We also discussed and received the first quarterly report on the outcomes delivered against the Operation Plan for the year ended 30 June 2024. A- to be carried out at some point during the period from 6 November 2023 to 5 June 2024;
B- for the primary purpose of educating and making the community aware of the requirements for the keeping of animals; and
C- for achieving improved compliance with the registration and microchipping requirements of the Animal Management (Cats & Dogs) Act 2008.

2 - Pursuant to Section 134 of the Local Government Act 2009 approves a systematic inspection program of all properties within the town boundaries of Winton:
A- to be carried out at some point during the period from 6 November 2023 to 5 June 2024; and
B- for the primary purpose of monitoring the keeping of animals under *Local Law No. 2 (Animal Management) 2011* and *Subordinate Local Law No. 2 (Animal Management) 2011*, including the keeping of excess or prohibited animals, and monitoring compliance with minimum standards.

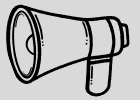

Mayor's Monthly Minute



It's hard to believe another month has passed and we're well on our way to Christmas. October wasn't quite as busy as September, with the Outback Festival closely followed by the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils Conference closing out the month, but there was still plenty happening in our small community. The tourists have started to dwindle as the weather heats up over the coming months.

The Shitbox Rally visited town with approximately 500 people in over 200 vehicles of all ages, shapes and sizes. The rally camped down at the showgrounds and were catered for by locals.

Members of the Economics & Governance Committee visited Winton during October to conduct the "public hearings inquiry into the emblems of Queensland and other legislation amendment bill 2023 and an inquiry into prehistoric dinosaur and paleo tourism in Outback Queensland". This hearing gave myself and other members of the community the chance to highlight how important Paleo Tourism is and can be to the local economy. The hearing was very well attended and I'm confident the committee got a lot of local information that will help them make a favourable report to the Parliament. The other item was the State Fossil emblem which was won by the "Muttaborrasaurus" with approximately 27% of the vote state-wide, which is phenomenal considering there was 12 finalists selected. We would have loved to see "Diamantinasaurus Matildae" selected, but it wasn't to be and a positive is that a skeletal replica of the Muttaborrasaurus is part of the Australian Dinosaur Trail.

There was a great roll up for the send-off held recently at the depot for the retirement of David "Bunt" Lenton. Bunt has been with the Council for almost 30 years and was an integral part of the construction crew. Cricky mentioned that he couldn't recall a failure while Bunt's been a part of the crew which is great recognition for not only Bunt but the WSC Construction Crew. We wish Bunt all the best in his retirement.



Mayor's Monthly Minute



Speaking about parties, Outback Futures celebrated 10 years in the Bush and 5 years of supporting our community with a get together at the Lost Poet. It was fantastic to see so many locals there to thank Outback Futures for all the great work they've done with kids and adults during this time. Many residents have benefitted from their continuing visits throughout the years and hopefully this can continue for many years to come.

Recently myself, the Deputy Mayor and CEO were in Gladstone for the Annual LGAQ Local Government Conference. The conference was attended by over 600 delegates and was a great opportunity to engage with other councils, Government Departments and State Members. Nothing beats face-to-face meetings when needing to raise issues with a Minister or Director General.

I'd also like to update the community on couple of projects that have been around for a while;

- Geothermal Plant – We are currently in legal negotiations with the Project Manager and Contractor to try and get an outcome that's best for our community. I understand the frustration in the community and I share this as this has gone on way too long. Council and our legal team is doing everything possible to get an outcome as quick as possible without jeopardising our claim.
- Youth Centre – The Youth Centre contract has gone out again for Tender. We didn't receive any suitable contractors on the first round and fingers crossed we get a favourable result second time around.

With the current fire danger warnings that we have in the region and the onset of El-Nino I encourage everyone in the shire to be very vigilant with anything that may start a fire. There's a lot of fuel in the region with the grass and drying conditions, the last thing anyone wants to see is a grass or bush fire damaging infrastructure and endangering lives.

We are getting close to the home straight of the current term of council and time to start thinking about nominating for the 2024/28 term of Local Government. If you're thinking about putting your hand up you must complete the "I want to be a Councillor Course" which is online or will be Face 2 Face in Winton on the 13th of November.

Regularly check the official Queensland Fire and Emergency Services website and social media, and tune in to local radio stations.

Call Triple Zero (000) if your life or property is under threat.

BIOSECURITY TIDBITS

How to manage invasive species

To deal with invasive species effectively, it's important for both residents and the Council work together. Residents should get to know the Council's plan for handling invasive species and this will help them identify and report any invasive species on their property. Doing this helps stop outbreaks and keeps the local environment healthy. Working together is crucial for a healthy community environment.

When you see invasive plants, the first step is to tell the Council. The Council will take care of removing them and use different methods to make sure they don't come back. This can include using chemicals, burying the plants deep underground, or burning them to stop them from growing again. Using these techniques helps manage invasive species effectively.

Aerial Baiting Review

The biannual aerial baiting week occurred 9-13th of October. Winton Shire Council would like to commend the Rural Services teams for their long days and hard efforts throughout the week to maintain our Council's commitment to our general biosecurity obligations to minimise the impacts of feral pigs, foxes, and wild dogs across the shire.



Drivers Caution

Please take caution while driving on roads passing through the commons and stay updated with drover notices posted on the Winton Shire Council's Facebook page. Keep an eye out for potential wildlife and livestock on roads across the shire, including cattle from the common area that might stray onto the main road. For the safety of all, we strongly advise both tourists and locals to practice caution, taking necessary measures to prevent any possible collisions.



Stock Routes Vegetation Coverage

The stock routes in the shire are currently heavily covered with vegetation. As we approach the summer season, the Council anticipates an increase in drover traffic as properties dry up and pastures diminish. To ensure the facilities meet maintenance requirements, ongoing maintenance of water facilities is a priority for the Council.

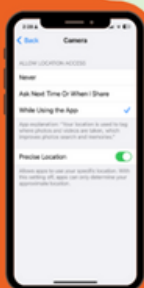

Beware of heightened snake activity in our area. Follow these crucial steps to stay safe:

- Stay Alert: Watch your surroundings, avoid tall grass, and use a torch at night.
- Wear Closed-Toe Shoes: Protect your feet.
- Maintain Distance: Do not approach snakes; back away calmly.
- Control Pets: Keep them leashed to avoid provoking snakes and monitor them in while off leash.
- Remove habitat: Be sure to mow your lawns and remove hiding places in your yard.

Recreation Grounds Irrigation



The parks and gardens crew have been hard at work upgrading the irrigation at the rec grounds. Irrigation in front of the gym has had an upgrade which will improve the quality of the lawn at the facility.

Flood Damage Works Progress

- Sealing works have been in progress along the Richmond Road with the road being primed on the 16th and sealing occurring shortly after that.
- Flood damage along Lerida and Stamford is at 70% complete.
- Webb access and Coinda Access works have been completed and the crew is moving to begin the Leesen and Tibit roads.
- Flood damage work along the Opalton road is at 20% complete.
- Richmond road RMPC graded to 20%

The completed electrical upgrades at Diamantina Gardens property have significantly improved the reliability and safety of the electrical systems, ensuring a more comfortable and secure living environment for all residents. Little Swaggies Childcare

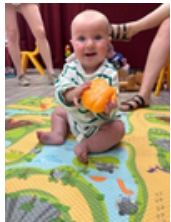

Bring the Boys & Gather the Girls

On the 9th of October, we had the privilege of being invited to Winton State School to attend a Mental Health talk delivered by Curtis Rayment. Curtis is dedicated to educate boys and young men in regional and remote areas of Queensland around consent and reshaping their understanding of masculinity. During the session, Curtis introduced a program titled "it's a man's issue," which encourages young men to actively engage in discussions surrounding consent and sexual assault. The students actively participated in the session and provided great positive feedback.



On 12th October, Outback Futures graciously extended an invitation for us to attend an event at Winton State School, titled "Gather the Girls" and "Bring the Boys". The purpose of the girls session was to address stress management, self-regulation, and grounding techniques, in order to equip them for the upcoming final term of the academic year and the subsequent assessments. The girls were provided with valuable breathing and grounding techniques to utilise at home.



The boys engaged in a discussion led by Dan (QAS) and Matt (Outback Futures), focusing on the repercussions of underage drinking and drug use. This was followed by a highly serious game of basketball, during which the boys actively participated and openly conversed. To conclude the event, the students were treated to a meal of their choice, and they eagerly anticipate the program's return next year.

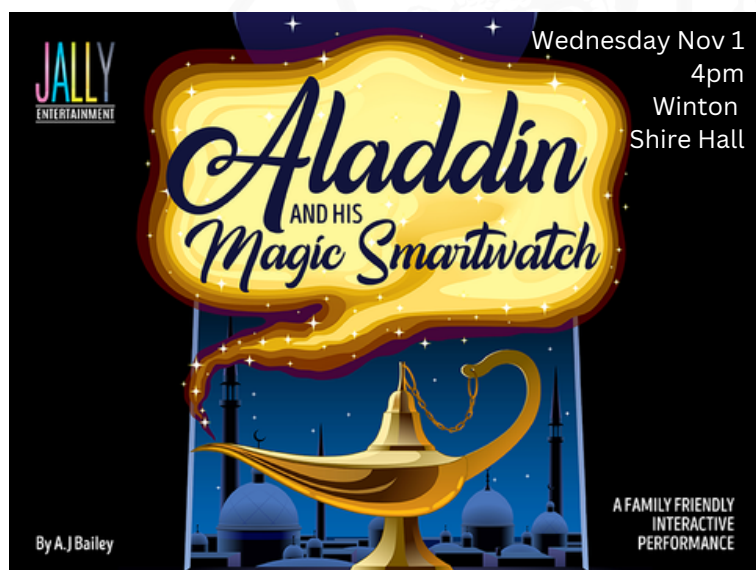
