# **Background Objective**

## **QUESTION**

Can Council be supplied with a report outlining the vehicles ascertained under the vehicle management policy in the current portfolios:

- Private Use
- Commuter use
- Use of Private vehicles

#### **RESPONSE BY INTERIM CEO:**

Council's Motor Vehicle Policy provides guidelines and criteria relating to:-

- the private use of Council vehicles,
- the commuter use of Council vehicles and
- the use of private vehicles for work purposes.

#### Private use of Council vehicles

The granting of private use of a Council vehicle is not operationally driven but is a benefit provided as part of an employee's total remuneration package.

For Council to be able to attract and retain quality staff it must offer competitive remuneration packages. Private use of a vehicle is a common component of Local Government competitive remuneration packages especially for executive staff.

As it is a component of an employee's Contract of Employment the granting of the benefit rests with the CEO.

For Winton Shire, 5 employees enjoy some form of private use rights.

#### **Commuter use of Council vehicles**

Commuter use is defined as use of a Council vehicle to travel to and from the employee's principal residence to work.

Whilst commuter use offers some benefit to the employee, its application is solely operational efficiency.

Commuter use is granted primarily to employees who are required to work weekends or outside of normal office and depot hours or to be on call or to respond to out of hours incidents.

It provides for a timelier response and avoids having to respond via a trip to the depot to collect required equipment and materials.

Commuter use is granted to 8 Winton Shire employees.

#### The use of private vehicles for work purposes

Notwithstanding that Council's Motor vehicle policy discourages the use of employee's private vehicles, it recognizes that in some instances it is more efficient to pay a travel allowance of 88cents per kilometre than increase the size of the vehicle fleet.

Whilst using private vehicles may be acceptable on occasions, it should not become a regular occurrence.

For the period from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2024 until 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2025 there was only 3 employee claims for travel reimbursement totally \$343.40.

Anecdotally the incidence of staff using their own vehicles for work purposes is greater than what has been claimed.

Meet the requirement to uphold our insurance obligations and termed conditions to ensure Council's integrity is being met?

#### **RESPONSE BY INTERIM CEO:**

I have reviewed Council's obligations under our vehicles insurance policy and against the Council policies listed in Cr Dorries.

The policy of most relevance is our Motor Vehicle Policy

Both our insurance policy and our Motor Vehicle policy stipulate similar obligations in regard to: -

- the safe operation of vehicle,
- its care and maintenance,
- compliance with all relevant laws.

The Motor vehicle policy is more detailed than the Insurance Policy in most areas except four areas where the insurance policy is quite specific.

Council's Motor Vehicle states "The vehicle must be driven in a safe and responsible way with due regard to the road conditions"

Whereas our Insurance Policy provides specific examples namely: -

- Move your vehicle away from rising waters including tides
- Don't drive into waters greater than it is designed for
- Don't leave your keys in the vehicle when unattended
- Load your vehicle in accordance with legal and safety requirements

As Council's Motor Vehicle policy is due for review these four specific areas could be considered in the reviewed policy.

# 9 QUESTIONS (WITHOUT DEBATE) FOR WHICH NOTICE HAS NOT BEEN GIVEN

# The following questions have been asked by Cr Tina Elliott:

1. Can Council be given an update on the Extension of Industrial Estate Project?

## **Response by Acting DOW:**

- Drawings for the construction of the internal road and widening on the Hughenden road are complete. An application has been submitted to ergon for the power supply. Council will prepare the tender documents for the civil construction of the internal road and roadworks on Hughenden road. It is anticipated the tender would be released by the end of march. Quotations are still outstanding for the extension of water to the subdivision.
- 2. When can council expect the confidential report on the finalisation of the underpayment of the neighbourhood centre wages? (as per January report to Council 13.8 UNDER PAID WAGES).

## **Response by Interim CEO:**

 Given the processes council is required to still complete I would not expect to be in a position to provide a final report until the April 2025 ordinary meeting at the earliest.

## **Required Process**

- All employees identified by Payroll audit as being underpaid during the period 25th November 2018 to 18th June 2023 were provided with a detailed explanation, an underpayment calculation and a Deed of Settlement and Release by Registered mail dated 7th March 2025.
- O Note: Given the elapse in time, ascertaining addresses for some of the past employees has been time consuming.
- Each employee, if in agreement with the underpaid calculations are requested to sign and return the Deed of Settlement and Release by 20th March 2025.
- O Payments can be drawn forthwith once each deed of settlement and release is signed and returned.
- O Those employees who dispute the calculations are invited to provide the basis for their dispute for further consideration by Council's payroll auditor.
- 3. In the absence of a Plant and Machinery 10 Year Replacement Plan, can council be advised of the number of motor vehicles within the fleet and how many are accessible as pool cars?

#### **Response by Interim CEO:**

 Motor Vehicles are defined to include our light fleet of SUVs, Sedans, Twin cabs and Single cab Utes. In total there are 27 vehicles excluding the Workshop Ute (insurance write off) the Administration Aurion-(Unserviceable) and SES vehicle.

In accordance with Council's Motor Vehicle policy all vehicles are required to be available for employee use as pool vehicles during office hours.

From an operational practice this is quite unworkable. Some vehicles are equipped for specific functions and from an operational perspective must be always available to a specific operator of function.eg Hearse, plumber's Ute, Cleaners Ute, workshop vehicle etc.

Other vehicles have been purchased to meet a business function and may be driven by several different employees. However, there is no specific vehicle within the organisation with the single function of being a "pool" vehicle.

With the demise of the Administration's Aurion the CEO's vehicle is presently fulfilling the role of a pool vehicle. The Ute assigned to the WHS role can also be used at times as pool vehicle.

The Mayor's vehicle, whilst technically a pool vehicle given Council's Motor Vehicle policy, is considered a pool vehicle of last resort given the Mayor's position in the organisation and in view of the fact that, unlike employees, the Mayor has no obligation to attend the office from 8.30am to 5.00pm Monday to Friday

At the Depot and Neighbourhood Centre there are sufficient vehicles whilst having a business purpose can also be utilised to meet travel requirements of staff.

4. Can Council be advised if the three streams of funding for the new youth centre have or will be receipted within the 2025 FY? (\$1,040,000 W4Q LDRC, \$300,000 QRRRF and \$537,928 RRG = \$1,877,928.)

## **Response by Interim Finance Manager:**

GBA are in the process of consolidating acquittal processes to secure the balance of funding, of which \$1,224,426 has already been received over several years based on milestone payments.

#### 5. What is the additional \$150,000 funding required for the Water Automation Project?

#### Response by Interim CEO:

The adopted budget predicted a total Project Cost of \$600,000, however expenditure to date plus commitments will result in a 2024/25 Expenditure of \$750,000, \$150,000 greater than budgeted.

In order to gain a better understanding of what has transpired with this project the Interim CEO and Acting DOW met on Thursday 13th March with the Owner and the Project Manager of ARCS, the company engaged to Project Manage the Water Automation project.

From those discussions it is apparent that the project has crossed several financial years, incurred cost delays in delivery and in addition to the Water Scada construction project the scope has expanded to include initial works for Sewerage SCADA, Water Master Planning, SCADA maintenance agreements and supports for Qld Audit Offices Queensland Regional Water Quality Report.

- ARCS have committed to provide a detailed account of their work in order to clarify this expenditure. This material will enable staff to provide a more detailed report to the April Council meeting.
- 6. Can Council be given an update on the Single Ramp Hall Entry Project is at?

# **Response by Acting DOW:**

- The Survey was completed on Friday 28 February and an Engineering Consultancy is preparing the design. The Tender documents are being prepared concurrently to minimise any delay in releasing the Tender.

#### **SUMMARY**

This report seeks to amend Council's Procurement Policy by incorporating amendments to and alignment of purchasing thresholds below \$15,000 to meet contemporary business practices.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

- 1. THAT the report be received.
- 2. THAT Council Adopt the amended Procurement Policy WIN-FIN-POL-007 as presented.

#### **REPORT**

This report incorporates an updated policy with amendments and is presented as the clean Procurement Policy for adoption.

Key amendments to the Policy incorporate:

- > Removal of duplicated references to the identical text under each of the 'Entering into particular contracts' field and incorporating the amended and concise version at the start.
- > Amendment of Purchases up to \$1,000 to a contemporary value of \$3,000;
- Addition of flexibility surrounding purchases from \$3,000 to \$8,000; and,
- Single quotations required for purchases \$8,000 to \$15,000.

These amendments have been driven to achieve operational efficiency and red-tape reduction as the former requirements were internally costly and added to impost on suppliers to prepare formal quotations for small-value works, which is ultimately passed on to Council as the consumer.

We are finding regularly contractors are unwilling to quote on works greater than \$1,000 (only a handful of hours plus materials) due to the draconian requirements of the existing policy which does not appear to have been comprehensively required for a significant period of time.

Council's Local Price Preferencing is addressed with a clause in purchases up to \$3,000 wherever possible, and an equally comparative product can be procured, must be awarded to a local supplier'.

Up to \$15,000 wherever possible, and an equally comparative product can be procured, must be awarded to a local or Regional supplier.

The \$15,000 to \$200,000 threshold is legislated and cannot be amended, nor can the 'Large purchases above \$200,00'.

All of the thresholds are governed by the Local Preference clause within the Policy (illustrated below):

## Local preference

Council will encourage and support the development of Local Business by providing locally based businesses (businesses that are either based or employ permanent staff in the Winton Shire) a margin on pricing compared to an external business as per the following:

- ➤ Up to \$15,000: a margin in excess of 15% subject to commercial value will be considered, with Due Diligence and reflection on past performance considered,
- > \$\$15,001 to \$1,000,000 (15%) > \$1,000,001 to \$5,000,000 (7.5%).
- More than \$5,000,000 (5.0%).

#### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

There has been mention of procurement processes in audit reports, therefore the adoption of the policy and procedure are seen to assist in addressing some of the issues raised. These documents also assist in adhering to legislation, that is, s104 of the *Local Government Act 2009*. The risk has been assessed as Minor 2 (Consequence) and Unlikely 2 (Likelihood) giving an overall assessment of Low L-7 if the documents are adopted.



# **Procurement**

**POLICY** 

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# Purpose

The purpose of this Winton Shire Council (Council) policy is to provide a framework for Council to implement a transparent, commercially efficient and accountable process for the procurement and purchase of goods and services.

# Scope

This policy applies to:

- Procurement activities across the organisation, who will also require the assistance and support of suppliers and relevant organisations to achieve its corporate goals and objectives.
- The materials, products and services procured by Council, including items procured by third parties, for example, contractors, acting as representatives for Council.

#### **Definitions**

Term	What it means / refers to
Chief Executive	Refers to the person appointed to the position of CEO under the Act
Officer (CEO)	and anyone acting in that position.
Council	Winton Shire Council (WSC)
The Act	Refers to the Local Government Act 2009 (Qld).
The Regulation	Refers to the Local Government Regulation 2012 (Qld)
Procurement	Refers to the purchase, hire, lease, rental, exchange or any other commercial transaction involving the outlay of funds in return for the provision of goods, services to Council or third parties acting as representatives for Council.

# **Policy statement**

Council will purchase goods and services in such a way that procure the most appropriate products and services to facilitate effective service delivery in a cost-effective manner providing transparent opportunities for suppliers to compete for Council business.

When purchasing materials and services, Council will have regard to the whole of life cost of items procured, the social and economic benefit to the community from the transaction and the principles of good governance, fairness and transparency in decision making both in the selection and administration of purchase transactions.

# **Local Government principles**

The primary goal of any Council procurement activity is to achieve the best value-for-Winton outcome. Value-for-Winton does not just entail the price, but broader considerations such as life costs, past performance, commercial and other risks, compatibilities and local factors. The lowest price may not be the best overall option.

Anyone with procurement responsibilities governed by the *Local Government Act 2009*, must act in accordance with the listed Local Government Principles (LGA 4(2)). The requirement to uphold the Local Government Principles is a statutory requirement applying equally to

Council staff members and elected members of Council. The Local Government Principles are outlined in Section 4(2) of the Act and are listed below:

- Transparent and effective processes, and decision-making in the public interest.
- Sustainable development and management of assets and infrastructure and the delivery
  of effective services.
- Democratic representation, social inclusion and meaningful community engagement.
- · Good governance of, and by, Local Government.
- Ethical and legal behaviour of councillors and local government employees.

Councillors and staff must make all decisions in respect to the operation and management of Council consistently with these principles.

Council officers responsible for the procurement of goods and services must comply with this policy. It is the responsibility of all Council officers involved in the procurement process to understand the meaning and intent of this policy.

# Purchase criteria

Council will consider a range of criteria when making a purchasing decision and selecting suppliers of both products and services.

Price is not the sole determinant of vendor or product selection for Council.

The range of factors that Council may consider when selecting items to be purchased and the vendors to supply said goods include:

- Quality of the materials.
- · Whole of life cost of the asset.
- Skills and qualifications of the supplier.
- Price.
- Reputation of the supplier.
- Social impact/benefit to the community of the transaction.
- · Economic impact/benefit to the community of the transaction.
- Environmental implications of the purchase decision.
- · Safety implications of the purchase decision.
- Value for money.

The relative weighting of the different components will depend both on the value of the transaction and the materials or services being procured. For transactions where public tenders are called the relative weighting of each criteria will be clearly identified in the tender documents. For smaller purchases the weighting will be considered subject to this policy.

# **Procurement principles**

The Regulation provides for Council to either adopt the "default contracting procedures" in Part 3 of the Regulation or formulate its own procedures as prescribed by Part 2 of the Regulation (Strategic contracting procedures). It has been considered prudent to adopt the default procedures provided under Part 3.

The meaning and intent of the Act's principles can be achieved for this Policy by ensuring the following Council Procurement Principles.

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## Value for money Local Government Act 2009 s104(3)(a)

Council must harness its purchasing power to achieve the best value for money. The concept of value for money is not restricted to price alone. The value for money assessment must include consideration of:

- Contribution to the advancement of Council's corporate outcomes and policies.
- Non-cost factors such as fit for purpose, quality services, sustainability, risk exposure.
- Cost related factors including whole of life costs, transaction costs associated with the
  acquisition, use, holding, availability of maintenance and support and disposal possibilities.

The value of any associated environmental benefits.

# Open and effective competition Local Government Act 2009 s104(3)(b)

Purchasing should be open and result in effective competition in the provision of goods and services. Council must give fair and equitable consideration to all prospective suppliers.

# Encouragement of the development of competitive local business and industry *Local Government Act 2009 s104(3)(c)*

Council encourages the development of competitive local businesses. In considering any acquisition the impact of that acquisition may be considered in the context as to how it influences outcomes within the Shire of Winton first, and adjoining Councils plus the Blackall / Tambo Regional Council second. Where price, performance, quality, suitability and other evaluation criteria are comparable, the following areas may be considered in evaluating offers:

- The potential creation of local employment opportunities.
- · The probability of locally or regionally available servicing support.
- A shorter communication span in contract management.
- Economic growth within the local area.
- Benefits to Council through associated local commercial transaction.

#### Environmental protection Local Government Act 2009 s104(3)(d)

Council promotes environmental protection and sustainability through its purchasing procedures. In undertaking any purchasing activities Council will:

- Promote the purchase of environmentally friendly goods and services that satisfy value for money criteria.
- Foster the development of products and processes of low environmental and climatic impact.
- Provide an example to business, industry and the community by promoting the use of climatically and environmentally friendly goods and services.
- · Encourage and promote environmentally responsible activities.

#### Ethical behaviour and fair dealing Local Government Act 2009 s104(3)(e)

Council officers involved in purchasing are to behave with impartiality, fairness, independence, openness, integrity, and professionalism in their discussions and negotiations with suppliers and their representatives.

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# Entering into particular contracts

# Small purchases under \$15,000 (excluding GST)

Prior to making purchases, a purchase requisition or a credit card transaction must be approved by an officer as authorised under Council's purchasing procedure. Once a purchase requisition has been completed, a purchase order must be obtained and given to the supplier to enable the order number to be quoted on the invoice.

# Petty Cash

Up to \$200.00 may be spent out of petty cash, except as authorised by the Finance Manager.

# Purchases up to \$3,000

No written quotation is required.

Due Diligence is compulsory when pre-determining an estimate of engagement value, ensuring transparency and commercial value is defensible.

Wherever possible, and an equally comparative product can be procured, a local supplier must be utilised.

# Purchases between \$3,000 and up to \$8,000

Purchases must be undertaken by:

- Accessing a Preferred Supplier Arrangement (PSA).
- Obtaining at least one valid verbal quote (sole supplier situations excepted) documented in the Notes forming part of the electronic requisition record.
- · Accessing a Local Buy contract.
- Wherever possible, and an equally comparative product can be procured, a local supplier must be utilised.

## Purchases between \$8,000 and \$15,000

Purchases must be undertaken by:

- Accessing a Preferred Supplier Arrangement (PSA).
- Obtaining at least one written quote (email is sufficient) (sole supplier situations excepted) documented and attached in the Notes forming part of the electronic requisition record.
- Accessing a Local Buy contract.
- Wherever possible, and an equally comparative product can be procured, a local or regional supplier must be utilised.

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# Medium purchases between \$15,000 and \$200,000 (excluding GST)

Section 225 of the *Local Government Regulation 2012* requires Council to invite written quotations before making a contract for the carrying out of work or the supply of goods or services involving a cost of between \$15,000 and \$200,000.

The invitation must be given to at least three persons who Council considers can meet its requirements at competitive prices. In the first instance, the invitation will be completed via the Preferred Supplier Arrangement.

Where there are no suppliers for that requirement, Council will seek quotes or advertise appropriately. Exceptions for medium purchases are noted in the section headed Exceptions.

# Large purchases above \$200,000 (excluding GST)

Section 226 of the *Local Government Regulation 2012* requires that before making a contract for the carrying out of work, or the supply of goods or services involving a cost of more than \$200,000, Council must either:

- Invite written tenders under section 228 subsection (4) of the Regulations.
- Invite expressions of interest under section 228 subsection (5) before considering whether
  to invite written tenders. (The decision to invite expressions of interest can only be decided
  by Council by resolution).

The invitation for tenders and expressions of interest will be published on the Council's website for at least 21 days and will allow for written tenders and expressions of interest to be given to Council while the invitation is published on the website. Tenders and expressions of interest will also be advertised in the Winton Herald and other publications where required, during the 21-day period.

Purchases over the value of \$200,000 need to be adopted by Council at either an Ordinary or Special Meeting of Council. Exceptions for large purchases are noted in the section headed Exceptions.

# **Exceptions**

# For medium and large contracts

Council may enter into a medium or large sized contract without first inviting written quotes or tenders under the following circumstances, and only with prior approval from the CEO:

- A quote or tender consideration plan has been approved by Council for the particular goods and services. (Section 230 of the Regulation)
- A Council approved contractor list (Section 231 of the Regulation)
- · A Council approved register of pre-qualified suppliers. (Section 232 of the Regulation)
- A Council approved preferred supplier arrangement. (Section 233 of the Regulation)
- Local Buy An LGA Arrangement in association with LGAQ and its subsidiaries (Section 234 of the Regulation).

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When assessing the most effective method of obtaining goods and / or services, Council officers should consider the administrative and price costs to Council of seeking tenders or quotations independently and the reduction of these costs which can be achieved by use of LGAQ and its subsidiaries.

Additional exceptions are permissible where Council considers one of the following circumstances is evident:

- · Council is satisfied that only one supplier is reasonably available.
- Council determines that due to the specialised or confidential nature of the services sought, it would be impractical or disadvantageous for Council to invite quotes or tenders.
- A genuine emergency exists as determined by the Mayor or CEO.
- · The contract is for the purchase of goods and is made by auction.
- The contract is for the purchase of second-hand goods.
- The contract is made with, or under arrangement with, a government body.

## Local preference

Council will encourage and support the development of Local Business by providing locally based businesses (businesses that are either based or employ permanent staff in the Winton Shire) a margin on pricing compared to an external business as per the following:

- Up to \$15,000: a margin in excess of 15% subject to commercial value will be considered, with Due Diligence and reflection on past performance taken into account, ,
- \$\$15,001 to \$1,000,000 (15%)
- \$1,000,001 to \$5,000,000(7.5%).
- More than \$5,000,000 (5.0%).

# Publishing details of particular contracts

As soon as practicable after entering a contract worth \$200,000 (excluding GST) or more, the relevant details of the contract must be published on Council's website and must be included in the register of contracts over \$200,000 (excluding GST) available from reception at the Winton Shire Council Office.

Relevant details include the person with whom Council has entered the contract, the value of the contract and the purpose of the contract.

#### Valuable non-current asset contracts

Section 227 of the Local Government Regulation 2012 provides that Council cannot enter a valuable non-current asset contract unless it first:

- · Invites written tenders for the contract under section 228 of the Regulation, or
- Offers the non-current asset for sale by auction.

A valuable non-current asset is:

- Land.
- Another non-current asset that has an apparent value that is equal to or more than a limit set by the local government.

Procurement Policy Page 8 of 9

A limit set by the local government under subsection 224 (7)(b) cannot be more than the following amount:

- For plant or equipment \$5,000.
- For another type of non-current asset \$10,000.

The requirements specified above are subject to the exceptions identified in section 236 of the *Local Government Regulation 2012*.

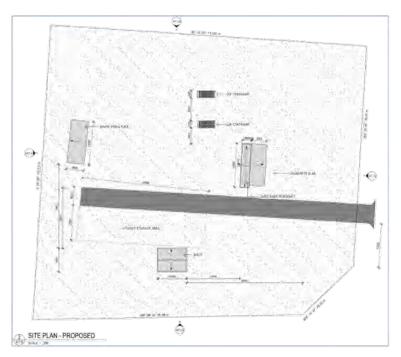


Figure 1 - Proposed Development within Subject Site

#### Schedule 10

(a) State Transport Corridor

Pursuant to Schedule 10, Part 9, Division 4, Subdivision 2, Table 4, a development application for a material change of use requires referral, if all or part of the premises:

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(a) are within 25m of a State transport corridor (Railway corridor) or

The subject site adjoins the Central Western System (Railway corridor) on the western boundary. Therefore, the application requires referral to the State Assessment and Referral Agency (SARA) in respect of State transport corridor matters.

#### Referral of the Development Application

In accordance with the PReg, as set out above, the development application was appropriately referred to SARA, by the applicant, for assessment of the proposal against State Code 2. The application was properly referred to SARA on 21 January 2025, as advised in the Referral Confirmation Notice of the same date.

(Note: The applicant did not refer the application within the 10 days of receipt of the Confirmation Notice, that is, by 2 January 2025, as prescribed by section 5.1 of the DA Rules. The applicant revived the application on 14 January 2025, in accordance with section 31.2 of the DA Rules.)

SARA issued an Information Request on 4 February 2025. The applicant provided a response to the Information Request on 11 February 2025.

On 4 March 2025, SARA provided a referral agency response – two conditions. These conditions are included in Part B of Attachment A – Recommended Conditions of Development Approval.

#### Central West Regional Plan (February 2009)

The Planning Minister has identified that the Winton Shire Council Planning Scheme appropriately advances the Central West Regional Plan. Therefore, separate assessment of the development application against the Regional Plan is not required.

#### State Planning Policy (July 2017) – Part E.

The State Planning Policy is appropriately integrated in the Planning Scheme. Therefore, separate assessment of the development application against the Policy is not required.

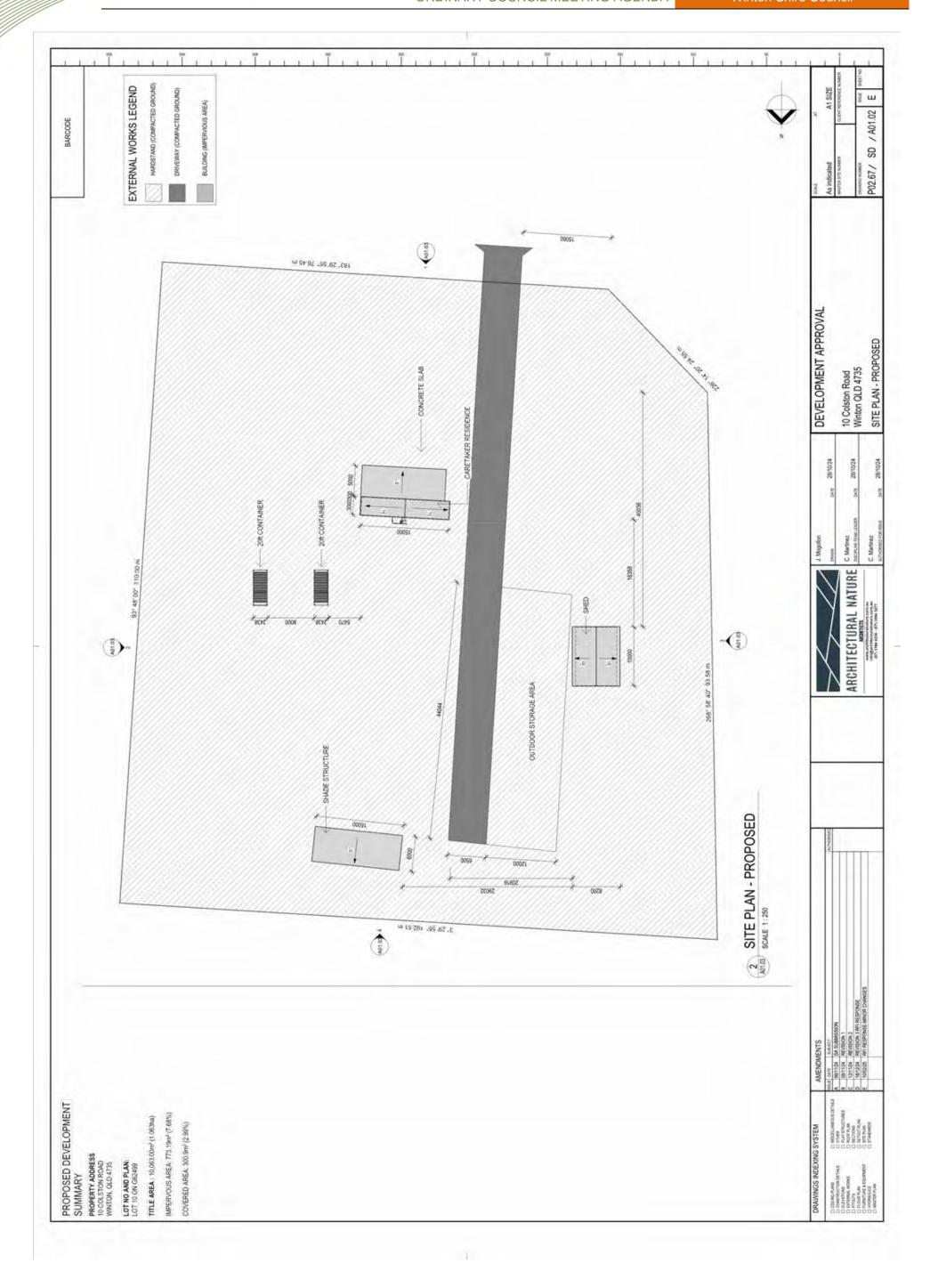

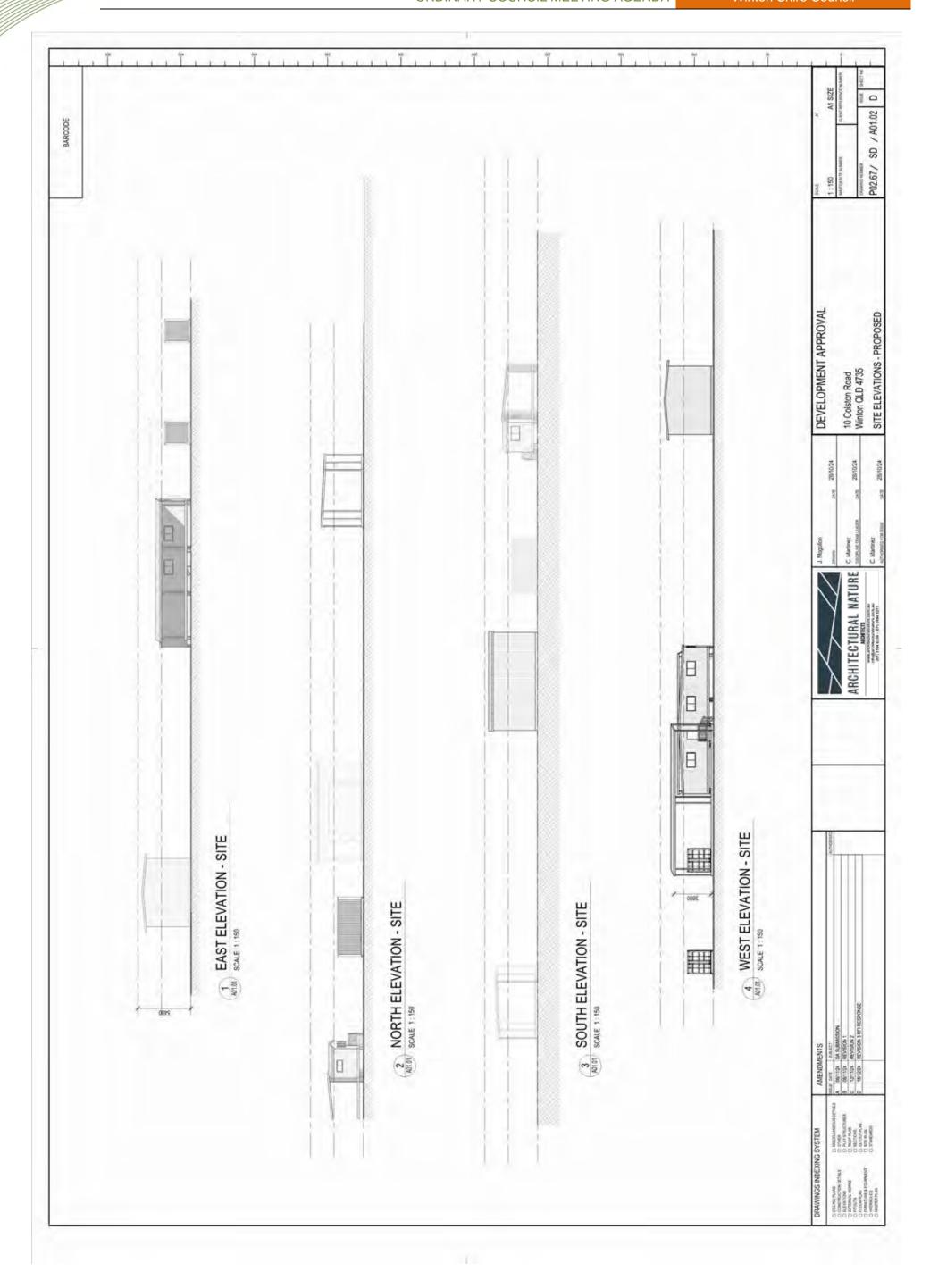

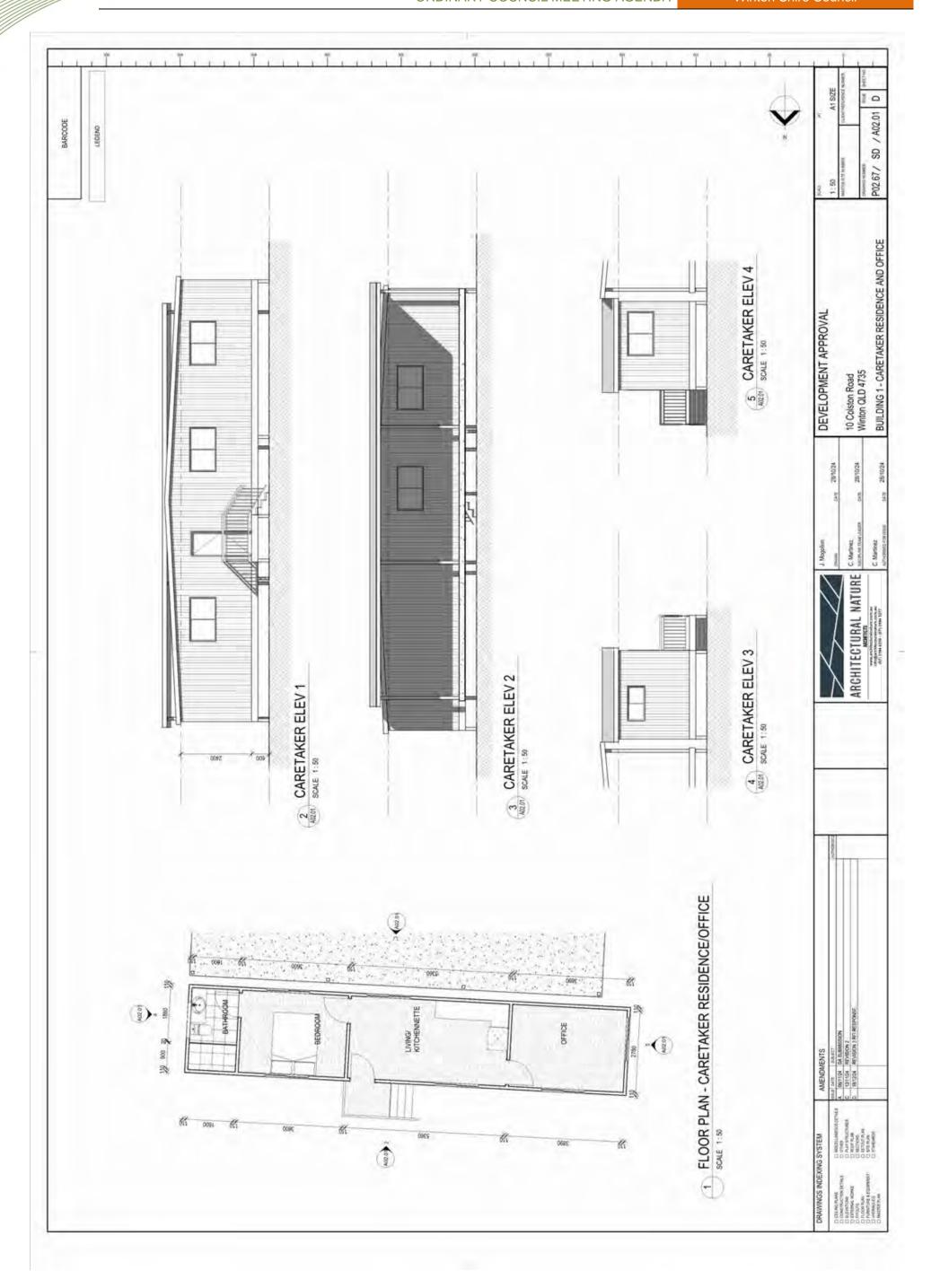

#### **SUMMARY**

This report addresses the purchase of 270Ha of Unallocated State Land at Opalton to support the Queensland Border Opal Association's (QBOA) objectives to establish a Bush Park and Exhibition and Visitors Centre.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

- 1. That the report be received
- 2. That Council accept the offer from the Department of Natural Resources and Mines, Manufacturing and Regional Development for the purchase of Lot 11 on USL 37898, at Opalton for \$13,500 plus GST plus costs.
- 3. That the CEO be authorized to complete the transaction including payment of the required deposit of \$10,728.08 by the due date of 28 March 2025, completion of the required survey plan, statutory declaration on future use, and addressing any native title rights and interests.
- 4. That the purchase be funded from Council's Land Development Reserve.

#### **REPORT**

In December 2020, the Queensland Border Opal Association (QBOA) made representations to Council to obtain use of a parcel of land in Opalton for the purpose of establishing the Opalton Exhibition and Visitors Centre.

In May 2021 Council resolved to apply to the Department of Natural Resources to purchase a portion of Unallocated State Land in Opalton described as Lot11 on USL 37898.

Apart from providing a site for the QBOA's Exhibition and Visitor Centre, the 270 Ha site provides the opportunity for the bush park and associated infrastructure to be included on a freehold portion of land which will provide further grant opportunities in the future.

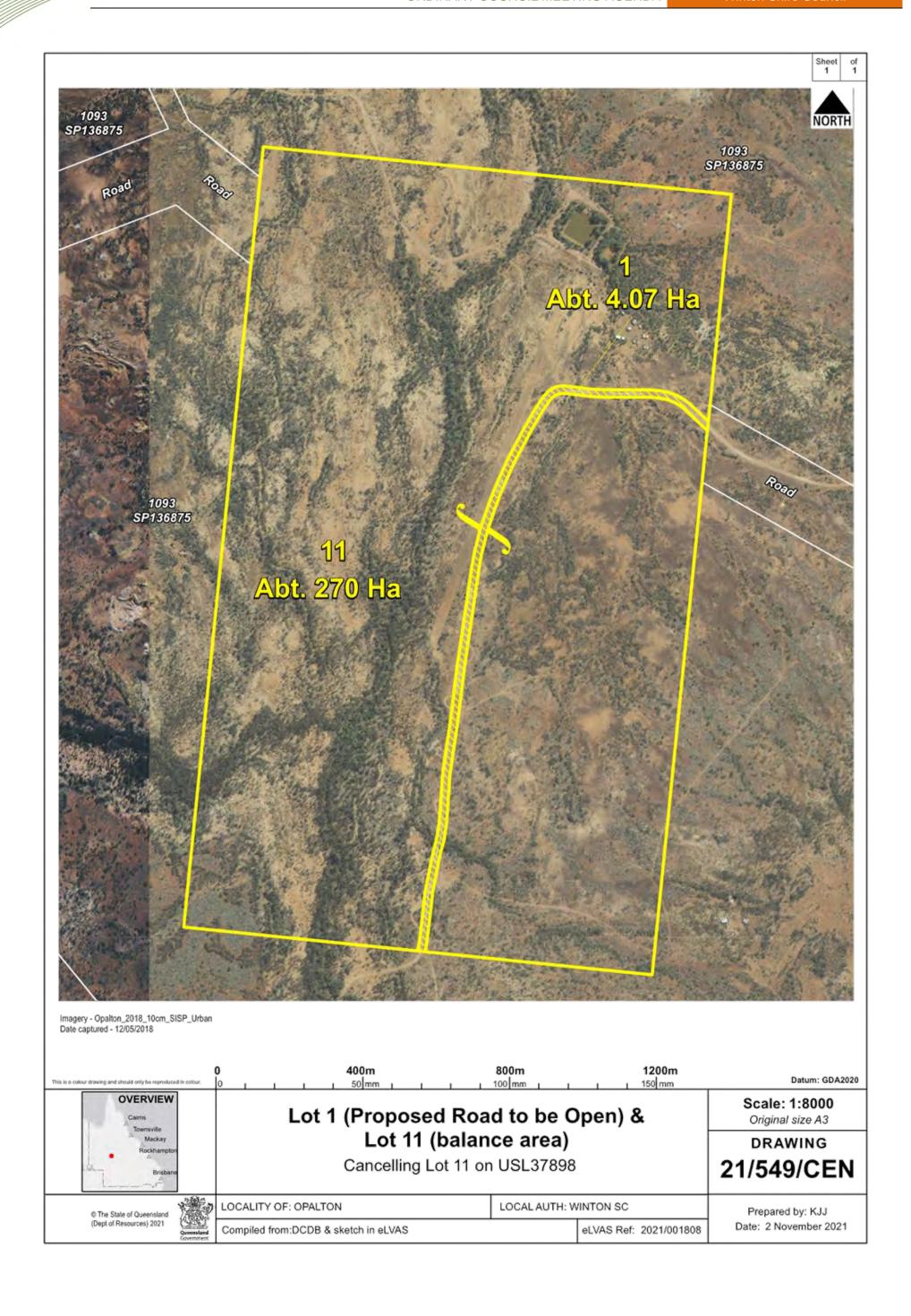

#### **REPORT**

The land upon which Council's sewerage ponds are constructed forms part of the Winton Golf Clubs lease from the State Government

To rectify this anomaly, Council commenced a process in 2020 to excise from the Golf Club's lease the land upon which the sewerage ponds are constructed and to seek to bring that parcel of land into Council ownership.

The Winton Golf Club have cooperated with this process and in January 2021 an application was lodged with the State Government to excise the Sewerage ponds from their lease and for Council to purchase the site.

By letter of 25<sup>th</sup> February 2025, the Department of Natural Resources and Mines, Manufacturing and Regional and Rural Development (The Department) agreed to the excision of 2.6 Ha from the Golf Club lease and for the sale of that land to Council

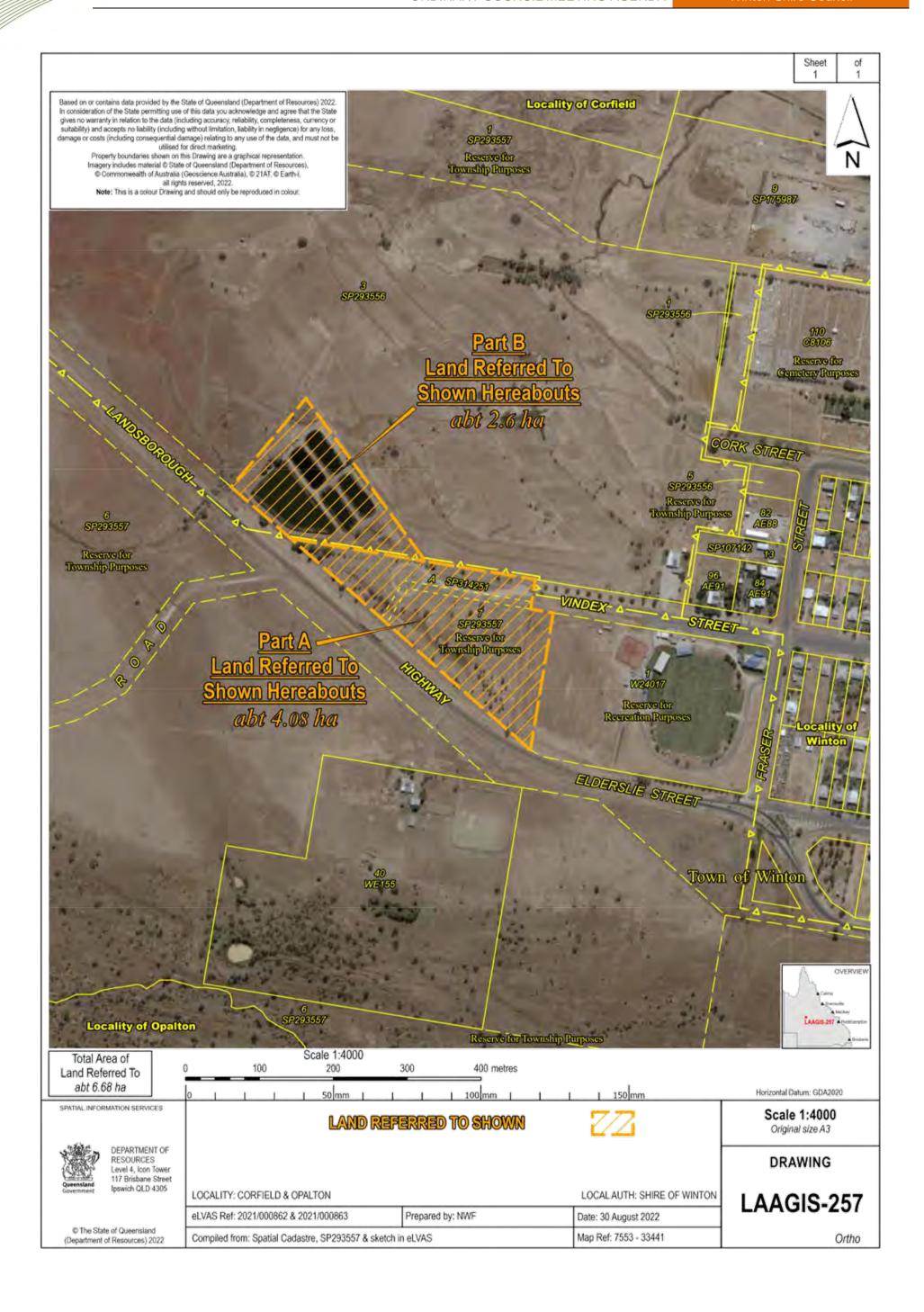

#### **REPORT**

In January 2021 Council made application to the Department of Natural Resources to purchase a 4.1 Ha triangular parcel of land adjacent to the Eric Lenton Memorial Recreation Grounds in the Town Pastoral Reserve.

The site already contained the "Winton Way out West" sign and was seen as suitable for development as a wetland area incorporating a town entrance into Winton and possibly used to expand the adjacent Recreation Reserve

The Department of Natural Resources and Mines, Manufacturing and Regional Development have now written to Council (24 February 2025) offering Council a Deed of Grant over the land.

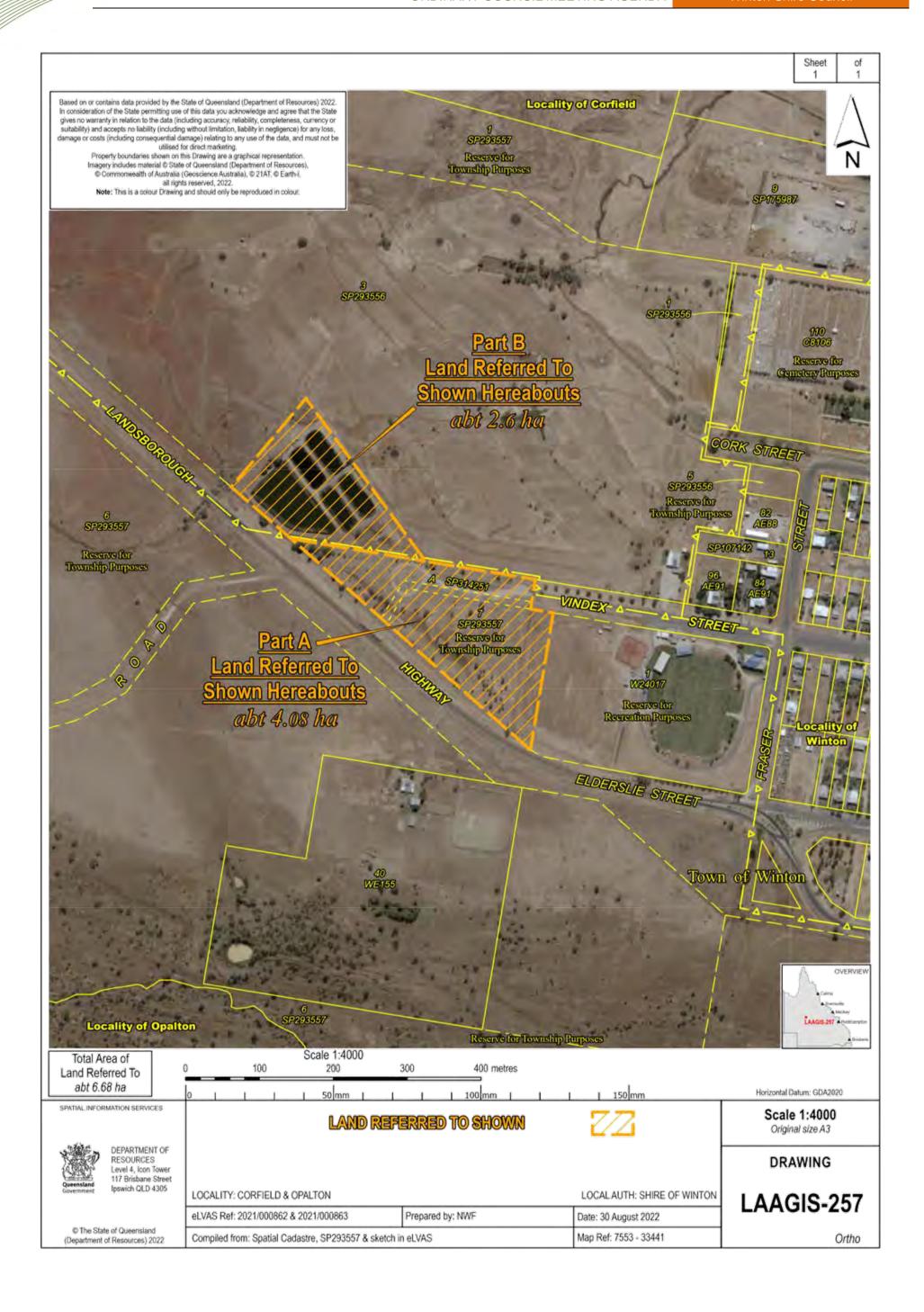

Bush racehorse trainers work for months to get their horses fit for two days of outback racing, and the community gathers to watch this iconic outback event play out. The Tower Hill Races have a 116-year history and are a unique cultural demonstration bush racing. Bringing together hundreds of attendees who camp at the Tower Hill racecourse for two days, they also provide a vital social and sporting opportunity for some of the districts most remote residents. Attendees are known to travel from interstate to our region to come to Tower Hill, and the colourful event is an important and very unique addition to the region's calendar for locals and tourists alike.

# 2. The North Gregory Turf Club Inc

The North Gregory Turf Club is hosting two race meetings in 2025. The first being 29 March and the second on the 20 September. The Race Club is trying to keep the country racing spirit in this small town by holding fun family orientated events that the whole community enjoy. This race meet will be working with other community organisations which is why on the 29 of March the event will be held throughout the day and finishing up late afternoon so the community can still support the local Diamantina Devils football team at their home game.

#### 3. Winton State School

To the Winton Shire Council,

I write on behalf of the Tower Hill Picnic Amateur Race Club (THPARC,) the organisation behind one of the Winton district's oldest and most iconic community events. The Tower Hill races have a 116 year history, and are unique in that they are one of only two grass-fed bush racing meets left in the country. Against the dust of a sun-kissed outback track, a hat has dropped for over a century to indicate the beginning of each race, with the echoes of the punters cheering on their horses from underneath a lone tin roof. The Tower Hill races bring socially isolated rural residents together for a common purpose and two days of celebration at an event that reflects our vibrant outback community.

In 2025, the THPARC has made the extremely difficult decision to break their formal ties with Racing QLD, after years of continually building restrictions that our little bush club is simply unable to operate under. These restrictions are designed for high level, high income city race meets and are applied to all Qld Racing affiliated organisations with a blanket approach, and no exemptions available for bush clubs like ours to which many of the requirements were not possible at a practical level – thus, we were largely forced out. Despite finding ourselves in a position where we no longer have the financial backing that comes with our previous attachment to Racing QLD, we have an engaged and motivated committee who are keen to continue the tradition of bush racing.

Finding ourselves in this position means that we must seek alternative forms of income to stay operational, and we are very keen to succeed in this endeavour. In continuing to operate the Tower Hill Races, the committee is committed to meeting the same high standards of animal welfare and organizational integrity that we have been legally required to meet as members of Racing QLD. In addition to an increased sponsorship drive, and new fundraising efforts, we are keen to seek grant opportunities as well as in-kind support to allow the Tower Hill Races not just to survive, but to flourish for years to come.

The Tower Hill Race meet is set to be held on the 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> April 2025. Please find attached to this letter, our application for a Council grant. We sincerely hope that Council views our grant application favourably and is keen to support this event, and we look forward to your response.

Council has the authority to nominate impoundment locations to ensure appropriate containment, welfare, and management of animals while allowing owners the opportunity to reclaim them.

The proposed impoundment locations are:-

**Horses** - Winton Showgrounds

Justification: Adequate yards and most functional location to muster livestock into, water access, and proximity for monitoring and care.

Cattle - Winton Saleyards

Justification: Adequate yards, water access and proximity for monitoring and care.

Dogs and Cats - Winton Council Pound Facility

Justification: Secure holding facilities, appropriate shelter, and compliance with animal welfare standards.

# Financial & Operational Considerations

- Designating specific impoundment locations ensures cost-effective management and reduces liability risks.
- Impoundment may incur holding costs (e.g., feeding, care, vet services) recoverable from owners upon reclaim.
- If unclaimed within the prescribed period, animals will be disposed of per Section 22 of Subordinate Local Law No. 2 (Animal Management) 2024.

# **RISK MANAGEMENT**

Designating impoundment areas complies with the requirement in the Local Law and reduces the risk of owners of impounded animals challenging the validity of the impoundment locations.

The Country Roads Connect (CRC) Program is a \$100 million Queensland Government funding initiative aimed at supporting local infrastructure that will deliver targeted investment to boost the safety of regional roads. The CRC Program will provide funding to local governments to pave regional unsealed roads which would otherwise become impassable during weather events.

The CRC Program is part of the Right Plan for Queensland's Future to ease pressure on transport and insurance costs by investing money into regional roads, and boost safety and reduce transport costs by upgrading regional roads. The Program will work hand-in-glove with the Safer Roads, Better Transport plan which will deliver congestion-busting and safety upgrades across Queensland.

- 2. THAT Council lodge an application through the Country Roads Program for \$18 million to complete the sealing of the Winton Richmond road.

# **Objectives**

The objectives of the CRC Program are to boost the safety of regional roads whilst:

- increasing the resilience of regional communities by improving the durability and reliability of regional road networks to withstand severe weather conditions.
- maintaining productivity by ensuring that regional areas remain accessible for economic activities, thereby supporting local economies.
- ensuring access for emergency services by providing reliable access for emergency services to communities that may be cut off during severe weather events.

These objectives will form the basis of the assessment and prioritisation methodology for nominated projects.

#### **Council eligibility**

The 66 regional councils outside of South-East Queensland are eligible to nominate prioritised projects to be assessed against criteria related to the Program objectives.

Ineligible councils are those in South-East Queensland: Brisbane, Gold Coast, Ipswich, Lockyer Valley, Logan, Moreton Bay, Noosa, Scenic Rim, Somerset, Sunshine Coast and Redlands councils. These councils are excluded to maximise availability of funds to rural and regional councils.

# Road eligibility

Projects on both the state-controlled road and local government-controlled road (LCR) network are eligible. Project nominations for LCR will be limited to Local Roads of Regional Significance, or for Aboriginal Shire Councils, Significant Local Roads, to ensure the Program focusses on higher order local roads with greater regional benefits.

This is aligned with the Government's commitment to work with local governments to improve local infrastructure and maximise regional benefit, regardless of road ownership.

#### Co-contribution

Projects on the LCR network will be fully state funded (100 per cent) with no co-contribution required from local government. Nominations that include co-contributions will however be considered.

#### Scope of works

The scope of works will be focussed primarily on road sealing projects.

Priority will be given to road sealing projects on 'missing links' or where progressive sealing is able to be completed.

# 6.1 Acting Waltzing Matilda Centre Manager Verbal Report

The air-conditioning at the centre has not been working since the afternoon of Wednesday 26 February 2025. There has been consideration to reducing the opening hours due to Work Health and Safety concerns and the inconvenience to patrons. A contractor is expected on Monday 3 March 2025 to hopefully rectify the system.

Major repairs and replacements to the projectors and lighting of the billabong exhibition and other smaller exhibitions will require the closing of the Centre from Tuesday 25 March 2025 to Friday 28 March 2025. The cost of the works (In excess of \$400,000) has been provided through a Council budget review as the equipment was no longer under warranty. The contractor is still looking to hire another scissor lift to carry out the work in the provided timeframe.

Vision Splendid has asked if the five chairs they donated can be installed. Staff are investigating the size and space of the chairs and area to see what is possible.

Council's Finance team no longer have access to the Waltzing Matilda Account due to the departure of the handling accountant at Evergreen Accountants. Temporary solutions have been put into place and every effort is being made to regain access.

Discussion centred on ideas for the WMC Float in the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary procession. The Board was comfortable for the staff to decide, preferring to leave the interpretation up to the participants. It was suggested that Winton Shire Council should enter two floats in the procession, one for Council and one for the Waltzing Matilda Centre with the WMC float leading the procession. It was recommended playing the Waltzing Matilda music on the float. Acting WMC Manager cautious of having too many employees participating due to budget considerations.

In response to questions on staffing, the Acting WMC Manager advised that the Centre is approaching a full complement of staff. Three additional Visitor Experience Officers have been recruited, the café recruited one additional person recently but are still seeking additional staff.

In regard to how staff convey the local story and information to people when they walk to the counter the Acting Manager has conversed with the visitor information centre coordinator (VIC) and the staff have been taught a speech for all customers as well as receiving a map. This will become part of the employee handbook.

There was discussion about informing guests who arrive late in the afternoon, that the opportunity to return tomorrow and finish the tour using the existing day pass is available.

The meeting was advised that the Mangers role would not be advertised until after the commencement of the incoming CEO Louise Knol. On 3 April 2025. The new CEO needed to define the role required before the advertising could commence.

### 6.2 Exhibition Supervisor verbal report:

Extended an invitation to the board for the 2025 John Villers Outback Art Prize Exhibition Opening and Awards Night that is being held on the 15 March 2025. The Children's Art Project will also be opened on this night, this is a digital online gallery that is connected to the Waltzing Matilda website. There is approximately sixty-five artworks submitted from children in the RAPAD Region. The strategic direction and changes of the John Villiers's funding is they are only supporting one new project. We are in year two of our project after receiving the three-tier funding. This is going to close in 2026. The partnership assists with prize money and funding for projects for youth, with a total of \$17,500 annually that cannot be sought from Government grants.

After the John Villiers awards is the Queensland Art Gallery's Asia Pacific Kids on Tour -is an interactive zone that is set up in the gallery from the 16 May 2025 to 20 May 2025.

From 26 May 2025 to 28 June 2025 was to be a First Nations Exhibitions including the Goa Koa artists, however they have declined as they required more time to apply for grant funding. The Gallery instead intents to bring forward a future exhibition to cover the slot.

From 1 July 2025 to 12 July 2025 is the QLD Boulder Opal Gems.

On page seven of the previous report, the comment referring to the bronze swagman statues being stored at the Gallery is confirmed untrue, they are believed to be in the Neighbourhood Centre cupboard and Mayor office.

To the Director/Facility Manager

The Electrical Safety Office (ESO) is Queensland's electrical safety regulator, administering the provisions of the *Electrical Safety Act 2002* (the Act).

The role of the ESO is to prevent people being killed or injured, or property being damaged or destroyed by electricity. We work to keep people electrically safe at work, at home and in the community.

Within the aged care sector, while electric mobility devices are commonplace now, we are aware of a shift from lead-acid battery chemistry to lithium-ion battery chemistry, which brings new risks. Staff and visitors may also have lithium-ion batteries in other types of electric mobility devices (such as e-scooters, e-bikes, e-skateboards). The ESO are concerned about the electrical risks of these devices (such as electric shock and fire) that may occur if storing and charging of these devices are not properly considered.

The ESO is writing to you to highlight the need for aged care facilities to be proactive in ensuring safety in relation to the growing use of these electric mobility devices and provide a timely reminder to ensure you consider proper storage to enhance safety. The ESO would also ask you to promote responsible home storage and charging to your residents, staff, and visitors.

Workplaces such as aged care facilities need to ensure appropriate risk assessments have been performed that include a review of storage facilities where electric mobility devices may be stored or be connected for charging. These risk assessments should include assessing the adequacy, accessibility and safety of current storage or charging areas.

The following guidance should be considered when assessing storage facilities for electric mobility devices:

#### 1. Storage location:

- Choose a cool, dry, and sheltered location to store devices, while ensuring adequate ventilation.
- Avoid placing storage areas near other buildings to prevent fire spread. Keep them away from common areas and flammable materials.

#### 2. Building type:

- Where possible consider using concrete or brick buildings for storage rather than timber buildings, as they pose less risk of spread of fire if there is an incident.
- Do not use under building storage for places to store and charge electric bikes or electric scooters.

#### 3. Spacing and piling:

 Arrange e-bikes and e-scooters with sufficient spacing to prevent them from being piled up or stacked on top of each other. This is to prevent overheating of the devices and to reduce cascading effects if an incident occurs.

#### 4. Charging controls:

- If allowing charging during operational hours, ensure the chargers match the specific electric
  mobility device brand/model. Avoid using general chargers or allowing residents or staff to
  swap chargers.
- Prohibit charging of modified electric mobility devices.
- Regularly check for damage and avoid charging if any issues are identified.
- Maintain clear spaces around charging electric mobility devices to prevent overheating.

#### 5. Safety measures:

- Install smoke detectors in the storage area and consider fire sprinkler systems.
- Keep exits clear, particularly from charging of electric mobility devices.
- Restrict access to the building or location where charging occurs.

By proactively reviewing and enhancing e-mobility device storage facilities, we can create a safer and more efficient environment for our aged care communities. # Our Projects



2019 Drought and Flood Program - QLD (Charleville, Kingaroy, Nymagee, Townsville, Julia Creek, Cloncurry) CCA partnered with the RACQ Foundation to deliver a 12-month Drought & Flood Program across rural and regional Queensland.

#### 2021 The Bushfire Recovery Program - Bega Valley Shire NSW

Following the Black Summer 2020 bushfires, CCA took on a major program—the Bushfire Recovery Program in the Bega Valley Shire on the NSW South Coast. The Recovery Program was a significant task that required months of detailed planning, involvement of multiple and diverse stakeholders and precision on-the-ground coordination of effort.

#### 2022 Water and Sanitation Project - Bega Valley NSW

CCA built storage and temporary housing for families in the Bega Valley who lost their homes in the Black Summer fires. The project included the construction of fourteen garages for multipurpose uses and involved licensed builders and over 50 volunteers.

#### 2023 Disaster Preparedness Program - Across VIC, WA & NSW

CCA managed and supervised the Australian Resilience Corps for the Minderoo Foundation. We delivered five disaster-ready projects in VIC, WA, and NSW, involving over 350 volunteers. The work included clearing fire breaks, widening access paths and roads, clearing debris, removing invasive species, and planting mangroves to reduce the impact of flooding.

#### 2023/2024 Rebuilding Project - Mogo NSW

Mogo a small village 4 hours south of Sydney was significantly damaged by the Black Summer bushfires in 2019. Many homes along with other buildings were lost. In October 2023, CCA worked with volunteers from Munich Re (international insurance provider) to do a backyard blitz style makeover of one of the senior members of the Aboriginal community's houses, and build a new storage shed for the Aboriginal Land Council to store their equipment after the original shed was destroyed by fire.

#### 2024 Disaster Recovery Program - Shepparton VIC

CCA took a team of volunteers to Shepparton to repair buildings, fences, gardens and remove debris left from the 2022 floods. Many of the residents our volunteers helped were still living in caravans two years on from the floods. CCA also employed carpenters and tilers to complete the project. It was wonderful to see gardens restored, kitchens completed and bathrooms tiled. By the end of the 10 days it was wonderful to see in some cases residents move back home and in others planning to do so in the near future.

#### 2024 Disaster Preparedness Programs - Shelly Beach and Avoca Beach, Central Coast NSW

CCA brought in a teams of volunteers from Munich Re to reduce storm damage to dunes, remove invasive species and plant native species. The long term outcome at both beaches is a reduction of dune erosion.

Dear Louise,

I am writing to confirm Winton Shire Council's participation in the Bureau of Meteorology's national 10-year Flood Warning Infrastructure Network (FWIN) Program.

By acquiring and remediating high priority flood warning assets, FWIN will enable the Bureau to simplify the ownership and management of Australia's flood warning infrastructure.

Assuming ownership of the gauges that the Bureau relies on to deliver flood forecasts and warnings will ensure that Australia's flood warning network is modernised, resilient and well-maintained, helping communities be better prepared during flood events. It also removes the burden of ongoing maintenance costs from councils.

The FWIN program commenced in Queensland in 2023 with the aim of obtaining and maintaining approximately 1000 flood warning sites over the next 4 years. Following acquisition, ongoing maintenance costs will be shared between the Bureau and the Queensland Government via the Queensland Reconstruction Authority. Existing flood asset owners are required to maintain their equipment under the 2018 Council of Australian Governments Intergovernmental Agreement, until sites are acquired by the Bureau. Continuing this maintenance is crucial to supporting the flood warning services to your communities.

The Bureau is committed to maintaining flood assets acquired under FWIN to the same high standard as our existing network. In some circumstances, sites may have conditions that require a specific and localised maintenance agreement. For these sites, the Bureau will execute a formalised maintenance agreement to ensure all monitoring equipment is managed appropriately and accountabilities are clear.

We have worked closely with Brenton Hall and Roger Naidoo over the past year to consult on the priority flood gauges that the Bureau is seeking to acquire and remediate where required. Below is a list of sites the Bureau is seeking to obtain from Winton Shire Council, noting there may be some adjustments to the final list of sites following detailed assessments:

The next steps of the Program will be to issue Council with transfer of equipment and/or licence agreements. This will be done progressively for the sites identified, with acquisition likely to be staggered over a number of years. Remediation works on sites will occur following acquisition, with capital works in Queensland scheduled to be completed by June 2029.

The Bureau will continue to work with Winton Shire Council over the duration of the FWIN Program.

- Attended IPOLA Information Privacy and Other Legislation Amendment Act training from the State Government surrounding the changing Privacy, Mandatory Notice of Data Breach and Right to Information laws that are going to be introduced in July this year.
- InfoCouncil also facilitated end user training that IT attended.

# **Economic Development**

### Winton 150 Year Celebration

Event Planner Decinda Burrell and Louise Marron from Event Society visited Winton early March for further site visits and meetings with stakeholders from Council and external businesses to discuss final plans for the 150-year weekend celebration. Final operational plans are concluding now to deliver events throughout the week leading up to and including the official celebration weekend.

## Marketing and Communications Winton 150.

An extensive marketing campaign has been created and this includes: Council, local and national social media platforms, print media in Australian Traveller magazine, RM Williams Outback Magazine, QANTAS magazine, Longreach Leader, Nth Qld Register, Southern Cross TV advertising nationally, Resonate Radio Group national radio advertising campaign, 4LG Rural Qld Today with Ben Dobbin, Weekly 4LG Bush Beats segment with Wattsy, Bishopp Billboards throughout south east QLD major highways and regional city intersections; Council monthly newsletter and information to VIC's in all neighbouring regions.

### **Economic Development Strategy and Action Plan 2025-2029**

The development of a five-year Economic Development Strategy and Action Plan (2025-2029) which is part of Council's Corporate Plan and Operational Plan is being researched and developed by regional economic consultants, Delos Delta. Stakeholder Engagement sessions with the community, business and industry groups and rural landholders have been conducted in Opalton, Winton and Corfield. A final digital workshop with Tourism and Business operators (who were unable to attend the February sessions), will be held on Thursday 27 March at 5.30pm, to provide an opportunity to share ideas regarding the future of the region. A summary of key engagement themes and outcomes from the Stakeholder Engagement sessions will form part of the Draft Economic Development Strategy allowing for comments on the Shire's economic vision, strategic themes and key objectives in preparation for the Final Economic Development Strategy and Action Plan stage.

#### **Renew Winton**

Monthly meetings are scheduled with Renew Australia and the Small Business Friendly Council as part of the Regional Activation Program. The next step is a presentation from the Renew Australia team to discuss the project details to interested participants including local business operators, community members, local creatives and commercial business owners.

# **Waltzing Matilda Centre**

February saw a decrease in visitor numbers at the Waltzing Matilda Centre, with a total of 83 visitors. Walk-in numbers are beginning to pick up, and there has been an increase in phone inquiries regarding the upcoming Winton 150 celebrations in early April.

#### **Enquiries and Services Provided**

Frequent Enquiries: Increased inquiries about the Winton 150 celebrations, along with standard requests for information about local attractions, accommodations, and road reports.

#### **Operational Updates**

The Waltzing Matilda Centre experienced a half-day closure due to air conditioning faults. Contractors was on site to restore functioning to one of the Centre's chillers and restore normal operations. The second chiller is in need of further repairs and will require an additional visit when the parts have arrived in the country. Estimated time is middle to late April. Exact dates to be confirmed.

The Waltzing Matilda Centre main exhibition upgrades will commence on Tuesday 25th March, for safety reasons this will entail closing the main exhibition to the public until Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> March.

All other areas of The Waltzing Matilda Centre will remain open, and entry prices will be reduced by 50% to the price of \$19 per adult while work is carried out.

### **REPORT**

Waltzing Matilda Centre Airconditioning - There two large air conditioning units at the Centre. One has failed and stopped working the other unit was working at 50%. A contractor has been onsite and repaired the failed one and several days later the second unit failed. The Humidifier which controls the art gallery stopped working a long time ago and parts have been ordered, they come from Italy. When these parts arrive, the Contractor will install them and repair the second unit. It is not possible for the Contractor to return and repair the second unit due to prior work commitments. We have organised for a technician to be onsite for the 150 Year event to ensure the Centre has air conditioning.

## **PARKS AND FACILITIES**

### Parks & Public Areas

- During the month of February, the Parks and Facilities team continued to maintain all parks and garden areas on a weekly basis with an increased focus on presentation for the 150 Year celebration.
- The team has completed planting 150 trees along McMaster Drive along with dripper lines. Some tidying up of the general is yet to occur.

#### **Show Grounds**

- The Show Grounds lawns and gardens have been maintained on an as needed basis.
- There was an irrigation leak in the mounting yard resulting in dry patches which has been repaired.

#### **Recreational Grounds**

 There are some high spots that have been cut out and replacement turf will be going in once it arrives.

### **Swimming Pool**

• The Swimming Pool lawns have been mowed weekly and all garden areas tidied.

#### **Street Sweeping**

• Some street sweeping has been done when possible.

#### **Vegetation and Vermin Control**

Weed control continued against unwanted vegetation on footpaths and other open areas.
 These areas are continuously being poisoned. Moving has commenced on the verges.

#### **Winton Aerodrome**

• Normal twice weekly inspections were carried out. The Aerodrome has also been slashed.

### **Undertaking and Cemetery**

- Two funerals have been conducted. Concerns were raised from attendees about the speaker not being loud enough to hear the reader.
- Cemetery Extension levelling of the ground will occur soon as staff are working on 150 Event, fencing is being procured.

- Town garbage collection is continuing on schedule with the use of the hire truck from Longreach.
- The new rubbish truck arrived on the 30 January 2025, and we are waiting for staff to be inducted. The trainer is expected to arrive in the week commencing 17 March 2025.

- Broken main in Manifold Street as the tap handle broke off, has been repaired.

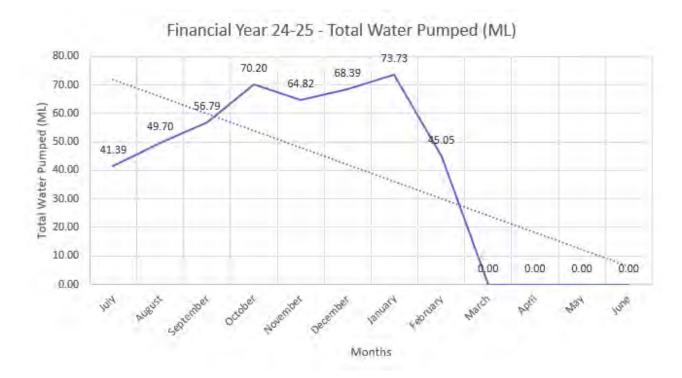

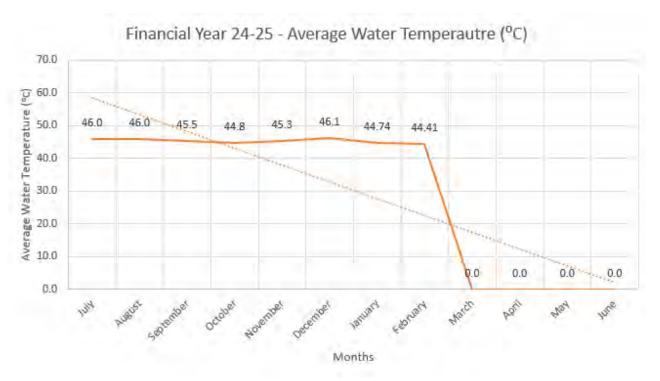

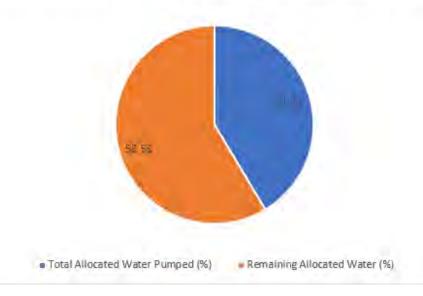

# Total Allocated Water vs. Remaining Allocated Water 24-25



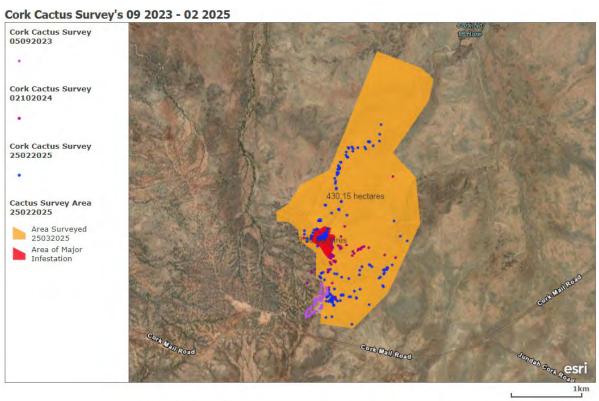
## **RURAL SERVICES**

### **Water Facilities**

- Inspections and expressions of interest for funding regarding stock route maintenance through the department of resources has been completed for a number of facilities.
  - Inspections/EOI's: Nadjayamba, 12 Mile, Fieldings, Strathfillian, The Grove, Karolla, Dicks Creek.
- Water facility inspections were completed and documented into the Stock Routes Management System (SRMS).

#### Weeds

- Weed spraying around Strathfillian has seen good die off.
- The Conn water facility has been sprayed as well.
- Survey of the Cork Snake Cactus was conducted, and the heart of the infestation was identified. Council has been in communications with the land manager as they have been doing some management and they have been provided the updated map.

### **Baiting**

- 40kg of baits were prepared this month.
- Wild dog bounty claim numbers are approaching the budget of 400 scalps, it is currently at 347 with 53 scalps remaining until the bounty closes for the 2024/2025 financial year.
- The Wild Dog Management Working Group meeting was held. Budget, Substrate quantities, and scheduling were confirmed along with authorised persons paperwork distributed to division leaders.
- Dates have been set for the next aerial bating campaign.
- The Substrate orders have been quoted on and ordered. The AV Gas is still in the procurement process.
- The substrate fridges and freezers have had some minor maintenance completed to ensure they will safely refrigerate the substrate.

## Common / Reserves / Routes

- A town common muster was scheduled due to the dry conditions. However, the muster was rescheduled due to the rain event. The muster dates have not been confirmed yet.
- Winton Town common received good rain for a period of a week. Since then, there has not been much rain to follow up. Pastures are greening up. However, more rain would go a long way in bolstering feed reserves.

- An independent feed assessment was scheduled for the 7<sup>th</sup> of February. However, there
  was a rain event making it impossible to get out into the paddocks. This will still be
  occurring once the common is dry enough to safely move the livestock, possibly in midMarch. Pending the results from the feed assessment the Common is likely to have the
  number of livestock reduced. The exact number of livestock will be determined post feed
  assessment.
- Teaspoon Dam, Long waterhole, and the Golf links Dam are all full after the rain event.
- A Town Common User Meeting was held to discuss the Draft Town Common Policy where the users were able to provide a lot of helpful feedback.
- Prior to the rain event we had someone interested in applying for a grazing permit at the Conn and there were several interested parties enquiring about the 4 mile once the current applicant had left.
- There is a grazing permit in place at the 4-mile paddock of horses. The livestock were removed on the 17<sup>th</sup> of February.

## **Western Community Transport**

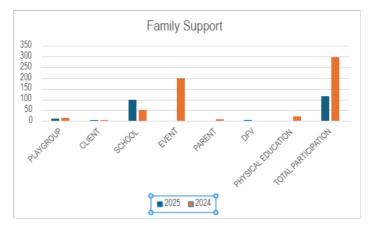
The Contracting and Community Partnerships team met with staff from the Neighbourhood Centre, various regional services, and the Department of Families, Seniors, Disability Services, and Child Safety to discuss investment in transportation for rural and regional areas.

The purpose of this funding is to enhance community transport and address issues related to isolation. Regrettably, it was discovered that this funding does not extend support to individuals over the age of 65 or those eligible for NDIS, PTS, or any other funded services. The Department has returned to reassess the needs of rural communities.

## **Meet and Greet**

The evening proved to be a delightful occasion as the community came together to greet both new and long-standing members, fostering engaging conversations. There were welcome packs that had an overview of the various programs available, along with additional resources from various organisations and emergency flip books designed to help individuals prepare for potential disasters. 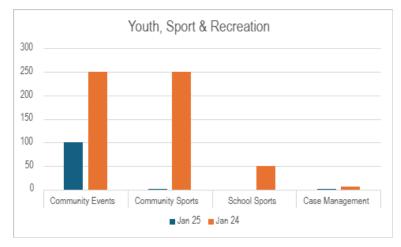


## **Clean Up Winton**

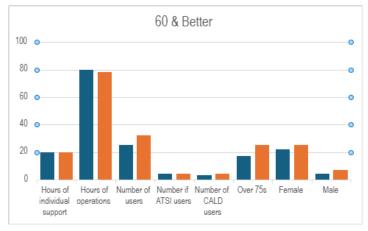


#### Pancake Breakfast

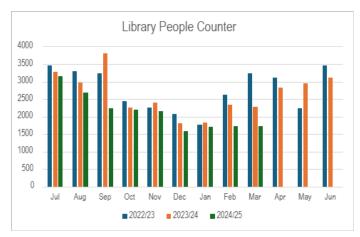


The Cadet Engineer presented a walking path plan which led to fruitful discussion

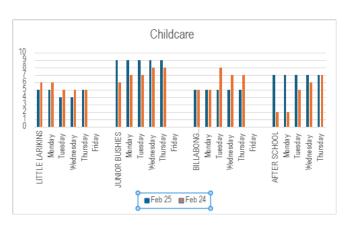
State Library of Queensland is offering various professional development opportunities throughout the year. A calendar of training opportunities is available, and this will be an opportunity for staff to upskill.

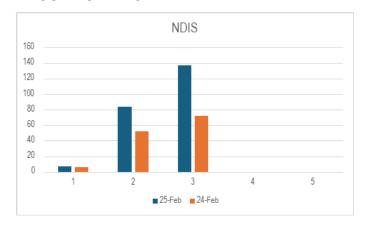
This month, Little Swaggies have welcomed a new enrolment for the Little Larrikins Room.

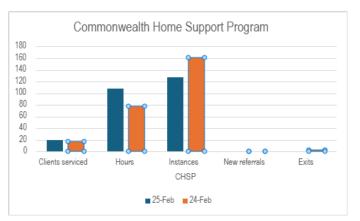
Little Swaggies are working alongside with Outback Futures for pre-kindy checks, with Grace Elliot the occupational therapist, families, and children.

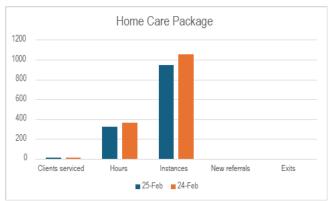
A working bee will be conducted in the coming months to build a fruit and vegetable garden where the chooks use to be located.



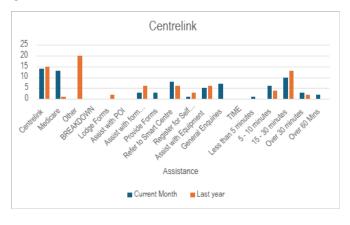
