SUMMARY

The Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival's vision was developed following the premiere screening of Mystery Road in Winton in October 2013 and is entering its 12th year in 2025. The Festival aligns with Screen Australia's objectives, supporting creative industries and economic recovery. Core Pillars of the Festival are quality programming, driving the destination, career pathways, screen industry leadership and local and social impact.

Council is asked to consider a partnership proposal The Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival Incorporated for the 2025 event, noting that the Moreton Bay Regional Council has withdrawn its financial support for 2025. As a result, the Festival Committee is requesting an increased financial contribution from Council.

Following the 2025 Festival, Council and the Festival Committee will enter into negotiations to assess the outcomes of the event and explore a potential three-year partnership agreement. This agreement would aim to identify new opportunities and maximise the social and economic benefits of this iconic and unique event.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the Report be received.
- 2. THAT Council accept the request from The Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival Incorporated (Festival) ABN 27 448 945 983 to enter into a partnership agreement for the 2025 Festival (27 June to 5 July 2025) with Council making a financial contribution of \$75,000 (seventy-five thousand dollars only) with no in-kind support requested from the Festival; and post the 2025 event, Council and the Festival will evaluate and assess the

outcomes of the event and explore a potential three-year partnership agreement which will be brought to Council for consideration by December 2025.

REPORT

The Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival is now in its 12th year in Winton. The Outback Film Festival is perceived as an excellent opportunity to stimulate filmmaking in the region from an economic viewpoint. It provides a platform for fostering a deeper cultural appreciation of film within the community and for sharing the unique experiences and culture of Outback Queensland with guests.

The existing sponsorship agreement between Winton Shire Council and The Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival has concluded.

Council is asked to consider a partnership proposal from the Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival Incorporated for the 2025 event, noting that the Moreton Bay Regional Council has withdrawn its financial support for 2025. As a result, the Festival Committee is requesting an increased financial contribution from Council.

Following the 2025 Festival, Council and the Festival Committee will enter into negotiations to assess the outcomes of the event and explore a potential three-year partnership agreement. This agreement would aim to identify new opportunities and maximise the social and economic benefits of this iconic and unique event.

The outcomes of the Festival that will be evaluated include audience growth, student and community participation, economic impact, educational outreach, media coverage, film submissions, filmmaker diversity, programming, industry engagement,

Winton Shire Council has sponsored The Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival for many years. In 2017-2019 sponsorship included a \$25,000 cash contribution plus "in-kind" support up to the value of \$15,000 per annum.

A proposal for a five-year partnership was then submitted in December 2019, leading the Council to approve a cash contribution of \$50,000, with any in-kind costs to be invoiced to the Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival. In April 2020, the Festival then sought the Council's assistance in providing the cash contribution, along with an additional \$16,500 in in-kind support for each Festival held in Winton. A VISION WAS BORN

In 2025 the Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival will turn twelve. This is also the year that Winton celebrates 150 years of settlement and the Festival will work closely with the Shire Council to appropriately respond to this anniversary.

The Festival vision was developed following the premiere screening of Mystery Road in Winton, Queensland in October 2013. Film directors, producers, actors and extras were at the dinner with local community leaders and they developed their vision for Winton and the region to become a hub and world leader for outback film making. Inspired by the Sundance Film Festival and the Sundance Institute, the Festival shares their long-term vision to bring screen culture to Regional Queensland along with the development of a vibrant film industry centered in Winton for the people of Outback Queensland. An outback film festival was seen as the ideal platform to help profile and develop Winton and the region from an economic perspective. It was also seen an opportunity to develop a greater cultural understanding of film and the sharing of outback Queensland culture. The Festival has seen a steady and incremental growth in its audience numbers and has put Winton squarely on the world map as the largest film festival devoted exclusively to Australian films. It is now widely considered as a must-see film festival.

WHY WINTON?

Winton is located in the heart of Outback Queensland, north of Longreach and south of Mount Isa on the Matilda Highway. From the early days of settlement, Winton has played an integral role in the cultural life of Australia. Winton is the birthplace of Australia's unofficial national anthem, "Waltzing Matilda" and was first publicly recited by Banjo Paterson at the North Gregory Hotel in Winton in 1895. This iconic town in the heart of the Australian outback is also the birthplace of QANTAS.

Its reputation as "Hollywood in the Outback" is emerging with several major film productions being filmed here.

Major Australian productions have been filmed in the Winton region, *The Proposition*, released in 2005 directed by John Hillcoat and written by screenwriter and musician Nick Cave. It starred Guy Pearce, Emily Watson, John Hurt, Danny Huston and David Wenham.





Released in 2013, *Mystery Road* was written by Ivan Sven and featured Aaron Pedersen, Hugo Weaving, Jack Thompson, Ryan Kwanten and Tasma Walton. Then in 2016, the much anticipated follow up by Ivan Sen, *Goldstone* hit the big screens after premiering in Winton. *Goldstone* was very successful at the box office and cut through to mainstream audiences with its stunning outback noir style and powerful thematic concerns. Then in 2019, the Indigenous political comedy TV series *Total Control* was filmed in Winton starring Rachel Griffiths and Deborah Mailman.

Winton has featured in a national commercial for Tim Tams and QANTAS and hosted the mini-series *Texas Rising* with a cast of major Hollywood stars. During the course of every Festival producers and directors scout the area as locations for their films. This is an integral role of the Festival - to introduce Australian filmmakers to the opportunities and pragmatics of filming in the outback The Festival regularly brings in filmmakers to present their films but always with an eye to assisting them to see the area as a possible future location. The Festival and its supporters spend considerable time showing the filmmakers around the Winton locations. Many have expressed serious interest in returning with a future production. This would mean employment and opportunities for locals and new film culture for travellers for years to come.

Notwithstanding the difficulties of cost-of-living pressures and reduced regional tourism, the 2024 Festival was a great success with audiences ensuring that Festival is now firmly entrenched in the minds of future cinematic adventurers.



FESTIVAL SUMMARY

Winton's Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival is the only film festival of its kind in Australia. Celebrating Australian screen culture in outback Queensland, the Film Festival is a dynamic and community focused nine-day event that combines film screenings with special events, industry experiences and multiple film productions that culminate in a highly participatory Closing Night. The Festival curates the very latest Australian films and cinema classics from yesteryear. There is a daily documentary stream, films for kids and families and opportunities for emerging filmmakers. 2025 is the anniversary of the settlement of Winton and the Festival will join in this year long celebration.

Every day there are masterclasses, workshops and film-related events for a broad audience. Staged in historic Winton, the Festival operates for five main reasons;

- 1. to promote and develop screen culture in Regional Queensland, and;
- 2. to celebrate Australian cinema and especially films made in Qld and provide opportunities for regional viewers to access these films;
- to develop a sustainable economy, support local small businesses and provide employment opportunities for Queenslanders;
- 4. to generate local and international film student opportunities and preparing the next generation of filmmakers;
- 5. to drive tourism to Outback Queensland and to engage tourists with cultural attractions to encourage extended stays.

The Festival program includes classic and contemporary Australian films, especially those films with an outback focus and films made in Queensland. There are cinema industry masterclasses, technical workshops, informal discussions with cinema stars, film location tours, a kids' clubs, special film related events and the always sold-out Closing Night Short Film Competition. The program includes some 50+ films shown in different theatres around town; the 107-year-old Royal Open-Air Theatre (one of only two open air theatres still operating in Australia), the Winton Shire Hall and the Sarah Riley Theatre.



We have moved away from employing an overall theme for the Festival. However, in 2025 we will work with Winton Shire to support the celebrations of 150 years of settlement. The schedule that appears to be most user friendly is the presentation of five films per day in streams: Documentary, Independent Visions, Retrospective selections (often based on films celebrating an anniversary screening 10, 20, 30, 40 and 50 years after their initial release). The evening content is divided into Popular Selections – the most mainstream films available and a genre film as the late-night option. Wednesday nights are dedicated to bringing silent films to life with a live band performing innovative scores.

Regional audiences are increasingly denied access to Australian films as they do not have easily accessible exhibition centres. The Festival fills an important need. In 2025 our focus will be on diversity – diversity of programming, staffing and representations. The Festival is a big production opportunity and many people get involved in the films that are made in Winton during the Festival. We look forward to broad community involvement whether as audience



members or as the star of one of the films. We continue our commitment to promote the work of Australian women in cinema as well as celebrating the work of Indigenous filmmakers to build on Winton's progressive and welcoming reputation. We support emerging filmmakers of all ages and all abilities, and we remain strong advocates for celebrating diversity and inclusivity.

FESTIVAL OVERVIEW

2025 promises to be another boom year for Australian feature films and documentaries. We will focus on outback comedies and dramas and foregrounding the diversity of our screen talents and highlighting the absolute importance of sharing our culture with regional and mainstream audiences.



We continue our passion for bringing to life silent film classics with innovative

and freshly composed musical accompaniment. Following on from the success of the young Brisbane bad, *Shade Hadie* creating ana alternative bluegrass blues soundtrack for the 1974 film *Stone*, they will return with a new and fun soundtrack to Ray Harryhausen's classic dinosaur adventure film *The Valley of Gwangi* (1969).

Wherever possible, the program supports emerging Queensland filmmakers and features films made in Queensland, often providing the first run for some films that have struggled with commercial distributors. In 2025 we will feature locally made films including *Dunny Derby* (made in Winton in 2023) based on the audience award winning film from the 2023 Festival as well as some of the best new Australian films and a retrospective program acting as a key exhibitor for Australian films and stories that otherwise would not find an audience.

Following in this proposal is the draft program that will provide a snapshot of the Screen Culture that *Winton's Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival* will bring to a broad audience in Winton in 2025. As a family friendly Festival, we cater to audiences of different ages and different backgrounds. There is a dedicated kid's program as well as program components that specifically cater for older audiences. The 2025 festival will feature some of the Australia's finest new films as well a selection of much-loved retro classics in one of Australia's most important historical cinemas.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS



Following the success of our writing masterclasses in previous years we will again feature some great Australian female screen writers. Winton's Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival continues to address the gender imbalance within the Australian screen industry and engage with the rectification process by presenting some of the best examples of women's work in Australian cinema.

A short film competition is incorporated into the program, specifically to cater for the 18-35 youth market and film students. In previous years this event was the audience highlight with a sold-out Closing Night and many satisfied visitors and locals who had a great opportunity to take part in high quality film production.

Winton's Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival endeavours to bring the very best films and film industry specialists to a broad audience in Outback Queensland. The audience has the unique ability to 'get up close and personal' with actors, directors, and producers, through masterclasses and workshops. The Film Festival wants to continue to contribute to supporting sustainable and self-generating careers and especially among women to build a range and breadth of skills in this industry for the long term.



150 Years of Settlement and Native Title Claim Victory

In 2025 Winton celebrates 150 years of settlement. This is potentially a contentious celebration as it may not acknowledge the killings, dispossession and forced migration of the Koa people. The Koa Mob have recently celebrated a Native Title claim. Both events should be included in a celebration of a complex history. From a cultural perspective it may allow for a healing dialogue around a shared cinematic campfire.

Some suggestions for these celebrations

An Indigenous Film Day – without too much fanfare the Festival has celebrated Indigenous cinema over the past five years with one dedicated day of screenings a- a combination of new feature films, documentaries and shorts – not at the exclusion of other days when Indigenous materials will also be screened.

Historical Film Exhibit: A curated exhibit that highlights films made in Winton and their significance. This could include artifacts, behind-the-scenes photos, and stories from filmmakers, making it interactive with QR codes linking to clips or interviews.

Screening of *The Proposition* – 20 Year Anniversary screening - a classic film, made in Winton, complimented by local food stalls and live music, creating a festive atmosphere that celebrates both film and community.

Local Film Contest, encourage filmmakers to create short films about Winton's history or its 150 years and Native Title Claim. Screen the best submissions during the festival

Documentary: Kolperi to produce a short documentary capturing the essence of Winton's film legacy, featuring interviews with residents and filmmakers. Premiere it during the festival.

Interactive Film Experience, set up a space where attendees can try their hand at filmmaking, using props and period costumes. They can film short scenes inspired by Winton's cinematic history, which can be shared on social media.

PROPOSED FESTIVAL PROGRAM – NEW FILMS 2025

The following is a draft program outline based on current availability.

Runt



Based on Craig Silvey's much loved novel, this is a film for the entire family – a heart-warming sentimental shaggy-dog story that follows ten-year-old Annie and her best friend, a former stray dog, named Runt. Annie's family is in financial trouble due to the endless drought so Annie and Runt try to win the Agility Course Championship Dog Show in London in order to save their family's farm from drought and misery. A beautiful, heart-warming film with an allstar cast.

The Surfer

Staring everyone's favourite maniac, Nicholas Cage this is the story of an Australian ma who has been living overseas for ages but when he returns to his beach side hometown in Australia, he is humiliated in front of his teenage son by a local group of surfers who claim ownership over the secluded beach of his childhood. Of course he has no choice but to fight back.





The Moogai

Indigenous horror story based on an award-winning short film. *The Moogai* is about a young Aboriginal couple who bring home their second baby. What should be a joyous time takes a sinister turn, as the baby's mother starts seeing a malevolent spirit she is convinced is trying to take her baby. This is a contemporary horror film steeped in the trauma of the Stolen Generation.

Inside



Director Charles William's debut feature film starring Guy Pearce. Transferred from juvenile to adult prison, Mel is taken under the wing of both Shepard, Australia's most despised criminal, and Warren, a soon-to-be-a-paroled inmate. The paternal triangle that forms between them becomes their undoing. A powerful character drama set inside the prison system.

Roadkill



Like a modern-day bushranger, Connor Shelby spends his days on the isolated highways of rural Australia stealing from unsuspecting victims. He justifies his actions by saving his earnings in the hope of taking the love of his life out of the unforgiving Australian outback. Across the country, in his 'quest from God',

a serial killer moves from town-

to-town executing those he believes to be 'sinful'. Hot on his trail are Detectives Albert and Ernest, driven and logical, the pair follow the trail of bodies in an attempt to find and stop the brutal killer. Their hunt brings them to Renmark, Connor's current refuge. After two young men report being mugged on the highway, the detectives investigate and discover the two cases may be closer to one another than he first realised.

Flathead



Two men in rural Queensland search for solace in spirituality in this cinematic blend of documentary and fiction. Now in his 70s, country bloke Cass returns to his hometown of Bundaberg seeking enlightenment. Having weathered a life of drugs, tragedy and, now, an illness, he follows his intrigue to evangelical Christians. Meanwhile, when Andrew Wong isn't fronting his late father's iconic fish-and-chip shop – the same one that allowed his family to send him and his sisters to school – he's working out and musing on Buddhism in his own pursuit of meaning.

Kriv Stenders new reality drama. Xmas Eve, 2014, in the shadow of the Great Pyramids of Egypt and Australian journalist, Peter Greste, is reporting from this most dangerous city on earth where bloody daily clashes between student revolutionaries and the government take place. No-one is safe. What Peter Greste doesn't know on that first night as he files his news across the globe is that he is the target and within a few hours he would be arrested, strip searched, despatched to a dungeon and accused of multiple crimes of terrorism, each one of which carried the death penalty. But as they drift ever further away from reconciliation, Nate comes to understand that the only way they'll ever fulfill their mother's final wish will be to face the ghosts of the past head on, no

Memoir of a Snail



Adam Elliott's exquisitely hand-crafted stop-motion wonder continues the joy and wonder of his earlier films *Mary and Max* and Oscar-winning short *Harvie Krumpet*. Grace's life may be a mess, but does derive pleasure from three things: her snail collection, romance novels and her guinea pigs. As children, she and twin brother Gilbert eked out a modest existence with their paraplegic father, a has-been performer gripped by alcoholism and grief after their mother's death. When he, too, passes away, the siblings are split up by child services: Grace is sent to Canberra, and Gilbert, to Perth. Isolated and depressed, Grace retreats behind a carapace – much like her snails – and fills her emotional void through compulsive hoarding. That is, until she finds a fourth source of joy: a friendship with outrageous octogenarian Pinky. A beautiful heart-warming tale

Andamooka



Alex's life falls apart just before she turns 30, she decides to drive to the outback to spend her birthday with her best friend in tiny opal mining town Andamooka. This is a road movie from a young woman's perspective that is revealing and confusing and beautifully observed.

Audrey



In this brutally hilarious black comedy, an Aussie teen's coma is her family's time to shine. Eighteen years ago, Ronnie Lipsick was poised for acting success ... until her daughter Audrey came along. Ronnie has lavished years – and the family's finances – on moulding the boisterous, petulant teenager into the star she almost was, ignoring her sexually frustrated husband Cormack and her younger daughter

Norah's interest in wheelchair fencing. When Audrey has the absolute gall to fall into a coma, Ronnie decides to impersonate her, stepping in to all of Audrey's auditions and acting classes. Meanwhile, Cormack embraces his tastes for religious-themed kink, and Norah finally gets her sport rolling (while also cosying up to Audrey's boyfriend). It's amazing what the Lipsicks can achieve with their disagreeable golden child out of the way!

SPIT



Lovingly made in Queensland a sequel o the much-loved classic crime comedy, *Getting Square* (2003). When ex-junkie, Johnny (Spit) Spitieri, flies into Australia on a false passport, he is locked up in an Immigration Detention Centre. With old enemies on his tail and a target on his back, Spit navigates a series of comedic misadventures, sharing with his fellow detainees the meaning of mateship and what it is to be truly Australian...

Spit will screen on the same day as a retrospective screening of Gettin Square (2003)

Kangaroo



A heart-warming family comedy directed by Kate Woods (*Looking for Alibrandi*) about ex-tv personality, Chris Masterson, who becomes stranded in an Outback town after a car accident on his way to Broome. There, he teams up with 11-year-old Indigenous girl Charlie. The pair form an unlikely friendship and work together to rescue and rehabilitate orphaned joeys in the remote but stunning Outback community. An endeavour that proves to be lifechanging for them both.

Windcatcher




Windcatcher is set inside the small country town of Herbertson, and follows the unlikely friendship between Percy Boy, a fast and resourceful Aboriginal boy, and the spirited Daisy Hawkins, as they band together to take home the local school sports day title from the hands of the Wolf Pack: a group of grade five bullies. Starring Jessica Mauboy.

Red Rock Run



This family feature film follows ten-year-old Lucy who is forbidden from attending the 1978 regional athletic trials as punishment for racing a delivery plane on a remote dirt airstrip. But with the help of her grandmother, she defies her Vietnam veteran father and enters the first kids' team into the Red Rock Run, a gruelling 120km outback marathon race.

A Christmas Castle Proposal: A Royal in Paradise 2



Despite busy schedules causing distance, Olivia and Prince Alexander travel to Torovia for Christmas with his family. Clashing cultures between their families lead to various mishaps. A follow up to the romance hit A Royal in Paradise by Queensland's most prolific producer, Steve Jaggi.

A Horse Named Winx



A Horse Named Winx tells the inspirational story of one of our greatest athletes. At the height of her fame, Winx became known as the "people's horse"—an Australian icon who transcended her sport—joining the realms of fellow legends like Cathy Freeman and Sir Donald Bradman. Although the world's greatest racehorse retired in 2019, she's still breaking records. Winx's only foal sold this year at auction for a world record \$10 million dollars. During her reign, huge crowds descended on racetracks across Australia to witness the Phar Lap of the modern era pull off the impossible—33 straight wins—a feat unlikely to ever be repeated. Winx's final race was watched by millions worldwide. From the wilful foal who was hard to catch, to a plain leggy teenager who kept to herself and turned her back on affection, Winx became a front page phenomenon, and in the process thrust her trainer Chris Waller and jockey Hugh Bowman onto the world stage. But away from the cameras, coping with the enormous pressure of maintaining the winning streak was testing Team Winx to the limit. Like My Brother



Four talented Tiwi Island Indigenous girls dream of AFLW stardom, and with the support of their community, battle the physical and social obstacles standing in their way

Aquarius



The story of a radical 10-day Festival in 1973 where the idealists face down police interference, internal chaos, drugs and personal dramas to create a living template for survival on earth...and almost succeed.

Mozart's Sister



The story of the other Mozart, Maria-Anna, a child prodigy forgotten to time, as seen through the eyes of musicians, musicologists, and researchers. Like her younger brother, Maria-Anna Mozart was a keyboard genius from an early age and the siblings toured Europe performing as wunderkinder to royalty. As a child it was acceptable for Maria-Anna to play in public. But when she reached 15, societal norms compelled her to retire. Tantalising clues exist of her continued virtuoso playing as well as her interest in composing music.

Make It Look Real



Claire, a pioneering intimacy coordinator is hired to guide actors through the process of simulating sex for a new film, Tightrope. Claire is apprehensive about how the director, Kieran Darcy-Smith, will respond to her presence on set. As she blocks scenes, designs modesty garments, and runs through nudity riders, it becomes apparent that one of the cast is uncomfortable performing a proposed threesome. As the first day of the shoot approaches, Claire and Kieran must work together to reshape the scene in a way that respects the actors' boundaries, without compromising the story. Make It Look Real immerses the audience in the funny, occasionally horrifying reality of simulating sex on screen, offering a spin on the 'tough jobs' genre to explore how film and television can safely represent one of the most fundamental aspects of human experience: sex and intimacy.

Her Name is Nanny Nellie



This powerful and poignant film offers us the rare privilege of bearing witness to a family reclaiming their history. In 1925, the Australian Museum commissioned three statues of 'full blood 'Aboriginal people: a child, a man and a woman, exhibited as nameless objects to be studied as examples of a 'dying race.' The woman was Nellie Walker, Irene Walker's great

grandmother and director Daniel King's great, great grandmother. Now Irene is on a journey to retrace Nellie's life and to reconnect the other families to their ancestors' statues and redisplay them, this time with their names, identities and dignity. This is far more than a symbolic quest, but an opportunity to change how we remember and represent, and to give the nameless names.

Future Council




Filmmaker Damon Gameau (That Sugar Film) takes eight kids on the ultimate road trip across Europe to seek solutions to our greatest ecological challenges.
Travelling in their vegetableoil-powered school bus, these young innovators hold candid, wise-beyond-theiryears discussions with each other and the CEOs of

major

polluters. Along the way, they divulge their fears for the future whilst grounding each other in their still-childlike qualities. Bringing their school desks with them, the kids learn from Gameau, other activists and nature, but most of all from one another.

Gameau's passion for the environment and social justice might have inspired this film, but the kids' youthful spirit and insightful thinking drive it. Eight young minds from around the world (including Australian Ruby Rodgers, the granddaughter of rock legend Jimmy Barnes) are brought together in this optimistic portrait of the future they will continue to fight for.

Hinkley Movie (McGregor)




In March 1981, John Hinckley shot U.S. President Ronald Reagan in a failed assassination attempt driven by a dangerous obsession with the Martin Scorsese film "Taxi Driver" and actress Jodie Foster. The attack shocked the world and forever changed American history.

Found not guilty by reason of insanity, John spent thirty-five years in a psychiatric hospital and now has freedom back. This provocative documentary examines the dark side of the American Dream, as Hinckley now seeks redemption through his art and music and grapples with his past in a nation deeply divided by politics and gripped by gun violence.

The Surfer (1987) Directed by Frank Shields

To accompany the new Nick Cage film of the same title that is one of the new film selections

Beach-stand operator Sam
Barlow's life was meant to be
sunny, simple and predictable and
it might have been only he
delivers a letter to his mate Jack
Fields. This easy errand leads Jack
to his death and Sam in search of
the truth. A compact and
absorbing contemporary film noir,
The Surfer remains virtually
unknown in Australia despite



being selected for the Directors' Fortnight at the 1987 Cannes Film Festival. *The Surfer* scratches the glitzy façade of the Gold Coast and finds danger and dirty dealings beneath. Here, Sam Barlow is an innocent whose loyalty to murdered Vietnam war mates Jack and Slaney compels him to leave his relaxed beachside life behind and seek the truth. The film doesn't dwell on Sam's military background, nor is there any deep analysis of the Vietnamese crime gang working for Hagan. This is a very good B-movie. Stars Gary Day, Gosia Dobrowolska, Rod Mullinar, Tony Barry

Captain Thunderbolt (Cecil Holmes 1953)

Adventurer Fred Ward is sentenced to hard labour for horse theft, escapes, and becomes a bushranger under the name of Captain Thunderbolt. Stealing mainly from squatters, he quickly becomes notorious. Trooper Mannix is assigned to capture him dead or

alive, eventually trapping him. After a long gun-fight, Mannix finds he has killed Thunderbolt's friend Alan Blake, and that Thunderbolt has escaped. Mannix passes off Blake's body as Thunderbolt's but the legend persists that Thunderbolt still roams free.

The Box (1975)



The Box is a comedy film based on the Australian soap opera The Box and featuring much of the same cast. The film also features Graham Kennedy playing himself, and Cornelia Frances in the key role of Dr. S. M. Winter, an efficiency expert brought in to improve operations at UCV-12. Robin Ramsay played Winter's assistant Bruce. Channel 12 is in financial difficulties. The company board calls the bluff of managing director Sir Henry Usher (Fred Betts), forcing him to call in a

systems expert to improve station

operations. Station staff are initially surprised to learn that the expert, Dr Winter, is a woman, named Sheila. Various attempts to first impress, and then to hinder Dr Winter end disastrously. A feature film, Manhunt, directed by Lee Whiteman and starring Tony Wild, is produced with hopes to increasing station income. Thanks to Wild's ineptitude the resultant footage is a disaster but the film finds unexpected success when reworked as a comedy.

Sky Pirates (1985)



Air force Lieutenant Harris starts for a flight to Boa Boa, on board Reverend Mitchell with a box containing a part of a top-secret extraterrestrial key. They get lost in a supernatural storm and find themselves after an emergency landing in kind of a Bermuda triangle, 5,000 miles off their course. Home again, no one believes Harris' story, and his crew suspiciously denies it too. Harris is thrown in jail, but manages to escape. Together with Mitchell's daughter he seeks the lost part of the key and its secret.

Sunstruck (1972) James Gilbert



Stanley Evans (Harry Secombe of the Goon Show fame) is a Welsh teacher who heads to Australia after an unsuccessful romance. Yearning for the good old days when he was a choral director in Wales, Stanley organises his Aussie students into a children's choir. Along the way, Stanley finds lasting happiness with downto-earth local woman.

Emoh Ruo (1985) Comedy



Des and Terri Tunkley are a happily married, but struggling couple about to take the big plunge and buy into the Great Australian Dream. Falling under the spell of a television advertisement extolling the joys of home ownership, Terri cajoles Des into making their first big financial commitment. At first, Des is none too enthusiastic about leaving their carefree, downwardly mobile lifestyle in a caravan park by the sea, and neither is their young son. The good life is for Des is embodied

in his beloved, as-yet-as-to-be-restored motorboat. Here then lies a basis for conflict between Terri's desire for the domestic comforts of a 'real' home, and Des' dream of sailing away to the West Indies. Undeterred by her husband's initial reluctance, Terri calls on Austral Finance for a housing loan. Now more determined than ever to realise her dream, Terri becomes frustrated by Des' lack of interest. When things finally come to a head between them one rainy afternoon. Des relents and sells his boat to raise the loan deposit. Immediately, the family packs up and sets off her their brand new home in a far-flung housing estate on the city's fringe. Not long after they settle into their new life, things begin to go awry: not only are their only neighbours dreadful nerds, but Des and Terri are also forced to work interminable hours to meet the repayments. Worse still, their 'dream' home turns out to be a complete lemon.

Fear Below



A rag-tag team of divers attempting to salvage a sunken car from a river are thwarted by a highly aggressive bull shark in Matthew Holmes' (THE COST, THE LEGEND OF BEN HALL) latest underwater horror epic.

Scurry



After wowing audiences with his special-effects laden alien invasion OCCUPATION RAINFALL, director Luke Sparke returns to his horror roots with SCURRY, a claustrophobic nightmare set in an ever narrowing tunnel below a city under attack. Trapped below ground amidst a catastrophic city attack, two strangers must crawl through an uncertain, narrowing tunnel in hope of evading the terror that lies above

and behind them. Badly injured and running out of food and water, it isn't long before the two realise that to horror outside might not be as dangerous as the horror inside. This session will be followed by a post-film Q&A with cast and crew

Waves of Madness



Directed by Jason Trost and inspired by classic videogames like Resident Evil and Silent Hill crossed with the spirit of those timeless black and white horror films of 1930s, THE WAVES OF MADNESS is a vivid Lovecraftian action/horror film shot completely from a side-scrolling perspective. A special agent is dispatched to investigate a distress call from an ocean liner, only to find the ship eerily abandoned and haunted by a malevolent force that twists sanity into terror.

Film Safari: The Chronicles Of Ninja



Australian gonzo filmmaker Andrew (THE SEARCH FOR WENG WENG) Leavold's most outthere film adventure so far as he parachutes onto a film set in Wild West Africa and into a starring role in a slavery-themed action movie (appropriately called White Devil!), all the while prepping a midget kung fu remake of *The Taller They Come* with director Ninja (B14, AFRICAN KUNG FU NAZIS).

Industry and Education Program

Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival will develop the capability of Queensland's screen industry and build the capacity of Regional and Remote Queensland through professional panels, masterclasses, workshops and education pathways. We will work collaboratively with ScreenWorks to deliver this program. Supporting a strong family friendly program, the Industry and Education program will, over time, develop career opportunities for the next generation and emerging filmmakers of Queensland, Australia and Internationally.

The Industry leading guests that come to the Festival – in 2024 they included Bruce Beresford, Sigrid Thornton, Chris Haywood, Scott Corfield and Matt Young – are closely tied to the film programming, selection and availability. All guests attended with no attached fees. Only travel, per diems and accommodation were provided. In order to activate high calibre guests to take the next step beyond Q&As into Industry masterclasses that require preparation and focused delivery a fee would be required for active participation.

Vision Splendid is already an Industry leader in Regional and Remote development in Australia. Further enhancing this reputation through connection and engagement with ScreenWorks and leading industry professionals to help shape the next generation of filmmakers is much sort after via the education pathways. Programs for 2025 include:

Kolperi Outback Filmmaking



Kolperi is a film education and development consortium committed to creating education pathways to increase the opportunities for emerging filmmakers in the Outback. Based in Winton, in the heart of Central Queensland, Kolperi is a strategic consortium comprising Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival, Griffith Film School, The Koa Aboriginal Corporation and the Winton Shire Council. Kolperi runs a range of programs for secondary, undergraduate and postgraduate students led by the Griffith Film School as well as a suite of unique programs for emerging professionals in writing and production that together represent a unique industry pathway for emerging practitioners in a unique outback environment.

Participants in the Bootcamps come from many of the best film schools in the world and collaborate to pitch, shoot and edit their short films to capture the magnificent landscapes, stories and personalities that Winton has to offer. To date there have been over 40 short films produced, often starring local talent, which screen as part of the final night of the Festival. This is a real cultural highlight that ensures that the Closing Night is always sold out given the high levels of community involvement.

The programs have grown year on year to include dedicated streams in film production, animation and screenwriting with both undergraduate and postgraduate students from as far afield as India, China, Singapore, Germany and the UK. Kolperi's Writers Lab is already bearing fruit with many of the films gaining funding or going into production. In future, we expect to create dedicated incubation and employment initiatives that will drive even more commercial projects to shoot in Winton, now known as the 'Hollywood of the Outback'.

To date Kolperi and previously the Vision Splendid Institute and its partners have hosted over 280 young filmmakers in Winton with the overwhelming majority of those enjoying industry employment after participating in both the Bootcamp and Alumni programs.

Priorities:

- 1. To prepare the next generation of filmmakers through compelling experiential educational opportunities
- To facilitate educational pathways for regional and remote community members to gain employment in the screen industries
- To make filmmaking in the Outback a viable and compelling alternative for emerging talent
- To create a supportive and diverse community of filmmaking practitioners, including film students, alumni and industry practitioners from around the world linked through their Outback experience
- 5. To promote future regional tourism and outback production opportunities

Education Program

Kolperi's Writer's Lab [Professional]: Emerging Writers develop their Outback Ideas

A unique opportunity for emerging writers to develop their Outback stories under the direction of established industry practitioners and potentially have them produced through the *Institute's Alumni Program*. Along with their peers, the



writers progress their concept and refine the characters, story and themes before presenting to an industry panel. The Lab accepts applications from Queensland-based writers and selects between 6-8 to participate.

Vision Splendid Institute's Filmmaking Ensemble [Alumni]

Bootcamp Alumni Collaborate to create showcase films. An extension program for Bootcamp Alumni who are inspired by their previous Outback experience to create high quality 'showcase films'. This program is uniquely positioned to produce films developed through the Institute's writing programs, showcase the talents of our alumni and springboard their industry careers. Crews include established industry professionals, recent GFS graduates and promising third year students who are supported by the Festival to shoot their films each year and showcase their achievements during the Festival closing night. This is an industry pathway project of the Vision Splendid Institute that begins with the student program and aims to secure participants with industry employment through increased industry engagement and internships. As participants' careers progress they are invited back as Bootcamp and Ensemble mentors.

Student Programs:

Griffith Film School's Experience Week [Secondary] - A taster program in film production for secondary students

A 6-day intensive led by the *Griffith Film School* for Secondary students looking to learn the fundamentals of filmmaking in one of Australia's most cinematic locations. The week opens with the Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival's final night showcase and continues for five days with participants using the latest in industry gear to recreate scenes from some of Australia's most celebrated films shot in and around Winton, including the *Proposition*, *Mystery Road*, *The Tree*, *Total Control* and *Goldstone* (4 July - 11 July, 2025).

Outback Filmmaking Bootcamp [Undergraduate] - A two-week undergraduate bootcamp culminating in the festival showcase

A two-week filmmaking intensive led by *Griffith Film School* where up to 60 **film** and **animation** students from Australia and around the world collaborate in small teams to pitch, shoot, edit and screen a film on the final night of the Festival. Students scout many of the

region's most cinematic locations, spend a couple of nights camping under the stars and have unique access to the Festival's industry guests. This program now in its 9th year attracts students from many of the best film schools in the world.

Outback Filmmaking Masterclass [Postgraduate & Erasmus Mundos]: A two-week postgraduate masterclass culminating in the production of a pre-scripted short film. A two-week filmmaking masterclass led by Griffith Film School and industry guests where 12 postgraduate filmmakers from Australia and overseas work with leading industry professionals to shoot pre-scripted scenes designed to challenge their creativity and craft skills. The exercises will screen as part of the Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival's Final Night Showcase.

Griffith Film School / Vision Splendid Institute Long Form Production Program [Alumni / Industry / PhD]: A multiyear development and production program providing experience to early career professionals in long form feature film and series production.

This program is designed to produce long-form projects developed as part of the Writer's Lab, or independently, and created by graduates of Bootcamp and Alumni Programs. This program allows graduates and/or PhD candidates to produce distribution ready content in a senior role under the guidance of experienced professional supervisors.





NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR FILMMAKERS & THE PUBLIC

2018 Vision Splendid introduced a writer's lab that will continue in 2025. There have been clear examples of success that have emerged from this lab with filmmaker David Cook's *Heart of a Man* (2024) emerging from a Writers Masterclass

In 2025 Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival will resurrect two previous programs to develop new opportunities filmmakers and the community:

The First Nations Dreamtime Storytelling Masterclass initiative is to be exclusively
designed to facilitate, develop and support emerging Outback Indigenous artists to
tell their stories. The masterclass will be a five-day intensive masterclass developed
by Oombarra Productions and will run throughout Vision Splendid Outback Film
Festival and hosted by a person recommended by Oombarra Productions. This

- immersive opportunity will support practitioners with deeper insights into effective storytelling, feedback on their scripts and assistance in advancing their screenwriting careers.
- Industry Days. Collaborating with ScreenWorks to assist emerging filmmakers and the public to participate in and learn from Industry professional through a series of panel discussions, Q&As, workshops, and masterclasses.



The Festival seeks to bring positivity to the community and hope for the future, tourism and the film industry have been identified as ways to diversify this rural community, encourage young people to stay in the local community and preserve the culture and heritage of the region. (Source: Outback Queensland Tourism Association). The Festival will build young people's confidence by providing them with new skills, with film offering a new platform to express themselves.

SOCIAL + COMMUNITY BENENFITS

The Festival offers visitors and the local community an opportunity to not only be exposed to a wide selection of classic and contemporary outback inspired Australian films, but an opportunity to be involved through public discussions, special events and masterclasses.

It gives the people of Winton, Outback Queensland and our wider audience from across Queensland and interstate, a greater understanding of screen culture by offering a hands on, personal and relaxed environment to gain a greater understanding of Australian film.

The Festival delivers a **significant economic benefit** for local small businesses by bringing in more tourist spend and keeping visitors passing through in town for longer. Community Benefits are shown in the IER Research results year on year comparison. The on-going results of this show increased economic benefits to Winton and the surrounding areas that ultimately create more opportunities for small business and jobs for the local area. This is an enormous benefit to a community that has been suffering from severe drought and now a drop in domestic tourism.

Through an increased profile of Outback Queensland locations and highlighting outback inspired stories, we attract considerable media publicity and industry awareness for the stunning scenes, people and filmmaking opportunities in this region.

Emerging filmmakers are provided with networking and screening opportunities directly at the Festival through filmmaking workshops, special functions and competitions where they can meet like-minded future collaborators that translates into future economic opportunities.

Through our existing partnership with Griffith Film School and University of NSW, and Oombarra Productions, the Festival provides film students and the students in Winton and Outback Queensland real life experience in the lead up and during the event as they assist with most aspects of the event. They are focused on developing entries for the Short Film Competition and future productions. There are opportunities to network with the film industry and gain firsthand insights into career pathways they may not have previously considered.

One of the most significant KPI is the return factor of students and emerging filmmakers to Winton to undertake larger and more ambitious projects. In recent years there have been more than a dozen such productions

Vision Splendid Special Events

To celebrate the 150 Anniversary of the settlement of Winton we seek to collaborate with the Winton Shire Council in staging special events during the Festival. We will further explore how we may also celebrate the recognition of the Koa Native Title of the land and waters of the region by the Federal Court of Australia. Previously Koa Indigenous artist, Charlie Chambers Jnr was engaged to create a mural of the story of Koa with an accompanying documentary. We will explore an appropriate follow up with the Koa Corporation.

AUDIENCE TALKS BACK

A slide showing of our regular audience members, those folk who turn up ever year and watch every film and eat every choc top - they will talk about their favourite films and give us an insight into how they see the festival from the inside. With only three slides each for their favourite movie posters they will tell us about the films and what they mean to them on a personal level.

Vision Splendid Kids Club

2015 was the inaugural year for the Kids Club and included making our car for the 'drive-in' theatre and a Paper Plane throwing competition in the lead up to the movie. The Paper Plane competition had entrants across all age groups, such as the CWA. In 2016, *The Year of the Dinosaur*, we featured dinosaur suit making, a Dinosaur Stampede, and Billy Cart Races with goats to go along with the silent film Kids Stakes. To ensure the success of the program again, designed around the Festival theme and specific movie titles, Winton's Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival has engaged **Adam Head** from Heads Up Film Services to manage the program. Adam provides years of experience in set design and creation and will facilitate some workshops around the Kids Club.

The aim of the Kids Club is to have children under the age of 13 develop and understanding of some of the element behind the screens to create a film set and have fun doing it. Together they will develop their own short and animated films to be shown in the Short Film Competition on the Closing Night. It also provides an opportunity for parents to have some free time and engages local small businesses in the workshop process.

"THE TYRANNY OF DISTANCE"

Just as our remoteness has been central to shaping our cultural identity, it causes us significant additional costs as compared to conducting a film festival in a major urban centre. Staging a film festival in Outback Queensland is not easy due to the distance, the additional costs and additional infrastructure and technically skilled people, as they are not available locally (yet). It is probably the most significant reason why an outback film festival has never been undertaken to this extent previously.

We are committed to producing an authentic and quality outback film festival which means not only the transport cost is higher, but also is the additional equipment, infrastructure and film and technical support team required, contributes significantly to the budget and bottom line of the event.

The additional transportation costs to bring film professionals to Winton is significantly higher than the costs involved in staging a cultural event on the coast. For example, return airfares alone for a Sydney based actor to travel to Winton, as compared to example the Gold Coast is \$ 1,150.00 as compared to \$300. The festival is minimum three day turn around given one day each way for travel and a minimum of one day in town adding to the cost of accommodation. The festival spends on average approximately \$30,000 on flights and \$45,000 on accommodation annually. For us to attract special guests we pay all expenses. This is worth it for the Festival to feature film celebrities as it is one thing that audiences absolutely love to see but it does come at a significant cost.



FINANCIALS

We are seeking support from Screen Queensland to assist the Festival in being able to further develop the event to provide a program that will enhance and expand the reach of Screen Culture for Regional Queensland, not just Winton. As you can see by the draft program, we are aiming to present a variety of films and introduce industry days to increase film industry involvement in the Festival. We have found that the Industry Focus is perhaps one of the most expensive aspects of the Festival as the accommodation, meals and flights are a key expenditure.

The Industry Focus costs include staging a 2 day dedicated Event with Industry Panels/Q&As, including student specific course, Breakfast with the Stars Q&A, masterclasses, workshops, First Nations Dreamtime Storytelling masterclass, First Nations Film Locations tours and special events that will not only attract a wider audience, but also to engage the public through hands on, intimate and authentic experiences to develop their understanding of screen culture. Presenters will include producers, actors, directors, writers, and set builders to allow for the audience to appreciate what goes into making the films they enjoy. We are seeking significant support due to the increased costs being incurred in staging the event in Outback Queensland.

EVALUATION

The 2025 Vision Splendid Film Festival will be evaluated in a number of social and economic ways through: -

- 1. Audience Development Ticketing and Qualitative Experience surveys
- 2. Cultural Participation
- 3. Satisfaction surveys, social media engagement
- 4. Media mainstream and social
- 5. Partnerships sponsorship and community and small business engagement

A survey is conducted during the event (IER administered by TEQ) to gain a greater understanding of our audience - where they are from and their satisfaction levels to adjust and develop the program for the following year. A written post event report is developed within 12 weeks of the event with a post committee meeting where public feedback is discussed. The table below further details our evaluation techniques.

Section 196(1) of the Local Government Act 2009 provides that a local government must, by resolution, adopt an organisational structure that is appropriate to the performance of the local government's responsibilities.

The attached Revised Organisational Structure and Functions of Council is down to the third reporting level and provides for -

- The allocation of the Functions and Services provided by Council across four Departments and the Office of CEO.
- The Functional areas of the Revised Organisational Structure contain some realignment at an operational level which is aimed at improving Council's service delivery to community.
- Department Leads, except for Works and CEO, are standardised to the title of Executive Manager. All Executive Managers, Director of Works and the CEO comprise the Senior Leadership Team.

Cr Tina Elliott, as Chair of the Recovery Group, has been at the forefront of leading and coordinating recovery efforts across all pillars of community restoration. Winton Shire Council have been actively engaged in steering the economic and tourism recovery following the recent flooding. Their collaborative efforts involve close coordination with various government departments to ensure a unified and effective response. A key initiative includes conducting a comprehensive survey aimed at assessing the flood's impact on local businesses.

Survey Development: Winton Shire Council has created a survey with 15-16 questions was developed to gather information on the impact of the flooding on businesses. The survey aims to collect data on direct and indirect impacts, including operational disruptions, supply chain issues, and infrastructure damage.

Survey Distribution: The survey will be distributed to the community via email, social media, and the website. The committee members were asked to review the survey and provide feedback within a couple of days before it is sent out.

2. Advocacy Brief on the impacts of the flooding disaster event

Advocacy Brief: The collected survey data will be compiled into an advocacy brief to present a strong case for additional support and funding. The brief will highlight the unique needs of the Winton local government area compared to other regions affected by different types of disasters.

3. Economic Development Strategy development update

Economic Development Strategy: an update on the economic development strategy, mentioning the consultation held in February and the ongoing work with consultants to finalise the strategy.

Consultation Feedback: The consultation held in February gathered feedback from the community, which has been incorporated into the strategy. The consultants are currently reviewing the document to ensure it reflects the community's needs and priorities.

Strategy Components: The strategy includes a vision, strategic plans, principles, and an implementation action plan. It also features an investment perspective to attract potential investors.

Governance and Implementation: Strong governance arrangements are being established to ensure effective implementation, reporting, and evaluation of the strategy's outcomes. Quick wins are identified to demonstrate immediate progress.

Timeline: The first draft of the strategy is expected to be ready for internal review within two weeks. Public consultation on the second draft is planned for late June or early July, with the final strategy potentially being endorsed at the July Council meeting.

4. Upcoming Events

Upcoming Events: The team discussed various upcoming events, including the Opera in the Outback and the Vision Splendid Film Festival. They emphasised the importance of proper advertising and communication for these events.

Opera Event: The upcoming opera event was discussed, with concerns raised about the lack of local community awareness and the need for better advertising. It was noted that while many visitors are aware of the event, local engagement is lacking.

Vision Splendid: The Vision Splendid Film Festival event was mentioned, with a focus on the need for timely distribution of promotional materials. It was suggested that event organisers should provide posters and other collateral at least a month in advance to ensure proper visibility.

Event Coordination: emphasised the importance of event organisers coordinating with the Council to ensure effective promotion and support for their events. This includes providing necessary materials and leveraging Council resources for wider reach.

5. Welcome to Winton

Welcome to Winton Initiative CEO Louise introduced the idea of a "Welcome to Winton" initiative to engage businesses and community members in providing a high standard of customer service and creating a welcoming environment for visitors.

Initiative Overview: The "Welcome to Winton" initiative aims to engage businesses and community members in creating a welcoming environment for visitors. The focus is on high customer service standards and quality products.

Business Participation: Businesses participating in the initiative would offer special deals or discounts to visitors, enhancing their experience and encouraging positive word-of-mouth promotion.

Community Engagement: The initiative also involves community members acting as ambassadors, promoting Winton's friendly and welcoming atmosphere to both locals and visitors.

Implementation Ideas: Various implementation ideas were discussed, including creating a local buying scheme, offering welcome packs to new residents, and leveraging social media to promote the initiative.

6. Tourism action plan 2025-2026

Chairman's Report

Introduction

With great pleasure, I present the Chairman's Report for the year ending 31 December 2024. This year has been one of both challenges and significant progress as we continue to honour the pioneers of the Australian Outback while adapting to an ever-evolving landscape.

Our core mission remains steadfast – preserving and celebrating Australia's rich pastoral history. Throughout the year, the Australian Stockman's Hall of Fame and Outback Heritage Centre (ASHOF) has focused on maintaining and enhancing our museum facilities, broadening our revenue streams, and ensuring operational excellence.

2024 was a challenging year in terms of tourism visitation to the entire Outback Queensland region and subsequently ASHOF. Despite lower visitation ASHOF managed to increase revenue and manage costs to generate a cash operating surplus in 2024.

Financial Performance

Total revenue for the year increased to \$3,172,291, an improvement from the previous year's \$2,991,559. This growth was primarily driven by increased admissions revenue, which reached \$2,305,338, alongside other sales and event offerings.

While we face financial constraints, the organisation has maintained a disciplined approach to managing expenses.

One of our key financial objectives is achieving a cash operating surplus, and we are pleased to report a net cash inflow from operations of \$358,625. This demonstrates prudent financial management despite external pressures.

Key Achievements

- Enhancement of the Museum Experience: ASHOF has continued its efforts to
 modernise exhibits and enhance visitor engagement. Integrating new storytelling
 technologies ensures that we remain relevant to younger generations while preserving
 historical authenticity.
- Expansion of the Outback Stockman Show and Events: Our live events and
 curated experiences have played a vital role in revenue generation and contributed
 significantly to visitor engagement. The addition of an external touring program has
 seen the Outback Stockman Show perform in 38 locations throughout Australia in

You may be aware that the Crisafulli Government has committed to "requiring all renewable projects to be impact assessable and subject to the same rigorous approval processes as other resource projects".

On 3 February 2025, amendments to the Planning Regulation 2017 (the Planning Regulation) commenced that changed assessment of wind farm projects from code assessable to impact assessable, meaning an assessment process requiring mandatory public notification and allowing for third-party submitter appeal rights.

I am writing to advise that legislative reforms have now been introduced into Parliament through the Planning (Social Impact and Community Benefit) and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2025 (the Bill) to deliver the next phase of these reforms.

Similar to other resource projects, the Bill introduces a new community benefit system for renewable energy projects in Queensland, which has been developed in discussion with the Local Government Association of Queensland.

Under the proposals, proponents will need to consider the social impacts of renewable energy projects in discussion with Local Government well in advance of a development application being lodged. In this way, proponents are expected to build social licence before a development application is lodged and commit to providing reasonable benefits to regional host communities such as financial contributions, local education employment and training, infrastructure, and/or accommodation that can be repurposed after the construction workforce has finished.

This new approach seeks to ensure that the local community is being consulted and aware of potential impacts of such significant renewable energy projects prior to lodgement of a development application, avoiding delays in approval processes due to lack of community awareness.

The Bill has been referred to the Parliamentary Committee for consideration and public consultation and further information on providing a submission is provided at www.parliament.qld.gov.au.

I appreciate that it is important for Queenslanders to understand the intent of the Bill and how it is to be operationalised. As the Bill introduces a new concept of a community benefit system into the *Planning Act 2016*, further operational changes to the Planning Regulation and other statutory documents are proposed, and are being made available early, to inform stakeholders how the framework will be practically implemented.

On this basis, I am pleased to be able to provide you with an overview of the full suite of proposed statutory changes for your consideration:

- the draft Planning (Social Impact and Community Benefit) and Other Legislation Amendment Regulation 2025 (the Amendment Regulation) - prescribes the types of renewable energy development that must comply with this framework, the level of assessment for the development, the assessment manager, the fee and what the development is to be assessed against, and other matters prescribed by the Bill
- a draft amended Social Impact Assessment Guideline currently mostly used for resource projects, which now prescribes the matters and process that must be carried out to inform the social impact assessment for renewable energy projects
- the draft new State Development Assessment Provisions State Code 26: Solar farm development - provides the assessment benchmarks against which the State Assessment and Referral Agency will assess solar farm development and
- the draft updated Development Assessment (DA) Rules includes operational and procedural changes as a result of the new community benefit system.

A copy of these draft documents can be accessed on the Department of State Development, Infrastructure and Planning's (the Department) website at https://www.planning.gld.gov.au/planning-issues-and-interests/renewable-energy.

Public consultation on the DA Rules will commence on 6 May 2025, closing after at least 20 business days, on 3 June 2025, as per statutory requirements under the *Planning Act 2016*. I have enclosed the gazette notice and a copy of the DA Rules as per these requirements.

Through the Local Government Association of Queensland, it is intended that an information session will be organised in this period, to support the explanatory information about the proposed changes.

I expect that feedback from Local Governments and other stakeholders will be informative and assist in refining practicalities of the new community benefit system.

Thank you for your email of 18 April 2025 to Senator the Hon Jenny McAllister, Minister for Emergency Management, Minister for Cities, concerning your request to extend the construction period under Winton Shire Council's Phase 4 Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program Grant Agreement.

With the announcement by the Prime Minister, the Hon Anthony Albanese MP, of the forthcoming election on 3 May 2025, the Australian Government has assumed a caretaker role. The Government is operating in accordance with the caretaker conventions pending the outcome of the 2025 federal election. During this period, by convention, decisions are not taken or advice given, that is likely to commit an incoming Government. Further information about these conventions can be found at www.pmc.gov.au/resources/guidance-caretaker-conventions.

Your letter has therefore been forwarded to the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communication and the Arts (DITRDCA) for a response.

I am advised that you met with members of the DITRDCA team who manage the LRCI Program on 16 April 2025 to discuss your request to extend two projects that have been delayed by the effects of flooding. In the meeting you discussed options to amend your work schedule, such as to withdraw and replace the projects or re-scope the projects, that would enable its full delivery by 30 June 2025 as is required under the Grant Agreement.

Accordingly, I understand that you are currently working with the LRCI Program team to revise the council's work schedule and that you have agreed to meet again in early June to discuss progress. I recognise the impact that natural disasters can have on the delivery of infrastructure projects, however as the LRCI Program is a temporary program, any decisions on continuing or extending the LRCI program construction period can only occur after the outcome of the election is known.

REPORT

Parks & Public Areas

- During the month of April, the Parks & Facilities team continued to maintain all parks and garden areas on a weekly basis. The Team did a fantastic job putting in extra hours to get all the gardens and the whole town in general looking its best in time for the 150 Years Celebrations. Positive feedback has been received from community members and visitors.

Winton Aerodrome

- Normal twice weekly inspections were carried out.
- Due to the wet weather the dirt strip has been shut for most of the month.
- The perimeter fence road will need to be graded as it has been washed away in parts.

Undertaking and Cemetery

- The Cemetery lawns and gardens have been mowed and hedged when needed, the monumental section has been poisoned. The RSL section was cleaned and tided in preparation for ANZAC Day. One funeral was held with good feedback from the family.

Refuse Collection & Landfill

- Town garbage collection continued on schedule with some runs being changed due to public holidays.

WATER AND SEWERAGE

Water Pump Station

- The upgrade to the water pump station is complete. We are now dealing with a few minor defects which is not unusual when a new system goes live despite all the pre-testing that occurs. A defects list has been created for assessment and rectification by the Contractor.
- Replacing the pumps and seals have been finished.

Sewer Pump Station

- Ergon has finished the connection for the upgrades.
- Future potential project to integrate Sewer Pump Stations into new SCADA system.

Wetlands

- Nil significant matters to report.
- Contractor is pricing for bigger sump pumps.
- Yard maintenance is going ahead (spraying, mowing etc.)

Imhoff Tank

- Cleaning of Imhoff tank.
- New sludge beds need to be quoted and added for next Financial Year.

Water Mains

Dagworth Street blowout - Tapping band snapped.

Sewer Mains

Business as usual with no significant matters to report.

Other works

- New bubbler installed at Youth and Recovery Centre.
- Refurbishment of 99 Cork Street bathroom is underway.
- Roof leaks identified and being fixed at Pelican Units.
- New filters installed at Waltzing Matilda Centre for the humidifiers.
- Installing replacement solar pump at the Winton Memorial Pool.
- Increase in private works this month.

RURAL SERVICES

Water Facilities

- Facilities have been largely unable to be accessed due to the flooding event.
- Water runs have been completed where possible: Winton-Sesbania, Winton Aspley Ridge, Town Common facilities, Winton-Middleton, Winton-Etna. Not every facility along these routes has been assessed.
- Ayrshire facility had the dam overflow which has caused significant wash outs on the dam wall.
- Mountain dam facility access road has been rendered completely inaccessible due to wash outs.

Weeds

Stock route weeds buggy has been fixed and is back in operation.

Baiting

- 12 tons of meat has been procured which is 2 tons less than the original order of 14 ton. Reduced quantity of meat due to flooding event.
- 2 new avgas drums were purchased and filled.
- Due to the flooding event the aerial baiting campaign will be cancelled for the upcoming round of baiting and instead division leaders will coordinate with Rural Services Manager to complete ground baiting. The Committee will meet in June once the budget has been

confirmed to schedule an earlier aerial baiting event than previously, tentative baiting date for late August or early September to ensure management of increased wild dog numbers.

Common / Reserves / Routes

- The town common muster remains scheduled for approximately May 24-25, pending sufficient drying after the recent rain event.
- Post-rain event, the boundary fence inspection was completed and staff have been fencing
 with neighbours as per the good neighbour policy. Council has supplied neighbours with
 materials and neighbours provided the labour. There are a couple of instances which
 require some Council labour to complete the work.
- Roads will require maintenance due to water currents impacting their condition.
- The Rural Services Manager in conjunction with the A/Operations Manager has completed a disaster impact report through to DPI to assist in securing funding for fencing repairs.
- An estimated 42 km of common roads were submerged during the rain event and are likely damaged.
- Water facilities post flood event are mostly in good condition.
- Back of Common tanks will need fencing shortly to ensure no damage can occur to the tank pad.
- The Winton tank near the showgrounds needs to have the base filled as it has a persistent leak due to the downward pressure on the taps.
- An application to acquire a permit to muster Bladensburg National Park is in process to schedule the muster for the 24-25 May 2025 pending any unforeseen circumstances.
- A drover is travelling through the Winton Shire and will be travelling down the primary route through to Longreach in May.

General

- Vegetation management required at Middleton Bore and Middleton Dam was not completed before the weather event.
- Structural repairs needed at Apsley Bore and Rum Creek.
- Weed control efforts ongoing at Crawford Creek.
- Future actions to be prioritised based on urgency and resource availability.

WINTON NEIGHBOURHOOD CENTRE PROGRAM

COMMUNITY WELFARE

The Neighbourhood Centre Team provided a delightful morning tea in celebration of the 150th anniversary, catering to over 300 guests. Attendees expressed that the food was exceptional and of high quality.

ANZAC Day

The commemoration of ANZAC Day, from the dawn service to the subsequent march, was remarkable, receiving extensive positive feedback from the community. This name honours two remarkable women who managed the Youth Centre and served as mentors to many young individuals over the years. Family members of both women attended the event to commemorate this important milestone, which included the ceremonial cutting of a cake. Additionally, a time capsule from the previous Youth Centre was opened, and its contents were displayed, providing a nostalgic glimpse into the past.



WINTON 60 AND BETTER

Participants of the Winton 60 & Better Program were abuzz during April with the celebration of the 150th Anniversary Reunion weekend. The group expressed their admiration for the successful event and extended their congratulations to all those involved. For many seniors, the highlight was the stunning display during Saturday's parade, marking the 150th anniversary as the most remarkable event Winton has experienced in years.

Throughout this busy month, contractors completed the painting of the interior walls in the Winton 60 & Better meeting rooms. Disruptions to the program were minimal, with activities temporarily relocated to the CWA hall; however, croquet was canceled during the painting.

The Winton 60 & Better program is thrilled to announce the return of chair yoga sessions, which will resume in May. Additionally, a new activity, morning darts, is set to commence on Fridays from 9:30 AM to 12:00 PM starting mid-May.

COMMUNITITY CARE

Community Care Services are very excited to host an information session in July with many stakeholders invited; consisting of allied health professionals, advocacy and law organisations, mental health professionals, equipment specialists and other great organisations focused around aged care and disability.

WINTON LIBRARY

Ancestry Library Edition and Facebook "150-year Centenary" page were invaluable resources whilst researching for the Winton 150 Year Centenary display. Both are packed with local history with lots of things to discover and explore.

The staff at Winton Library have seized the chance to advance their skills through online courses from the State Library of Queensland tailored for Rural Libraries of Queensland employees. The modules are tailored to address the needs of Rural Libraries Queensland (RLQ) and staff managing Indigenous Knowledge Centres (IKCs).

Library staff have also had the opportunity to complete the introductory module of 'Unlocking the Power of AI in the Outback". A workshop will later be held in Longreach.

CHILDCARE

Little Larrikins 0-2 years

The lead educator has been concentrating on developmental milestones; for instance, if a child shows delays in sensory development, the educator will prioritize activities that promote sensory play, such as slime and playdough. During enrolment, parents complete a form detailing their child's interests, which the lead educator also takes into account. Recognizing that each child is at a different developmental stage, the lead educator ensures that activities are tailored to be age-appropriate for every child.

Junior Bushies 2-3.5 years

Children are currently fascinated by Cars and Trucks. The lead educator is engaging with the children by creating tracks on the floor using tape. Additionally, the children have constructed a car wash for cleaning their vehicles. They are also focusing on numeracy skills, specifically counting from 1 to 5, and each month they explore primary colours. This month, their focus is on the colour red, where they experiment with mixing paints to discover how to create Red. Furthermore, the children enjoy imaginative play, dressing dolls and putting them to sleep.

Billabong Friends 3.5-12 years

The Lead Educator is focusing on teaching the alphabet from A to Z, which has been successfully accomplished. They are also working on blending two-letter words, such as 'or', to create the 'OR' sound. The children are recognizing letters and can articulate words that begin with those letters. Additionally, the Lead Educator is conducting number grouping activities using paddle pop sticks, illustrating examples like 2+2 and determining the result by counting.

Kindy children 12-3pm

The Lead Educator's initiative for the kindergarten children emphasizes the correlation between words and egg phonics. Additionally, they are engaging in a project on ocean pollution, where students identify pollution and create collages using images from magazines or recycled materials to depict a polluted ocean. This program also includes lessons on various types of pollution and the importance of recycling.

OSHC- Prep-year 6 3pm-5.30pm

The lead educator does homework with the school children while another educator looks after the children, this is for half an hour each afternoon. They are working on multiplications at the moment also using paddle pop sticks and grouping. The OSHC are also working on pollution also and how to recycle and what pollution effects have on the world. The OSHC children also has free play where they decide what to do, which is usually colouring in, or something to do with paints.
