The following information was provided by the Chief Executive in response to the Questions taken on Notice from Cr Frank Standfast on 21 April 2022:

1. Following the decision at the Council Meeting held on 16 December 2021 to procure equipment and train staff to enable live streaming of funeral services to be offered, when will this service become available?

Council's Information Technology Administrator has approached a supplier to receive an updated quotation for the equipment required. The equipment is expected to be ordered by the week ending 13 May 2022. Brendon will discuss the deployment of the current solution with the provider, which looks to use a standard smart device and online portal to manage the streamed service.

2. Have baby change tables been installed as part of the amenities upgrade at the Winton Swimming Pool? (as indicated at the Council Meeting held on 21 October 2021)

A baby change table was ordered but following the onsite visit to the airport on 21 April 2022, it was decided to place it out there as the pool ws closing for the season. Another change table will be ordered for the swimming pool. A check will also be carried out on all other ablution blocks for mirrors and change tables.

3. Can an update be provided on the repair / replacement of the electronic scoreboard at the Recreation grounds?

The new scoreboard left the manufacturer on 29 April 2022 and is expected to arrive soon. The old scoreboard was put back up on the new brackets so when the new one arrices, it will just drop into place.

SUMMARY

The Cash Handling and Customer Payments Policy and other associated supporting documentation has been drafted to provide operations with a framework for cash handling and managing other customer payments throughout the organisation, and for aiding in reducing any associated risks and ensuring all statutory financial obligations are met.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the report be received.
- 2. THAT the WSC-FIN-POL-001 Cash Handling and Customer Payments Policy be adopted.

REPORT

The Cash Handling and Customer Payments Policy details Council's commitment to statutory financial obligations and providing a secure work environment that protects the welfare of Council employees and safeguards cash at designated sites.

This Policy provides a framework for customer payments, cash handling and cash security to ensure that Council fulfils its financial service delivery obligations, including:

- Establishing and maintaining accountability for the flow of cash through Council;
- Ensuring consistency in cash handling/payment processes across Council;
- Ensuring all amounts due and receipted to Council are collected and deposited to Council's bank account on a continuous and timely basis.

The policy ensures cash handling procedures are in place, accessible and all Council employees are familiar with the processes, trained, authorised and delegated with the appropriate level of responsibility in all aspects of customer payments and cash handling.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The risk associated with adopting the Public Interest Disclosure Policy has been assessed as Insignificant (Consequence) and Unlikely (Likelihood), giving an overall assessment as Low 2.

By drafting this policy and presenting it to Council for endorsement, it ensures the Elected Members are aware of the policy framework being developed within Council.



WINTON SHIRE COUNCIL FINANCE

CASH HANDLING & CUSTOMER PAYMENTS POLICY

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PURPOSE

The purpose of this Winton Shire Council (Council) policy is to ensure the handling of customer payments throughout the organisation along with any associated risk is minimised and all statutory financial obligations are met.

SCOPE

This policy applies to all Council employees responsible for the processing of customer payments (i.e. cash, cheque, EFTPOS, direct deposit and credit card payments) applicable to any Council operation or program, and any person authorised to dispense petty cash.

This policy should be read in conjunction with the WSC-FIN-PRO-001 Cash Handling and Customer Payments Procedure.

DEFINITIONS

Banking	Cash preparation and reconciliation for collection by Councils authorised employee member for deposition with the bank.
Cash Handling	Manual handling of cash, petty cash, floats (special events, collection of money) banking preparation and reconciliation.
Council	Winton Shire Council (WSC)
Council Employee	Any person employed directly by Council regardless of their employment status, undertaking duties on behalf of Council.
Designated Sites	Sites throughout Council that provide customer payments and cash handling facilities/processes.

POLICY STATEMENT

Council shall provide a secure work environment that protects the welfare of Council employees and safeguards cash at designated sites.

Council shall ensure that cash handling procedures are in place, accessible, and ensure that all Council employees are familiar with the processes.

Council employees shall be trained, authorised and delegated with the appropriate level of responsibility in all aspects of customer payments and cash handling.

Appropriate cash receipting systems, consistent with corporate objectives, shall be installed to support cash handling at designated sites.

Customers and employees shall be encouraged to use transaction processes that do not require cash.

Note: Borrowing or taking cash from any float or till for personal benefit, however minor, is prohibited.

DESIGNATED SITES

Council shall ensure that each 'designated site' is established and maintained in a safe working environment that minimises the risk to Council and Council employees.

Designated sites include:

- Council's Administration Office.
- · Neighbourhood Centre.
- Waltzing Matilda Centre.
- Tuckerbox Café.

- · Swimming Pool.
- Public Library.
- · Wash-down Bay.

Each designated site shall have a secure area for the storage of cash and must have an acceptable level of security that protects employees and cash.

MANAGEMENT OF CASH HANDLING

Employees shall adhere to the following cash handling process:

- All Council cash (including the float) is kept in a lockable safe, lockable draw or purpose made petty
 cash box/device.
- Only Council cash is stored in the Council's safe keeping devices at the designated sites.
- The float shall be taken from the safe and placed into a cash draw prior to start of business, and takings are reconciled after close of business when all customers have left the premises.
- Excess cash amounts shall be removed discretely from the till during business hours, counted and placed into the safe.
- · All discrepancies as a result of cash handling processes are recorded, processed and reported.
- · Ensure all monetary takings are banked.
- Ensuring Council deposits are recorded and reconciled to Council's bank account.
- Ensuring all cash is transported in a safe and secure manner.
- Receipts either electronically or manually are issued when requested by the customer.

Note: Receipts shall be dated and numbered in sequential order.

In the event of a power failure, employees shall manually record all transactions and issue manual receipts where required to the customer/s.

DIRECT DEPOSITS

Council offers customers the choice of paying for their Rates Notice/s and other invoices by Direct Bank Deposit.

Council's banking information is displayed on the bottom of rates notices/invoices and on Council's website.

Receipts are automatically generated for direct deposits in the finance system but are only issued at the customer's request.

CREDIT CARD PAYMENT - OVER THE PHONE

Council offers customers the choice of paying for services using their credit card, either at the administration office or over the phone.

To complete the credit card transaction, customers are required to provide the following details:

- The service the customer is paying for i.e. rates, wheelie bin, building application, child care, aged care etc.
- Amount to be paid.
- Credit card number.
- Credit card expiry.
- Card Verification Value (CVV).

PAYMENT BY CHEQUE

Council offers customers the choice of paying for services by cheque. For the cheque to be processed successfully the cheque must be correct and completed in full including:

- That the cheque is made out to Winton Shire Council.
- · That the amount in writing is the same as the written dollar value on the cheque.
- That the cheque is dated and signed.

Receipts are automatically generated in the finance system but are only issued to the customer on request.

EFTPOS FACILITIES

Council offers customers the choice of paying for services/items using EFTPOS at the following locations:

- Council Administration Office.
- Waltzing Matilda Centre.
- Tuckerbox Café.

Where possible, in the event of a power failure transactions are manually record and customers are issue written receipts where required.

COMMUNICATION

Council's management team shall ensure that

- Council employees have access to this policy and are provided with the opportunity to be involved in the review of this policy.
- Changes and/or amendments made to this policy shall be communicated to Council employees.

WINTON SHIRE COUNCIL ADMINISTRATIVE

DOCUMENT MANAGEMENT POLICY

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PURPOSE

The purpose of this Winton Shire Council (Council) policy is to establish a framework for the creation and management of Council's records.

SCOPE

The policy applies to Councillors, Council employees, contractors and volunteers who create or maintain records, business systems and database applications.

The policy provides the overarching framework for corporate information, management policies, procedures or guidelines.

DEFINITIONS

Council	Winton Shire Council (WSC)
Councillor/s	The Mayor and Councillors of Winton Shire Council, within the meaning of the Local Government Act 2009.
Council Employees	Local government employee: (a) The chief executive officer; or (b) A person holding an appointment under section 196 of the Local Government Act 2009.
Document Management System	An information system that captures maintains and provides access to records over time.
Records / Public Records	Any form of recorded information, both received and created, that provides evidence of the decisions and actions of a public authority while undertaking its business activities.
Retention and Disposal Schedule	A legal document issued by the Queensland State Archivist to authorise the disposal of public records under the Public Records Act 2002.
Retention Period	The minimum period of time that records need to be kept before their final disposal as specified in an authorised retention and disposal schedule.

POLICY STATEMENT

Council recognises its regulatory requirements as a public authority under the *Public Records Act 2002* and is committed to the principles and practices set out in other relevant Queensland State Archivist standards and guidelines.

Councils records are a vital asset that support ongoing operations and provide valuable evidence of business activities over time. Council is committed to implementing best practice document management practices and systems to ensure the creation, maintenance and protection of accurate and reliable records.

RECORD MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES

Council's document management objectives include maintaining processes and systems to assist in creating and maintaining complete and reliable records. Document management shall be:

- · Adequate for the purposes for which they are created and kept.
- Created to document and facilitate the transaction of Council business.
- Complete in content and contain the structural and contextual information necessary to document a transaction.

- · Accurate in reflecting the transactions, activities or facts that they document.
- Securely maintained to prevent unauthorised access, alteration, removal or destruction.
- Kept in a format that allows their continued use.
- Entered into the corporate database systems.
- · Maintained so that they are identifiable, retrievable and available when needed.
- Retained for as long as they have administrative, business, legislative, historical and cultural value.
- Preserved by being stored, protected and maintained.

PROTECTION OF RECORDS

Records are archived to be preserved and maintained over time for as long as required to meet administrative, legal, fiscal and archival requirements.

Archived documents are kept in a secure location within Councils premises.

ACCESS TO RECORDS

All records either created or received within or on behalf of Council are official records that belong to Council and, subject to the considerations shown in this clause, are to be relocatable and accessible as authorised.

An employee's level of access to records is relevant to:

- · Their position responsibilities and accountabilities.
- The level of delegated authority.
- Privacy considerations.
- Legal professional privilege.
- Commercial-sensitivity.
- Other specific considerations where confidentiality restricts the normal right of access to records.

Authorisation from the relevant Director may be required before access is granted.

Council is required to comply with legislation that permits access to its records by members of the public and authorised external agencies, or as part of a legal process such as discovery or subpoena. Enquiries or applications for access to Council's records are considered in accordance with Council's Right to Information Policy.

RETENTION AND DISPOSAL OF RECORDS

It is an offence to destroy any public record without authorisation from the State Archivist. Unless otherwise authorised, all records must be retained and disposed of in accordance with the Local Government Sector Retention and Disposal Schedule. This Schedule is used in conjunction with the General Retention and Disposal Schedule.

Records must be appraised for possible continuing archival value. That is, records with legal, historical or cultural significance to Council and the community must be retained permanently in Council's Records Collections or State Archives.

Any records subject to legal processes such as discovery and subpoena or required for internal or external review or investigation or relevant to an application made under the *Right to Information Act* 2009 must be protected and not destroyed even if the retention period has passed.

Ephemeral records (that is items of short-term temporary informational value that are not required to be kept as records) may be destroyed at any time without reference to a retention and disposal schedule. These records may include but is not limited to:

- Announcements of social events.
- Duplicate copies or extracts of documents kept only for reference.

· Copies of circulars, flyers and forms.

These documents can be disposed of as part of normal office administrative practice.

Where the official version of a record is verified as being already maintained in Council's document management system a copy may be destroyed/disposed of, in the appropriate manner, at any time without reference to the Retention and Disposal Schedules.

DOCUMENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS

Council's primary document management system, InfoXpert is the internal document management system where all corporate administrative records are captured and stored.

Paper-based records received by Council are captured within this system through digital imaging. Paper files are only created and maintained for particular classified or special arrangement.

While InfoXpert constitutes Council's preferred primary document management system for all corporate administrative records, there are a number of other information systems, databases, software applications and paper-based systems which operate outside InfoXpert and function as document management systems.

Council's document management systems are dedicated to creating and maintaining authentic, reliable and useable records which meet the needs of internal and external stakeholders. Records are maintained for as long as they are required to effectively and efficiently support Council's business functions and activities.

All of Council's records must be created and maintained within the preferred document management systems. Records must not be stored/maintained in network drives (for example S: and Z: drives), local hard drives, electronic mail boxes or other storage devices.

These electronic storage facilities do not contain document management functionality to ensure records are captured and managed in accordance with sound document management principles.

Council's document management systems manage the following processes:

- Creation and capture of records.
- Storage of records
- · Protection of record integrity and authenticity.
- · Security of records.
- Access to records.
- Disposal of records in accordance with retention and disposal schedules.

DOCUMENT MANAGEMENT RESPONSIBILITIES

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER (CEO)

The CEO is responsible for ensuring Council's compliance with the *Public Records Act 2002, Local Government Act 2009* and the principles and standards established by Queensland State Archives, including:

- Accounting for document management and systems within Council to Ministers, Parliament and others as required.
- Assigning document management responsibilities within Council.
- · Providing appropriate resources to maintain document management systems and processes.
- Ensuring document management systems are in place and produce complete and reliable records.
- Ensuring document management requirements are included in all business undertaken by Council.
- Taking all reasonable steps to implement recommendations made by the State Archivist.

- · Actively promoting and supporting a positive document management culture throughout Council.
- Ensuring that core Council plans, strategies, policies etc. are reviewed annually, biannually or as required.
- Ensuring employees, contractors and volunteers are aware of their document management responsibilities.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The Information Technology Officer shall:

- · Provide the technical infrastructure required for document management.
- Provide technical support for the document management systems.
- Provide expert advice on information technology for document management strategies in an electronic environment.
- Develop and manage technical aspects of:
- · Disaster preparedness and recovery strategies and procedures.
- · Records and systems migration strategies and procedures.
- Regular backups for records and document management systems and business systems that
 create and store records.
- Manage the security mechanism for the protection from unauthorised access to information in electronic form.

DIRECTORS (OR DELEGATE)

Council Directors and/or their delegate shall:

- Develop and implement document management processes.
- Identify document management requirements in consultation with other departments.
- Consult with Queensland State Archives in relation to policy and Information Standards development where required.
- Make, keep and preserve complete and reliable records that document business transactions within
 compliant and accountable document management systems.
- Train Council employees in relation to document management obligations, processes and procedures.
- · Ensure strategies and procedures exist to identify and locate records.
- Develop and maintain document management administration for Council's primary document management system.
- Develop and implement an internal document management framework, including policies, standards, procedures and other forms, registers, tools etc.
- Identify and manage vital corporate records with regard to the relevant storage parameters and accessibility standards.
- Undertake document reviews i.e. annually, biannually or as required.
- Develop, manage, test and review disaster preparedness and recovery strategies and procedures for all records, including electronic records.

MANAGER/S AND SUPERVISOR/S

All managers and supervisors shall:

- Ensure complete and reliable records are made and captured into the relevant record and business systems that create and maintain records.
- Ensure document management systems underpin and support business processes and report any deficiencies to the Director and Information Technology Officer where required.

 Monitor employee, contractor and volunteer compliance with Council's document management processes and practices.

EMPLOYEES

Council employees are responsible for capturing and recording Council records including:

- Creating complete and reliable records of Council business in accordance with the Public Records Act 2002.
- Complying with all policy documents introduced to foster document management best practice throughout Council in compliance with this and other departmental policies and procedures.
- Capturing Council's records into the relevant document management system at the time of creation or receipt.
- Keeping records for as long as they are required for business, legislative, accountability and cultural purposes.
- Archiving documents where required.

COMMUNICATION

Council's management team shall ensure that:

- Councillors and Council employees shall have access to this policy and be provided with the
 opportunity to be involved in the review of this policy.
- Changes and/or amendments made to this policy shall be communicated to all Councillors and Council employees.

13.3 CORPORATE CREDIT CARD POLICY - ADOPTION

The risk associated with adopting the Corporate Credit Card Policy has been assessed as Insignificant (Consequence) and Unlikely (Likelihood), giving an overall assessment as Low 2.

By reviewing this policy and presenting it to Council for endorsement, it ensures the elected Members are aware of the policy framework being developed within Council.



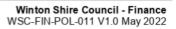

CORPORATE CREDIT CARD POLICY

1

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PURPOSE

The purpose of this Winton Shire Council (Council) policy is to provide guidance on the provision and use of Corporate Credit Cards and ensure sound governance of expenditure.

SCOPE

This policy applies to all Councillors and Council employees who have been issued with and who are responsible for the use of a Corporate Credit Card.

This policy should be read in conjunction with the Procurement Policy and Code of Conduct.

POLICY STATEMENT

Council will generally use Corporate Credit Card payments in circumstances where a Council purchase order would not be accepted, or it is more efficient to use a Card. Card usage must be in accordance with the relevant Council policies and guidelines.

CORPORATE CREDIT CARD ISSUE

Cardholders shall be appointed by the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) only and shall be in alignment with Council's Procurement Policy and other requirements as applicable.

CREDIT CARD LIMIT

Credit card limits are established in accordance with the guidelines within Council's Procurement Policy. The Cardholder shall be familiar with the issuing financial institution's terms and conditions for card usage.

CANCELLATION OF CORPORATE CREDIT CARDS

Corporate credit cards shall be can cancelled in the following circumstances:

- · At the completion or termination of the cardholder's employment.
- · If the card has been lost or stolen.
- Where the need for a credit card no longer exists.
- · Where the cardholder has breached the requirements of this policy.

In these instances the cardholder shall return their Credit Card to Council's Finance Manager immediately.

The Finance Manager is responsible for the cancellation of credit cards and where required for notifying the cardholder that the card has been cancelled.

CREDIT CARD SECURITY

Cardholders are responsible for the security of Council credit cards and all associated card information i.e. statements. Cardholders who suspect their credit card is lost or stolen are to immediately notify the Finance Manager.

CORPORATE CREDIT CARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

The following terms and conditions apply to all cardholder's:

- All purchases made using credit cards must comply with the relevant legislation including the Local Government Act 2009 and the Local Government Regulation 2012.
- All purchases made using credit cards must comply with Council's Procurement Policy directives.
- Purchases made using credit cards shall only be for goods and services required for the official use of Winton Shire Council in conducting its business.

- Cards shall NOT be used for cash advances.
- Cardholders will be required to certify that purchases are for legitimate business use. Cardholders
 found to be in breach of this requirement may be subject to disciplinary action and/or may have
 their credit card cancelled.
- Under no circumstances is the credit card to be used for personal charges.
- ALL purchases must be accompanied with a Tax Invoice/receipt.
- Purchases made using credit cards are to be acquitted each month using the credit card statement and associated tax invoices/receipts.
- Restrictions on the type of purchases permitted may be placed on the credit card use as directed by the CEO, these restrictions will be made known to the cardholder.
- The Cardholder is the only person entitled to use the credit card.
- Card statements shall be authorised by the appropriate Director and CEO.

Note: The CEO's card statement shall be authorised by the Mayor and the Mayor's card statement shall be authorised by the CEO.

INAPPROPRIATE USE OF CORPORATE CREDIT CARDS

Corporate credit cards are issued to Councillors and Council employees in a position of trust in regard to the use of public funds. Improper use of credit cards may render the cardholder liable to legal action or criminal prosecution.

Deliberate inappropriate use of credit cards will result in immediate cancellation of the credit card. Inappropriate use shall be immediately reported to the CEO and other authorities as appropriate. Action in respect to Council's Code of Conduct may be pursued.

COMMUNICATION

Council's management team shall ensure that:

- Councillors and Council employees have access to this policy and are provided with the opportunity
 to be involved in the review of this policy.
- Changes and/or amendments made to this policy shall be communicated to Councillors and Council
 employees.

Meeting matters included:

NexGen

The CEO tabled a brief on the development of the regional instance of NexGen. The CEO outlined:

- RAPAD has previously endorsed the development of a regional instance of the NexGen procurement platform (November 2020),
- The platform will allow for the de-identified exchange of procurement data between RAPAD Councils to populate a series of Regional Economic Insight dashboards and help train an economic impact analysis tool,
- The development of the platform is now sufficiently advanced that the project team would like to begin incorporating live (de-identified) data from individual Council NexGen instances to populate the regional environment,
- That to offset any privacy concerns, NexGen requires each participating Council execute an amendment to the platform's Terms and Conditions which has already been signed by the RAPAD Councils,

As a result, the Board endorsed the development of the Regional Insights Dashboard, empowering the CEO to take all reasonable steps necessary to implement this important resource for the region, and that the Board endorses the amendment to the NexGen Platform's agreed Terms and Conditions proposed by Local Buy.

IT Inventory Landscape

The CEO tabled a brief outlining:

- How the ICT Landscape & Inventory project aims to catalogue the technologies, suppliers and systems used by councils across the region,
- That the ICT Inventory will be an internal and confidential tool to assist
 Council's within the RAPAD region improve the visibility of their technology
 ecosystem to identify opportunities to enhance the quality of the technology
 and systems available to Councils, as well as reduce duplication and cost, in
 turn enhancing financial sustainability, and that,
- That the Project will be led by RAPAD's Chief Digital Officer and will run for approximately eight weeks.

As a result, the Board endorsed the immediate commencement of the ICT Landscape & inventory project.

Finance, Legal, Risk

The Board received the organisations YTD financials for the period ending 28 February 2022, and took updates from the CEO on:

- The status of the 20-21 financial year audit which remained ongoing, with PKF / QAO unable to commit to a finalisation date,
- The organisational strategic risks; a recommended amendment to the Boards sponsorship and philanthropy policy; recent RESQ Boards meeting outcomes.

Further to these updates the Board moved resolutions receiving and or endorsing:

- The organisations YTD February financials,
- An amendment to the Boards sponsorship and philanthropy policy, and
- That on behalf of RAPADs seven member councils, RAPAD would make the sum contribution to the West Qld Alliance of Councils (WQAC) sponsorship '22 for 22" to the Premiers Flood Appeal.

- Remote Area Board Funding²

 joined the meeting and provided an update on the FarOut! Campaign,
 - CWQ Brewing
 The CEO updated that three of the remaining four labels had been developed and were with each community's stakeholder group for feedback.
- RAPAD Skilling www.rapadskilling.com.au
 The Board received the RAPAD Skilling Managers, Steve Rossberg, report for the end of February 2022 period. A full suite of courses available at RAPAD Skilling can be found at https://www.rapadskilling.com.au/courses
- RFCSNQ www.rfcsnq.com.au
 The CEO tabled the RFCSNQ Project Management Committees recent draft minutes from their March meeting. Also tabled was the Grazing Futures program which has commenced, and which RFCs will be playing a key role in. Detail on this will soon be available on the RFCSNQ website and a range of marketing collateral is being developed in conjunction with partners.
- CEO Update
 - AEC Engagement The CEO tabled the draft strategic plan as a late item and advised he would be meeting further with AEC on the business plan,
 - WQAC Assembly As a wrap of the Assembly, all information, presentations, and the Assembly communique are made available on the WQAC website. The WQAC leadership group are due to meet for a debrief on the Assembly and to discuss the 2023 event,
 - Regional Waste Management Following the 22, 23/2 Board meeting the CEO met with DES and LGAQ. The CEO will write to DES seeking support to commence the management and implementation of a ToR, tender call and associated, for the development of a regional waste management strategy. The LGAQ, at the recent ROC meeting held in Townsville, made several key points regarding this and some highlighted were:
 - Plans need to be able to identify and prioritise actions and activities that will provide long term and sustainable improvements in waste management and resource recovery,
 - Not just about large infrastructure education and awareness; small-scale infrastructure, e.g., upgrade/replacement of used oil collection facilities; mobile equipment; hub and spoke aggregation infrastructure and equipment; static facilities; procurement opportunities,
 - · Consider the investment needs and their cost,
 - Economic and market development opportunities for each region as a result of implementing the plan.
 - Housing The CEO advised that as announced at the WQAC Assembly, funding has been announced for council area action plans. The CEO advised he, G.Hoffman and S.Talbot met recently with the department to talk through the respective understanding of the requirements of the funding. The CEO also updated on the recent meeting with Federal Minister Sukkar, G.Hoffman and S.Talbot and members of the WQAC Leadership Group, to discuss housing policy,
 - LEB Stakeholder Advisory Group There was discussion on recent approaches from 'Lock the Gate' for the Board to amend its current LEB policy although the Board declined this request,

LGAQ ROC Meeting - The CEO and Chair attended a Regional Organisation of Councils (ROC) meeting hosted by LGAQ, and both expressed their appreciation to LGAQ for hosting the annual event, as it is an important information sharing forum. While in Townsville for the ROC meeting the Chair and CEO and NWQROC and



SWQROC representatives met with Senator Susan McDonald to discuss Western Qld priorities.

 Local Government Sustainability Framework – The CEO tabled the departments recently released outcomes of the Sustainability Framework Review and there was further discussion on that,



 Tourism – The CEO updated on the RAPAD and OQTA hosted going away for long time tourism 'guru', Daniel Gschwind from QTIC, who is stepping back from his role,

The CEO advised on other activities occurring recently or planned:

 He attended a Remote Area Board (RAB) forum with the department and other RABs, to discuss future RAB funding,

 He met with UQ Global Challenge PhD scholars to provide feedback on a proposed project and met with UQ Law School pro-bono law to talk through some projects and ideas,

· He will be attending a QFES Risk Management Workshop,

 He received a thankyou letter from 'Leading in the Central West' for the RAPAD sponsorship for their event held in Blackall in late 2021,

 An application was lodged for Regional Universities Centre funding through the Australian Governments Department of Education, Skills and Employment. A Regional University Centre is a facility that regional students enrolled at any Australian tertiary institution can use to seek support to study tertiary courses delivered by distance,

 A query was put to QDAF about extending the LTO for the former Ag College, to 30 October, as there up to 13 travelling groups who have expressed an interest in accommodation after the current LTO expiration

of 30 June,

 A launch of the SQNNSWDIRH is proposed to be undertaken at the 24,25 May Board meeting.

 A brief was prepared for Cr Martin for his discussions with DESBT Director General W.Agnew regarding support for shearing and wool handling programs. The brief was modelled on a program RAPAD ran in conjunction with UQ Skills in 2020 through the DESBT RSIS project,

He was seeking annual leave for approximately seven days between 22
April and 6 May. Due to that upcoming absence of the CEO for the

SUMMARY

The Winton Shire Council has been offered funding of\$2,133,570 pursuant to the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program Phase 3. It is a requirement for the funding to be fully expended by 31 December 2023.

Council has previously received approval for 8 projects totalling \$1,246,785 leaving a balance of \$886,785 to be allocated. Project nominations for the balance of the funding need to be lodged as a matter of urgency as the deadline is 30 June 2022. This report seeks delegated authority to be provided to the Chief Executive Officer to complete project nominations (determined by Council) prior to 30 June 2022.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the report be received.
- 2. THAT delegated authority be provided to the Chief Executive Officer to complete project nominations, in consultation with Council, to ensure the balance available of \$886,785 is claimed through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program Phase 3.

REPORT

The LRCIP Phase 3 Guidelines were released on 20 October 2021 and Winton Shire Council's maximum grant amount is \$2,133,570. The agreement funds projects from 1 January 2022 to 31 December 2023 allowing two calendar years for completion.

From the LRCIP guidelines, the following projects are considered acceptable: -

This could include projects involving any of the following associated with a road:

- traffic signs;
- traffic control equipment;
- street lighting equipment;
- a bridge or tunnel;
- a facility off the road used by heavy vehicles in connection with travel on the road (for example, a rest area or weigh station);
- facilities off the road that support the visitor economy; and
- road and sidewalk maintenance, where additional to normal capital works schedules.

Projects will also be considered generally publicly accessible if they are in a location that is:

- generally publicly accessible to the wider public undertaking a specific activity (for example council
 operated sporting fields); or
- generally publicly accessible for a limited age group of the community as a whole i.e. a kindergarten building; or
- used for the provision of an essential service or community service, as determined by the Department, and the amenity of the asset is publicly accessible and benefits the community.

All projects whether carried out on council owned land, or another type of public land, must deliver benefits to the community, such as improved accessibility, visual amenity, and/or safety. Examples of eligible works include:

- Closed Circuit TV (CCTV);
- bicycle and walking paths;
- painting or improvements to community facilities;
- · repairing and replacing fencing;
- improved accessibility of community facilities and areas;
- landscaping improvements, such as tree planting and beautification of roundabouts;
- picnic shelters or barbeque facilities at community parks;
- community/public art associated with an Eligible Project (Eligible Funding Recipients will need to provide a clear description of the conceptual basis of the artwork);
- playgrounds and skate parks (including all ability playgrounds);
- noise and vibration mitigation measures; and
- off-road car parks (such as those at sporting grounds or parks).

Council approved the following projects at the meeting held on 18 November 2021: -

Hall Air-conditioning (part)	\$275,000
TOTAL	\$1,246,785

The report which was considered by Council at the meeting held on 18 November 2021 also provided a list of additional projects for funding consideration, however no further projects were nominated. This was also an agenda item for the Council workshop held on 28 January 2022 however the amount of \$886,785 remains unallocated. It should also be noted the tender accepted for the electrical upgrade to the sewer pump stations was \$277,220 and only \$190,000 has been applied for

From memory, it was proposed to consider the balance of funding following staff presentations as part of the 2022/2023 budget deliberations. This could potentially leave us with very little time to lodge project applications given the deadline of 30 June 2022.

As we now only have the May and June council meetings to approve projects, a way forward is to consider granting delegated authority to the Chief Executive Officer to complete project nominations, in consultation with Council, to ensure the balance available of \$886,785 is claimed through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program – Phase 3.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The risk associated with reviewing and nominating projects for funding through the LRCIP Phase 3 program has been assessed as Moderate (Consequence) and Possible (Likelihood) giving an overall assessment as Medium 9.

The key risks to Council include the project deadline, nominating projects which are not eligible for funding and nominating projects which cannot be completed before the 31 December 2023 deadline.

SUMMARY

This report presents a draft Willie Mar Strategy, 2022-2027 Revitalization Program for approval by Council. As well as the recommendation from the Friends of Willie Mar group to pursue applying for Heritage Listing for the site.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the report be received.
- 2. THAT Council approve The Willie Mar Strategy, 2022-2027 Revitalisation Program.
- 3. THAT Council pursue applying for Heritage Listing for the Willie Mar Heritage Site.

REPORT

At its Ordinary Meeting held on 17 March 2022, Council decided to develop a long-term strategy for the Willie Mar site. Council also approved proceeding with the Willie Mar Market Place concept, with amendments, apply for grant funding and to use the site at 74 Riley Street for the Willie Mar Market Place.

The Willie Mar Market Garden site is considered of state significance. The site is a rare intact example of the Chinese market garden and shop-keeping practices that were prevalent in the early settlement of colonial Australia. There are very few of these sites still in existence in Queensland, let alone sites that encapsulate a garden, shop and dwelling. The house on the site is an example of another aspect of early 'alien' immigration into Australia, purpose-built buildings by non-white settlers to satisfy Commonwealth legislative requirements.

Willie Mar is iconic to Winton and is even the design chosen for the CWQ Brewing Company Winton Lager. However, repairs and community requests may take an extended period to be addressed and more opportunities exist for benefit maximisation of Willie Mar's as a cultural asset.

The long-term strategy seeks to address identified conservation issues and activate the original site and the 74 Riley Street site. The strategy outlines steps to repair and maintain the premises and increase community engagement with this important and unique heritage site. The strategy has been developed in consultation with community members and the Assets Manager.

In a consultation meeting held on 12 May 2022, the Friends of Willie Mar Group motioned to support the recommendation that Council pursue Heritage Listing for the site and were all in favour.

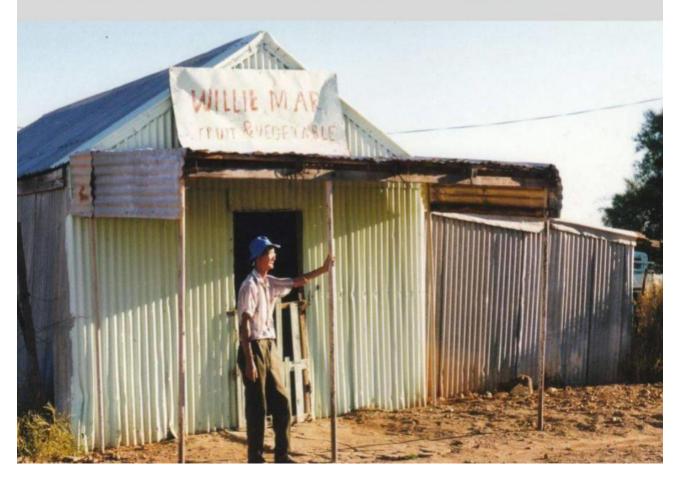

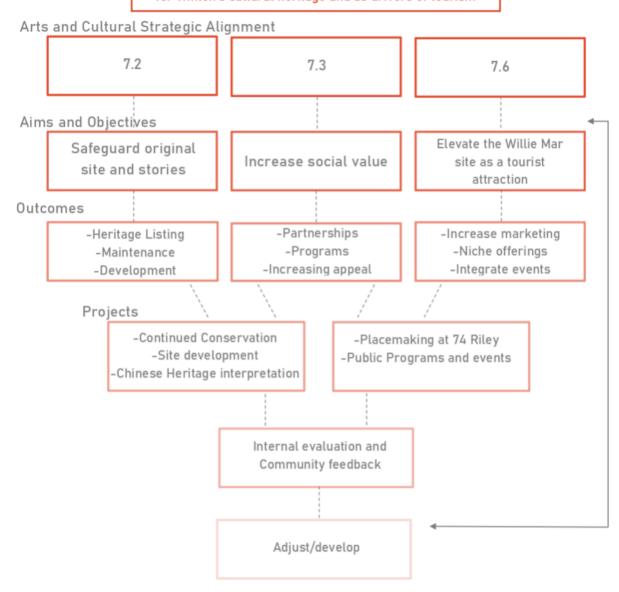

Introduction

The Willie Mar site and adjacent block offer the Winton Shire Council a unique opportunity to present an alternate historical viewpoint not widely recognised and, pay respect to the culturally diverse groups of people who were instrumental in establishing townships here and throughout the region.

Mar Yen arrived in Winton in 1923 and established the Market Garden at 68 Riley street. Later, his son Mar Yen Shoo arrived and after his father's death, took on the business and dwelling. Operations continued until a 2000 flood caused damage that could not be repaired. Mar Yen Shoo passed away in 2007, leaving the site abandoned and leaving the legacy of Willie Mar to the community of Winton, as no family was ever located.

The site is a rare intact example of the Chinese market garden and shop keeping practices that were prevalent in the early settlement of colonial Australia. There are very few of these sites still in existence in Queensland, let alone sites that encapsulate a garden, shop and dwelling. The house on the site is an example of another aspect of early 'alien' immigration into Australia, purpose-built buildings by non-white settlers to satisfy Commonwealth legislative requirements.

Currently there are identified issues with the management and maintenance of the site resulting in delays in required repairs, removal of rubbish and further development. There is feedback

received that the site is not immediately identifiable as a place of significance and this may contribute to a lack of awareness. This is also affecting key relationships that require cooperation to provide beneficial outcomes for all parties.

The 'Willie Mar Market Place' proposal that was approved by Council 17/3/22 is the beginning of a place-making project that aims to triangulate traffic to the site to begin to elevate this aspect of Winton and Australia's heritage. The revitalization and benefit maximization of the Willie Mar and Chinese outback settlers' sites and stories are reliant on arts and cultural programming directing activity to the site and driving tourist visitation.

The Willie Mar Market garden has been identified by council as a cultural asset for Winton and this strategy seeks to maximize the benefit of this site for the community and, as a unique historical site as a tourist attraction.

The Strategy

The long-term strategy is based on a 'Quicker, Lighter, Cheaper' theoretical framework with a strong emphasis on community-driven initiatives².

It has been created to accommodate experimental approaches and changes based on feedback received through evaluation at the beginning and end of each stage. This approach is supported through national and international case studies³ that find that the most successful public spaces are influenced by community need and desires and developed to meet these requirements⁴.

This strategy offers opportunities to support the success of the Willie Mar legacy* into the future through bilateral partnerships, increased marketing communications activities and resource allocation in response to the identified aims.

Stage 1: Establish

Aim: Safeguard the original site and the story

Evaluation of the site has taken place and is on-going in consultation with the community and stakeholders.

This has revealed several areas for improvement and opportunity. These are short term goals to prepare and maintain the site for visitation and conservation purposes.

Outcomes

Maintenance: An identified issue is the irregular upkeep of the original site and surrounding areas. Establishing a 'maintenance roster' with appropriate Council departments to monitor landscaping, rubbish dumping and required repairs on a more regular basis may assist in dealing with this issue. This would potentially decrease delays in responding to issues as they arise and allow the house and lean-to to be opened to visitors.

Development: There are several developments required to secure the site to open for visitors. These include signage, preventing access to the back verandah from the house and stairs to access the house whilst preserving the original structure. This may also include measures to prevent road trains parking in-front of the site for extended periods i.e; fencing, signage, concrete shoulders etc.

Heritage Listing: To establish continuity in the management and care for the site, heritage listing is advised. This would provide a legislative framework to follow for conservation of the site and ensure that it is taken care of regardless of community, staff or Council members interests. This would allow more opportunities to gain access to grants and resources for upkeep or development as the need arises. In addition, this would increase the profile of the site and assist in leveraging a truly unique and important cultural asset for Winton.

In a meeting held on the 12/5/22, the Friends of Willie Mar community group motioned to support this recommendation and was favored by all.

Stage 2: Invest

Aim: Increase the social value of the site

In this context increasing the social value refers to the use of the site by the local community and travelling public. It is understood through consultation that the site as is may not be immediately identifiable to visitors and for the Winton community this is not necessarily a space that is being used.

Outcomes

Partnerships: Opportunities for partnerships that will increase activity and profile of the site. This could include partnerships with local community groups, local businesses, shire councils throughout the region, museums, arts and cultural institutes and events and more.

Programs: Developing a portfolio of public programming to develop awareness of Chinese heritage in Outback Queensland and Willie Mar's story. These programs will give the public an opportunity to engage with the content and drive visitation to the site (the original site and 74 Riley street). These programs will be based on historic and cultural aspects associated with the site and may include: workshops, guest lecturers, and school holiday activities.

Increasing appeal: This will include the installation of the shade sail and outdoor furniture at 74 Riley street to increase comfortability and enjoyment of the site. This is also referring to general 'beautification' in line with the goals of the Town Beautification Committee. Concept development for the use of space at 74 Riley street is ongoing and consultation will continue. This will be part of increasing appeal through providing further interpretation of Chinese heritage in Outback Queensland.



REVITILISATION STRATEGY- WILLIE MARS

Stage 3: Integrate

Aim: Elevate the Willie Mar Market Garden and associated sites as another unique tourist attraction that captures Winton's character

Integration of Willie Mar's Market garden is required to increase the public profile and platform this site as an exciting celebration of Winton's cultural heritage. This can be achieved by increased resource allocation and marketing and communications activity. These are long term goals that would be supported by implementing strategies identified previously.

Outcomes

Increasing marketing: Increased street signage on the main street to direct tourists to the site. This could include street signs and a condensed story board in line with Winton's historical signage positioned somewhere visible that alerts tourists to the location of the site. This may also include increased information about the site included in Winton's tourism material and hosting events that attract media attention.

Niche offerings: In line with developing public programming, niche events to attract new groups to Winton and alternate offerings to Winton locals is suggested. This may include demonstrations and workshops by Chinese Australians, twilight events, Chinese New Year celebrations and more. As the site develops, the opportunity for community led initiatives will be

increased and allow for experimental arts and cultural events to take place.

Integrate events: Existing events offer a fantastic opportunity to integrate this site into Winton's arts and cultural calendar. The installation of seating at the 74 Riley street site will allow visitors to sit to enjoy meals from food trucks during festivals, the possibility of hosting 'live tourism' performances and events taking place during festivals- workshops, paint and sips, games, children's activities etc. This space will also provide the opportunity for markets and outdoor community events.

Stage 4: Evaluation

Aim: Internal evaluation and community feedback

To ensure the space is reaching its potential, regular evaluation and community consultation will occur.

Outcomes

Adjust and Develop: Successful community spaces are driven by the community. Through evaluation and feedback, Council can adjust the strategy and develop projects that fulfill the needs of the community and ensure the strategy aims are being achieved. This should happen during/after each stage.

Recommendations

Platform and preserve the stories of Willie Mar and Chinese Heritage

- 1.1 Through integrating site into events and social calendar
- 1.2 Through obtaining heritage listing
- 1.3 Through securing the site to open safely for visitation
- 1.4 Through development of historical interpretation space at 74 Riley street

2. Develop and maintain mutually beneficial relationships

- 2.1 Through actioning requests for rubbish removal, addressing road train parking and repairs from FOWM
- 2.2 Through regular and increased community consultation
- 2.3 Through partnering with neighboring shires, businesses, historical groups and experts, and relevant stakeholders

3. Increase allocated resources for Willie Mar

- 3.1 Through developing maintenance roster to care for the site and meet the needs of the community
- 3.2 Through marketing and communications activity
- 3.3 Through development and management of public programming

Community Consultation

The proposed strategy was developed in response to community consultation in 2022 and Council's interests (see Appendix A, Appendix B). To execute and adjust the strategy, community consultation will continue.

Investment

The cost of developing the site to increase appeal and secure the site for visitors are 'one off' costs that are based on concept development and community consultation that is ongoing.

The Willie Mar site currently has an allocated \$12,000 per F/Y. Currently most of the budget has been used to pay consulting fees and cover building materials and expenses, averaging \$11,000 p/y for the last 5 years. If this funding could be utilised to activate the site through events and community engagement activities, we may be able to elevate the site and increase its appeal and social value to achieve the goals outlined in the strategy.

For example, if maintenance and repairs could be taken over by other council departments as part of scheduled works, and the Willie Mar fund continued to receive an allocated \$12,000, we would be able to utilise \$1500 p/m in peak season and \$500 p/m in the off season to arrange events and activities. This is an estimate based on the average \$1200 cost of hiring a guest speaker for a 2-day workshop. Partnerships and relevant community led initiatives may also provide low cost alternatives to accompany and increase paid programming.

Funding opportunities

The Gambling Community Benefit Fund

4 rounds of \$35,000 and 1 super round of \$100,000 per year. The grants are to assist in providing services, leisure activities and opportunities for Queensland communities.

Queensland Arts Showcase Program (QASP)

project funding for up to \$30,000 or \$60,000 with co-funding. Categories for funding to change so check with the website.

Touring Queensland Fund

Grants to support the touring of high-quality performing arts or exhibitions. It also supports Artist in Residence programs in schools.

Other sources

There are various grant opportunities available for Queensland heritage listed places that may be available should the site be enlisted. There are also community and arts grants that are available at varied times so opportunities should be checked regularly.

Appendix B

During community, council and expert consultation some concerns have been raised regarding the suitability of the 74 Riley street site, the maintenance of present and future sites, the interpretation of the story and Chinese heritage, and of suggestions to 'revitalise' the story and the site. These concerns have been addressed through development of this strategy and associated project planning and are detailed below.

- Flooding- Improvements and development at the site will be flood proof as many other community and Council sites have been developed. The strategy and placemaking projects associated have been planned in conjunction with the Assets Manager to ensure any addition or improvements at site are cognisant of the flood risk in the area.
- Maintenance and Repairs A major concern identified by the community is irregular upkeep and delayed response in requested repairs and improvements. Stage 1- maintenance and development is planned to address these concerns through establishing/including the site in a roster.
- Road trains (Safety and parking) This is a passage for road train as are many other roads in Winton. To combat associated risk the suggestions of fencing, signage and concrete shoulders have been put forward. This may also deter road trains from parking in-front of the original shop and house which is another concern of the community. The

inclusion of these measures is included in phase 2 of the strategy- 'increasing appeal'.

 Funding- The strategy has been created to allow for incremental changes that can account for feedback and interest received from the community and visitors. This is to scale cost and spending as needed. There are 'one-off' costs associated with the development of the 74 Riley street site and applications for grant funding have been submitted.

The suggested strategy is not intended to overtake the management of the site- rather develop a plan to converge stakeholder interests and allow the community to influence development of activities, programs and placemaking.

SUMMARY

This report provides an update on Council's efforts to amend the Winton locality boundary in consultation with the Department of Resources.

RECOMMENDATION

1 That the report be received.

REPORT

Council has for some time been seeking the State Government locality boundaries in and around Winton to be amended to avoid confusion for property owners and people trying to locate properties. This matter was considered at the Council Workshop held on 28 January 2022 where Mr Charles Dyer presented two suggested boundary options based on a 10km radius and a 20km radius.

Council's preference was for a 20km radius to be pursued and this proposal (see attached copy of map) was forwarded to the Planning Services section of the Department of Resources based in Mackay.

This proposal has been reviewed by their Geographic Information Officer, Mr Justin Kingsford and considering key issues including: -

- Alignment with cadastral boundaries;
- Avoids segmentation of land parcels or adjacent properties in common ownership;
- Uses distinguishable physical barriers to define boundaries where required, for example National Parks, state forests and rivers.

Mr Kingsford has provided an amended boundary plan after taking these matters into consideration and Council is asked to confirm whether it is supportive of this amended plan (see attached copy).

I have also invited Mr Kingsford to attend the Council Meeting via teleconference to enable this boundary proposal to be fully discussed and any questions to be answered. There will also need to

be considerable community consultation to support this process and this can be outlined by the departmental staff.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The risk associated with considering the amended Winton locality boundary map has been assessed as Minor (Consequence) and Unlikely (Likelihood) giving an overall assessment as Low 4.

This assessment has been based on departmental staff having had the opportunity to review our draft proposal which should increase the chances of the Minister approving the boundary alteration.

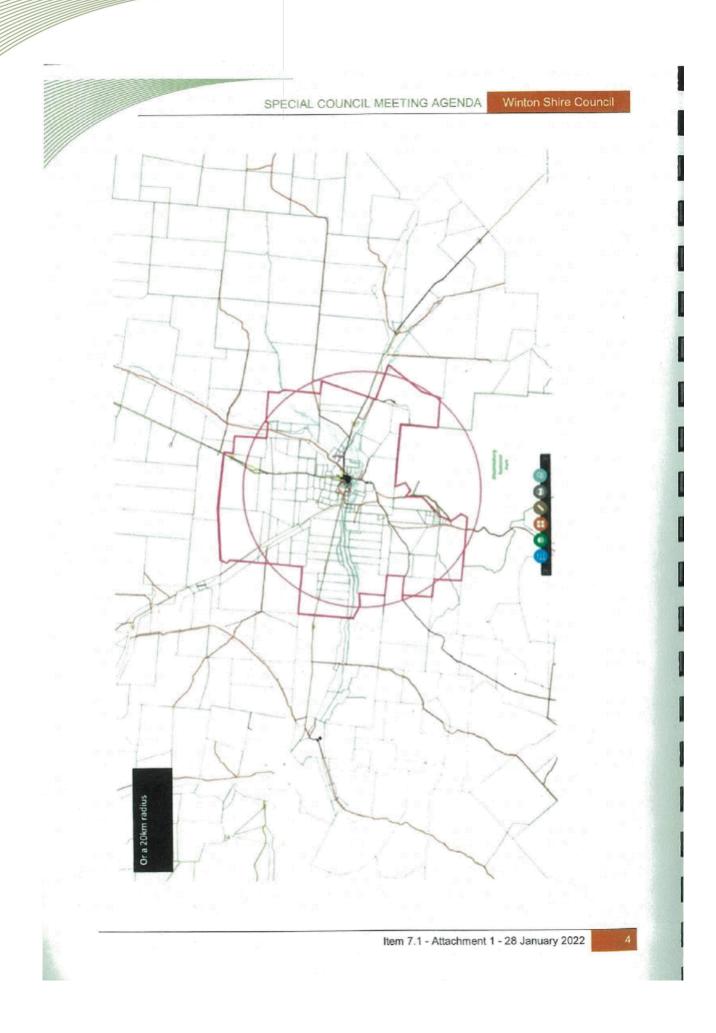

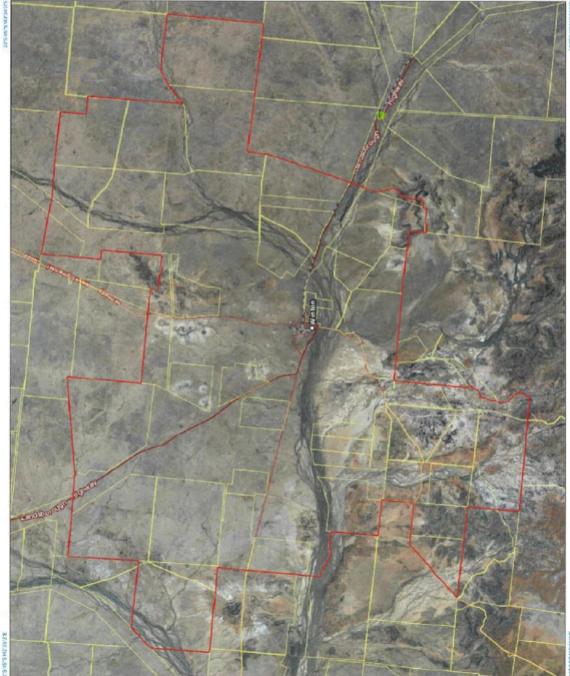

I'm writing in regards the QCWA Centenary Endurance Ride which will be held in June 2023. I have attached a sponsorship letter from the QCWA Central West Division requesting assistance for the main ride in June 2023. We are hoping Council can assist with some level of sponsorship and also consider some in-kind assistance as the event will bring hundreds of people to Winton.

Following a meeting with organisers from Qld Endurance Ride Assoc, CWA representatives and local Winton interested parties I have also been instructed to write to council for assistance with a half ride that will be held in Winton Sept 3rd and 4th 2022 as a lead up to the Centenary ride. The half ride is a mandatory lead up to the full ride, it gives riders from all over Qld a chance to check the local terrain and volunteers a practice at running checkpoints, starts and finishes. Unlike the big event this race will not involve Longreach and the Central West it is solely Winton based. We anticipate approx. 70 riders and their crews will be camping at the show grounds for around a week.

Ways Council can assist with the half ride.

- Consider waiving the cost of camping at show grounds for riders and crew.
- Consider being main sponsor of half ride. This would entail a donation of \$1000 to cover the cost of prizes, which will be embroidered horse rugs for 4 divisional winners.
- Consider some assistance with the touching up of approx. 80km of existing tracks from racetrack, long waterhole, common fence, pipeline to dinosaur museum, Apsley lane water facility and back to showgrounds. Council employee Ernie Ellis has offered to operate any donated machines on his own time.

We believe the half ride will bring a couple of 100 people to town for about a week and the main ride next year could bring 1000 people. As well as those involved in the rides, we are hoping to encourage a large number of spectators and media people. If successful the ride could be put back on the QERA calendar and become a regular attraction to add to our thriving tourism industry.

With around 600 patrons through the gate, it was on a par with our centenary meeting way back in 1999. They were well catered for with a hotly contested and well supported fashions on the field, 4 bookmakers, perfect weather, quality food, cold beer and plenty of entertainment. With a lot of time and effort being put into our track, events and facilities each year it is extremely rewarding to see these results.

This year we will have the usual attractions of Fashions on the Field, Nearest the Pin golf, Rick Gough Music, Calcutta, kid's entertainment, great food, cold beer and top shelf horse racing.

We have had a few busy years working on improvements to our venue. We have replaced the jockeys' room with a state-of-the-art facility, replaced the men's and ladies' toilets and shower block, installed the new judges stand, built a new portable catwalk for the Fashions on the Field judging, and other smaller improvements. We are in the process of upgrading the fences around the saddling enclosure and stables. The Queensland Government has released a discussion paper proposing changes to expenditure limits in Local Government elections. The Liberal National Party has serious concerns about these proposed changes.

Under the new guidelines, mayoral candidates will only be able to spend a limited amount on their election campaign (on a sliding scale based on population). However, registered third parties, such as trade unions and other special interest groups, will be able to spend the sum of every Mayor in Queensland combined and will be allowed to spend this amount in any Local Government Area of their choosing.

For example, a mayoral candidate in a Local Government Area with a population of 50,000 will be limited to spend a maximum of \$50,000 on their campaign. In comparison, each trade union or special interest group could spend up to \$3,822,941 to influence the election outcome in that Local Government Area.

This is an egregious assault on democracy and on your right to a fair election, free from the undue influence of third parties.

The Government has opened consultation on these proposed changes, and I encourage you to make your voice heard. Submissions may be sent to the Department of Local Government at localgovernmentpolicy@dsdilgp.qld.gov.au.

Further to our meeting at the Waltzing Matilda Centre this morning I should like to first thank you and the Mayor, Gavin Baskett, for accompanying me in inspecting existing Museum display spaces along with current displays.

The damaging effect of rain in the open shed display spaces was noted along with the impact of dust and the need to weatherproof these in order to preserve the objects on display and to minimise cleaning costs as well as the resultant improvement in presentation of displays. We discussed the use of polystyrene sandwich panel on existing structures and the major improvement in presentation of displays under such conditions.

We were in agreement on the need for such improvements and discussed possibilities of Council funding same in a staged program over a period of time.

On behalf of the Society I request that Council progress work on an engineering design to be completed within the 2022-23 budget period, arranging finance and commence a building program as soon as possible. I will raise this issue at our next monthly meeting to investigate what financial contribution the Society could make toward it, bearing in mind that we have limited funding opportunities and under the MOU our obligations are primarily to the presentation of displays rather than capital works.

I note that we also inspected the recent works at the Christina Macpherson Cottage, noting that the soffitting and painting had both been satisfactorily completed.

Trusted Environmental and Geological Information (TEGI) program

Delivering trusted baseline information and analysis for Australia's Strategic Basin locations

The Trusted Environmental and Geological Information (TEGI) program is a scientific collaboration between Geoscience Australia and CSIRO, and is managed by Department of Industry, Science, Energy and Resources (DISER) to deliver regional geological and environmental assessments underpinned by transparent, trusted, and regulator-validated baseline geological and environmental data for each Basin.

The purpose being to provide:

- · an improved understanding of geological, surface water, groundwater and ecological systems
- an improved understanding of the potential hazards, risks and impacts of a resource project development
- · improved access to baseline scientific data through digital platforms, and

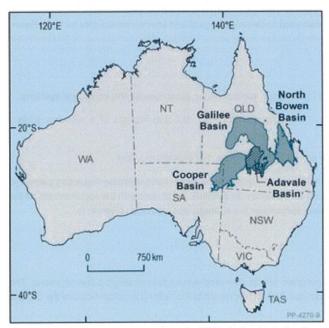


Figure 1 Strategic basin locations in focus for TEGI. Further basin locations will be announced in the future.

- consolidation of baseline data, information and tools to support and optimise regulatory pathways to make development decisions as efficiently as possible, consistent with the requirements of the environment and resource developments in the strategic basin location (Figure 1).

Scope

The Strategic Basin Plans—TEGI program will be delivered across four strategic basin locations. The first location includes the north Bowen and Galilee basins, while the second location includes the Cooper and Adavale basins.

Two further strategic basin locations will be determined and announced by the government in the future.

The scope of the work for each strategic basin location will be similar and include the collation and quality assurance of contextual information, focusing on geology, energy and mineral resources, groundwater, surface water and protected environmental matters.

TEGI will build on the outputs from the Australian Government's Geological and Bioregional Assessment (GBA) programs and leverage data and information generated through Geoscience Australia's Exploring for the Future program also.

Preliminary analysis will be undertaken to identify areas in each basin where resource development is most likely, based on energy and mineral resource assessment potential.

A gap analysis will be undertaken to identify key blind-spots in the current understanding of the basin geological systems and environmental matters in relation to resource development opportunities. The gap analysis will inform the development of more detailed investigation and assessment in later phases of the program.

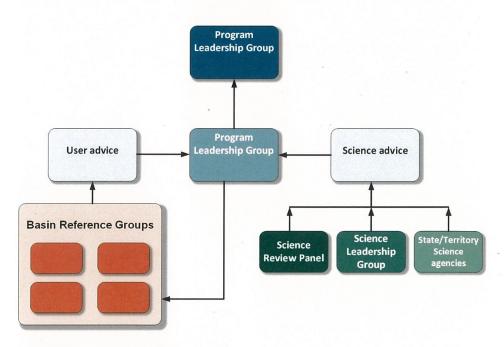


Figure 2 Governance structure of TEGI program.

TEGI is committed to ensuring that it delivers science, data and information of the highest calibre. That is why the program is implementing a robust structure of oversight, user-centred design and science validation. The governance structure for the program (Figure 2) leverages the expertise of both internal and external scientists, with advice on the key information and data needs for each strategic basin location also being provided by the communities and industry who live and work in the region.

Windows Patching

Winton Shire Council and Cyber CX have done a large push to update several Windows machines which were lagging behind in their scheduled updates. This process has been very successful where we have now reached a patch compliance of 97.38% across our entire domain. The remaining machines are on the older end of their lifecycle and will be replaced in the next planned renewal cycle of computers.

Managed Firewalls

During the month of March, nutanix-backup was the most detected Application with 7.4 TB of data processed by the Firewalls, followed by ssl with 251.9 GB.

Applications in the Winton environment continue to match known business applications with no suspicious applications to be raised.



During the last month, the largest category to be blocked with 183 sessions was 'web-browsing'.

'not-applicable' continues to be blocked by design. This App-ID is assigned to any session that will be discarded due to the traffic being dropped.

DarkTrace Email Protection

Over the past 4 weeks Winton Shire Council has received a total of 13, 655 emails. Of which approx 8% have had a corrective action performed to ensure security. Within the 8% of actioned emails the majority at 48% was blocked links which may contain malicious content, 26% were deemed to be spam and were delivered to the junk folder, 24% were held for a 100% severity score and the remainder was due to other actions.

WINTON YOUTH, SPORT AND RECREATION

The Winton Chess Club

The club saw a huge rise in participation this month with over 35 individuals attending the coaching and playing session on Tuesdays and Thursday evenings. The Club was also invited to the 60s & Better community to conduct some social chess sessions for the seniors in town. The club will visit the 60s & Better program every Friday in the month of May; further continuation would depend upon the level of interest from the 60s & Better group. The youngest person to play and learn chess was 5 years old and the oldest person was 96 years old. The club has also been collecting data on the existing chess knowledge of its players, which shall be compiled and measured against a survey that shall be conducted towards the end of June. This club is run by the Youth Sport and Rec Officer for the time being.

Soccer Clinics

Weekly soccer sessions are being held at the St. Patrick's Primary School. The kids at St. Pats have always been enthusiastic about soccer, and to accommodate this interest, weekly soccer sessions

are organized during the lunch break. Kids spend a bit of time training in various skills before they transition to playing a game and scoring goals. \$400 worth of equipment, including soccer balls, bibs and markers were purchased for facilitating these clinics.

Annual Sport and Wellbeing Survey

The Annuals Sports and Well Being survey received a total of 75 responses and was closed on the 28th of April 2022. The data for this shall be used in the Youth Sport and Rec Strategic Plan and a separate report for this survey shall also be released to the community in the Month of May.

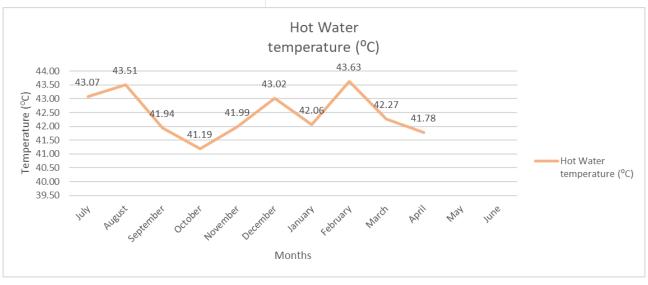

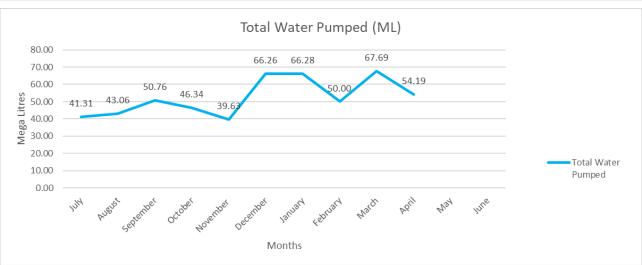

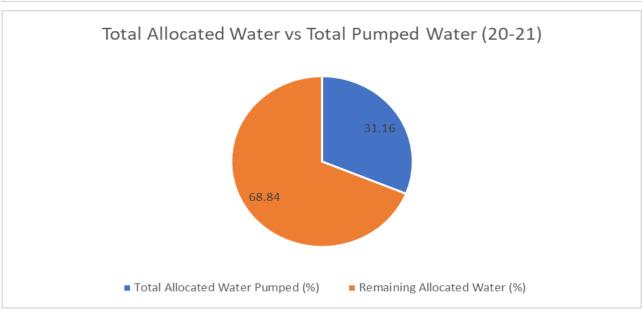

Gridsure, the Grid contractor has completed 234 out of the contracted 260 grids. Works currently suspended due to machinery breakdown. Expected to be completed by June 2022. Five grids identified for replacement.

WATER FACILITY

The Grove water upgrade has been completed (funded project).

Reserves- 280 cows were in the Four Mile due to wet weather and now have been removed. These cattle were on the Four Mile for a week.

Need to look at building a close water square behind the dump if possible- recently sick cows were in the sale yards and had to be let out.

SALEYARDS

Busy, with lots of cattle coming in and going out.

Weighbridge fabrication has turned up for Scale Upgrade.

Basic maintenance- shed roof has been screwed down after recent wind and rain.

Pressure pump fitted to overhead tanks

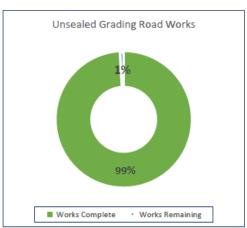
