SUMMARY

This report outlines the research.

REPORT

The Winton Airport is an important part of Council's infrastructure and a valuable asset to all of us who live and work within our Shire. It provides REX Airlines a safe airport during its regular (under normal circumstances) Tuesday and Thursday flights to Longreach and Townsville. It also plays a vital role in supplying the people of our region with access to medical services on the coast and beyond, via the Royal Flying Doctor Service. It is vital in times of floods, when on occasion Winton is cut off by road. It is also used regularly by workers who chose to fly in and fly out of our region rather than driving here.

There are two types of Aviation fuel that is dispensed from our airport. One is Jet A1, this is pumped manually from 200 litre drums. The other fuel is AVGAS, this is stored in an underground 25,000 litre capacity fuel tank and is pumped to aircraft via a dedicated AVGAS fuel bowser. Approximately two years ago airport caretaker and aircraft re-fueller Mr Peter Butterworth brought to Council's attention that the AVGAS fuel bowser was beginning to malfunction on a regular basis. This bowser was very old, and Council made the decision to have it replaced. Therefore, a new bowser was installed.

However, the Airport Caretaker still reported that there was an ongoing issue with the system. He noted that when he starts the pump it does not appear to be holding a prime, therefore it shuts down after pumping about 1.5 litres of fuel due to an air gap in the line. He then needs to restart the pump to continue fuelling.

For many years the Winton Shire Council has employed Northern Refuelling Maintenance (NRM) to perform regular maintenance on the AVGAS bowser. This is done on a six-monthly basis. During their last visit to Winton in late 2019 they were asked to investigate the problem concerning the air gap within the system.

The conclusion was that the bowser itself is performing well and is not the problem.

The problem appears to be in either the underground tank itself, or the fuel line leading from the tank to the bowser. As the tank and the lines to the bowser are both underground the problem cannot be visualised.

A representative from NRM was asked to submit a report and a quote to solve this problem.

NRM sent a report and quote outlining the process involved with cleaning and testing of the AVGAS tank and the fuel lines that run from the tank to the bowser. The quotation includes some exclusions noted and would be an added and at this stage an unknown cost to Council. The quote stated an amount of \$57,441.08, however this is only to find out what the problem or problems might be. If the underground tank or the underground fuel lines are in need of repairs the only way to determine the extent and cost of these repairs would be to excavate the earth around the area. This would be a delicate process where NRM would need to be present. Only when the problems are determined would NRM be able to submit a further quotation for repairs. Also, there is the distinct possibility that NRM may determine that the tank and or fuel lines have become unsafe and are not repairable and will need to be replaced as they have been in the ground for over twenty years.

Another option was put forward by NRM.

This involves replacing the existing 25,000 litre underground AVGAS tank with a new above ground 25,000 litre self- bunded AVGAS tank. The existing tank and fuel lines would be decommissioned, this process would involve draining and degassing the existing tank to render it fully redundant. The existing tank would remain in the ground, therefore there would be no need for extensive excavation works to take place. A concrete slab would then be placed next to the old tank site whereupon the new tank would be installed, along with all relevant fuel lines to the bowser. NRM have quoted to cover the entire process, including commissioning of the new system at a cost of \$155,384.47.

Note that in the current financial year, there is a net profit from fuel sales at the airport for the year to date of approximately \$35,000. This extrapolates to a full year surplus, operating under normal arrangements of around \$50,000. The replacement of the tank would therefore have a return on investment period of approximately 3 to 4 years. The above ground tank would have an expected life of more than 10 years.

All projects meet the requirements of the funding – a check with Drought Communities Projects is underway to verify.

Projects that are on Council land (such as the Winton P&A Show Society) should be in accordance with the Master Plan.

Winton P&A Show Society

The new yard will allow commercial show cattle to be displayed better during judging. They will also allow a larger nomination to be accepted as well as more room for cattle. All material and labour will be sourced locally.

Winton Dirt Bike Club

Upgrades to the facility to have water available during event days. The club is working hard to make this facility one where not only locals can enjoy the sport but other clubs from around the area such as Longreach, Richmond and Mt Isa.

Winton's Diamantina Heritage Truck & Machinery Museum

Benefits of this project include:

- 1. The major priority will be to provide adequate housing for the ever growing collection of heritage & vintage vehicles and machinery at the Truck Museum.
- 2. The restored vehicles need to be fully secured and under cover where preservation of valuable artefacts can be protected from the harsh summer sunlight.
- 3. Respectfully house significant collections of heritage trucks and machinery that tell valuable stories of people and place of Australia's history and heritage of Road Transport for future generations
- 4. The large covered area will also enable our volunteers to carry out their duties in a cool and safe environment.

A major feature of this project will be highlighting the history of road transport of the wool industry from this region from the 1930's and the truck loads of wool transported from the Winton region to the Brisbane Wool Stores from the 1960's. The restored trucks and their history will be highlighted inside the building with static displays and story boards showing loading and transporting methods of wool from station properties and transporting of wool by Western Queensland truckies who made a contribution to the development of Queensland's Road Transport system. Most importantly the broader community and tourists will benefit from the education and awareness component at the Museum as our visitors to the Museum are always keen to learn history of bygone era. The Truck & Machinery Museum is developing as another major tourist attraction for Winton that will stimulate the local community and present first-class attractions for the many tourists visiting the Truck & Machinery Museum.

Winton Golf Club

The side entry and exit stairway and landing at the Winton Golf Clubhouse has become a risk factor and in urgent state of repair. This building infrastructure was constructed some 40 years ago and over time has been showing signs of wear and tear to the point of not being a safe point of entry into the premises.

The eastern side of the Clubhouse enables entry for patrons to the ablution facilities, golf buggy shed and the large lawn and entertainment area where numerous functions are held during the year.

The benefit of this building upgrade will be a great asset for this local sporting complex who actively conducts weekly sporting events, local community functions, major open golf championships and professional coaching clinics for adults and juniors throughout the year.

The Winton Golf Club is not presently in a position to fund this building upgrade outright, due to Covid-19 virus providing uncertainly at all levels for the Club in 2020. In regards to trading and restrictions to the playing of the sport, there are immediate challenges to the Club financially in the short and medium term for this year.

SUMMARY

This report presents the OTB Spatial report on the Winton Township – Urban Street Numbering. There are several suggestions in the report that Council may wish to adopt in moving the current property addressing in line with the Australian Standard.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the report be received
- 2. THAT the OTB Spatial report be received.
- 3. THAT Council note the inconsistencies identified in the OTB report.
- 4. THAT Council adopt and implement the suggestions and recommendations contained in the OTB report.

REPORT

The consistent and logical implementation of street addressing, including naming of streets and numbering of properties is essential for public safety as well as daily activities such as package delivery.

At its workshop held on 8 October 2019, Council considered and discussed the need for and implication of not having a consistent urban street numbering system. The outcome of the workshop was that the matter of Council's inconsistencies in address numbering be investigated and reported back with recommendations tabled at a future Council Meeting.

Consultancy OTB was engaged by Council following the workshop to carry out this investigation. Attached is the report that has been prepared by OTB for Council's consideration.

One aspect of street naming was briefly referred to in the report but is considered an essential first step in correcting several property addresses. This is in respect to the spelling of Nesbitt Street - this is the correct spelling (based on the historic location and original use — Council has news articles referring to this street from early last century, so this is the spelling that we should be using.

Other ways it is spelt include Nesbit (street signs are in this version), Nisbet (often used by locals), Nisbit (spelling currently used by Google Map – Ergon have used this spelling on their power poles).

Therefore, in accordance with clause 4.7.1 of the Australian Standard that stipulates "a road name shall have the same spelling as any name from which it was derived", all forms of the spelling of this street other than "Nesbitt" should be amended.

SUMMARY

In late 2019 Council received \$300,000 in funding under Works for Queensland 2019-2021 which was allocated to the Childcare Centre. From this funding, \$50,000 was spent on the kitchen upgrade bringing it up to the required health and safety code for care centres and the remainder was allocated to playground renewal.

In order to achieve the playground renewal, Council funding was allocated for the development of a Master Plan which provides for a cohesive renewal of the entire site.

Playscape has been engaged to deliver the \$250,000 worth of work, the delivery of which has been hampered by COVID-19.

It would be beneficial for Council to consider the Master Plan in its entirety and plan and budget to carry out all the works in the 2020-21 financial year.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the report be received.
- 2. THAT Council budget for the additional \$565,000 in the 2020/2021 financial year to enable Phase 2 to be carried out in conjunction with Phase 1 which enables Council to achieve the best value for money. Further, that Council allocate a 10% contingency (\$83,000) for the entire project to provide for variances during the construction.
- 3. THAT Council engage Playscape Creations for Phase 2 under section 234 'Exception for LGA Arrangement' under the Local Government Regulation 2012 to achieve the best value for money.

REPORT

What the Master Plan Is

Little Swaggies Childcare - Masterplan Concept Min..pdf

In late 2019 Council received \$300,000 in funding under Works for Queensland 2019-2021 which was allocated to the Childcare Centre. From this funding, \$50,000 was spent on the kitchen upgrade bringing it up to the required health and safety code for care centres and the remainder was allocated to playground renewal.

At the time there was unrealistic time pressures to get the work done over the Christmas holidays (2019) which led to Council engaging Playscape Creations directly as a tender exemption under the Local Government Regulations. Playscape have proven to be the most professional contractor the Asset Manager has dealt with in recent memory.

The balance of grant funding (\$250,000) does not go very far in the world of upgrading playground equipment. To avoid a 'hodge podge' approach the Asset Manager utilised the strategic design fund to generate a Master Plan. Playscape were asked to quote on this (following on from the excellent design work previously undertaken during the very early stages of the water park) and a Master Plan (MP) was created for the Centre. In this way, none of the already limited \$250,000 would be spent on the plan – all of it would go towards 'work on the ground'.

As previously noted, a Master Plan delivered by Playscape Creations does not mean they are the only contractor that can deliver the entire plan. The Master Plan shows where a sand pit should be and where a slide should be and where a garden should be to create a holistic experience. Any contractor can then install these features. Playscape Creations are, however, excellently situated to perform the works — understanding the equipment, suppliers, lead times, installation and commissioning regulations, children psychology etc.

Total Costs

Playscape costed the entire project for a total of \$830,000 which can be split into two phases – little larrikins (toddler area) and junior bushies (main area)

You can see that the amount of money in Phase 1 does not stretch very far – it is enough to do the little larrikins side and not much else. Trying to do some work in little larrikins and some in junior bushies is going to use a lot of money in preparation work and will not result in much 'above ground' playground or features.

There is a saving of approximately \$40,000 if Playscape only mobilise once and do Phase 1 and 2 back to back.

With COVID-19 Playscape are currently 'staying at home' so the delivery of Phase 1 is on hiatus until further notice.

CURRENT PLAN

Council carry out the \$265,000 of work (that includes \$250,000 in Works for Queensland) under Phase 1. This work is already awarded but not scheduled due to COVID 19.

234 Exception for LGA arrangement

(1) A local government may enter into a contract for goods and services without first inviting written quotes or tenders if the contract is entered into under an **LGA arrangement**.

The *LGA arrangement* in question is LocalBuy – a subsidiary of LGAQ. LocalBuy tender for types of work and companies that respond are rigorously evaluated and assessed before being allowed onto a panel.

In this way all the companies that are on the panels are pre-qualified. They have all gone through a competitive tendering process which is readvertised every 3 years.

The Local Government Act (Regulations) has section 234 written into it expressly to help Local Government procure services when open tendering is unlikely to provide value for money.

In this regard Playscape Creation have proven themselves as visionary designers who work closely with the client to achieve the best outcome. Contractually they are the ideal contractor with a very professional and experienced team who are also client focused.

This report is seeking Council support to approve alternative payment arrangements for property owners to assist with the payment of their second rates instalment which was due on 31 March 2020.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the Report be received;
- 2. THAT Council endorse alternative payment arrangements for the second rates instalment through the following measures:
 - a. By extending the discount period from 31 March 2020 to 26 June 2020 for those assessments which were unpaid as at 31 March 2020 and which only have the second rates instalment amount for the 2019/2020 financial year outstanding;
 - b. That daily interest charges be waived on the above assessments from 1 April 2020 to 26 June 2020;
 - c. That the Chief Executive Officer be delegated authority to consider and resolve any subsequent payment requests received in implementing this decision.

REPORT

Towards the end of March 2020, the full impact of the COVID-19 restrictions were beginning to be felt across the Shire. Hotel and café trading were dramatically reduced, and travel / social distancing restrictions closed the local tourism industry.

The second rates instalment for 2019/2020 was due on 31 March 2020 to enable the 15% discount on council rates and charges to be received. The week prior to the due date, the following messaging was circulated to property owners via the Herald and social media channels: -

- Dear Property Owner, as you may be aware, the discount period for the payment of the current rates instalment expires on 31 March 2020. The COVID-19 event is heavily impacting our local businesses, their staff and the wider community. Should you experience any difficulties in meeting the payment requirements for your current rates instalment, please contact Council's Rates Officer on 07 4657 2666 or email rates@winton.qld.gov.au to discuss alternative payment arrangements. Given the timing of the Council Election, all requests for alternative payment arrangements will be referred to the incoming Council for consideration.

At the end of the discount / due date on 31 March 2020, there were 106 assessments with unpaid rates totalling just over \$427,000 - this represents approximately 10% of all rateable assessments across the Shire. Of these 106 assessments, 31 have previous instalments, arrears and fines outstanding and can be considered long-term outstanding assessments.

Many other councils in our region and across the State have adopted alternative payment arrangements to assist property owners in these difficult times.

Council may wish to start considering options on how it wishes to continue supporting property owners and local businesses through future rating deliberations.

A proposed amended budget report has been compiled by staff in order to revise the budget position of Council as at 31 March 2020.

The attachments to this report capture changes in relation to the budget position with major aspects impacting on the current financial position. These include but are not limited to the expected receipt of additional grant funding, both capital and recurrent, additional expenditure associated with the grant funding and revised depreciation charges.

The revised budget includes changes to the scope of flood damage works and timing of works and payments, prepayments of grants and adjustments to depreciation. The impact of the COVID-19 restrictions on the operation of the Waltzing Matilda Centre has had a significant financial impact with reduced revenue of almost \$500,000.

The amended budget report and financial documentation was only finalised on 17 April 2020 and is yet to be presented to the Audit Committee.

SUMMARY

This report presents expression of interests for the delivery of the 2021 Way Out West Fest (WOWF).

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the report be received.
- 2. THAT Council commit to holding a Way Out West Fest event in 2021, 2022 and 2023.
- 3. THAT the Chief Executive Officer, or his delegate, be authorized to enter negotiations with Chandler Shaw Events for event management of the WOWF 2021, with an option for 2022 and 2023.

REPORT

In June 2019, a report (attached) was provided to Council reviewing the operation of the Winton Way Out West Fest (WOWF) held in 2018 and 2019. The report was received by Council at the September 2019 Council meeting where Council resolved:

- 1. THAT the report be received.
- 2. THAT Council agrees to hold a third Winton Way Out West Fest in 2021 with the event date and method of delivery to be determined and subject to the availability and securing of headline performer/s.

3. THAT Council prepare and distribute a media release advising of the Council's intention to plan for a third Winton Way Out West Fest.

In December 2019, Council's Tourism Officer identified potential event managers listed below:

- 1. Chandler Shaw Events (Greg Shaw & Jeff Chandler)
- 2. E.E.A. Event Planning & Activation Consultancy (Ray Maguire)
- 3. Media Rare Pty Ltd (Brian Chladil)
- 4. Sound Australia (James Dein)

Mr Greg Donovan from Big Run Events (Big Red Bash) was also identified as a potential event manager and originally expressed interest but after discussions with his team, he advised he did not have the resources or the time to work on another event.

Following this, the Expression of Interest document (attached) was sent to the four potential Event Managers. The expression of interest document sought suitably experienced event management organisations to deliver the Winton Way Out West Fest (WOWF) in 2021, 2022, and 2023 with the initial term of the engagement to cover the delivery of the 2021 event with an option to extend, subject to meeting key performance criteria set by Council. The below excerpt is taken from the briefing document attached:

"Council is looking to engage a competent event management organisation (referred to as the Event Manager) to oversee and manage the successful execution and delivery of the Winton Way Out West Fest. The aim of the Event Manager will be to ensure that the event is successful and cost-effective, paying close attention to budget and time constraints. As an already established brand, the Way Out West Fest requires the skills of an Event Manager with excellent project management skills, who understands marketing and promotion of large events in the outback and won't leave anything to chance. Council is not afraid to consider fresh innovative ideas and lead the pack to deliver a unique outback event."

Arrangements were made for the identified Event Managers to visit Winton in February/March 2020 to meet with Elected Members and staff to discuss their interest in the WOWF event. Both Chandler Shaw Events and E.E.A. Event Planning & Activation Consultancy came to Winton in person and Brian Chladil and James Dein participated via phone conference.

The four responses received are attached with some additional comments on each below:

1. Chandler Shaw Events – Chandler Shaw Events already arrange two events; the Slim Dusty Festival in Kempsey and have also been appointed to run the Mildura Festival by the local Council.

Jeff Chandler also ran the Gympie Muster for many years and Greg Shaw was involved in the first two WWOWF as an artist transport officer, so he has a good understanding of what happened at the first two events.

During their site inspection, they had many ideas on scaling the event to suit our budget and limit our risk. They are well connected with all areas of the Australian music and events industry. Jeff has a good record at financial management and delivering on budget. They also had strong opinions on finding a unique positioning statement for the event and understand the need to connect with the community.

Their support team all come highly recommended, however it is unknown how successful they have been in securing Government funding.

They believed that 3,500 visitors are realistic and achievable and presented a preliminary budget on this figure.

2. E.E.A. Event Planning & Activation Consultancy – Ray Maguire has a vast amount of knowledge in all areas of Event Management and believes there were many areas where

major cost savings could be implemented. Ray indicated he has many other projects on the go and would only be able to act as a consultant. No Event Budget was provided, nor key personnel and their capabilities.

- **3. Media Rare Pty Ltd** Brian owns and operates one of the biggest ticketing companies in Australia. Brian indicated several times that if he was involved, he would operate at armslength and not as a hands-on Event Manager. No Event Budget was provided, nor key personnel and their capabilities.
- **4. Sound Australia** Sound Australia's idea to completely reposition the festival with all entertainment in the main street is a radical one. James thinks by doing so it would instantly separate the Winton event from all other music events. The WWOWF would be the only event to actually take place in a main street. The town would be totally linked to the event. Groundwater Festival at the Gold Coast is similar in that it takes place on public streets in the Broadbeach area and is hugely successful. A list of other suggestions links the event more to the town and the attractions, than it has in the past. It would become more about the town than about the music and would be less dependent on who the headline artists were.

Their support team is also highly regarded. James has a very close working relationship with Events Queensland and has a very good track record of attracting Government Grants.

On the negative side, James has not demonstrated his ability to Council to work to a budget or deliver a profitable event in the past two years. No event budget was provided.

On considering all the above proposals, Chandler Shaw Events or Sound Australia are identified as the leading proposals. Chandler Shaw Events would deliver a more predictable outcome with lower risk, while Sound Australia's would be radically different, however this comes with obvious risk. With either option, Council will need to play a more proactive role in the delivery of the event. Council's workforce and resources need to be used where possible to save on costs and Council should also have absolute financial control of the event.

The report recommends Council proceed with an event in 2021, 2022 and 2023 and authorise the CEO or his delegate to enter negotiations with Chandler Shaw Events. Chandler Shaw Events has shown the highest level of professionalism and cooperation with Council. Their response was the only proposal to present a complete preliminary budget. At their meeting with Council they developed a good rapport with staff and Elected Members; this relationship will be important as both parties will be working closely together to deliver this event. Their conservative approach to consolidate the event and build an economically sustainable event that builds over time is a sound and proven app

I write to thank you for hosting the Regional Community Forum in Winton on 24 February 2020 and also to address the matters raised during our subsequent discussions and in your letter to me of 27 February 2020 regarding a collaborative approach to fully fence the Bladensburg National Park with pest exclusion fencing.

QANTAS Anniversary Board Meeting

I have referred the matter of QANTAS and its anticipated 100th anniversary board meeting to the Honourable Kate Jones MP, Minister for Innovation and Tourism Industry Development (see enclosed letter). Minister Jones will consider the appropriate support measures and will respond directly to you regarding this initiative.

Supply of Sodium Fluoroacetate

During our discussions you expressed concern about the future supply of sodium fluoroacetate (1080) and Biosecurity Queensland's diminishing 1080 concentrate stockpiles, particularly given the anticipated resurgence of sheep production in Western Queensland. While I am unable to provide any further advice at this time, please be assured that the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries (DAF) will continue to work cooperatively with the Local Government Association of Queensland, Local Governments themselves, and with industry regarding future supply of 1080 concentrate.

Pest Exclusion Fencing

I note that in your correspondence of 27 February 2020 the reference to pest exclusion fencing to the Director-General, Department of Environment and Science (DES). The construction of exclusion fencing for Bladensburg National Park boundaries is, indeed, a matter for DES in the first instance as Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service and Partnerships within DES is the custodian of this land. I will, however, take this opportunity to note the effectiveness of the "Dog eat sheep" presentation accompanying your correspondence.

Fencing is one method available for controlling wild dogs, and, since 2015, as part of the Queensland Feral Pest Initiative, the Queensland Government has contributed a total of \$14 million in funding for cluster fencing to Local Governments and natural resource management groups.

Notwithstanding this, in terms of wild dog exclusion and cluster fencing generally, DAF believes that, in many cases, effective management necessitates the strategic integration of several different control methods.

Future Management of Katu Thanda – Lake Eyre Basin

Finally, I note your feedback on the consultation processes associated with the Palaszczuk Government's "Future Management of Katu Thanda – Lake Eyre Basin" initiative (also referred to as "Pristine Rivers"). I will ensure your feedback is passed on to DES as the lead agency on this matter.

Community Services

Central West Community Options

Staffing:

CWCOP has recruited a new Personal Care Attendant for Winton and Isisford. There has been a successful School-based Traineeship and the First Start Community Services Trainee who started on 31 March 2020.

Two workers who are high risk in the event of infection of Coronavirus have opted to take the opportunity to work from home, including CWCOP Client Care Coordinator and the Neighbourhood Program Coordinator.

COVID-19:

The threat of COVID-19 affecting our community has become the primary focus of the Neighbourhood Centre essential services. CWCOP has developed a Winton Neighbourhood Centre Action plan which outlines a three staged response for COVID-19 pandemic which includes:

Stage 1 – Preparation/Preinfection

Stage 2 - Active Phase/Response and

Stage 3 – Post active and Recovery.

CWCOP has been operating business as usual, however reducing non-essential services and encouraging consumers to follow self-isolation and hygiene recommendations. All consumers will be contacted and notified of the business directory and alternative business arrangements to access essential services and shopping. Consumers who do not have access to social media or internet will continue to receive Council Media Releases, and relevant information and our programs will continue to monitor the health and well being of all consumers and vulnerable consumers. CWCOP is also monitoring staff health and fit for work status.

CWCOP is also working with Qld Health and other stakeholders to ensure:

- Adequate PPE supplies for front line workers
- Training and information of staff, consumers and general community
- Promote personal hygiene routines

General:

Auskeys finished 27 March; Council has successfully transitioned to the new system for online portals.

An application has been submitted for CWCOP for further registration to deliver National Disability Insurance Scheme services which were due 31 March 2020. CWCOP has secured the services of ProviderPlus, an independent organisation to assist in the process of registration.

Winton Neighbourhood Centre Program

The Garden Club:

The Club had a Swap and Buy session for March. This is a way for people to share their plants and information on how they grew them, from a seed or cutting. Everyone contributed and took home a different plant and shared some knowledge on how to grow them. Garden Club is becoming very popular and this month we had a visit from the Agriculture Class from the Winton State School. They bought along lots of plants that were surplus to their needs and were very willing to share how they grew them. Twenty-three people attended this session. Unfortunately, all future sessions have been cancelled due to the COVID19 outbreak; however, we will endeavour to create some challenges through social media. One idea is a sunflower competition.

Centrelink:

COVID – 19 and closing of businesses, there has been a significant increase in the number of people accessing Centrelink, which has caused an overload of the system throughout Australia. The Neighbourhood Centre is currently training up another staff member to fill and meet the demand.

The Winton Men's Shed:

The Men's Shed did not have a March Meeting due to restrictions and have closed down any further activity until the end of the COVID19 crisis.

The Neighbourhood Centre:

The Neighbourhood Centre has cancelled all activities in line with State and Federal Government regulations with the pending COVID19 pandemic. Measures have now been put in place to monitor people coming through the doors of the Neighbourhood Centre to ensure the safety of all workers and practice social distancing.

Winton Neighbourhood Centre was fortunate to be able to deliver the International Women's Day Event on the 7 March. This event was a two-stage program which started with wine and cheese at the Australia Age of Dinosaur canyon. Participants were then bussed back to the North Gregory Hotel for a two-course meal and entertainment by the glamourous girls from Boutique Burlesque by Bailey who travelled out from Mackay to perform for our event. DJ Gary Parker provided music. Over 150 women attended this event, and feedback was very positive.



Community Development Recovery

Buy from the Bush Twilight Markets were held in the main street of Winton on Friday 6 March. Seventeen stallholders and four local businesses showcased their wares to the local community with some making sales of more than \$160 during the event. Local hotels also benefited from families enjoying the market stalls and having dinner while they were out.

The Buy from the Bush team assisted with creating social media platforms to enhance sales and promote everyone's merchandise to an online audience of more than 200,000 followers from the Buy from the Bush web directory. Having an online presence will allow stallholders and business owners the opportunity to supplement their incomes during the tough times.









A completed proposal outlining the benefits of a broadcasting license for both radio and local television channel will help maintain the social capital within the Winton community during the COVID-19 outbreak. The channel will allow social service providers and committees to continue to deliver regular health and well-being and resilience programs throughout enforced social isolation timelines.

Business support has been provided directly to all local business owners within the shire. Packages with crucial information regarding grants and funding opportunities have provided much-needed support and one on one consultations to ensure business owners remain sustainable in these troubling times. Family and Individual support information with contact details for emotional support included in the information pack for referrals to other agents completed if required.

The Community Development Officer had a meeting with the Queensland Health Department Mr Glen Desailly (Nursing Director for Mental Health and ATODS Central West Hospital and Health Service Longreach) and Mr Ben Norris (Manager of Mental Health Drought and Disaster Team Brisbane) as well as Recovery Technicians Parker Dance and Sue Cummins. An assessment of how TRAIC programs were delivered and received by the Winton Community, including plans in the future regarding Mental Health and Well Being and Suicide Prevention and Depression programs would be delivered in the future. A strategic plan is being created to ensure TRAIC programs will still go ahead in Regional and Remote communities. More information to come once completed.

A Local Drug and Alcohol Team, once established, will address the significant uptake in alcohol and drugs as well as domestic violence occurring in our community. Multi agencies in Winton, including the police, ambulance, QLD Health and local school representatives will represent their departments and make up the Local Drug and Alcohol taskforce. The first meeting will discuss the main objectives to work towards addressing these social problems within the community.

Winton 60 & Better

Winton 60 & Better continued with regular activities until the end of the month, because of COVID – 19 activities were disrupted.

Winton 60 & Better hosted our monthly Bingo at the Neighbourhood Centre on a Saturday morning. This change resulted in a very successful morning with fantastic support from community members. The coordinator received very positive feedback, accompanied by some great ideas. Spar Winton Donated a \$25 gift voucher which was won by Jill Doherty.

The movie this month was "Judy" which was not popular and received walkouts. Rock painting continues to entertain. Many rocks painted with Winton 4735 have been hidden throughout Queensland as well as New South Wales, South Australia and the Northern Territory. Young and

old have taken to the rock hunt. We are all eager to see one of our Winton QLD rocks posted on the Facebook page for rock hunters. Thank you to Julie Mann for the donation of paint pens for the rock art. This month 60 & Better offered a Marble Mug craft activity.

The Seniors Week Grant has been submitted for the catering of a senior's week lunch. Seniors Week Planning 2020 is on hold at this stage.

Jane Dennis joined our exercise class, giving a demonstration of her Emmett Therapy and talked to the group about the importance of movement and balance.

The group have discussed and received information regarding fraud and scammers again as our members have been receiving strange texts and emails.

Repairs and maintenance at the 60 & Better have commenced. JMB Painting have quoted for the painting of the building. HBB have attended to replace all lighting and smoke detectors.

The local WORC camp have assisted in disposing of obsolete equipment in the meeting rooms.

The building is starting to look more organised as we try to organise the ever-accumulating craft supplies with limited storage.

This month saw an increase in technology support for televisions and the standard iPad and phone support.

All 60 & Better activities ceased on 23 March in response with the COVID-19 pandemic. The coordinator has been keeping in touch with members for the first week and will work on a plan with input from other departments in the coming weeks. It is early days, and things are changing daily.







Youth Sport and Recreation

Youth Support:

On Thursday 5 March we had a visit from the team at ArTour who met with myself, Melissa Doyle, Chloe Stockham and John Elliott as part of their Roadcase tour. ArTour delivers a variety of touring arts and entertainment packages for regional Queensland and across the nation. The YSR officer arranged for Melissa, Chloe and John to join the meeting to see how ArTour might be able to deliver programs to suit our tourism and community events in the future.

After discussions with the DOCED, the YRS officer listed the Youth Centre in the Flipside Circus program that was due to arrive in September. Unfortunately, as a result of COVID-19, the program has now had to be postponed until 2021.

Following visits to the Student Council Meeting, the YRS officer arranged for the students to attend a local Council meeting to learn the correct procedures of the Council and the roles and responsibilities within that. Seven students from Winton State School Student Council attended the Council meeting on 19 March.

Referals have been made for youth NDIS client.

Easter Program:

The YSR Officer spent several days over a couple of weeks doing a spring clean of the Winton Youth Centre. This involved sorting through all of the supplies and crafts and ordering storage equipment to replace current broken or faulty equipment. Forty large plastic storage tubs and 20 small tubs were purchased from the Winton hardware to store all the sorted crafts and supplies safely and ensure safer, more convenient access as well as promoting the longevity of items that would otherwise expire or be exposed to the elements of mice etc.; Containers were labelled and filled.

The initial program that the YSR officer had worked on for several weeks to deliver throughout the Easter period was heavily aimed at getting kids outdoors and active. Again, as a result of COVID-19 restrictions, the program had to be cancelled but still delivered. The YSR officer reformatted the entire program creating individual folders with a daily schedule of activities and a craft pack to support the completion of activities. The new program focused on offering activities that the youth can complete from their homes but also offers interactive elements such as zoom face-to-face sessions where kids can engage with myself and one another. The program also aims at encouraging physical activities the children can do from home. The program will run from Monday, April 6 to 9, take a break over the Easter long weekend and return on the 14th until the 17th. A total of 42 children signed up for packs, and all have been received and are currently engaging in the program as of April 7.

Repairs & Maintenance of the Youth Centre building:

The fridge compressor was replaced by HBB Electrical and is now functioning well.

The projector screen and cabling are still in progress, and Harry is awaiting parts.

Sport & Recreation:

- Bush Beats Dance has been cancelled due to COVID-19. Discussions have been made about whether there is an opportunity to deliver a virtual dance lesson for interested families. The staff at Redridge will update me once they have constructed a program that facilitates this.
- Winton Junior & Senior Rugby League season has been cancelled until August 2020 and will only recommence under advisement if COVID-19 restrictions are lifted.
- Winton Netball held their first meeting on March 2nd, and it was attended well. Once numbers are determined, the club aims to begin in Term 2. Shirts are hoping to be ordered so that the season can commence with them—no further meetings due to COVID-19.
- Waltzing A Clean Up event was cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions. The cleaning supplies
 that were delivered by Clean Up Australia have been placed in the storage facility beside the
 Men's Shed for future engagement.

Little Swaggies Childcare

Before the breakout of the Coronavirus, we were fortunate enough to have Outback Futures visit with the speech and occupational therapist. Pam Seymore, an experienced Learning and Literacy support worker, joined Outback Futures at this visit. Pam spent time in the Billabong Friends

Room, discussing foundational literacy skills in early childhood and reading stories to the children to demonstrate different literacy learning skills to the educators.

Some minor building maintenance has been completed with the installation of new soap dispensers in all bathrooms and kitchen areas in the centre. The installation of new hand sanitiser dispensers throughout the centre, this includes outside each room and the Little Larrikins veranda to ensure that any persons entering from the staff car park or bin area cleaned their hands before entering the building. Signs were erected in the centre car park to remind parents not to leave children in cars unattended after a catastrophic event that occurred at a Cairns child care centre. We erected signs at both the front and rear gates to notify all visitors to report to the office upon arrival to ensure that anyone on-premises (other than centre educators) were signed into our visitor book. At the rear gate, another sign indicating "no unauthorised entry" was erected as all visitors to the centre must enter through the main entrance to be able to report to the office.

During March Miss Brittany left Little Swaggies to work in another area of Winton Council, Nicole Searle joined the Little Swaggies staff as a casual Diploma Qualified educator. Nicole will be assisting Kristen Williamson in the relief of staff during programming and lunches. Due to current numbers in the Little Larrikins, Room Shai Howard will move room to be assistant with Kristen Lenton in the Junior Bushies Room. Shirley Kelly will remain in the Little Larrikins Room.

Coronavirus hit not only our country but the entire world in a severe way in March. In essence, we have been very proactive in ensuring that our families are kept up to date with as much information as possible in regards to the threat of the COVID-19 virus in our community.

Winton Shire Council sent media releases and, information from the Australian Government in regards to fee assistance from Centrelink and updated Infectious Diseases Policy from Australian Childcare Alliance, this information was sent through to families in the form of newsletters, posters, Facebook. We introduced temp checks on all staff and children when entering the service as high temperatures is one of the main indications of contracting COVID-19. We were able to purchase a non-contact body thermometer from HBB Electrical.

Earlier in February the Billabong Friends Kindy Room visited the Winton Library and borrowed some books to read at the centre – due to the COVID-19 virus threat. Unfortunately, the Winton Library closed during March, and the children were unable to have another excursion to return the books and borrow some more – thankfully Amanda the librarian collected an assortment of exciting books and came and delivered them to the centre!! Amanda also took back the books that we needed to return. On the 17th March the Billabong Friends Kindy class enjoyed an excursion to St Patrick's School to celebrate St Patricks Day, lots of fun was experienced by the children including face painting, decorating green biscuits, painting and enjoying some lollypops.

One of our families brought in a special surprise for Show and Tell – some baby ducklings that they found under their house. It was very exciting for both the Junior Bushies and Billabong Friends classes. Everyone was very keen to pat and hold the ducklings but as explained by their friend and their parent they were very small and needed to be held very gently, so Mrs Martyr and Miss Kristen held the ducklings so that everyone could touch very gently without hurting them – it was a great learning opportunity to discuss gentle hands and looking with our eyes, not our hands.

Junior Bushies started off the month learning about colours; this occurred through many different types of activities including collage, play dough, rainbow spaghetti, rainbow-coloured water beads, slime in the tough water downstairs, kinetic sand, painting and colour matching games.

Junior Bushies celebrated Harmony Week by way of activities including learning about other cultures with Japanese sushi and learning how to use chopsticks. We placed a picture of a harmony tree along with all of our handprints on the glass door, multi-cultural puzzles, books about inclusion and painting activities that included the Harmony Week theme "everyone belongs" poster.

CHANNEL 7 WEEKENDER PROGRAM

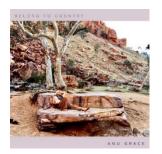

Building Better Regions (Federal Grant) – Showgrounds Electrical Upgrade

This project is lodged and is "Pending Assessment". The Australian Government has advised this might be announced in April 2020.

Building Better Regions (Federal Grant) – Pool Kiosk

This project is lodged and is "Pending Assessment". The Australian Government has advised this might be announced in April 2020.

Building Facilities Management

Mr Andrew Williamson has commenced employment within the Assets Section as Council's Building Facilities Officer.

Mr Williamson has 3 core areas of focus:

- Building Maintenance and Repairs
- Insurance
- Tenancy

To help achieve this, Mr Williamson has setup a new system for lodging and tracking works requests.

The completion of building maintenance work is currently hampered by Council's inability to fill the position of Building Maintenance Officer. That aside, Mr Williamson is in the process of generating works packages for advertising.

A three-year contractor for pest control of Council buildings, assets and sewer manholes is out to tender and will be awarded in April.

Building and Land Valuations

AssetVal have provided the final report for the revaluation of land and buildings. Council land is valued at \$2.3M and buildings have a replacement cost of \$72.8M with a written down (fair value) of \$48.9M.

Annual depreciation for buildings is up from \$987,000 to \$1.67M which is slightly less than the expected \$1M increase the Asset Manager and Council's Accountant were anticipating now that the Waltzing Matilda Centre has been fully realised as a Council asset.

Even though the Waltzing Matilda Centre is a \$25M+ building, the valuation is based on a range of values. Some decrease in Council asset values (and disposals – such as the old Neighbourhood Centre) has kept the building valuation increase as low as possible.

Note the depreciable value of \$1.67M exceeds Council's budget for renewals – resulting in net decrease in asset condition across the portfolio.

Corfield Fitzmaurice Painting

Arranging for a specialist (due to the presence of lead) is hampered by COVID-19 and travel restrictions.

The convenience of doing this work during cooler months without tourists around would be of significant benefit to Council and it is hoped the project can be advanced in April or May.

DCP Extension (2020) - \$1M - Various Projects

The projects are in various stages of draft submission. This is at the direction of the Drought Communities Department. With this round of funding, the \$1M grant constitutes one project as far as the DCP portal is concerned. The Council projects previously identified have been entered into the portal with associated documentation. Updates of project delivery are below:

QANTAS and WINTON sign	GBA have been engaged as Project Managers and are completing detailed design.
	Geotechnical investigation has been completed and results forwarded to GBA.
Community Projects	Advertised in the Winton Herald. Expressions of interest closed Friday 3 April.

Elderslie Street

Following the successful trial of an alternative sealing product earlier in the year, the joint sealing work was carried out during March. The completion of this joint sealing marked the last of the three Separable Portions (SPs) to reach Practical Completion associated with the civil works contract for Elderslie Street asset renewal project. Each SP has a 12-month defects liability period.

During March, work was carried out to replace a section of the subsoil drainage which was not flowing freely and suspected of causing moisture ingress into the road pavement resulting in a section of pavement severely deforming. The subsoil drain was likely damaged during preparation of the site in 2019 for community events. The subsoil drain is now flowing correctly and it is expected that the pavement failure will be repaired at the same time as the defective surface is rectified.

The road surfacing sub-contractor, Fulton Hogan, will be taking coring samples of the asphalt of the southern lane on 22 April. It is expected that the assessment of these samples will identify the cause of the bitumen bleeding and asphalt rutting that has occurred over the last six months to this section of roadway and determine course of action to make good this surfacing.

Contractor Project Resources was engaged to complete the installation of the shelters, tourist information signs and street furniture. This installation work commenced in March and will be completed by April.

All the lighting was completed in the shelters and the laneway and toilet block at the back of the library.

The touchscreen has been installed and tested and interactive software loaded. A thorough audit of the content and updates will be required and scheduled appropriately.

There are three plaques that still need placement (outside of Marty Gillespie). Cobb n Co, Centenary and the legend stones. The legend stone plaque will be installed on the new section of footpath around the tree where the legend stones are located.

Cobb n Co and Centenary will be located as close as possible to the original positions at the western most crossing.

Considering it is March, the Asset Manager intends to prioritise the placement of the Walkway of Honour acknowledgement as its ANZAC day soon.

Marty Gillespie Memorial

The Asset Manager has been working with Mrs Stephens and the Gillespie Family on this project. ARM Sign have been engaged for design work and the three options forwarded to the Gillespie Family for feedback. The chosen design is achievable and suits the aesthetics of Elderslie Street.



Geothermal Power Station

The Geothermal Plant is not handed over – Council will not take delivery until satisfied that the plant is fully operational. A fault in the operation was caused by a pump failure - this pump has now been pulled out and returned to gTET for root cause analysis – the plant has two such pumps.

A thorough clean out of the piping and condensers is planned for April with the Asset Manager working with a company from Cairns to attend to these works.

A 380micron filter screen is on order - Council have ordered this but are investigating who is contractually liable for this oversight. The Asset Manager has directed that the plant not be put into operation until:

- 1. There is adequate filtration in place
- 2. The pipes are clean and free of sediment
- 3. The evaporator has been chemically cleaned

Lark Quarry 4GX Tower

Telstra have advised that the project is back on track the relevant authority has waived the licensing issue as it is one government department paying another government department. Telstra are now engaged in preparing to deliver the project.

This might segue into the other 4GX towers (under DCP extension 2020) which Telstra do not foresee any issue installing this calendar year.

Lark Quarry Painting

A detailed specification has been created along with tender documentation. This will be released shortly however it advised to leave the painting until as late in the financial year as possible as weather conditions should ensure a good finish.

Australian Age of Dinosaurs has advised that Lark Quarry will be closed to the public during this period.

Once a contractor has been appointed there will be some consultation with Parks and Wildlife about meeting their environmental requirements for the project.

Showgrounds – Ablution Block

The contractor is actively engaged in procurement of materials and subcontractors for the project. It is expected to start in April and take advantage of the COVID-19 induced quiet period.

Showgrounds - Masterplan

Presentation to the community of the Public Draft is delayed due to COVID-19.

W4Q (17/19) - Winton Waterpark

Some concrete breakout is occurring on the northern edge of the slab where the apron slab joins the playground slab. Playscape Consultant Engineers are conducting investigations and determining a recommended course of action.

Meantime the chemical dosing system has had its first annual maintenance visit from Prominent which should allow Council to maintain the equipment in the best possible condition.

The Asset Manager has conducted a series of experiments into the best way to clean the playground. The build-up of scale is not caused by the 'normal' Winton water but rather the calcium hypochlorite (chlorine) used in the pool system.

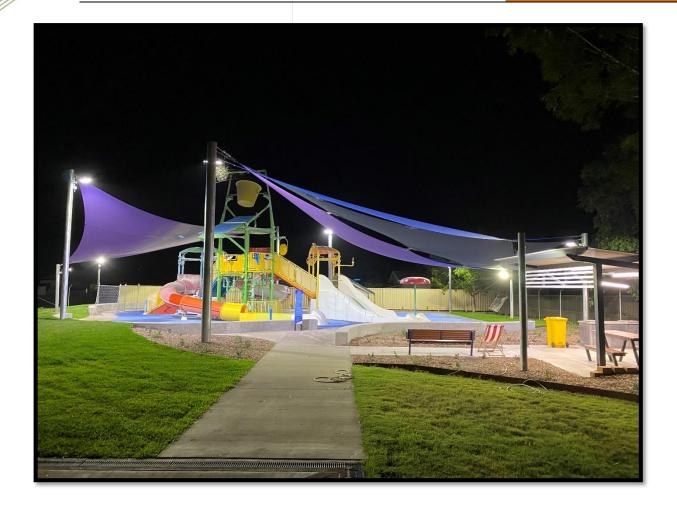
The playground can be cleaned back to almost new by applying a weak cleaning acid, waiting for the reaction to work (10 minutes) and rub liberally with a cloth.



500ml Cleaning Vinegar, repeatedly sprayed on over a 10-minute period before rubbing with a cloth. It is recommended the Leasee carry out this cleaning, progressively, over the winter period.

W4Q (19/21) - Waterpark Shade Structure

DataLek have completed works on the lights for the Aquatic Playground as well as the large downlights for the 25m pool (some of which were non-operable). Landscaping is largely completed and the pump shed has been repainted for a consistent colour.



W4Q (19/21) - Childcare Playground

There was no progress on this project during the month of March.

WMC Remedial Concrete Works

From a detailed survey carried out in February 2020, progress on the three identified actions is as follows:

Concrete Works – In late March building contractor Mann Made was awarded the contract for the removal and replacement of the exterior slabs and is expected to commence work in early April.

Joint Sealing – following successful trials of joint sealing product GSA on Elderslie Street by contractor Exelseal, this product and applier were engaged to carry out some of the joint sealing at the entrance to the centre and will return to do new sections after concrete demolition and reconstruction has occurred.

Concrete coring and grinding – there has been no success to date in sourcing a contractor for these works.

Roads and Drainage

Capital Works Program

Reseal Program

This year, sections on the rural roads Jundah Road and Jundah–Cork Road and town streets Werna, Chirnside and Vindex have been identified as needing resealing. Tenders have been received, assessed and awarded; the tender was awarded to Fulton Hogan. Works crews have been completing some preparation works before resealing, including kerb and channel repairs, pothole patching and crack sealing. The reseals are programmed to be executed in late April 2020.

Maintenance Program

Rural Roads

Rural road maintenance has been progressing well. Crews have been intergrading maintenance works in with the flood damage program. This will enable Council to get a better value for money out of both programs. Roads that are not part of the flood damage program will be monitored and maintenance will be conducted as needed.

During March 2020 we have had a pipe failure on the Winton Jundah Road, a detour has been put in place and crews are programmed to repair the pipe failure in the week beginning 13th April 2020.

The current expenditure for rural maintenance is \$610,347.73

Olio - Muttaburra Sheeting

Council received extra drought assistance money through Roads to Recovery Funding to the value of \$563,060 this money has been matched with funds from the Rural Roads Budget to the value of \$500,000. This money will be spent on sheeting 9.1kms of the Olio - Muttaburra Road from Hughenden Road through to Winton – Corfield Road.

Works on this road have started with gravel being carted from Scrubby Gravel Pit. A grading crew is due to start spreading and laying out material on the week beginning 13 April 2020, it is estimated that it would take 6 weeks to complete these works.

Town Maintenance

Town Maintenance has been progressing well. There has been minor pavement patching works and driveway works conducted around town. Current expenditure to date for town maintenance is \$259,722.53

TMR Contract Works

Road Maintenance and Performance Contract (RMPC)

The RMPC works program is progressing well. With an overall budget of \$375,000.00. Which is made up out of the following schedules;

Schedule 5 & 6 have been finalized; all claims have been made.

Works crews have been completing, Bitumen patching and inspections on the RMPC this month.

Pavement Rehabilitation - Kennedy Development Road

During September Council were invited to tender on a pavement rehabilitation project on the Kennedy Development road between Chainage 131-138.35. A tender was submitted to TMR and council has been successful in obtaining the project for the value of \$3,610,548.76 GST inclusive. This project has been scheduled to start in late October with 2km of the project being completed by Christmas.

Works have begun on this project and are progressing well. Base works for the first 2.2kms have been completed with crews receiving high percentage passes for the compaction of the material. The first stage of the project was primed on the 16th of December 2019 and sealed on 20 December 2019, guideposts were installed, and the road reopened to traffic.

Works have been progressing well on stage 2 of the project with all base material carted, spread and compacted. A 10-metre grid has been installed and the road trimmed ready for sealing. A prime date has been confirmed for 9 April 2020 and a seal date for the 16 & 17 April 2020. Current expenditure for this project is \$1,884, 764.76.

Water Service Maintenance

Repaired 25mm water services at the following addresses:

- Repaired 50mm poly sub main in the corner of Nesbit & Vindex Street.

Corfield Water

- The two new 25,000 litre poly supply tanks have been replaced on the elevated stands at Corfield. In the course of conducting this project the first old fibreglass tank which was leaking badly had a sludge build-up of 900mm in the bottom and the second tank with a split radiating out from the outlet flange which also had a build-up of sludge to the depth of 600mm. While water samples still pass suitable for human consumption, discolouration of the water itself appears to be coming more noticeable on talking to an old-time grazier in close proximity to Cofield itself. He has also noticed a deterioration in the clarity of the water on his property and is of the belief that his bore and the one at Corfield both drain from the same water table. A much better flow rate has been achieved as it was found that a section on the supply line from the bore to the overhead tanks had a couple of galvanised fittings included which had a build-up of iron deposit internally reducing the flow rate by approximately half. A height gauge, float switch (waiting on an electrician to connect when next in the area) and enclosed ladders to each platform are the remaining items to be installed. At present the bore is operating non-stop in order to replenish supply to the borrow pit for road work.

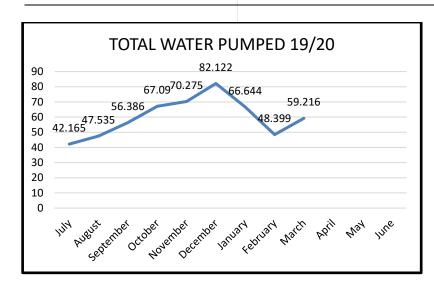
Sewerage Maintenance

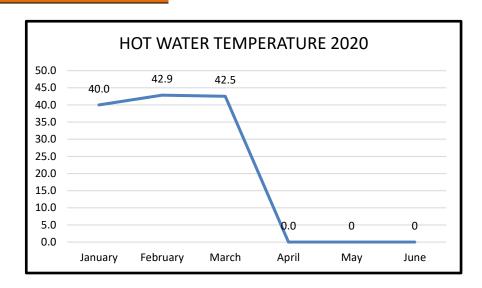
- All pump stations are operating effectively with only one pump blockage at no.1 station and a partial blockage at the wetlands lift pump. Since the COVID-19 was first identified, a noticeable decrease in flow of effluent has resulted possibly due to the reduced numbers entering our town.
- The excess soil from the swimming pool was able to be utilised to help replenish the earth banks of the settling ponds at the wetlands (due to erosion).

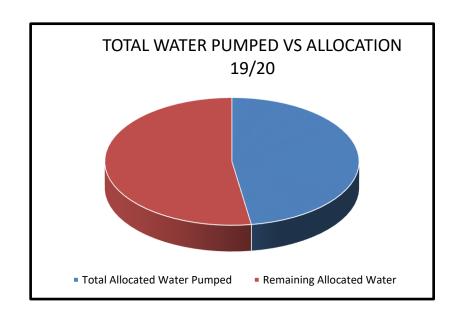
Other Works

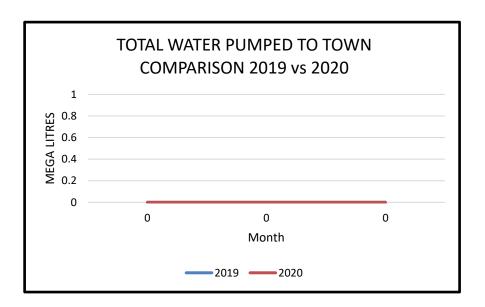
- The 13,000L water supply tank for the residence at the Airport was removed from the stand, hosed out and chlorinated as the quality of water was badly discoloured. Originally these works were scheduled to occur during the re-stumping of the residence.
- An eves gutter was installed on the skillion roof over the filters at the swimming pool as the neighbour complained that our water was draining on to his property (indirectly).

- The PVC down pipes on the Bull Selling Shed at the Sale Yards have been replaced (Due to the damage caused by a fire within the shed approximately twelve months ago).
- A new security fence around No.1 bore has been erected and all old concrete footings and slabs from the original building (since removed) has been removed.
- A sewer house drain blockage was removed from the northern Squash Court Building.
- Hose taps to units 2,5,9 & 14 at Diamantina Gardens have been replaced also at 60's & Better.
- Repairs to toilet at Unit 13 Diamantina as well as the water service at unit 6.
- 100mm AC water main at Showgrounds has been repaired due to the number of breaks that have occurred in this supply line from the corner of Cork & Manifold Street consideration should be given for renewal in next year's budget.

Rural Services

Water Facilities

The water facilities are running at 70 percent due to some pumps being turned off or pulled out, as the dams were not filling up. Werna Nest was cleaned out by an excavator and turned off waiting on a loader so the banks of the nest can be cleaned up. A fence around the bore will be completed soon.

Four Mile Nest - the outlet pipe keeps getting blocked by mud. Council has a repaired tank as a replacement, just waiting on a truck to pick the tank up and deliver to the dam and will fill in nest in place of the tank.

Knapdale Windmill has been pulled down and a solar set will be placed there as the dam is getting used for road works.

Tulmur outlet needs an air compressor to clean the lines as cattle got into the nest and have stirred the mud up and blocked pipes.

Menin bore is pumping around the clock to keep up to cattle.

Middleton bore has been turned on to full speed to fill overflow for the upcoming roadworks.

Weeds

Council staff have sprayed a thick patch of Parkinsonia along the Western Channel on the stock route and will start working along the stock routes while doing water runs.

Parkinsonia at the Waltzing Matilda Centre has been sprayed while the centre has been closed.

Baiting

Baiting has been relatively quiet this month with only 20kg completed. Dog Scalps have increased to around 4 a week since the scalp price was increased. One landholder is getting a dog a day along the Mill's Channels.

Baiting is set to commence at the end of April for 4 days.

A new coldroom has been delivered and can be utilised as a backup freezer for the COVID-19 response if businesses need the space.

Biosecurity-Fencing

An inspection was carried out on a property in Winton that consisted of a number of Class 3 pest plants in the yard. An estimated cost of \$10,000 is required to clean up this yard including burning some of the plants as well as cutting and removing trees with a loader.

With the QPFI Grant and DCQ Grant there has been \$200,000 worth of chemical distributed to local graziers.

Fencing is a slow process as imported fence products are not coming in and its putting a hold on some fences.

Commons/Routes/ Reserves

Cattle on the Winton Common were mustered on the 21 March with 148 young cattle sold at the sale in Blackall. This is an average of 10 head per Common user with one user selling their entire lot. All Common users seem happy with the muster and the way their cattle behaved. 66 calves where branded and 170 cows returned.

Middleton Common was mustered on the 23 March with 100 young cattle sold, mainly straight off the cow. With 115 cows returned.

Corfield Common has 44 cows and calves on it. This Common will have to be closely monitored because of the grasshopper and lack of feed. Horse Common will be mustered without notice given as there are horses going on and off the Common and users will be told when in the yards and will be under lock and key.

Application has been submitted for the Aspley Lane from a family operator at Corfield. Permission has been granted, this permit is for 28 days and can be reapplied after 28 days. There will be 300 head in the lane which falls in the stocking rate of 1 head to 25 acres.

Sale Yards

Sale yards have been very busy with a large number of cattle over the scales and spelling in yards. All reports have been very positive in relation to the service that the Saleyards Caretakers are giving as they are willing to work in with them day or night with over 15,000 head passing through the yards this month and more to come.

New ramp construction is waiting on trim deck sheeting to arrive which has been on backorder and the ramp can then be concreted.

Comments

Funding jobs are going ahead, with minor repairs as some of the troughs that were received, leaked and have broken the inlets out of them. Suppliers have been contacted and new replacement troughs have been ordered and the supplier has fixed the module that was causing this to happen.

Parks & Facilities

Public Parks

During March, the Parks and Gardens team continued to maintain all parks and garden areas. This includes hedging and shaping, mulching, mowing and many other associated tasks. With many weeds still present in garden beds after the rains, a concentrated effort was put in place to poison them before they could set seed.

All automatic irrigation systems were once again adjusted to suit the weather conditions. We have over 120 automatic inground irrigation systems throughout our town, these are constantly being monitored and checked on a regular basis.

On March 31st parks staff erected orange bunting around the play equipment at both Patricia Bucknell Park and Hollow Log Park, closed signs were also erected. The Musical Fence area was also cordoned off from the general public. This action was in response to the COVID-19 requirements for social distancing.

Show Grounds

The Showgrounds area was mowed and whipper snipped on a weekly basis during March. The grass surrounding the tree lines along the Vindex St entrance to the Showgrounds was slashed.

Recreational Grounds

The Recreational Grounds precinct was mowed and whipper snipped on a weekly basis, this includes the skate park and the main oval. Several low spots on the main oval were top dressed.

As there is no scheduled football on the oval this season, parks staff will continue to top dress areas that are in need of attention.

On March 31st the skate park was cordoned off from the general public and 'No Entry' signs were erected in response to COVID-19 social distancing.

Swimming Pool

The Swimming pool area was mowed as part of the regular Thursday mowing run.

The landscaping at the Water Park was completed in March. The last step was to plant out the garden beds. Various species of Callistemon, Eremophila and Lomandra were installed. These were chosen because of their durability, ease of maintenance and their aesthetic appeal. The turf that was laid in late February has bedded in well and is growing quite nicely.

Street sweeping

The street sweeper was used regularly throughout March. However late in the month it had a malfunction. A defect was filled out and it is awaiting repairs. Elderslie Street from Sesbania Street to Manuka Street is still being cleaned manually at the start and end of the week. During a period when bugs were quite prevalent, the main street was cleaned on a daily basis.

Vegetation

During March the parks team continued to mow, whipper snip and poison unwanted vegetation on all footpaths, this is an ongoing process. All long grass along the bypass was slashed.

Undertaking and Cemetery

One funeral was completed during March, this occurred in the Lawn Cemetery.

Maintenance continued on all three Cemetery areas. The Lawn Cemetery was mowed as part of the regular Thursday mowing run. The Monumental and RSL cemeteries were poisoned as weeds were once again putting in an appearance. Flower holders were also installed at the Columbarium.

Garbage

The refuse collection service has carried on as normal, however in late March, the truck malfunctioned. Workshop staff were able to get it operating again, however it is still not operating correctly and will need to be looked at once again.

COVID-19

All parks staff are continually briefed every morning as new Council updates and other relevant information is released. All staff have been made aware of their responsibilities in regards to social distancing and general hygiene. Staff have also been advised not to engage with any members of the general public while performing their day to day duties. All staff are fully aware of their responsibilities and are adhering to these directions.

Aerodrome

Normal twice weekly inspections were completed without any problems detected. The runway strip on runway 14/32 was slashed. Runway 05/23, (dirt strip) was closed for several days due to wet weather. Once it dried out it was inspected and re-opened.

On 10 March it was noted by Airport Reporting Officers Doug Stuart and Leon Parry that the PAL/AFRU was not working. This acronym is short for Pilot Activated Lighting and Aerodrome Frequency Response Unit. This system allows pilots to activate the runway, windsock and apron lighting systems upon approach, it also allows Winton ground staff to communicate with pilots if the need arises. ARO staff also use it to activate the lights while carrying out regular inspections. After consulting with the original installer of this system, Airside Services, ARO staff were able to reinstate the PAL/AFRU. However, Airside Services recommended that the unit should be replaced in the near future, as it is quite old and is now obsolete. Acting Director of Works and Airport Manager was consulted and it was agreed that the unit should be replaced as it is a vital piece of infrastructure. A quote was sought and received from Airside Services. The new PAL/AFRU will be installed in June when Airside Services comes to Winton to perform the Annual Technical Inspection of the runway lighting systems.
