### **SUMMARY**

A momentous occasion awaits Winton as it prepares to mark its 150th year, with a series of meticulously planned events. The weekend of 11-13 April 2025 promises to be the highlight, brimming with engaging activities, nostalgic reunions, and a glamorous Gala Ball.

A Request for Quote to produce a Winton 150 Year Anniversary Book was released on 1st July 2024 and sent to six (6) Authors and Writers. Three quotes were received from:

- John Elliott
- Dr Neville Buch,
- Lyndon Megarrity

This Report requests Council's support and approval for a sponsorship of \$41,925 for the publication of a comprehensive 144-page colour book. The book, authored and photographed by the esteemed John Elliott, will beautifully depict the rich history of Winton and its surrounding region. The funds will be utilised for research, writing, editing, imagery, and printing of this remarkable piece.

### **REPORT**

Winton Shire Council will celebrate this milestone year of reflection by celebrating the town's rich history of growth, perseverance, and success.

The Winton Shire Council has organized the Winton 150 Year Celebration weekend and various events throughout the year in line with their Tourism Strategic pillar. By fostering partnerships and relationships with the community, businesses, neighbouring regions, tourism, and industry organizations, as well as government agencies, the council aims to achieve its objectives.

This highly anticipated event in Winton will pay tribute to the region's original settlers, industries such as agriculture, opal mining, and the airline industry, as well as notable figures like Banjo Paterson. Additionally, it will highlight the recent growth in tourism and dinosaur discovery.

The local businesses will greatly benefit from the influx of visitors, which will contribute to the overall local economy. Furthermore, the Winton 150-year Celebration Book will serve as a valuable keepsake, capturing the essence and history of the town, its founders, notable individuals, the timeline of the region's industries and businesses, and even offering a glimpse into the future.

### THE BOOK

John Elliott has cultivated a strong professional bond with the Winton community, local businesses, and neighbouring areas throughout his career. With a portfolio of 15 historical and pictorial publications, John Elliott is now suggesting to:

- Engage in discussions with the community and descendants of founding families in Winton and nearby towns through interviews and knowledge sharing to uncover significant historical details.
- Collaborate with the Council to finalize the manuscript.
- Collaborate with a graphic designer to create illustrations.
- Review artwork with the Council.
- Coordinate with a printer to produce the book.
- Attend the book launch and exhibition in April 2025 at the WMC.

The book will be available for sale for \$49.95 per copy at the Dagworth Store, as well as at various pop-up locations such as Vintage Markets during the Winton 150 Celebration weekend of 11-13 April 2025. Additionally, copies will be stocked at the Winton Shire Council Library.

The breakdown of the cost of producing this book is as follows:

- Research, interviews, writing, editing, liaising with designer and printer \$20,000.
- 3 x visits to Winton (Brisbane to Winton return flights) \$4,500
- Printing of 2000 copies by Cranbrook Press (Toowoomba) + delivery to Winton -\$17,425

Total cost of Winton 150 Year Anniversary Book = \$41,925.00

It is proposed that Council will provide:

• 3 x Return flights to Brisbane.

- Accommodation (Council unit/room in house) for the duration of each visit.
- Use of the Reading Room at the WMC for interviews.
- Use of an office at WMC for duration of each visit.
- Facilitate with transport required to outlying stations and towns in the region.

#### **SUMMARY**

This report aims to put in place a document that defines responsibilities relating to the operation of the Winton Community Garden on Winton Shire Council owned land at 102 Elderslie Street, Winton.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

- 1. That the report be received.
- 2. That Council approves the attached document "Memorandum of Understanding between Winton Community Garden and Winton Shire Council".

That Council authorises the Chief Executive Officer to execute the document on behalf of Winton Shire Council.

### **REPORT**

In January 2022, the Winton Shire Council offered a portion of land at 102 Elderslie Street to be used as a Community Garden.

Mr Andrew Judd and other community members established the community garden (also known as 2 ducks garden) on the land offered. Council has also contributed donations for events such as Annual Tree Day.

There is no agreement in place that provides information regarding responsibilities for operations and insurance in relation to the activities that occur on this Council owned land.

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) provides an opportunity to clarify responsibilities into the future in relation to the operation of the community garden. Winton Community Garden has already reviewed the document and have found it acceptable.

### Under the agreement:

- Winton Community Garden holds liability insurance with Winton Shire Council being responsible for Public Liability and Building insurance.
- Winton Community Garden has the responsibilities of any normal commercial tenant.
- The operation is to be run as a not for profit that is, it's aim is to provide opportunities for the
  community for health and wellbeing activities and events. Funding will be provided by charging
  a membership fee to cover insurance, and community financial assistance (for example, from
  grants).
- Council will provide a rubbish bin and a rubbish collection service and will be responsible for building maintenance and any charges for utilities (electricity and water).

### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

The risks of approving this Memorandum of Understanding are the cost of providing utilities (which has already been occurring since the community garden's inception). The benefits are to the Winton Shire community by providing assurance to the community garden of Council's ongoing support.

Therefore, the risk is considered Unlikely and Minor consequence, giving a risk rating of Low-4.

# Scope

This Memorandum of Understanding is to provide an outline of the terms and conditions for managing the relationship between Winton Community Garden and Winton Shire Council.

### **Parties**

### Party 1

Winton Community Garden 102 Elderslie Street WINTON QLD 4735

A community garden is a piece of land gardened or cultivated by a group of people individually or collectively. Normally in community gardens, the land is divided into individual plots. Each individual gardener is responsible for their own plot and the yielding or the production of which belongs to the individual. In collective gardens the piece of land is not divided. A group of people cultivate it together and the harvest belongs to all participants.

### Party 2

Winton Shire Council 75 Vindex Street WINTON QLD 4735

Winton Shire Council is a Local Government Authority acting in a landlord / auspicing capacity of the Winton Community Garden, with the relevant Work, Health & Safety and Landlord legislative responsibilities in place.

### Recitals

This document sets out some key responsibilities.

#### 1 Insurance

- Insurance required for liability purposes is obtained by Winton Community Garden through a designated insurance provider via Queensland Water and Land Carers (QWaLC)
- Winton Shire Council requires a Certificate of Currency to confirm Winton Community Garden having Public Liability insurance coverage to the value of \$20m.
- c. Buildings Insurance is the responsibility of the Winton Shire Council.

### 2 Use of facility

- a. Winton Community Garden is available to be accessed by members and guests 24/7, normally by appointment via the Secretary of Winton Community Garden.
  - In principle, the Garden is open weekly on Sunday mornings 9am to 11am, from March through to October, with restricted opening days through the hotter summer months.
  - It is also opened for Special & Community Events, General Meetings, and an Annual General Meeting.
- b. Waste generated from the site is the responsibility of the Winton Community Garden. Council can provide a rubbish bin for a weekly collection; garden waste will be addressed by the Winton Community Garden, normally by composting on-site. General upkeep of the premises is the responsibility of Winton Community Garden. Day to day upkeep includes those items that would normally be the responsibility of a tenant under a commercial rental agreement.
- c. Maintenance of any building asset will be the responsibility of Winton Shire Council. It is the responsibility of Winton Community Garden to advise Winton Shire Council of any building maintenance required to ensure the asset is maintained appropriately.

### 3 Costs and expenses

- Winton Community Garden charge a membership fee to cover the insurance requirements.
- b. Funding is also provided via various community grants accessed during the course of the financial year, to help with health and wellbeing activities and events, garden improvements and tools and equipment.
- c. Winton Community Garden can apply for community financial assistance, through Winton Shire Council's Community Grants Request Form; used by non-profit community organisations to seek funding for events and services that benefit the needs and priorities of the Winton community.
- d. Utilities costs of water and electricity are provided by Winton Shire Council as part of the common area located at 102 Elderslie Street, Winton.

### 4 Work undertaken at the Winton Community Garden

Products, crops, or harvest, as a result of the work undertaken by Winton Community Garden cannot be sold for commercial gain or in competition with existing local businesses.

Types of work being undertaken at the garden, include but are not limited to:

- Activities that include gardening, composting, water management, growing of medicinal plants,
- b. Undertake community projects if desired, e.g. National Tree Day
- Participation in training programmes such as composting, crop rotation, raised bed gardening, cooking and demonstrations in nutrition,
- Participation in activities that advance the health and well-being of community gardeners,
- e. Engagement in traditional and cultural activities such as arts and crafts, traditional hunting, and fishing.

### 5 Reporting requirements

The Management Committee will provide an annual report to the end of June every year to Winton Shire Council to provide an overview of the Winton Community Garden's activities for the previous year.

#### SUMMARY

The current Complaints Management Policy does not align with legislative changes, particularly the *Local Government Councillor and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2023* which now changes how complaints in relation to Councillors and the Mayor are dealt with. The opportunity has been taken to update some of the content in line with best practice as provided by the Queensland Ombudsman Policy and Procedure Guide.

### RECOMMENDATION

- 1. That the report be received.
- 2. That the attached Complaint Management Policy (WSC-GOV-POL-003) be adopted.

### **REPORT**

There are several changes to the Complaints Management Policy in line with legislated changes and best practice principles (as provided by the Queensland Ombudsman Policy and Procedure Guide).

There are many changes to the policy that are difficult to highlight in an attachment;

### Additions include: -

- In Purpose, "Council seeks to resolve individual complaints and identify opportunities to make systemic improvements".
- In the Policy Statement, "Council also recognises complaint management is an essential component towards quality customer service and good corporate governance" and to the objective, an additional dot point: "Review feedback received from complaints as an opportunity to improve Council's systems, decision making, service delivery and customer experience where this is applicable".

- Additional dot points under policy principles:
  - The active interest and support of management;
  - Effective policy and procedures for an effective complaints management system;
  - o Providing a positive environment that encourages and helps people make complaints,
- Heading and content of Roles and Responsibilities
- Complaint Levels
- Under Administrative Action Complaints the addition of several dot point examples:
  - Council's failure to action a request to fix a pothole in the person's street or other place they regularly travel;
  - o A development approved by Council affecting a person in the neighbourhood;
  - A repeated complaint by an affected person about the general quality of park maintenance (previous version referred to quality of the water or water pressure);
  - Council's failure to take action following a request by an affected person to investigate; for example, a barking dog or noisy air conditioner;
  - o Inappropriate disclosure of a person's private information (breach of privacy).
  - The amount of a charge or rate unless these are set by legislation or by resolution of Council;
  - Online commercial advertising;
  - Competitive neutrality complaint;
  - Complaints received about Council's services; for example, water and sewerage services.
  - o A Councillor, including the Mayor, which is outside Chapter 6, Part 2, Division 6 or the *Local Government Act 2009.*
  - Removed Complaint from a customer whose private information has been inappropriately disclosed as this now comes under privacy law and is dealt with under that legislation as a data breach, rather than a complaint.
- Complaints about Councillors including the Mayor has completely been rewritten in compliance with legislation that was enacted in November 2023 that is, *Local Government Councillor and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2023*.
- Review of policy now includes "will be reviewed every three years and when legislation changes".

Other changes include formatting, punctuation, and easy read guideline changes.

### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

There is a higher risk should the policy not be adopted as this will cause the policy to continue to not comply with legislative changes.

The risks associated with adopting the attached policy relate to compliance with legislation and best practice guidelines. Therefore, the risk factors are Unlikely with the consequence of Minor, providing a risk factor of Low-3.

Complaints Management Policy Page 1 of 13

# **Purpose**

The purpose of this Winton Shire Council (Council) Complaints Management policy is to establish Council's commitment to ethically, fairly, transparently, and compliantly, managing and resolving all complaints.

This policy provides a single framework for identifying, assessing, recording, managing, and resolving complaints.

Council is committed to providing a quality level of customer service that does not attract complaints. Council seeks to resolve individual complaints and identify opportunities to make systemic improvements.

# Scope

This policy applies to the management of all complaints regarding Winton Shire Council actions, services, Councillors, Council employees, contractors and volunteers.

## **Definitions**

Administrative Action	As defined in the Local Government Act 2009, includes a decision, or a failure to make a decision, including a failure to provide a written statement of reasons for a decision; an act, or a failure to do an act; the formulation of a proposal or intention; or the making of a recommendation.

# Policy statement

Council acknowledges the right of a person to lodge a complaint and is committed to upholding its legal obligation by aiming to provide an effective resolution to ALL complaints received.

Council also recognises complaint management is an essential component towards quality customer service and good corporate governance.

The objective of this policy is to:

- Provide a framework for the process of identifying, assessing, recording, managing and resolving complaints.
- Ensuring the complaints management process is statutory compliant, ethical, fair, objective, transparent and consistent.
- Offer a complaints regime that facilitates continuous improvement of Council, service delivery, systems, processes and employees.
- · Ensure complaints are responded to in a timely manner.
- Inform the complainant of the remedy available to them if they are not satisfied with a particular outcome, decision or action that directly affects them.
- Review feedback received from complaints as an opportunity to improve Council's systems, decision making, service delivery and customer experience where this applicable.

# Policy principles

Council complaint management principles include:

- The active interest and support of management;
- · Effective policy and procedures for an effective complaints management system;
- Providing a positive environment that encourages and helps people make complaints,
- Treating all complaints seriously and treating all complainants with respect, courtesy, dignity and fairness.
- Reviewing all complaints on merit and addressing all complaints in an equitable and impartial manner adhering to the principles of natural justice and procedural fairness.
- Acknowledging and responding to the complaint and keeping the complainant informed as to the process steps and progress.
- Managing all complaints confidentially and in accordance with the relevant legislation.
- Providing information about Council's complaints process (policy and procedure) on Council's website - complaints can be lodged in various forms (written, via email, in person).
- · Providing all decisions / actions to the complainant in a timely manner.
- Identifying opportunities for improvement.

# Roles and Responsibilities

### **Governance Coordinator**

The Governance Coordinator will be responsible for the Complaints Registers, liaising with investigation personnel and the Chief Executive Officer to ensure complaints are managed efficiently and effectively and that complainants are kept informed of the progress of their complaints and concerns.

### Chief Executive Officer

The Chief Executive Officer is the final decision maker in relation to responses to complaints and the referral of matters that require further action by Council (for example, Show Cause Notice, Infringement Notice, etc.).

### Senior Management

Senior Management are responsible for ensuring investigations into complaints are executed efficiently and with priority to ensure the complaint can be addressed in a timely manner. Senior Management will support the making of complaints and see them as an opportunity for improvement.

# Assessment of the complaint

A complaint may be received via any communication method, such as an email, letter, through the Council website, verbally (in person, by telephone) or any other communication method. Council's preferred method for receipt of a complaint is in writing.

Note: Council does not consider comments published on social media to be complaints.

Once information is received, it will be assessed to establish the information is a complaint, as defined and to determine the complaint category. Not all complaints will require a formal investigation.

The Level and Categorisation of the complaint will determine the applicable procedure to apply, including the management level to consult and liaise with.

Every effort will be made to address the complaint at the first point of contact, unless the complaint is related to:

- · The conduct of a Councillor.
- Of a serious nature.
- Multiple complaint categories or the categorisation is unclear.

In these instances, the CEO is responsible for assessing and categorising the complaint.

# Complaint level

- Level 1: Frontline complaint handling (early resolution)
  Level 2: Internal assessment, investigation, or review
- Level 3: External assessment, investigation, or review.

# Complaint categories

### Administrative Action Complaints (AAC)

An Administrative Action Complaint is a complaint about an administrative action of Council made by an affected person. For a complaint to be an Administrative Action Complaint, the complainant must be an affected person, including:

- Council's failure to action a request to fix a pothole in the person's street or other place they regularly travel;
- A development approved by Council affecting a person in the neighbourhood;
- A repeated complaint by an affected person about the general quality of park maintenance;
- Council's failure to take action following a request by an affected person to investigate; for example, a barking dog or noisy air conditioner;
- Inappropriate disclosure of a person's private information (breach of privacy).
- The amount of a charge or rate unless these are set by legislation or by resolution of Council;
- Online commercial advertising;
- Competitive neutrality complaint;
- Complaints received about Council's services; for example, water and sewerage services.
- A Councillor, including the Mayor, which is outside Chapter 6, Part 2, Division 6 or the Local Government Act 2009.
- Referrals from outside agencies; for example, the Queensland Ombudsman.

If it has been determined that the definition of a complaint has been satisfied and the complaint is not an Administrative Action Complaint, then it will generally fall into one of the following categories.

# Complaints about Councillors, including the Mayor

The most appropriate way of making a complaint will depend on the type of conduct.

Conduct	How it is to be dealt with
Unsuitable meeting conduct	Raise a point of order with the meeting chairperson, who will deal with the matter in the meeting
Inappropriate conduct	Make a complaint to the Office of the Independent Assessor
Misconduct	Make a complaint to the Office of the Independent Assessor
Corrupt conduct	Make a complaint to the Crime and Corruption Commission

### Inappropriate conduct

Behaviour contrary to the Code of Conduct, a policy, procedure, or resolution of the council.

All councils are required to adopt an investigation policy (WSC-GOV-POL-005 Investigation Policy) about how they will deal with complaints of suspected inappropriate conduct of councillors that are referred by the Office of the Independent Assessor. When the Office of the Independent Assessor (OIA) refers a matter to Council for investigation, it will provide a referral notice about the suspected inappropriate conduct.

The referral notice may include a recommendation from the Independent Assessor about how Council may investigate or deal with the conduct, which may be inconsistent with the Council's normal policy.

Once an investigation is completed, a report is submitted to a Council meeting for consideration. It is then a Council decision to determine if the councillor has been found to have engaged in inappropriate conduct and if so, what the consequences should be.

### Misconduct

The conduct of a councillor is misconduct if the conduct:

- Adversely affects, directly or indirectly, the honest and impartial performance of the councillor's functions, or exercise of powers;
- Is a breach of trust placed in the councillor, either knowingly or recklessly;
- Is a misuse of information or material acquired in, or in connection with, the performance
  of a councillor's functions, whether the misuse is for the benefit of the councillor, or for
  the benefit or the detriment of another person;
- Contravenes an order of the local government or the Councillor Conduct Tribunal
- Is a failure to comply with a council's acceptable requests guidelines;
- Is a failure to comply with the council's reimbursement of expenses policy;
- Is a failure to notify the Independent Assessor that a councillor may have engaged in inappropriate conduct or misconduct;
- Is participating in a decision on a matter in which the councillor has a prescribed Conflict of Interest
- Is a failure to inform a meeting of the particulars of a councillor's prescribed or declarable Conflict of Interest;
- Is a failure to report a suspicion of another councillor's prescribed or declarable Conflict
  of Interest at a meeting;
- Influences or attempts to influence, direct, or discuss a matter with another person, who
  is participating in a decision, when a councillor has a prescribed or declarable Conflict of
  Interest in the matter;

- Gives a direction to a council employee (except where the employee is providing administrative support to the councillor or the mayor directing the CEO as prescribed in the Local Government Act 2009, or senior executive employees as prescribed in the COBA)
- Is a release of information confidential to the council that the councillor knows is confidential, or reasonably should know;
- Is a failure to inform the CEO of particulars of interests at the start of the term, or appointment of a councillor, or to correct the Register of Interests, or update the Register of Interests annually;
- Is repeated inappropriate conduct that has led to a councillor being disciplined on three
  occasions within a year, or if a councillor re- engages in conduct following a previous
  order of council for the same type of conduct;
- Is inappropriate conduct by a chairperson while managing or leading a council meeting (including a committee meeting)

The Office of the Independent Assessor may refer the matter to the Councillor Conduct Tribunal (CCT) which is an independent body made up of members and a president. It is responsible for dealing with matters referred to it by the Office of the Independent Assessor where the Independent Assessor forms a reasonable belief that the councillor may have engaged in misconduct. The tribunal's functions include the following:

- · To hear and decide matters referred by the Independent Assessor
- To investigate and make recommendations to local government about suspected inappropriate conduct if referred to them by a local government.

#### Tribunal decisions

After conducting a hearing, the tribunal must decide whether the councillor has engaged in misconduct. If so, it must then decide what action it will take to discipline the councillor. The tribunal may decide that no action be taken against a councillor or may make one or more of the orders or recommendations prescribed in the *Local Government Act 2009*.

### Corrupt conduct

Corrupt Conduct Corrupt Conduct is defined under section 15 of the Crime and Corruption Act 2001 as conduct that:

- Adversely affects, or could adversely affect, directly or indirectly, the performance of a councillor's responsibilities or the performance of the council and • Involves the performance of responsibilities in a way that is not honest or impartial, or
- · Involves a breach of the trust placed in a councillor either knowingly or recklessly, or
- Involves the misuse of information or material acquired in connection with the councillor's responsibilities and
- If proven would be a criminal offence.

### Corrupt Conduct also means:

- The conduct of a person that impairs, or could impair, public confidence in the
  administration and involves; collusive tendering, fraud in relation to an application for a
  license or permit with a purpose of protecting health or safety of persons, protecting the
  environment, protecting use of natural, cultural, mining or energy resources,
- Dishonestly obtaining, or helping someone to dishonestly obtain a benefit from the payment or application of public funds or disposition of assets,
- Evading tax

Fraudulently obtaining or retaining an appointment that if proved would be a criminal
offence or lead to termination of the person's service,

Complaints of corrupt conduct will be referred directly to the Crime and Corruption Commission (CCC).

## Complaints about the Chief Executive Officer (CEO)

Complaints about the conduct of the CEO will be directed to the Mayor or their delegate who will initially assess and manage the complaint.

### Public Interest disclosure

A complaint received regarding a public interest disclosure, which identifies or alleges cases of maladministration, corrupt conduct or the misuse of public resources or contraventions giving rise to dangers to public health and safety, the environment or to persons with disabilities, will be administered in accordance with the *Public Interest Disclosure Act 2010* and Council's Public Interest Disclosure Policy (WSC-ADM-POL-005).

### Corrupt conduct

A complaint, information or matter that involves or may involve suspected corrupt conduct will be assessed and managed in accordance with the *Crime and Corruption Act 2001*.

The nominated person, under section 48A of the *Crime and Corruption Act 2001*, will manage complaints against the CEO that are reasonably suspected to involve corrupt conduct.

# Internal complaint or grievance

An internal complaint or grievance is any type of problem, concern or complaint relating to an employee's work or the work environment. A grievance can be about any act, behaviour, omission, situation or decision affecting an employee, which the employee thinks is unfair or unjustified.

A grievance may relate to aspects of employment, such as:

- Workplace bullying including sexual harassment.
- Workplace discrimination.
- Unreasonable or lack of management action.
- Breaches of Council policy documents and legislation; that is, the Code of Conduct.

A complaint will not be deemed a grievance if it relates to reasonable management action including:

- Setting and managing performance goals and standards including dealing with unsatisfactory performance – refer to the Performance Management Policy (WSC-HR-POL-005).
- Allocating work or work location in a transparent manner.
- · Implementing organisational changes or restructuring.
- Resolution for complaints or disputes pertaining to industrial relation matters.

Complaints that are considered a grievance will be administered in accordance with Council's Grievance Resolution Policy.

### Other matters governed by a Statutory review process

A complaint that has a separate statutory review process will be directed to the relevant review process, in the first instance. These include:

- Planning issues that can be addressed through the Planning Act 2016.
- Competitive neutrality issues that can be addressed through the Local Government Act 2009.
- Disputes regarding administrative decisions that can be addressed through the Queensland Civil and Administrative Tribunal.
- Disputes regarding infringement notices which can be reviewed through the Magistrate's Court.

## Other complaint

Any other type of complaint that is not within the scope of an Administrative Action Complaint or categorised within this policy will be directed to the CEO for assessment and review.

# Managing unreasonable conduct

Frivolous and vexatious complaints consume considerable time, resources, and finances with no benefit to the community or Council. A complaint deemed to be frivolous or vexatious will be managed in accordance with Council policy.

Frivolous or vexatious complaints include:

- Matters either deemed to be minor, in relation to higher priorities, that are not likely to
  cause a threat to public safety or financial loss to Council or others; that is, a complaint
  about a person illegally parked unless it is considered dangerous.
- A complainant who refuses to accept the decision of an authorised officer.
- A complainant who unreasonably refuses to deal with the officer appointed to undertake the review.
- A complainant who has consistently, over time, contacted Council about minor or the same matter/s, judged not to be a priority, resulting in unnecessary and costly consumption of Council resources, unless the subject matter is deemed to warrant investigation.
- Follow up calls about minor matters.
- Rhetorical comments; that is, 'can't anyone at Council do math?'
- A complainant who has a history of:
  - Making complaints and review requests about their issue / related issues and contacting or cc'ing other government agencies, Members of Parliament, Ministers or other people and organisations.
  - Complaining about Council or an officer's integrity or competence or taking their complaint to other forums alleging bias or corruption, because they are dissatisfied with the decision.
  - Giving forceful instructions about how their complaint should be dealt with and / or by whom.
  - Making unreasonable demands that organisational time and resources be spent dealing with their complaint.

# Contact with complainants

Council prefers that a complainant provides their name and contact details. This allows the CEO or nominated person, where necessary to invite the complainant to provide further information to assist in fully understanding the concerns, the issue to be investigated (if an investigation is to be undertaken) and the outcome or remedy sought in accordance with Council policy.

If a person requires assistance to lodge a complaint, assistance will be provided.

Council is committed to transparency. Council will, acknowledge receipt of the complaint in a timely manner, keep the complainant appropriately informed of the process steps and progress of the complaint, and / or the investigation and the outcome / actions of the decision.

Note: Anonymous complaints will be accepted and assessed where sufficient information has been provided to Council.

# Review options

Review options may include an internal review on the merits of the complaint, undertaken at the CEO's discretion, and / or an external review by an external agency such as the Queensland Ombudsman.

The complainant will be advised of review options when notified of the outcome of their complaint.

# Reporting an Administrative Action Complaint (AAC)

The CEO will report an Administrative Action Complaint in accordance with Council's Administrative Action Complaint Procedure and other legislation.

Council will maintain a record of all Administrative Action Complaints in a Complaints Register. Council's CEO or their delegate is responsible for:

- Assessing the complaint category and actioning the complaint accordingly.
- Conducting investigations were deemed necessary.
- Investigating complaints referred to Council either verbally or written, or by an external agency such as the Queensland Ombudsman.
- Providing advice to Council departments investigating the complaint.
- Providing progress reports to senior management, identifying, and advising of potential risks requiring immediate rectification.
- Liaising with state government agencies where required.
- Administering the complaints management process, providing formal and statistical reports, recommendations and associated administrative tasks.
- Facilitating educational awareness programs in relation to the Complaint Management policy and other related policies and procedures.
- Being the central registrar for Council's Complaint Register.
- Reviewing and reporting on complaints to Council's management team and Council as required.

Review and Renewal of the State Disaster Management Plan and the Prevention, Preparedness, Response and Recovery Disaster Management Guideline (DM Guideline)

Dear Mayor White

As you are aware, responsibility for disaster management functions have transitioned from the former Queensland Fire and Emergency Services (now the Queensland Fire Department) to the Queensland Police Service (QPS).

QPS is implementing a range of programs and activities to continue to support disaster management in Queensland. One of these programs is the review and renewal of the State Disaster Management Plan (SDMP) and the Prevention, Preparedness, Response and Recovery Disaster Management Guideline (DM Guideline).

As a result of the transition of disaster management functions, legislative changes to the *Queensland Disaster Management Act 2003*, *Disaster Management Regulation 2014*, and the substantial stakeholder engagement required to review and renew the SDMP and DM Guideline, the QPS will implement a three-phased approach to this work on behalf of the Queensland Disaster Management Committee (QDMC).

Phases one and two will be completed before the end of 2024 and will focus on changes linked to Administrative Arrangements Orders (No.1 and No.2) 2023, the Emergency Services Reform Amendment Bill 2023, and the Disaster Management and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2024. Given the legislative and administrative nature of these changes, stakeholder engagement will be limited to impacted Queensland Government departments during phases one and two of the program.

QUEENSLAND POLICE SERVICE

Phase three will commence in the second half of this year and will culminate in a comprehensively revised SDMP and DM Guideline. Extensive stakeholder consultation will be undertaken for phase three with engagement across Queensland's disaster management sector. Initial engagement rounds are anticipated to commence in July to September 2024. The QPS Doctrine and Guidelines team will be in contact with key stakeholders in the coming months to commence planning stakeholder engagement sessions.

Phase three will be the sector's opportunity to shape the SDMP and DM Guideline moving forward, and your organisation's participation is strongly encouraged. 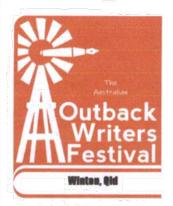

### **Workplace Health and Safety**

Work is ongoing to build the new Safety Management System. The Work Health and Safety induction materials have also been refreshed and updated to support the above and comply with an array of legislative obligations.

Workplace Health and Safety Inductions have been ongoing with high demand reflecting the upsurge in recruitment activity. To support induction and ongoing safety training, the month of June saw a continued integration of the new program into the System Management System. This on-line tool will enable safety inductions to be designed and tailored for each applicant depending upon work location and unique job characteristics. The department looks forward to creating a system in which inductions will be undertaken on-line or through interactive videos, safety questions/quizzes, enabling compliance with Codes of Practice and Queensland legislative requirements. The system also enables reports to be generated for a variety of administrative and compliance related purposes. Looking forward to creating these unique packages to roll out across the Departments within Winton Shire Council.

#### Work has also commenced on:

- First Aid and CPR Training has commenced 9–10 July, Corporate staff will commence their training first due to urgency with position descriptions across the organization. Then we will lock in a date for the Depot Works department soon.
- Health & Safety Representative Training has now been completed. HSRA Qld attended Winton Neighborhood centre over a 5-day training event. Committee has now attained the qualifications to represent their workplace. Certificates will now be logged with Workplace Health & Safety Queensland by WHS Officer.
- Breathalyzer has been purchased from "Alcolizer". Five units will be placed across WSC departments being the Depot, Neighbourhood Centre, Main office, Childcare and Waltzing Matilda Centre.
- New Incident form still to be implemented and Workplace Bullying Harassment form still to be completed and signed off.
- Fire Warden nominations and training will be next as a priority across the organization. Providers are being researched into commencing training by end of July.
- Several training events have been locked in for Works Depot staff. Chemical Skillset –
  Airport Radio Training EWP industry training. Several training will be looked into covering
  the rest of the year.
- Animal Control training, this issue of finding a suitable trainer is ongoing and being thoroughly researched, in the interim Council is still working with a mentor when needed.

## Information Technology

Physical connection of the new network in the Supper Room to support disaster recovery has begun and will be completed by late August.

A number of incremental cyber security controls and policies have been identified and upgraded over the last month. Internal procedures and processes have also been elevated.

Collaborated with the Waltzing Matilda Centre and the finance department on an efficiency project. This streamlined the WMC end-of-day cash counting process, resulting in a weekly labour savings of up to 20 hours.

Started work on the Waltzing Matilda Centre Point of Sale project. This will be rolled out in the café by the end of August with the information centre following suit in around November during the quiet season.

Engaged multiple vendors to start scoping the Standard Operating Environment project.

Responded to one critical internal cybersecurity incident in partnership with CyberCX.

Attended presentation of a Contractor Management System to enhance Workplace Health and Safety processes. Project kick off meeting being held mid-August.

Work on implementing the Staff Intranet is underway. A working group with members representing all the different departments of Council has been created to ensure the needs of all staff are represented. Rollout for this will be around end of August.

## **Governance Coordinator Report**

Policy and Procedure Reviews

#### General

Policy and procedure reviews continue. A prioritised list is consistently being updated as well as addressing requests for assistance in updating and creating documents.

The new area created for Registered Documents, accessible to all staff with access to infoXpert is being populated with documents as they are updated. This is also occurring as those documents published on the website are reviewed and the most recently Council adopted policy is identified.

The review of the currency of documents published on the Winton Shire Council website continues to make sure the most recent formally adopted documents are published.

Work on updating the Little Swaggies Childcare Policies in line with legislative changes is underway. There are 52 policies in this suite that will be reviewed over the next month.

#### **Complaints**

Policy in relation to Complaints has been reviewed and revised to better adhere to legislated requirements and will be submitted for Council review and adoption in August.

#### **Delegations**

- The delegations from Council to the CEO has been adopted.
- Delegations from the CEO to staff regarding financial matters have been incorporated into the published Procurement Procedure.
- Operational delegations from the CEO to staff will now be compiled now Council to the CEO delegations have been adopted. This work is scheduled for August 2024 and is based on information available from other Councils and from LGMA.

#### Risk Matrix / Registers

- A universal Risk Assessment Tool (which was one of the non-conformances in the WH&S Audit) has been completed and is yet to be reviewed by the Health and Safety Committee.
- A number of Risk Registers are in place across the organisation. It is anticipated that these can be consolidated into one working document for consistency.

#### Register of Registers

This document continues to be updated as more registers are discovered and will provide information that is required to be included in the Annual Report.

#### Complaints / Work Requests

#### **Administrative Action Complaints**

There is currently no active Administration Action Complaints.

#### **General Complaints**

There are 27 open complaints remaining with most of these relating to animal disturbance. The Authorised Officer (currently the Rural Services Officer in Longreach, under a Memorandum of Understanding arrangement) visited Winton in May, June and July and attended a number of the sources of these complaints.

It is anticipated a number of these complaints have been resolved and will be finalised when the requested reports are provided.

A Compliance Notice that was issued in relation to one complaint about the keeping of birds has now been largely addressed. An additional complaint received in relation to another property keeping birds has now also been served with a Compliance Notice that, it is anticipated, will resolve the two complaints lodged about the same matter.

As advised previously, a Compliance Notice was issued during one of the Authorised Officer's previous visits late last year and a further follow up has occurred.

#### Legal

#### **Local Laws**

With local laws enacted, work has begun on determining the processes and documentation required to enable compliance. Some processes in relation to the application for a permit for the keeping of animals and for parking of some vendors (for example, the deaf society selling tickets, visits by Services Australia, etc.) Initial work has been undertaken in relation to commercial vendors (for example, takeaway foods, etc.).

#### **Intellectual Property**

The registration of Intellectual Property has been completed with the exception of the registration of the animation. Governance has been advised by Economic Development that there are difficulties and costs involved in obtaining the animation that was adopted by Council and therefore no application has been lodged for the animation.

The process within IP Australia means that whilst all applications have been accepted, until the advertising and notification process within IP Australia has been completed, the full registration will not be provided.

#### **Contracts for Winton Shire Council Facilities**

#### Showgrounds Management

The Showgrounds Contract review is being progressed with consultation with Works to understand the scope of the work required scheduled with consultation with the current caretaker scheduled to occur during August. Further work on determining responsibilities will refine the final schedules to be included in the contract and will therefore determine what the contractor fees will be.

#### Other Winton Shire Council controlled facilities

The Winton Saleyards and Airport contracts are current and being monitored. The Airport Management contractors have been advised of the successful completion of the 3-month probationary period. The contract in relation to the Pool for the coming season (and off-season maintenance) is currently under review.

#### **Leases / Property**

Lawyers have provided draft lease documents that can be used in the future. Most agreements appear to have lapsed. The first agreement currently being progressed is for the Diamantina Heritage Truck & Machinery Museum. Whilst they have requested access to additional land, until this is resolved, a replacement of the elapsed agreement will be drafted.

#### **Animal Control**

The approved Animal Management Inspection Program has occurred with information provided by Winton Shire Council's Authorised Officer for Animal Control. The aim of the program was educating the public in relation to the keeping of animals.

Council has received advice regarding the training of Winton Shire Council employees to perform Animal Control activities. It is anticipated this will see three Council staff able to perform these duties in future which, it is anticipated, will mean complaints are addressed more efficiently at a local level.

#### State Penalties Enforcement Registry (SPER)

Offence Codes for Winton Shire Council have been lodged with SPER and are now active so that, when fines are levied, they may be referred to SPER to manage collection and enforcement of the fine.

#### Annual Operational Plan

Now that the final list of projects, included in the budget documents, has been agreed, the Annual Operational Plan is currently being compiled and is anticipated to be available for the September 2024 Council meeting.

#### **Annual Report**

The Senior Leadership Team has been requested to provide commentary in relation to their achievements over the 2023/2024 year to ensure the report is able to highlight what has been accomplished for the year.

The Annual Report will be compiled over the next month to draft, awaiting the final audited financial reports.

## **Economic Development**

#### **HOSPITATLITY & EVENTS**

It has been busy since the last week of June. This month has recorded the most significant sales at \$34,107 in 2024 thus far, the last month has the second highest sales at \$26,683. Bus groups came to Winton most days in July. The figures for sales as well as the number of visitors at the cafe could be considered to have reached the peak of the season this year. The biggest contribution of the sales every month was hot coffee. Toast was the basically highest in the food menu. Also, Croissants which were displayed in the cabinet became one of the second most popular items. It was a successful month for both walk ins and catering in July.

#### COUNCIL COMMUNITY NEWSLETTER

The latest issue of the Council Community newsletter has been circulated, featuring extensive coverage and photographs of the various events that took place in Winton throughout July. Additionally, updates and news on projects and works pertinent to the community and shire of Winton are provided by council departments.

#### WINTON 150 YEAR WEEKEND CELEBRATIONS- 2025

The Winton 150 Year Celebration weekend is progressing with the refinement of the suppliers and quotes for the main events within the weekend. Regular meetings are conducted with event organiser, Decinda and Hollie from Events Society. A volunteer Coordinator Committee is being organised for activities such as Tag-a-long Tours, the Grand Parade, Historical Displays and Walks, an Info Hub, and Reunion Registrations. We have met with and discussed opportunities for both schools to be involved in the weekend and Events Coordinator is meeting with the Creative Arts Group regarding Vintage Style markets and a Trades from the Past working display. The design of merchandise specific to this celebration is currently being designed and John Elliott will soon begin his research for the Winton 150 Year Anniversary book.

#### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UPDATE**

The Economic Development team attended the Australia Dinosaur Trail meeting in Richmond on Thursday July 25 and later visited the Kronosaurus Korner Centre in Richmond. Representatives of Council and Councillors from the three shires, Richmond, Flinders, and Winton were in attendance. Discussions considered reducing the current annual expenditure on social media and that it be managed by the Kronosaurus Korner; expanding the Dinosaur Trail to include Quilpie, Longreach, Mt Isa, and Boulia Shires; establish a dedicated website and address ticketing issues that all Council Shire VIC's have encountered. Discussions also included establishing a new MOU and monthly reporting and acquittal requirements.

All officers of the department attended the LGMA Council Report Writing workshop on 24 July which provided understanding of local government structure, references to policy and procedure and a clear direction and guidelines on researching, writing, and editing a report with a principle=based approach and relevant to the audience, primarily Councillors.

Tourism collateral in the form of Winton Town/Region Map Pads have been updated and printed; the Winton Tourism booklet has been updated and is currently in print; and the Waltzing Matilda Centre guest booklet is also being updated by Cox Architecture and will proceed to print shortly.

The fortnightly 4LG Bush Beats segment with Wattsy on a Friday continues to highlight events, news and activities in Winton and the region.

As part of Economic Development Australia accreditation, the economic development officer attended a Circular Horizons Webinar which engaged RDA Australia and Penrith City Council discussing innovative approaches and the 5-year roadmap with timeframes, initiatives across departments and resources to value add and build a better understanding of circular economy principles and involvement with all relevant stakeholders.

#### TOURISM SIGNAGE AUDIT

The Economic development team is in the final stage of finalising the successful company.

#### **WISE AND WELL IN WINTON HEALTH CARE STRATEGY**

The Winton Wise and Well Health Strategy is near completion with consultants producing a final draft for Council consideration and discussion for later this week.

#### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY AND ACTION PLAN**

Council is still currently evaluating tenders received for the preparation of the 2024-2029 Economic Development Strategy and Action Plan. This is a timely process to ensure the successful advisory firm offers expertise in regional economic development, diversification and economic initiatives, stakeholder consultation and works collaboratively with Winton Shire Council to ensure the region is sustainable, competitive and offers a community with modern infrastructure and quality essential services to enable liveability, and wellbeing, while sustaining current and future population growth.

#### **OUTTBACK REGIONAL GALLERY**

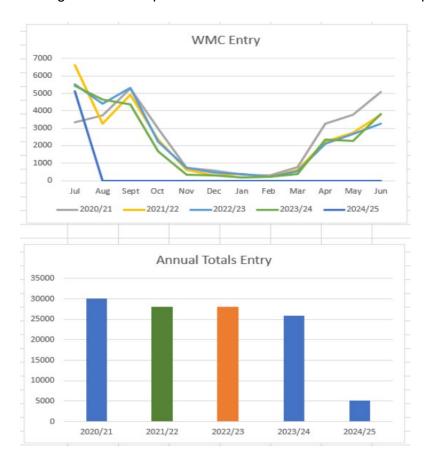
Queensland Boulder Opal Associations 2024 Queen of Gems Awards opened to the public on Saturday 6th July at the Outback Regional Gallery celebrating Winton's signature gemstone – Boulder Opal. The Awards presentation night on Saturday 13th July coinciding with Winton's Opal Festival attracted 120 people to the opening event and from over 40 entries the winners from each section announced. Entries included local and international talent with some entrants travelling as far as USA and Switzerland. Winton Shire Council Mayor Cathy White opened the event.

The 2023 National Photographic Portrait Prize, a touring exhibition from the National Portrait Gallery opened at the Outback Regional Gallery on Saturday 20th July. The National Photographic Portrait Prize exhibition is selected from a national field of entries, reflecting the distinctive vision of Australia's aspiring and professional portrait photographers and the unique nature of their subjects, and supported by the National Collecting Institutions Touring and Outreach Program, an Australian Government program aiming to improve access to the national collections for all Australians. Special guests visiting on the evening included Sarah Johnson, Senior Curator Qantas Founders Museum Longreach, Brett Aldington CEO Museums and Galleries NSW. The exhibition will be on display until 11 October.

The 2025 John Villiers Outback Art Prize Call for Entries will open this month seeking artworks with the theme: Outback: A Sense of Place. The prize open to Adult and Emerging Youth Categories is generously supported by The John Villiers Trust, Winton Shire Council and Ros Kavanagh of Elders Insurance Central Queensland.

#### WALTZING MATILDA CENTRE

- Visitor numbers for July 2024 Entry to WMC 3117 with an additional 2023 walk-ins
- July was a busy month for the Waltzing Matilda Centre, significantly influenced by the Opal Festival and the influx of travellers from both the Big Red Bash and Boulia Camel races.
- The Opal festival was a major highlight of the month, attracting numerous visitors from across the globe.
- The Winton Showgrounds was opened to accommodate the overflow camping.



#### SOCIAL MEDIA

In terms of reach, WMC's posts collectively reached 18.4K users, which is a decrease of 19.5%. This decline is largely due to one exceptional post regarding the Top Tiny Tourism Town, which achieved a remarkable reach of 13K. This post outperformed our average reach by 1,686%, generating 1,953% more reactions and 3,200% more comments compared to our median posts in June.

The account recorded a total of 694 content interactions, indicating a 21.8% engagement rate. Additionally, 7 clicks on our webpage link, showcasing a substantial 600% increase. The total website visits of WMC for the month reached 1.2K, which is a significant 117.7% increase

compared to June. An increase of link clicks should be considered as one of the key factors to improve the number of the visitors at the centre since it has potential that directly leads to the booking system. The most successful content during this period was the QBOA Festival post, which was shared 28 times, indicating strong interest and engagement.

It is demonstrated that the more posts, the more followers, likes and interactions. Therefore, it is essential for WMC to adopt a more proactive and strategic approach to the social media efforts. By increasing the activity and focusing on targeted content, it brings about enhancing engagement with the target audience and ensure WMC stay competitive in the tourism industry. It is apparent that WMC's Facebook and Instagram accounts are required to increase the activities as other benchmarks do.

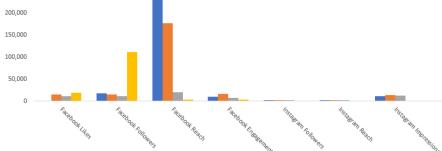

A workshop took place at Oondooroo Station, where numerous buildings were available for painting and viewing. A variety of artwork was showcased by the end of the day.

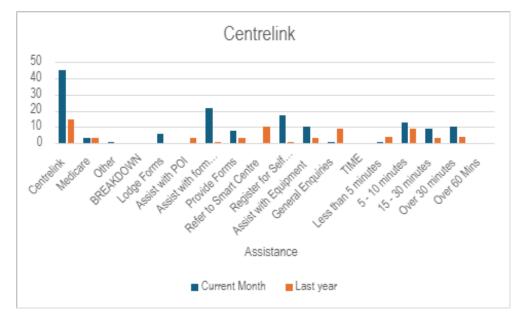

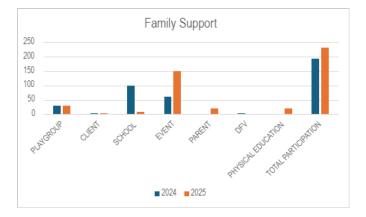
#### **Playgroup**

#### **WINTON 60 & BETTER**

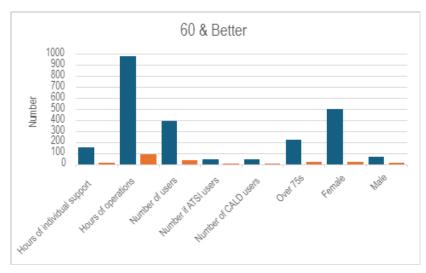

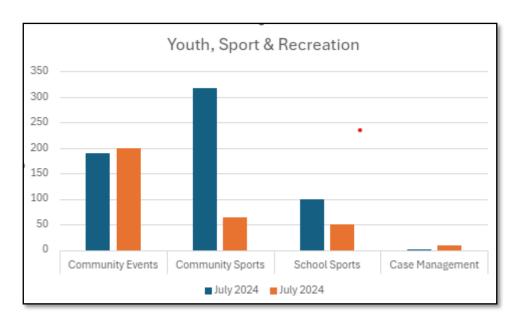


#### **Pancake Breakfast**

#### **COMMUNITY CARE**

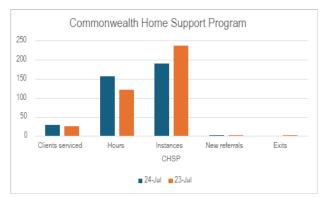

Going forward, we are looking into having this event run annually, in turn we encourage all feedback and suggestions.





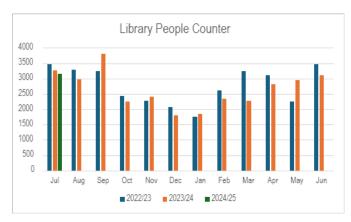
#### **LIBRARY**

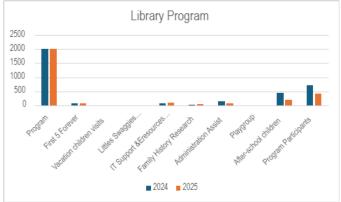

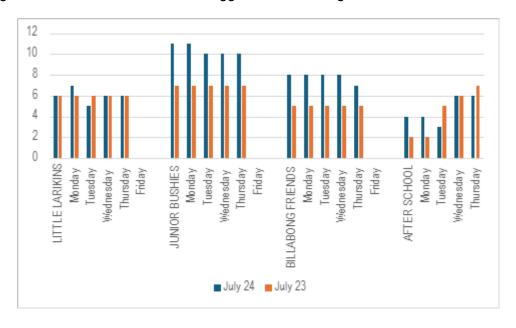


#### **CHILDCARE**

#### **REPORT**

#### **PARKS AND FACILITIES**

#### Parks & Public Areas

- During the month of July, the Parks & Facilities team continued to maintain all parks and garden areas.
- The team continues to attend to the requests of Snap Send Solves as efficiently as possible while still prioritising daily duties.

#### **Show Grounds**

- The Showgrounds lawns and gardens have been maintained regularly.

#### **Recreational Grounds**

- The Recreational Grounds precinct was mowed, and whipper snipped.

#### **Swimming Pool**

- The Swimming Pool lawns have been mowed and all garden areas tidied.

#### **Street Sweeping**

 Street Sweeping was carried out on a weekly basis but has now stopped due to a leaking seal on the collection bin lifting arm. This has been sent back to the manufacturer to be repaired under warranty.

#### **Vegetation and Vermin Control**

 Weed control continued against unwanted vegetation on footpaths and other open areas with the continued assistance from the Stock Routes team. This is ongoing and these areas are continuously being poisoned and mowed.

#### **Winton Aerodrome**

- Regular bi-weekly inspections were carried out with the area slashed and poisoned.
- Extra patrols have been carried out before each take-off and landing due to the increased numbers of bird life. This is being monitored regularly.

#### **Undertaking and Cemetery**

- The Cemetery lawns and gardens have been mowed and hedged and the Monument section has been poisoned.

- One funeral was conducted in July.

## **Refuse Collection & Landfill**

- Town garbage collection is continuing on schedule.
- Rubbish truck was in the workshop for three days undergoing repairs to the bin extension arm. The rubbish collection was completed by hand on these days with the assistance of the work camp.

# **RURAL LANDS**

#### **Water Facilities**

- The updates to the Agbots have been completed successfully.
- Minor trough repairs were carried out at Karoola, Mountain Dam and Canis.
- Fencing work at the Grove is complete and Nadjayamba's works have commenced.
- Contractors from the Leaky Bore Project have visited the Menin and Mackunda water facilities to assess the sites before beginning work that is scheduled for November or December 2024.
- Two water runs were completed.

#### Weeds

- Spraying has begun at the Karoola water facility after a request was submitted to remove the new growth of prickly acacia trees at the facility. This has been suspended until the team have obtained their required certificates.
- Chemical handling training has been scheduled for the second week in August and once this has been completed spraying will continue.

#### **Baiting**

- The new financial year has seen the bounties for wild dogs reopen with twenty scalps claimed and mapped so far.

#### Common, Reserves and Stock Routes

- The common is still closed to new users or additional stock.
- Stock levels are looking good, however extra stock could heavily impact the stores for the year.
- The horse common has a lot of feed, and a survey of the fencing has been completed to identify any maintenance which needs to be completed.
- A regular feed assessment will start in the beginning of August to ensure that the feed reserve is in good condition.

#### General

- The team has been low staffed for the past month with one acting Rural Lands Officer and one Labourer.
- Applications for a new Labourer have been received and interviews have concluded.

 Applications for the Rural Services Manager have closed and interviews will be scheduled shortly.
