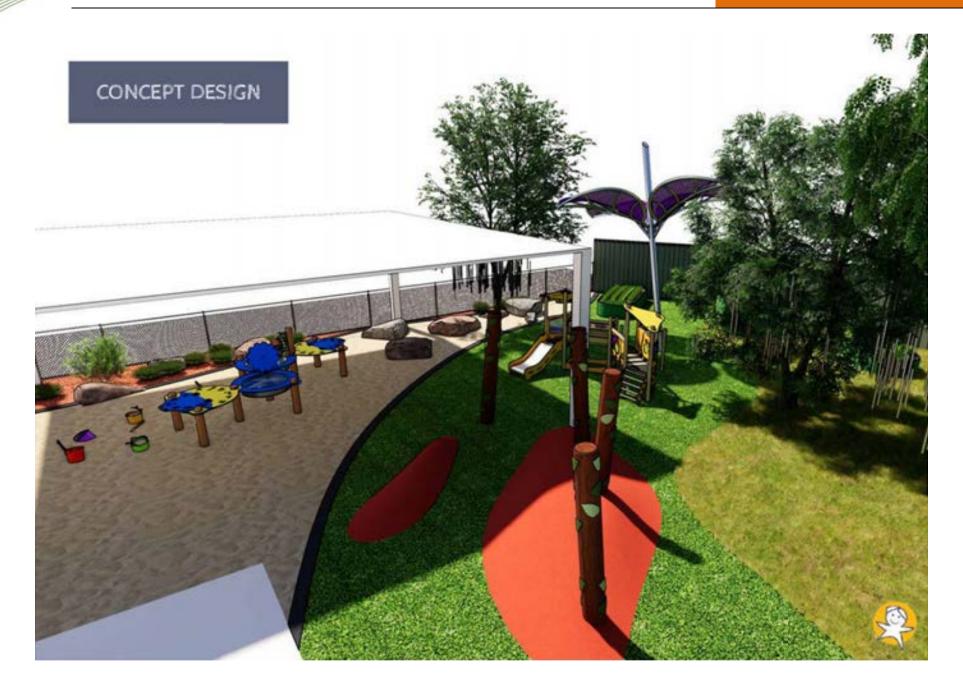

#### PROPOSAL

On 25 November 2019, Council received a properly made development application on land located at 113-115 Elderslie Street, Winton seeking approval for school excursion accommodation for students of A B Patterson College. The proposal (known as the Winton Annexe) is in recognition of the close relationship between the College and the Winton community and seeks to provide, to the students, an understanding of both the fragile environment of western Queensland and of the lifestyles of the people who live in the towns and on rural properties.

The philosophy which was adopted by the College in determining the need for and design of the Winton Annexe is described in the Planning Report submitted with the development application as:

There has never been a time more in need of connectivity between rural and urban communities than now. A need that demands young people understand the fragile nature of our environment, the land, our resources and the conviction and struggles of those who choose to live in rural communities and the extent that we live in such essential symbiosis.

The Winton Annexe proposed for development in Winton on land acquired by A. B. Paterson College for this purpose, continues an extensive plan to enable the College to develop a footprint in this historic town; one in which the College has had a close and enduring relationship for 20 years. The Annexe, to be named 'Barty's Place' pays respect to the importance of Banjo Paterson to our history and to the people who have lived and worked the land, enabling growth and industry for generations.

A. B. Paterson College seeks to develop this special Annexe for the following purposes:

- To have a dedicated facility to support our Year 6 Winton camp. A place in which the students can have the appropriate facilities without relying on the goodwill of Council and prominent groups in the community to provide accommodation locations;
- To have a dedicated space that enables greater flexibility and the opportunity for the College to bring other groupings of students to the Annexe for a variety of educational and service opportunities;
- To provide a facility that enables Queensland Tourism, the Winton Shire Council, and prominent businesses such as the Australian Age of Dinosaurs to promote Winton as a location for a greater number of school groups. Such activity enhances the opportunity and likelihood for parents and families to visit and engage with the community.

The Winton Annexe will enable interested parties to genuinely partner with A. B. Paterson College to support their mutual aims and objectives.

The proposal includes student accommodation, kitchen and dining facilities, staff accommodation, ablutions and laundry, outdoor fire pit with seating, grassed open space and landscaping. The design of the proposal is climate-responsive, of a high quality and reflective of the outback character.

On-site parking is provided for six cars (including one PWD space) and for loading/unloading and parking of buses. Maximum building height of the accommodation building is generally less than 8.5 m. The proposal can accommodate a maximum of 62 male and 62 female students and eight staff. Connection to all necessary infrastructure can be provided to the subject site. #### 2. SITE DETAILS

The subject site comprises two lots (Lots 108 and 109 W2402), with a total area of 4045 sq m. Both lots are freehold and in the ownership of A B Patterson College Limited. (Refer Figure 4 – Subject Site)

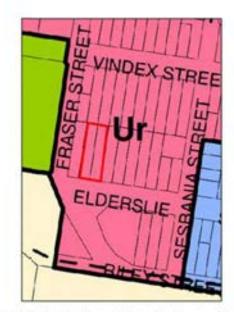


Figure 5 Subject Site Zoning - Winton Shire Planning Scheme

#### ASSESSMENT

The development application has been processed and assessed in accordance with the requirements of the Planning Act 2016, the Planning Regulation 2017 and the Development Assessment Rules.

On 23 January 2020 SARA provided a referral agency response - no requirements.

The subject site is located in the flood hazard area – level 1 – Queensland floodplain assessment overlay. In relation to flooding, floor levels of all buildings have been set above the anticipated flood level relevant to the subject site.

In relation to the specific State interest of water quality, the proposal can be conditioned to comply with the stormwater management design objectives as applicable, during construction.

The proposal clearly accords with the outcomes of the Regional Plan as the proposal is for a facility to accommodate visiting school excursion groups to provide opportunities to impart knowledge and understanding of the history and lifestyle of rural communities in western Queensland.

### Summary

This report provides the minutes of the Red Ridge (Interior Queensland) Limited Meeting held on 29 January 2020. It also provides further information on the "Dress the West – Beneath the Outback skies" program for further consideration by Council.

### Report

This report provides the minutes of the Red Ridge (Interior Queensland) Limited Meeting held on 29 January 2020.

Back on 21 November 2019, correspondence was received from Red Ridge (copy attached) on the delivery of regional arts and cultural projects across Western Queensland in 2020. One of these projects is the "Dress the West – Beneath the Outback skies" concept. This letter requested expressions of interest from local government by 9 December 2019. Given this was prior to our next scheduled Council meeting, I provided a response advising of Council's interest in the project (without committing) and requested further information on the level of involvement including any financial commitment to partner in this project.

Further information has now been provided in a letter dated 4 February 2020 (copy attached) which sets out the four stages, giving options for engagement based on individual capacity for

inclusion in the 2020 program. Indicative costings have also been provided which cover the four stages including: -

-	Development	\$ 7,250
-	Photo Shoot	\$ 5,150
-	Promotion and Marketing	\$ 1,900
-	Performance / Production	\$17,900
-	TOTAL PROJECT COSTS	\$32,050

Council has discretion over the stages it wishes to participate in and it is likely the cost can be spread over two financial years. There is also the option for Council to incorporate the Performance / Production stage with an existing community event to value add. If Council wishes to participate in this program, it would be totally up to Council and the community on when they would like the event to take place.

Advice has been received from Red Ridge that if Council intends to participate in the whole process, the community workshop phase can take approximately four months, so if the community workshop phase commenced in March 2020, the event could take place around July / August which would tie in nicely with the tourist season.

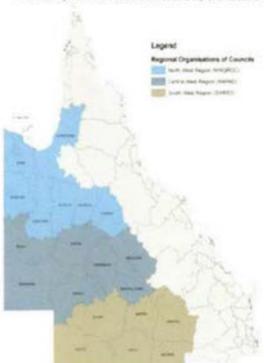


#### RAPAD Board Meeting 3 February 2020 Communiqué - DRAFT

As a part of normal business, the Board of RAPAD held its first scheduled Board meeting for 2020 on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of February via zoom videoconferencing.

#### Matters covered at the meeting were:

. 2020 / 21 budget submission: Working in partnership with the SWLGA and the NWROC, as the 'Western Alliance', the Board endorsed a submission to the State



Governments 20-21 budget relating to road infrastructure. In summary the alliance called for:

- Reverse the long-term trend of declining funding allocations to the North West District, Central West, District and South West District of the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) under the Queensland Transport and Roads Investment Program (QTRIP).
- Build on the success of the Transport Infrastructure Development Scheme (TIDS) and the existing framework of Regional Roads and Transport Groups (RRTGs) by supporting a new investment pipeline in TIDS for the three western Queensland RRTGs, and
- As part of the above and as a commitment to 'place based' policy and program delivery, immediately review the current TIDS Policy to re-adjust the current 50/50 matching component acknowledging the constrained budgets of Western

Queensland Councils.

- Disaster Management and Plant Hire Rates: Advice was provided by the CEO that the working group had reengaged since Christmas and seeking meeting with QRA at present to progress ASAP.
- Regional Planning Interests Act: The CEO advised of recent meetings held between Lake Eyre Basin stakeholder groups, including RAPAD, concerned over the State (07) 4632 5600

Governments proposed changes to the Regional Planning Interests Act relative to the Qld component of the Lake Eyre Basin. The State provided targeted stakeholder updates prior to Christmas. The proposed changes were presented in a 6-point power point presentation, with limited detail. While the stakeholders have differing opinions on the proposed changes, the CEO advised that all groups were united in their opinion that the consultative process conducted by the State was very deficient. The State has offered extensions to submission dates with these now due by 14 February. The Board considered its position and they instructed the CEO to place a submission.

- 2020 Election: Further to the draft election platform discussed at the December 6, 2019 meeting, discussions have occurred with mayors out of session and a revised draft was provided at this meeting. It is the intention of the Board that they would aim to finalise the election platform by the end of February. Working in conjunction with the South West councils through the South West LGA and the North West councils through their North West ROC, it is the intention to put forward both separate and joint election platforms.
- Rural Financial Counselling Service North Qld: The Board received the RFCSNQ Project Management Committees (PMC) draft December 11 meeting minutes, service statistics, and information on the Federal Governments trial small business financial counselling program to service drought affected areas. Information on RFCSNQ can be found at <a href="https://www.rfcsng.com.au">www.rfcsng.com.au</a>.
- QATC / LPC: The CEO advised the Board on the progress of his discussions with the QDAF this year to date: since presenting the Board and the QDAF in late November 2019, with the prefeasibility report prepared by Price Waterhouse Coopers. The report, and outcomes of these discussions are remaining confidential to date however the CEO advised the Board that any potential progress regarding a transition is still in its early stages, and entirely in the hand of the State Government.
- Financial, policy, governance: The CEO tabled general finance matters which were received by the Board.
- Wild Dog Coordinator: The CEO tabled the Qld Wild Dog Control Coordinators progress report #2, pertinent to the Central West, and delivered by AgForce.
- Tourism data model: The CEO tabled the tourism data model interim report and advised that the consultants were visiting all LG regions the week commencing 3 February.
- Next meeting: Winton: 25 and 26 February preceded by the roads & transport; water
  and sewerage, and regional pest management group meetings. An invitation was
  extended to Hon Shahe Stone AC QC to attend the RAPAD meeting. The CEO
  advised he was waiting on feedback about the launch of the Central West Regional
  Resilience Strategy, and the QRA advised it was imminent.

#### Report

Whilst applying to the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) for an additional charitable sub-type (advancing culture) to be added for the WMCL, a complication arose. A Senior Analyst from the ACNC reviewed the existing Constitution of the WNCL and identified an object which was non-compliant for a charitable organisation.

If unaltered, it would be determined the WMCL would lose their charitable status and their 'deductible gift recipient' benefits. Following consultation with the Senior Analyst, if the above amendments to the Constitution are agreed to by Council, the ACNC would approve of the WMCL retaining their charitable status and the application for the additional sub-type could also be considered.

The Board of the WMCL will be considering these proposed amendments at a meeting to be held on 17 February 2020 and should they recommend the changes be made, Council will be in a position to adopt the above recommendations.

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

The Winton Wild Dog Management Committee (WWDMC) was established in 2012 and has been a positive step forward in the management of wild dogs and their impacts. This is due to the advisory group being led and managed by the local Landholders and key stakeholders in partnership with the Winton Shire Council.

Predation on livestock from wild dogs within the Winton Shire, has been an ongoing issue across most areas of the shire for many years. A number of Landholders have implemented various forms of control with varying success. Sheep and wool producers have felt the brunt of the impacts and many have left the industry mostly due to predation from wild dogs. Landholders have re-stocked with cattle but are now feeling the impacts of wild dogs on their cattle herds.

Historically, the main control technique has been the use of Sodium Fluoroacetate (1080) in fresh meat baits. This technique has been used by distributing meat baits from the air or by hand on the ground. Several Landholders are investigating the use of exclusion and cluster fencing methods to protect livestock from predation. Additional methods have included trapping and eradicating wild dogs with the use of a 'Trapper'.

#### 2. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Wild Dog Management Plan is to implement an effective, efficient and coordinated approach to controlling wild dogs that aims to reduce impacts on livestock production and to increase Landholder participation within the Winton Shire area.

#### 3. SCOPE

This Plan applies to the Winton Wild Dog Management Committee and Landholders within the Winton Shire Council Area.

This Plan has been drafted to align with the outcomes identified in the Winton Wild Dog Terms of Reference.

#### 3.1. ABOUT WILD DOGS

Wild dogs are the largest mammalian predator in Australia. Wild dogs have few natural predators besides humans, with the pups being vulnerable to birds of prey, foxes, snakes and goannas.

Wild dogs vary in size, but most are similar in size and shape to kelpies. Adults are usually slender and weigh 15kg on average, feral domestic dogs that are caught in the wild can weigh up to 70kg.

The dingo is a native animal which has interbred with dog breeds that were brought to Australia with European settlers and hybrids or wild dogs soon spread to the north and west from south-eastern Australia.

The females come into season Feb / Apr, with the pups being born 2 months later. Breeding may occur later in the year, depending on seasonal conditions. Females produce an average of five pups each litter. The breeding cycle can vary when influenced by a range of factors including, age, social status, latitude, seasonal conditions and genetic purity.

Wild dogs have been recorded dispersing over 550km in less than one month, however this is not normal, with most moving shorter distances to occupy nearby vacant territory.

Wild dogs do not need to drink water on a daily basis, however the distribution of populations is usually linked to the availability of water. Wild dogs occur in all habitat types on mainland Australia.

#### 3.2. IMPACTS

During the planning process it has been made clear, that the loss of production from the impacts of wild dogs on livestock is a key problem that producers are encountering. It must also be noted that loss of production is just one of several impacts that wild dogs are having on landholders within the Winton Shire area. The varying impacts that landholders are experiencing are as follows:

- Livestock losses and injuries.
- Stress to livestock.
- Limitations on diversifying farm enterprise,
- Adverse environmental impacts due to excess wild dog populations,
- Disease impacts / risks to livestock and humans.
- Personal and financial stress and concern on landholders.
- Social impacts on the local community i.e. loss of employment, and
- Stress on local government funding allocations.

These impacts are being experienced at varying levels across the Winton Shire. The ability of wild dogs to move across the landscape, using corridors like national parks and river systems, crossing shire and property boundaries, makes management difficult. Greater awareness, measuring and monitoring the impacts are crucial to the success of this plan that will help implement strategic and coordinated management.

As wild dogs have been in the landscape for many years, it is important to focus on managing the impacts that they are having rather than individual dogs. The goal however is to reduce impacts or as a long-term outcome to eliminate impacts across all areas.

#### 4. OBJECTIVES

The key objectives of this management Plan are:

- Increase the number of sheep and wool producers within the Winton Shire area,
- Identify and prioritise potential high impact / density areas within the Winton Shire Council area.
- Increase Landholder participation in effective wild dog control within the Winton Shire by 10%.
- Support funding (within budget constraints) for wild dog control in line with inflation.
- Provide education to Landholders and community through workshops and field days to increase awareness, skills and knowledge in wild dog behaviour and control techniques, and
- Continue to lobby government and research organisations to provide new and effective control tools for wild dogs.

#### 5. WINTON WILD DOG MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE (WWDMC)

The WWDMC began in 2012, with Landholders being involved in the decision-making process and receiving support from other agencies and individuals. The WWDMC is an advisory committee only, which provides advice to Council on the details of where and when strategic wild dog control should occur, using a state coordinated calendar showing aerial and ground baiting activities.

The Winton Shire Council area has been divided by the committee into 5 divisions (refer to attachment 1). Each of the divisional areas has a minimum of two appointed representatives, whose responsibility is to communicate with and coordinate landholders in their area, to implement strategic and coordinated control among other roles.

The WWDMC is made up of the following members:

- Chairperson, or his/her designated representative,
- Deputy Chairperson,
- The Secretary (Council provided),
- Winton Shire Council Mayor or his/her designated representatives,
- Two representatives from each division or their designated representatives,
- Meat Coordinator,
- Winton Shire Council Rural Lands Officer (RLO) or the designated representative,
- Winton Shire Council Biosecurity Officer, and
- Other technical advisors as requested by the Committee.

The WWDMC is made up of the following divisions:

Divisional Areas	Baiting Station
Northern	Dagworth
Southern	Wantalanya
Eastern	Sesbania & Tarragona
Western	Cork
Far Western	Franklin

#### 6. IDENTIFIED STAKEHOLDERS

All stakeholders in reference to this Wild Dog Management Plan, have the responsibility to participate and/or have input into the actions implemented by the Council. This is in line with the current Biosecurity Act 2014.

The Biosecurity Act 2014 commenced on the 1st July 2016. The Act is designed to deliver a single, cohesive legislative framework that replaces six previous Acts, making substantive amendments to three other Acts and replaces eleven pieces of subordinate legislation. This includes the Fisheries Act 1994 (part), the Exotic Diseases and Animals Act 1981, the Stock Act 1915, the Land Protection (Pest and Stock Route Management) Act 2002 (part) and the Agricultural Standards Act 1994 (Queensland Government).

The following is a list of stakeholders and their roles and responsibilities in the management of wild dogs within the Winton Shire area.

#### 6.1. BIOSECURITY QUEENSLAND

- Provide support and relevant input to Council and the WWDMC in areas such as legislation and state government regulations,
- Provide the technical support and advice in regard to best practice in wild dogcontrol,
- Work closely with the Council Rural Lands Officer (RLO) to ensure the regular supply of 1080 solution and other products for baiting programs, and
- Provide Geographic Information System (GIS) and mapping support where required.

#### 6.2. WINTON SHIRE COUNCIL

- Support and endorse the WWDMC in its advisory role in guiding and implement best practice control options.
- Promote the WWDMC and its action through local newsletters and publications and provide administrative support,
- Provide a baiting service to landholders to allow for coordinated management,
- Within budget constraints provide funding for wild dog control activities within the Winton Shire area in partnership with landholders.

#### 6.3. LANDHOLDERS

- Carry out or permit preactive best practice control on private land within the plan area i.e. trapping, baiting and shooting,
- Provide relevant wild dog data to their area coordinator to be submitted at the committee meetings,
- Actively participate in coordinated 1080 baiting programs (aerial and ground), and
- Work with and support neighbouring landholders to participate in wild dog control
  activities.

#### 6.4. AGFORCE QUEENSLAND

- Provide support to all stakeholders in their actions to reduce wild dog impacts,
- · Provide access to training and information relevant to best practice wild dog control,
- Fully support and assist the Winton Shire Council and the WWDMC program,
- Provide linkages / contacts between neighbouring shires and address wild dog control
  at a catchment / regional scale, and
- Assist with management plans and participation data collections.

#### 6.5. STATE LAND REPRESENTATIVES (QPWS, QR)

- Represent their relevant departments as an active, contributing landholder in wild dog management, and
- Provide relevant information to landholders in respect to some restrictions that are encountered on state lands.

#### 6.6. LOCAL AND WIDER COMMUNITY

- Need to be kept informed of the impacts that wild dogs are having on the producers of their region, and
- Business owners should understand the possible impacts that can occur on their business due to consequences of increased number of producers leaving their industry of choice due to wild dogs.

#### 6.7. TRAPPER

- Provide landholders and the Winton Shire Council information on dog trappings, shootings and sightings,
- Work closely with the Winton Shire Council and the WWDMC to ensure effective and strategic use of the trapper's time and expertise, and
- Provide a full report on all activities undertaken by the Trapper in the Winton Shire area.

#### 6.8. AUSTRALIAN WOOL INNOVATIONS (AWI)

Continue to support wild dog control activities within Central West Queensland (CWQ).

#### 6.9. MEDIA

 Support and promote the Wild Dog Management Plan and report on 'good news stories' regarding wild dog control activities.

#### 7. WILD DOG MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES

The aim is to minimise the impacts of wild dogs across the Winton Shire area, this strategy sets an objective of 'zero tolerance' of wild dogs.

The Winton Shire Council shall only endorse and promote best practice control and management for wild dogs under this plan. Best practice techniques include the following:

- Baiting (1080),
- Trapping,
- Shooting.
- Exclusion and/or cluster fencing practices,
- Use of Guardian animals, and
- Satellite surveillance technology.

#### 7.1. SODIUM FLUOROACETATE 1080

The most suitable wild dog toxin to be used is Sodium fluoroacetate (1080). 1080 is the most efficient, economic, humane and species selective chemical currently available for pest animal control in Australia.

Material to be baited with 1080 will be fresh meat correctly sized as per the requirements set by the regulations. 1080 is a Schedule 7 poison and as a solution is only able to be possessed by an 'authorised person' (Rural Lands Officers).

Baited material can be distributed by hand baiting by the landholder or aerial baiting from an aircraft. Both techniques have their advantages, and both are needed to successfully and efficiently control wild dogs.

Note: 1080 poison signage is compulsory for all lands where baiting occurs. Signs shall be installed immediately before 1080 baiting operations commence and placed according to the requirements specified by the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAF). The signs must be maintained for at least four (4) weeks after the authorised period of bait lay has expired or after all untaken baits have been collected.

#### 7.1.1. AERIAL BAITING REQUIREMENTS

- The WWDMC will recommend dates for the aerial baiting campaigns, the quantity of meat to be distributed and the flight path of the plane, for consideration by Council,
- The Division representatives arrange landholders to assist with the on-ground operations on the baiting days, i.e. meat preparation,
- Aerial baiting campaigns should only cover inaccessible terrain of the region as much as possible to achieve value for money and effective wild dog management. Ground baiting should be encouraged in the more accessible country,
- Council arranges an order for the plane, fuel and bait meat. The authorised officer (RLO) carries out the impregnation of bait material, and
- It is critical that strategic ground baiting efforts are carried out in coordination with the aerial campaigns.

#### 7.1.2. GROUND BAITING REQUIREMENTS

- Landholders shall contact the Winton Council Rural Lands Officer (RLO), to reactive ground bait.
- The Landholder shall approach neighbouring landholders to ask if they would like to participate in ground baiting, to allow for improved coordination.
- Meat maybe available from the RLO for baiting that is done 'outside' the coordinated baiting program times, and
- The RLO will carry out the preparation of baited material.

Note: The duties and tasks that need to be carried out prior to the coordinated aerial baiting campaigns conducted each year, is outlined in Attachment 2.

#### 7.1.3. MEAT SUPPLY AND COLD-ROOM USE

- The Winton Shire Council has a cold room at the Council Depot (Rural Services Stock routes shed).
- Landholders may use this cold-room to store unbaited meat that has been sourced on property for future use in a baiting program,
- The RLO will account for meat going in and out via a recording system,
- Meat being stored in the cold-room is to be pre-cut into bait size pieces before being stored.
- Winton Shire Council will provide a pre-determined amount of meat for the aerial and ground coordinated baiting programs that occur annually, and
- The Division Representatives of the WWDMC shall ensure all landholders in their division are aware of the upcoming campaign and encourage them to participate.

#### 7.2. TRAPPING

Trapping may be undertaken by the Trapper or Landholder and is a target specific method of controlling wild dogs. This technique is very effective when used to control 'difficult' older dogs that may be hard to bait.

Many landholders have been and are now starting to trap successfully to complement the aerial or ground baiting programs.

#### 7.3. SHOOTING

Shooting on its own is not recognised as a successful broad scale control technique but is definitely one technique that is recommended and needs to be used and promoted in conjunction with the other wild dog management strategies.

Shooting along with trapping allows landholders and community members to make the most of opportune moments in wild dog control and to also claim the Winton Shire Council wild dog scalp bounty.

#### 7.4. FENCING

Fencing methods such as cluster or exclusion fencing provides a non-lethal method of reducing wild dog impacts. They are most effective when used in conjunction with other methods of control such as baiting, trapping or guardian animals. These fencing techniques are expensive to erect and maintain, but they do complement other control programs.

There are varying configurations of exclusion fencing, ranging from electric to high netting and each has their own advantages and disadvantages depending on the land type and maintenance requirements.

#### 7.5. GUARDIAN ANIMALS

Guardian animals can be utilised for the protection from wild dogs. Various guardian animals may include, donkeys, alpacas and Maremma dogs. Maremma dogs are the most commonly used across Queensland and are quite successful in protecting livestock from wild dog predation.

The de-sexing of maremma dogs is recommended, to eliminate the risk of cross breeding with the wild dog population. Landholders planning to use maremma dogs should refer to the State Government best practice guidelines and also their local vet.

Note: It is recommended that landholders use more than one if not all of the above-mentioned control techniques to ensure effective all year-round control of wild dogs. The use of one technique on its own is unlikely to ensure effective control of wild dogs and their impacts.

#### 7.6. SATELITTE SURVEILLANCE TECHNOLOGY

With increasing advances in satellite technology, the opportunity exists to monitor dog activity and then specifically target selected areas with dog control programs. This technique should result in more effective control and use of the budget funds available.

These initiatives are only in their infancy and further investigation and assessments of the benefits are to be considered.

#### 8. COMMUNICATION

The Winton Shire Council will focus on increasing the level of participation in control programs, increasing knowledge of the impacts across the shire, promoting successes and lessons learnt.

The main actions of communications will include the following:

- Advertise the WWDMC 'Public Meeting' in the Winton newspaper and other media outlets;
- Advertise the 1080 Baiting Program in the Winton newspaper two weeks prior to the commencement of baiting activities.
- Collation and dissemination of maps displaying areas of concern, general impactdata and identifying gaps in the control program,
- Engaging all landholders in awareness raising / training events such as planning workshops and information events, and
- The promotion of 'good news stories' to demonstrate that positive outcomes occur from implementing strategic and coordinated management.

Engaging 'non-compliant' landholders can be difficult, however if a greater sense of community and team work is developed, participation is more likely to increase.

#### 9. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

Monitoring and evaluation processes are critical to ensure wild dog management within the area to be effective, measurable and accountable. Monitoring data will include the following:

- Collection of and interpretation of contract trapper and scalp bounty data.
- Collection of an interpretation of baiting statistics and landholder data,
- Data gathered by the Winton Shire Council, on limitations placed on landholders diversifying their farming enterprise, and
- Number of information days, mail-outs, baiting days and public meetings.

Detailed data will be collected and collated from control programs including:

- Percentage of the Winton shire covered by the baiting program,
- Number of landholders participating,
- Volume and strength of baits distributed and the method (aerial or ground),
- Aircraft track logs, and
- Points where dogs are trapped or shot (scalp and division data).

This data will continue to be collected and provided to the committee members and community on a regular basis. This will allow Council and the committee members to make informed decisions on future management techniques to be implemented. It will ensure successful and strategic control is achieved by utilising the most accurate up to date information.

This information is critical to ensure that funds are targeted at known wild dog areas and value for money is achieved from the budget allocation.

#### REPORTING

Reporting on success and failures of the program is essential for the improvement of techniques and strategies. Each Division Representative on the WWDMC will be required to table a report from their division at the quarterly meetings. The report will include a summary of the current dog activity in their division and also issues that have arisen since the previous meeting.

The chair of the WWDMC shall prepare and present reports at Council meetings when required, to provide elected members with information to support the WWDMC and its associated activities. A map showing data that has been collated will be presented in a suitable format to demonstrate effectiveness of the program.

The Council RLO shall continue to provide data to the committee on who participated in both aerial and ground baiting activities as well as the amount of bait material used. This data will be critical in assisting the committee on targeting control. It will also inform the committee of the landholders to carry out baiting programs outside the two coordinated programs.

#### REVIEW

This management plan shall be reviewed by Council and the WWDMC with direct input from all stakeholders on a bi-annual basis (odd years – in alignment with the Chairperson position). The timing of the review will coincide with the Council annual budget meeting, which will allow for the allocation of funding for the management of wild dogs.

The review process will involve the use of mapping and all monitoring data collected throughout the year to assist with setting priorities and refining the entire program. Any changes made to the core elements of this Plan will need to be forwarded to all landholders through the division coordinators and/or the local newsletter for input / feedback.

A full report on the wild dog program will be produced after the review. If requested, neighbouring shires shall be sent a copy of the report to assist with cross border planning / communication and any emerging issues.

#### 12. ACHIEVING THE OBJECTIVES

Community led wild dog management programs can be very effective in reducing the impacts on all stakeholders. Therefore, it is critical that this Wild Dog Management Plan is owned and implemented as a combined effort from all stakeholders of the Winton Shire.

The keys to meeting the objectives include:

- Using a team approach to combine landholder resources and efforts;
- Landholders taking full ownership of the problem via effective biosecurity management plans;
- · Honest and open communication with the Winton Council;
- Utilise best practice methods;
- Remaining open to new and innovative techniques;
- Funding support for the program from the Winton Council or other grant opportunities;
   and
- Effective promotion and endorsement of the WWDMC and the role it plays in the community.

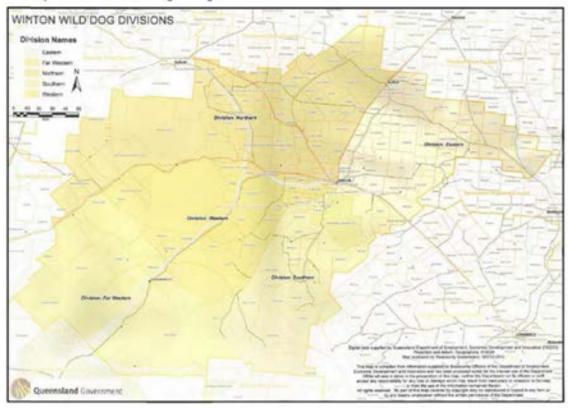

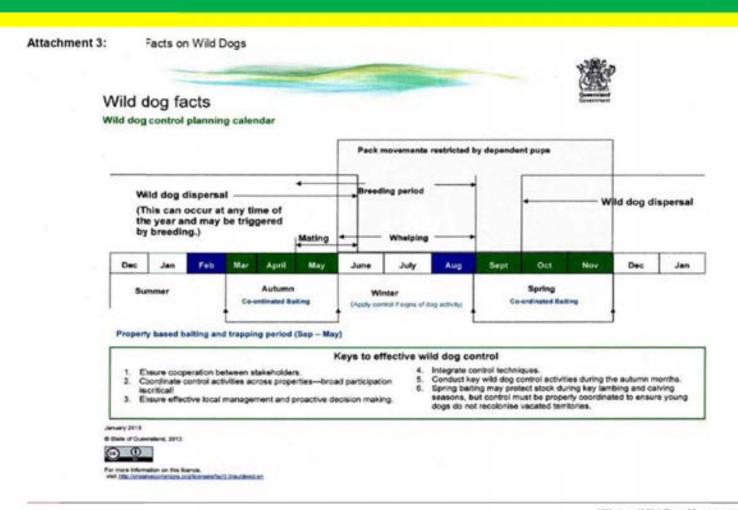

At the Council Meeting held on 20 December 2018, Council agreed to support the dedication of the lease area identified as Lot 64 on AE113 (previous Western Picnic Race Club Racecourse) as a reserve for Strategic Land Management purposes with Council consenting to be the trustee of this Reserve. No indication was given by Council on how this area was to be utilised in the interim and I have recently received two expressions of interest to either lease / agist the block. I seek a direction from Council on how they wish to utilise this area.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

- 1. THAT the Report be received;
- 2. THAT Council determine how the Reserve area identified as Lot 64 on AE113 is to be used prior to a long-term strategic use being determined.

#### **REPORT**

Information provided by the Department of Natural Resources, Mines and Energy indicates the area of the lease previously held by The Western Picnic Race Club Inc. for their racecourse is 258.609 hectares and is located on the Winton / Jundah Road. A map showing the Reserve is attached for information.

After Council agreed to take control over this area, a portion of the boundary fence was removed / damaged and the cattle from the Town Common currently access this area. #### Summary

At the Council Meeting held on 13 December 2019, permission was granted for the Diamantina Rodeo & Campdraft Association to upgrade the lighting at the Showgrounds. Council also asked for the condition of one of the lighting poles to be investigated for possible replacement. This report seeks Council's consideration for the replacement of the lighting pole to enable the lighting upgrade project to be completed.

#### Recommendation

- 1. THAT the Report be received.
- 2. THAT Council increase the Showgrounds Maintenance budget by \$10,000 to enable the replacement of one lighting pole to enable the Diamantina Rodeo & Campdraft Association's lighting upgrade project to be completed.

#### Report

The Diamantina Rodeo and Campdraft Association (DRCA) were successful with a funding application for \$43,210 to upgrade the lighting at the Winton Showgrounds. A copy of the correspondence from the Association, including a lighting plan is attached for information.

At the Council Meeing held on 13 December 2019, the following decision was carried: -

- THAT the Diamantina Campdraft and Rodeo Association be given permission to erect the arena lights as requested and that Council will investigate the condition of the pole near the cut-out yard. In preparing the lighting plan and quote, it was identified the lighting pole near the cut-out yard would need to be replaced. This was confirmed by Council's Asset Manager and it has been estimated the cost is likely to be around \$10,000. The quote from Westec Electrical does not include pole upgrades or replacement. In the letter from the DRCA, they do indicate that they "will contribute additional costs if the funding available does not cover the expenses".

The quote from Westec Electrical does not cover: -

- Damage cover for the removal of the existing lights;
- Cable upgrades if required;
- Switchboard upgrades if required;
- Pole upgrades or replacement;
- Sub-contractor payments.

It is possible additional costs will be incurred (in addition to replacing one of the lighting poles) by the DRCA and Council may wish to contribute to the lighting upgrade project by meeting the cost of the lighting pole replacement.



To Winton Shire Council

Diamantina Rodeo and Campdraft Assoc applied for funding towards upgrading the Lighting at the Showgrounds. The grant funding was approved for \$43 210.

DRCA have had a qualified electrician to assess the lighting upgrade and have informed that the current lighting at showgrounds are very low quality and also drawing a lot of the power supply.

Therefore, he would replace all lighting elements on poles with high quality LED flood lights enabling a more effective cover and brightness over the arena and also around the camp area. Theses LED lights will also lower the power supply that is currently getting used. (Attached is further information form Electrician.) The lights been installed will enable the arena to have much brighter lighting and vision for events to commence into the night.

Diamantina Rodeo & Campdraft Assoc feel this project is a vital part of our showgrounds, enabling our events to continue into the night safely and also allow more events to expand, which will also benefit our community. Lighting upgrade will not only benefit our committee but all showground user groups and the general community giving more opportunities. DRCA feel this is an effective stepping stone towards the lighting and feel there is always ways to expand done the track.

DRCA will contribute additional costs if the funding available dose not cover the expenses.

Therefore, Diamantina Rodeo & Campdraft Assco would like the approval of Winton Council to support the lighting upgrade funding available to the Showgrounds.

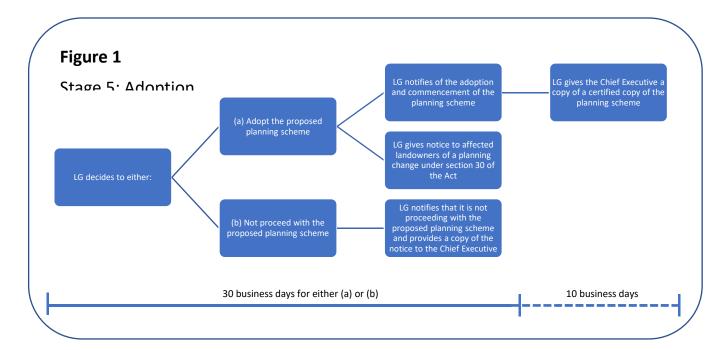
#### Report

The Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme has been prepared in accordance with the State Government legislative framework and mandatory guidelines. On 6 February 2020, the Minister for State Development, Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Planning (DSDMIP) advised the review of

the proposed planning scheme had been completed and Council may now adopt the *Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme*. A copy of the Minister's letter of consent dated 6 February 2020 is attached for information.

The Winton Shire Council resolved to join other rural and remote local governments in preparing a new planning scheme via a Template Planning Scheme with the assistance of the DSDMIP. Since 2018, the DSDMIP has assisted Council to prepare the proposed planning scheme. The most recent action taken by Council was the submission of the proposed *Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme* for final Ministerial review on 28 January 2020.

The proposed Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme is now in Stage 5 – Adoption of the planmaking process set out in the 11 April 2018 notice issued to Council under section 18(3) of the *Planning Act 2016.* Figure 1 below summarises the steps for this legislative process.



## **Options**

In accordance with step 18 of stage 5 of the prescribed plan making process set out in the 11 April 2018 notice issued to Council under Section 18(3) of the *Planning Act 2016*, Council must resolve whether to:

- (a) adopt the proposed planning scheme; or
- (b) decide not to proceed with the proposed planning scheme.

## Adopt the Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme (recommended option)

The Council should proceed with the gazettal process for the following reasons:

- i. The Winton Shire Planning Scheme has been developed in consultation with State Government agencies and complies with current legislation;
- ii. The State Government has supported Council with resources to prepare the proposed planning scheme;
- iii. The Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme has been publicly notified and the general public are aware of its content.

Should Council decide to proceed with the adoption of the Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme, then it is required to give notification of its decision in the Government Gazette, local newspaper and by making the Planning Scheme available on the Council's website. Council must also provide copies of these notifications and a certified electronic copy of the Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme to the Chief Executive of the Department of State Development, Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Planning.

## Not Proceed with the Planning Scheme

There are no foreseeable reasons not to proceed with the proposed planning scheme.

Notwithstanding, if Council were of a mind to not proceed with the proposed planning scheme, this decision must be notified in the Government Gazette, local newspaper and on Council's website. A copy of the notices is required to be sent to the Chief Executive of the Department of State Development, Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Planning.

## Conclusion

The State Government has given approval for Council to adopt the Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme. It is important the required statutory steps are completed prior to commencement of the new planning scheme. Commencement of the new planning scheme is therefore proposed on 2 March 2020. The adoption of the Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme is the final stage of a protracted legislative process set out in the 11 April 2018 notice issued to Council under Section 18(3) of the *Planning Act 2016*.

I write to you in relation to the template planning scheme initiative the Department of State Development, Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Planning (the department) is undertaking to assist rural and remote local governments update their planning schemes. I am advised that your council is participating in this initiative.

As you are aware, the Planning Act 2016 (Planning Act), replaced the Sustainable Planning Act 2009 on 3 July 2017. Under the Planning Act, a local government preparing a new planning scheme must follow the process I give in a notice under section 18(3).

I have considered the Minister's Guidelines and Rules when preparing this notice to ensure that the process for making the planning scheme is proportionate to the level of risk associated with making a scheme in a local government area like yours.

Under section 18(6) of the Planning Act, Winton Shire Council must make its planning scheme by following the process in this notice, which comprises of this letter and enclosures A, B and C.

The process described in Enclosure A of this notice is to be undertaken in the order in which it is prescribed. A communications strategy that the local government must implement about the instrument is also enclosed as Enclosure C.

  - that submissions about any aspect of the proposed planning scheme may be made to the local government by any person
  - g. the consultation period during which a submission may be made
  - h. the requirements for making a properly made submission
  - i. a contact telephone number for information about the proposed amendment.
- 7. The public notice published under step 19 must state:
  - j. the name of the local government
  - k. the decision made by the local government about the planning scheme
  - the date the planning scheme was adopted

## **REPORT**

The following report outlines the works completed in the month of January 2020 by the Works Department.

## **Asset and Quality**

## W4Q (17/19) - Winton Waterpark

The funded component is completed. Grass was removed before the rains in January interrupted work. Final landscaping will be over the next couple of months if weather permits.

Some electrical modifications will be made to the main switchboard to protect against power surges and reinstate the button timer.

Contractors have been engaged to carry out annual maintenance on the chemical dosing system (all pools).

## W4Q (19/21) - Waterpark Shade Structure

The core project is complete with some electrical connections, lighting, WIFI and cameras to be installed when the electrical contractor returns to Winton in February.

## W4Q (19/21) - Childcare Playground

Conceptual design has been completed by a specialist Contractor. The design has a focus on different textures, natural elements and interactivity. Sand and water play features prominently as well as usability. The design brief was determined by the Childcare staff – ensuring elements they wanted to see (and elements they didn't want) were addressed and included.

## W4Q (19/21) - Elderslie St Stage 2 Beatification

As far as the funding is concerned, this stage has been completed and claimed.

The shade structures have been installed with the rest of the work to be finished in February. Plans to fully complete the street are underway and will be completed over the coming weeks.

## **BBR – Showgrounds Electrical Upgrade**

The project was lodged by the due date and has advanced to "Pending Assessment".

#### **BBR - Pool Kiosk**

The project was lodged by the due date and has advanced to "Pending Assessment".

# DCP Extension (2020) - \$1M - Various Projects

The projects are in various stages of draft submission. This is at the direction of the Drought Communities Department. With this round of funding all \$1M constitutes one project as far as the portal is concerned. The Council projects previously identified have been entered into the portal with associated documentation. Updates of project delivery are below.

QANTAS and WINTON sign	GBA have provided quotes for design and are engaged to carry out detailed work. Clarification for land access to the town common north of the Showgrounds is underway.				
Community Projects	To be advertised to the community in February.				
Corfield Water Infrastructure	GBAs Keith Luckhurst has been invited to Winton in early February to look at the project to determine engineering requirements – particularly relating to potable water supply and delivery.

Telstra Small Cells – Middleton and Opalton	Telstra have been given notice of Councils intent.				
PWD access at shed 5 (WMC)	Design and quotes previously sought. Updating and engaging supplier will happen in February/March.

Adverse Event Plan	As part of the funding Council is required to have, or use the funding, to develop an Adverse Event Plan. This is not a disaster management plan – this is a long-term economic plan as an alternative to traditional agriculture in drought affected areas.				

#### **WMC Remedial Concrete Works**

A detailed survey is planned for early February which will provide levels throughout the foyer area. In terms of the concrete slabs the Asset Manager has determined an appropriate course of action. One slab will need to be cut and demolished and reinstated while another will need to be ground down to remove trip hazards.

From monitoring the crack sealing in Elderslie Street, the Contractor that installed that work is the best candidate to complete the WMC work – even going as far as offering a 5 year guarantee for the works.

## **Geothermal Power Station**

The shed that houses the power station has had the final touches completed for building certification.

The cooling tower has been converted to clean water (from the pump shed) and has been cleaned and chemical dosing re-established. After one week the water was pacified and ready to use.

The previous dirty water was likely a significant factor in clogging the condenser on ORC2. Fittings have been sourced to allow Winton Council to carry out backwashing (now and in the future).

Testing of the unit before backwashing and after will be carried out with a scheduled visit from GTET and both ORCs spun up to full speed to ensure contractual obligations have been met.

Additional batteries are in shipping to replace dead cells caused by the battery bank being in storage for a long time.

Additional reports were requested by Ergon relating to a flicker in the power production – this has since been isolated to the Ergon grid and is not coming from within the power station.

## **Showgrounds – Ablution Block**

The Contractor is actively engaged in procurement of materials and subcontractors for the project. In regard to the race event in March a temporary block might be required to provide additional ablutions.

## Showgrounds - Masterplan

The pre-draft of the Master Plan has been completed with Scott Alston from MAK scheduled for a visit in early February to show the plan to Council and the Showgrounds Users Committee.

#### **Building and Land Valuations**

Quotes have been assessed and a specialised Contractor has been awarded the work to complete valuations on Council building and land assets. An assessor is scheduled to be in Winton in mid-February.

This year sections on the Jundah Road and Jundah – Cork Road and Town Streets have been identified as needing a reseal. Tenders have been received, assessed and awarded; the tender was awarded to Fulton Hogan. The reseals are programmed to be executed in late March 2019.

#### **Rural Roads**

Rural road maintenance has been progressing well. Crews have been integrating maintenance works in with the flood damage program. This will enable Council to get a better value for money out of both programs. Roads that are not part of the flood damage program will be monitored and maintenance will be conducted as needed.

The current expenditure for rural maintenance is \$463,128.20

#### **Town Maintenance**

Town Maintenance has been progressing well. There has been minor pavement patching works and footpath works conducted around town. Current expenditure to date for town maintenance is \$227,421.45

Works crews have been completing bitumen patching and inspections on the RMPC this month.

## Pavement Rehabilitation - Kennedy Development Road

During September, Council were invited to tender on a pavement rehabilitation project on the Kennedy Development Road between Chainage 131-138.35. A tender was submitted to TMR and council has been successful in obtaining the project for the value of \$3,610,548.76 GST inclusive. This project has been scheduled to start in late October with 2km of the project being completed by Christmas.

Works have begun on this project and are progressing well. Base works for the first 2.2kms have been completed with crews receiving high percentage passes for the compaction of the material. The first stage of the project was primed on the 16<sup>th</sup> of December 2019 and sealed on 20 December 2019, guideposts were installed, and the road reopened to traffic.

Works recommenced on the Kennedy Development Road with crews completing pulverising works and preparing the subgrade ready for base material. Current expenditure for this project is \$956,131.31.

- Repaired 63mm poly sub main at the Cnr of Cork & Manifold Street.
- Repaired 100mm AC water main which feeds the Showgrounds from Cork Street.

### Water Pump Station

Upgrades to electrical connections from the switch board to hot pumps including the introduction of soft start and stop devices to reduce back pressure on the Geothermal Plant. The half hour delay is being over ridden when a power outage or fluctuation occurs (meaning an immediate shut down). The new electrical equipment is so sensitive that the slightest flicker throws the independent pump breaker or the main isolating switch that controls the whole station, including lights. During recent weeks this situation has occurred on several occasions. We are also relying on only two hot pumps as the third has been connected but still not working (has been out of service before Christmas). Recent rain has relieved this demand for water as is the case at this time of the year. Demand has a bearing on discharge temperature, which is affected when low flows occurs (during wet weather, longer retention time in the mains and water tower have a tendency to have a cooling effect). Council has been informed that the stand by generator may not be suitable to engage automatic mode due to the load restraints. The water make up line from the Water Pump Station to the Geothermal Plant has been changed from the cold supply to the hot as the assed anti scale solution which is introduced to the cold system has proven to have a detrimental effect on the collection tray at the bottom of the cooling towers (This direction was challenged at the time).

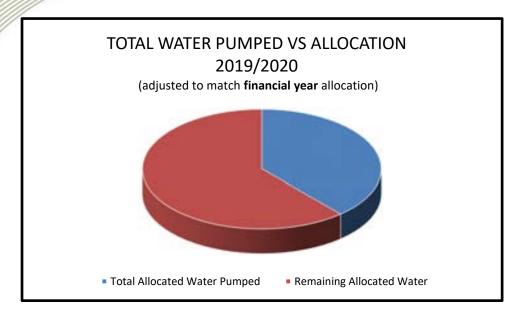
## Sewer Mains and Pump Station Maintenance

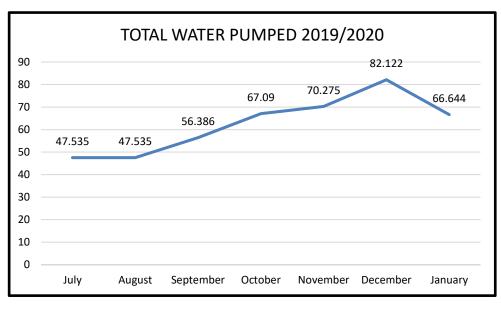
- Only 1 main blockage occurred in Bloomfield Street between Nesbit & Manifold Street.
- During the recent rain, we have restricted pumping from No. 2 Station to the manhole in Cork Street. This is conducted by only having one pump operating at any time which allows the free flow from this manhole downstream without overflowing through some private dwellings ORG's. This procedure is necessary as large quantities of storm water is still entering our system by way of broken jump ups and disconnector traps not sealed on private properties.
- Over a three-day period, an inspection was carried out with the Water & Sewerage Manager and Consultant Engineer of all sewer manholes (internally) in order to make a

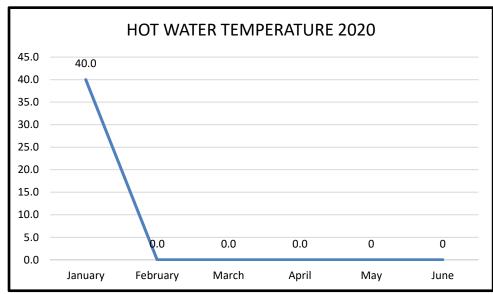
determination whether internal restoration is required (a report should be produced in the near future with the findings).

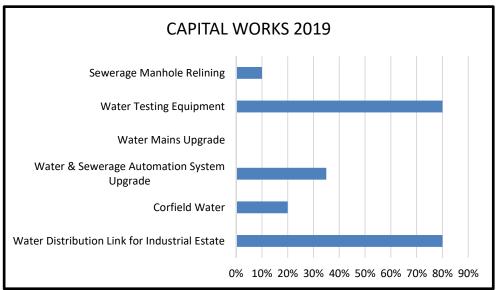
## **Other Works**

- An inspection and recording of all poly water lines which radiate from the extremities of the water mains network to outlying properties namely, WORK Camp, Airport, Muddy Road, Butcher Slaughter House, Old Dairy Boulia Road & Gypsum Plant have been conducted.
- 80% of work has been completed on the laying of the new 150mm blue brute water main running from Chirnside Street West, North to the Rail line (which is still to be under bored) then in a north westerly direction towards Ludwick Mechanical crossing (the bitumen road to the rubbish tip) before connecting into the existing main in the industrial estate. The completion of this project will provide security of supply to the area as the present is serviced via a very poor condition 150mm DI line run adjacent to the road/rail crossing in Wilson Street.
- New drinking fountains have been installed at the following locations: Swimming Pool, Gym, Workshop, Shire Hall, Airport Terminal and Recreation Grounds.
- Toilets have been serviced at the Child Care Centre.
- Toilet repaired at Unit 12 Diamantina Gardens.
- Taps have been re-washered and shower replaced at 5 Bladensburg Street residence.
- Unisex toilet behind library has been repaired.
- Private works has been carried out on private combined sewer line servicing at 25 & 27 Dagworth Street.
- A new replacement submersible sump pump has been installed in the effluent holding tank at the Sale Yards toilets.
- All water meters have been read for rates purposes and eight have been replaced.

## **Water Facilities**

The water facilities are running low, most of the dams are about 10% and the bore levels have dropped back. The following facilities required maintenance:

Kalkadoon - needed a replacement pump and removed sun tracker as birds have eaten wires and set panel to a fix state.

Karoola - replaced tracker plug as birds have eaten the end of the wire.

Four Mile - blocked in the outlet as there is no riser on bottom of the nest the mill is off, so the nest can go dry, so it can be fixed

Nadjayamba - same as the four miles.

12 Mile – there is a goanna hole at the bottom of the nest and the nest has let go and will be repaired.

There are 47 water facilities and half of them have had the pump turned off, so they don't burn out or run dry. Four-mile nest is.

#### Weeds

A letter was sent in to Council regarding a tree in a yard. The letter was asking Council to remove a Prickly Acacia tree but it is not a prickly acacia. It is a Mesquite tree which is still a restricted category 3 tree. As there are many of these trees and lots more restricted trees in yards it would be worth running a program to remove them all.

## **Baiting/ trapper**

There are still dogs moving around the Shire and I have completed 200kg of meat this month. Waiting on a guote for a cold room to come back so funding money can be utilised.

#### **Biosecurity**

Only a few biosecurity activities were completed this month, these included a biological control for some cactus and trees around town.

#### Commons

The Town Common is running well. The back gate on the walking track has been getting left open and cattle getting out there on back street and one old cow pushing under the fence on Longreach road and busting the fence.

#### Sale Yards

The number of cattle are down but will pick up after the rain. Construction of the ramp is on hold until clarification is sought with the ownership.

I have been in contact with the local electrician for a plug for a genset when there is no power.

The bitumen ramp needs a nib wall around it, so water doesn't keep washing gravel away.

The local electrician is producing a report and a quote to Council for the lights, which do need replacing to prevent any safety issues.

#### **Comments**

Funding jobs are still ongoing, waiting on equipment to finish them off. Waiting on new floats as some were faulty and won't shut. Stock Routes State Government have noted they will pay for fixing burnt out pumps as it was starting to cost a lot of money.

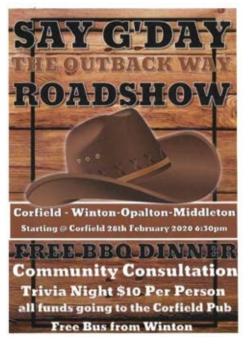
## **Community Development Recovery**

Bookings have been very popular with only limited places left.

is a social event designed to bring everyone together for community consultation and a Trivia Night full of fun. A six-monthly Monsoonal report has been completed and submitted to the Queensland Reconstruction Authority. The report contains the progress KPIs regarding recovery in the Winton Community, including details of Bio-Security Plans and community events and services that are being utilised within the community. A case study was completed for the Gem's of the West event held in March 2019, one month after the monsoonal event, as a marker of how far the Winton community, both men and women, have come in the last 12 months.

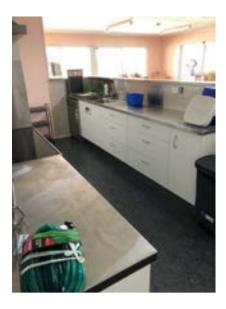

#### **Infoxpert Fix**

Infoxpert briefly went down due to a certificate expiring over the new year. This was addressed through the quick response from Infoxpert support providing a new certificate to last another 5 years.

## **Australia Day**

Due to some technical issues with Practical the decision was made to update the server it is currently running on to a more current and stable build. Practical has been engaged to carry out this work in their next available Window early in the new year. This should improve stability on the system and ensure that it is kept in a viable state for any future needs.

## **Testing and Tagging**

A large amount of testing and tagging has been conducted around various areas and Council premises to bring everything into a current tested state. This is an ongoing process and requires assistance from staff to ensure that products that require testing are brought to the attention of Councils testers.

## **Computer Replacement Program**

The computers that arrived shortly before end of year have begun to be installed and will be deployed early in February. This should clear out the remaining Windows 8 machines still located on Councils network.

### **Phriendly Phishing**

Council have engaged the services of Shearwater Solutions and their product Phriendly Phishing in order to train staff members about the dangers of scam emails and how to spot them. This covers many topics and runs over multiple small sessions that can be run at times convenient to each user. This will help to ensure that sensitive information and logins are not compromised and will continue to be secure.

The training units start at a beginning level and will automatically increase in difficulty to represent valid threats to the workplace.

#### Website update

Council has engaged LGAQ to reconstruct and redesign our main website as well as 2 additional websites (experiencewinton.com.au and dinosaurtrackways.com.au). This project is nearing completion with all 3 sites currently in beta testing stage before final release. Training is being negotiated for staff key staff members and will be completed either Late February or early March just prior to the release of the updated websites.

Due to the websites being functionally complete the staff at LGAQ have asked Council to place a content hold on the websites whilst the migrate information over. This means that only emergency updates are being applied to the website such as road condition and Council reports.

Once the websites are live, we will be conducting a review of all information across the various sites and ensuring that those necessary to keep information up to date are trained in the ability to do so. The new platform that we are being migrated to will give us the ability to more easily manage the information presented to the public and ensure that each department is able to look after their own sections where possible. This will be very important to those staff members that might have substantial changes of information over short periods to keep up to date.

## Jessamine Place - Community Fundraising and Land Allocation

Further to recent discussions at the Winton Community and Aged Care Advisory Group last year and following the incorporation on 8th January 2020 of the Winton Community and Aged Care Services Limited we wish to request from Council the following:

- The release of funds currently held by Council on behalf of fundraising for Jessamine Place as part of the Winton Aged Care Strategy, and
- · Advice from Council in relation to the land allocation for the proposed facility.

As a background, in September 2012 Gillies Consultancy Group in conjunction with Winton Shire Council developed an Aged Care Strategy for the Winton Community based on the need for more residential aged care services locally. A decision was made by Council at the time to set up a Community Fundraising entity which collected the funds but did not incorporate to our knowledge. #### **SUMMARY**

This report presents initial summary data received from the Department of Natural Resources, Mines and Energy – State Valuation Service following a revaluation of properties throughout the Winton Shire Council for rating purposes.

# **RECOMMENDATION**

1. THAT the report be received.

### **REPORT**

On 15 January 2020, Mayor Baskett and I met with Mr David Hobbs and other staff from the Department of Natural Resources, Mines and Energy – State Valuation Service to receive a briefing following a revaluation of all property values within the Winton Shire Council.

The last round of property valuations was carried out on 1 October 2013 and these became effective from 30 June 2014 and have been used for rating purposes up to this point. The latest round of valuations will be dated 1 October 2019, will become effective from 30 June 2020 and will be issued to property owners on 4 March 2020. It was made clear at this meeting that rural property values would be increased throughout the Shire, however the quantum of these increases were not disclosed.

Advice has just been received from the State Valuation Service of the proposed increases to valuations and a copy of this information is attached to this report. Some of the key information to come out of this report includes: -

- The total value of properties throughout the Shire has increased by 52.07%;
- There has been no increase to non-rural property values (Winton, Corfield & Middleton)
- Increases to rural property values based on localities established by the DNRME include: -

0	Corfield	40.02%	(136 properties)
0	Kynuna	39.64%	(15 properties)
0	Middleton	109.75%	(41 properties)
0	Opalton	98.25%	(79 properties)
0	Winton	135.50%	(7 properties)

This will prove to be extremely challenging for Council in determining its rates in the dollar for generating rates income for the 2020/2021 financial year. Mr David Hobbs will be present at the Council Meeting to brief Elected Members and staff on the rationale behind the new property valuations.
